Police believe burglars return for more loot

Police are not for certain, but they think the same persons who burglarized four businesses here last week may have returned for one more try.

Officers responded to a burglar alarm at Park Clinic just before 10:30 Sunday night to find familiar signs.

Someone had attempted to pry open the north door of the building with an object similar to ones used last week.

The would-be burglars were unable to force open the dead-bolted wooden door, and apparently used the tool to shatter the glass upper portion, possibly out of frustration.

Accompanied by Dr. Erwin Soell, they searched the interior of the building, finding no one or anything missing.

Burglars used tools taken from an auto dealership to gain entry into two businesses here Tuesday of last week, where they were able to find only about \$200 in cash.

Another tool, a screwdriver, also taken from the dealership was found in one of two Holliday businesses that were burglarized the same night, police said.

Complaints of three thefts, one burglary and one criminal mischief were listed on the week's police blotter, as were notations of three unrelated arrests.

Two tires and an eight-foot aluminum ladder were reported as stolen from a home in the 600 block of South Park Thursday. They were valued at approximately \$200.

Incumbent candidate for District Attorney, Barry Macha, also told police Thursday someone had taken 34 of his campaign signs from various locations around the city. Two of them were large, 32x48 and 48x48, and the others were smaller.

Cables off a welding machine parked in the 400 block of West Washington were reportedly taken sometime Monday.

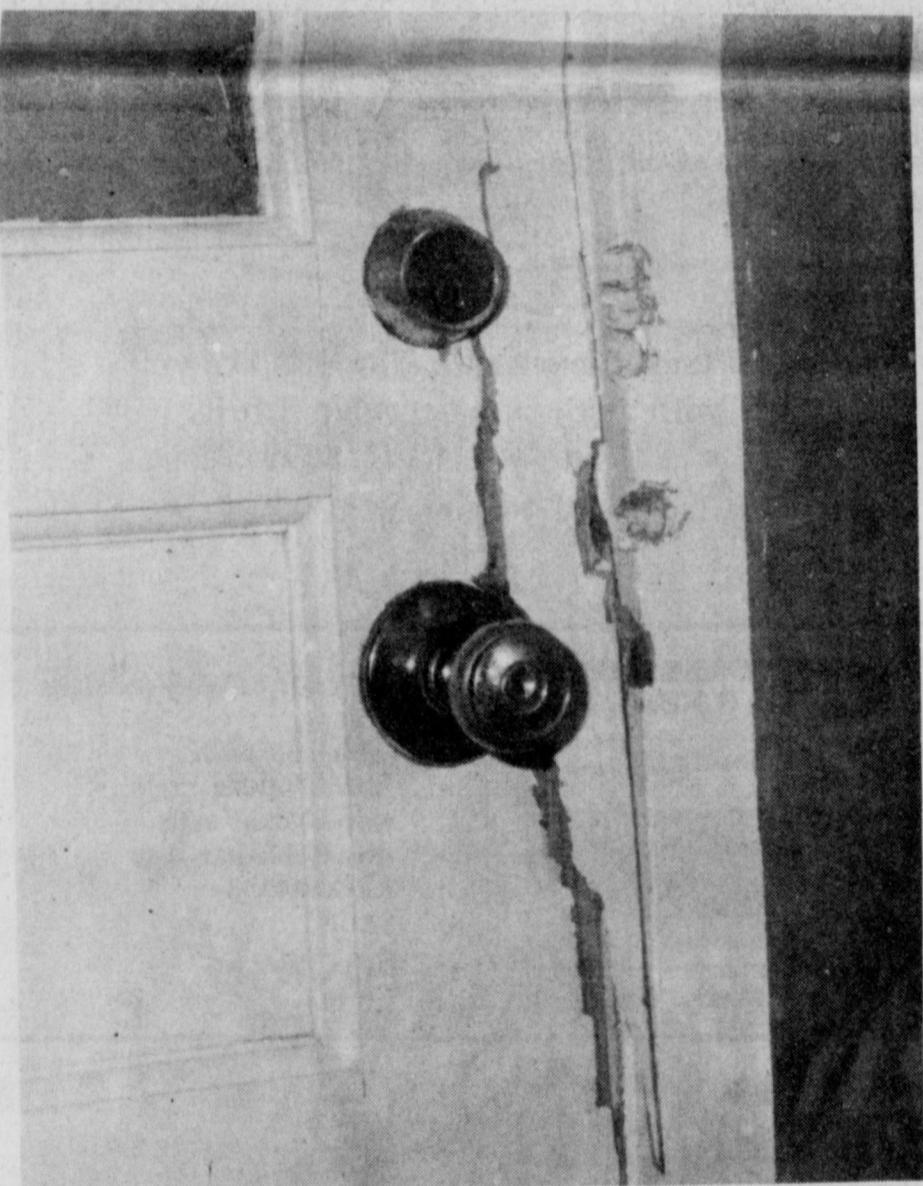
A radio, speakers, tapes and other items were taken sometime Sunday night from a vehicle parked in the 700 block of Park Plaza.

Police were informed Monday afternoon that the speakers had been recovered from a trash container in the area.

Police arrested Phillip Sheridan Krum, 36, on a charge of criminal trespass Friday night.

Krum, who had refused to leave a residence in the 300 block of West Jefferson after being warned, was later transported to county jail, according to the blotter.

Letcher was taken before Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson and released on a personal recognizance bond after promising to appear in municipal court.

He faces fines of almost \$500 on the four charges.

David Lee Hayman, 30, was arrested on the access road west of Johnson Road at 2:59 a.m. Sunday, and his car impounded.

Hayman, who was later bonded out, was charged with public intoxication-driving, no drivers license and no proof of liability insurance.

Hawks take on Bulls Friday

Their numbers cut by injuries, the Iowa Park Hawks will travel Friday to Bridgeport in search of their first district win of the season.

Kickoff for the Dist. 4-AAA contest will be at 7:30 p.m.

Three starters were listed Tuesday by Coach Len Williams as questionable because of injuries.

Tackle Frank Banks, who has had to wear a cast all season to protect a

broken thumb, severely sprained an ankle during Monday's workouts, and likely will not even suit out.

Cory Bridwell dislocated a shoulder just before the end of the first half against Graham, and was unable to work out earlier this week. He also is a tackle.

Linebacker Brian Luney, who also handles the team's punting chores, injured a knee during Friday's game, and could be sidelined this week.

While the Hawks are 1-6 on the season, Bridgeport is 3-3, and also is looking for its first win in district.

In fact, Bridgeport is still looking for its first victory, ever, against Iowa Park. This will be their seventh meeting.

Two years ago, Bridgeport was the only team the Hawks beat, 28-14, en

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Trustees name administrators

Filling voids created by the recent resignation of Iowa Park Junior High Principal Jimmy Alsup, school trustees have named three personnel to new administrative positions.

The resignation started a domino effect, because all three positions were filled from within the faculty.

Assistant high school Principal Randy Lovelady was named to replace Alsup.

Dennis Brooks, who had only begun this fall to work in the newly-created junior high assistant principal's position, was assigned to fill Lovelady's post at the high school.

Those two actions took place during the board's meeting Monday night.

Then, in a called meeting Tuesday night, the board named Steve Moody as the junior high assistant principal.

The selection of Moody, who has been teaching American history in the eighth grade since 1988, was made after a closed-door interview with him and another candidate.

The two candidate finalists were nominated from a field of nine, seven from the Iowa Park faculty and two not employed here, following interviews conducted by Lovelady and Supt. Glen Mitchell.

Interviews will not begin to fill the teaching vacancy created by the appointment of Moody, who has a total of eight years experience in education. He reportedly began his new duties Wednesday morning.

Alsup tendered his resignation, effective Nov. 30. He reportedly is unable to work, citing an injury to his back.

Also during the meeting, trustees approved a new pay scale for all administrative personnel except that of superintendent. In some cases, the number of working days in a year were also adjusted.

The new salaries and work days include: assistant superintendent, \$49,236, 226 days; high school principal, \$46,236, 226 days; junior high principal, \$40,500, 216 days; elementary principals, \$42,236, 226 days; assistant high school principal, \$35,397, 207 days, and assistant junior high principal, \$28,640, 183 days.

There will actually be less tax dollars involved in the total amount, since the resignation of Alsup, Supt. Mitchell explained.

Salaries prior to the increases and

Alsup's retirement were \$287,800. The new salary total is \$284,481.

OTHER BUSINESS

The board approved acceptance of the lowest of two bids for the purchase of 60 chairs for the choir department. Total bid by Hoover Brothers was \$1,041.

Also approved was a transfer request from City View School District student Stephan Paulk, an eleventh grader.

New student travel policies were approved, as were requests for student field trips and setting of per-mile transportation costs.

Enrollment this month in the dis-

News Briefs

City council slates meeting

Action on three bids, appointments to three boards and a resolution are on the tentative agenda for Monday's meeting of the city council.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Appointments will be made to the city's board of adjustments and planning and zoning commission, as well as a joint appointment with the school board for a local representative to the county tax appraisal district.

Aldermen will consider approving

bid specifications for the electrical, heating, ventilation and air conditioning of the Recreational Activities Center; authorizing the city administrator to advertise for bids to purchase a new sanitation truck, and also to purchase water line materials for the looping project in the northwest part of the city.

The resolution to be considered is accepting the contracted work at the RAC, and authorizing payment of the final bill.

The other work at the RAC was not included in the initial building's contract.

Sales tax picture is bright

Iowa Park's sales tax rebate check this month was 16.11-percent greater than the October check in 1989, according to a release from the state comptroller's office.

The check was \$12,920.15, raising the year's total to \$134,861.09. That is almost a complete percentage point, 0.60, higher than the \$134,061.72 reported for the tenth month last year.

Only one other city in Wichita County is on the plus side, according to the report. Electra is 8.05-percent higher for the period than last year. Burkburnett is a minus 1.95-percent and Wichita Falls a minus 0.20.

Holliday is a minus 16.44-percent.

The October checks reflect taxes collected on August sales and reported in late September by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Scope of ESA program topic

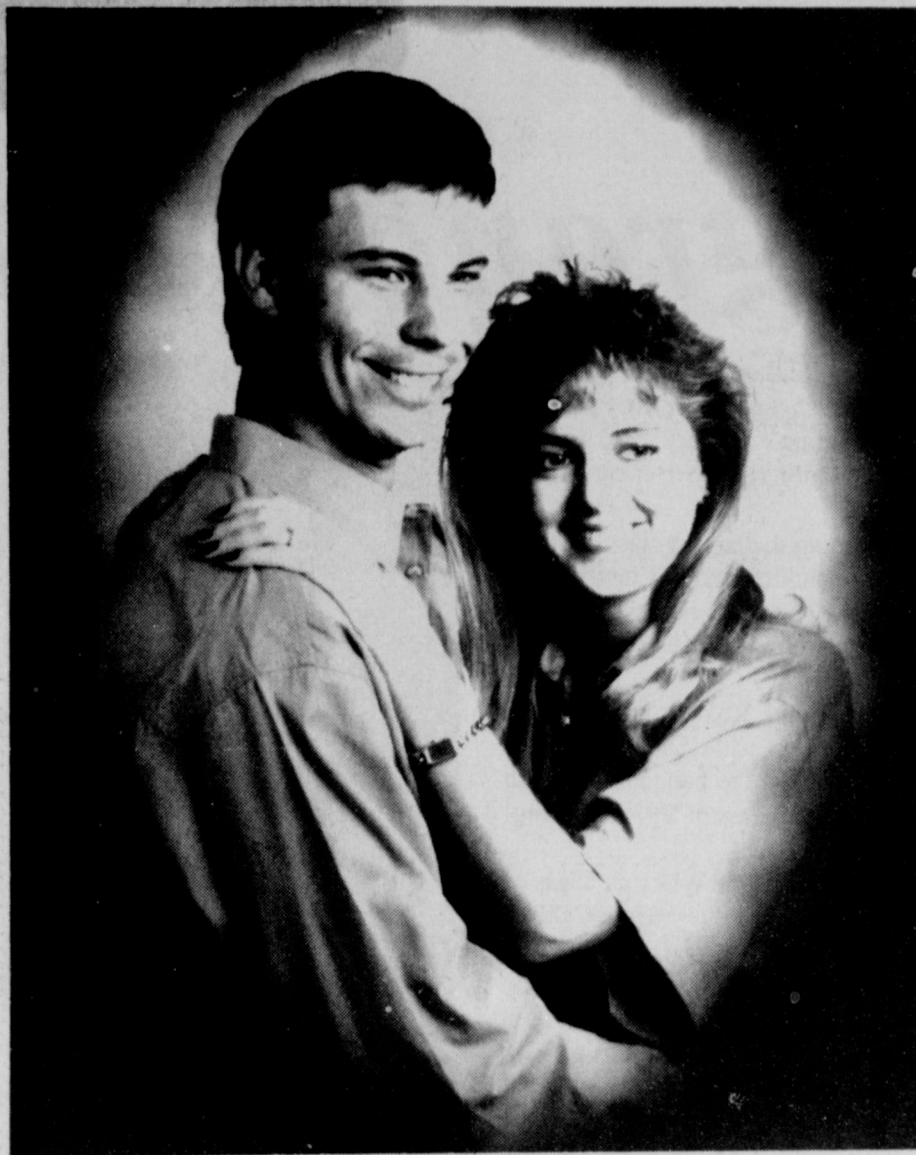

As I See It. . .

A little-known fact is that a member of the Texas A&M Aggie football team and directly responsible for the "12th man" tradition, was a regular visitor in Iowa Park over many years. His name was Harry Pinson, and he and his wife, Mildred, used to be regular visitors, primarily around Christmas

time, of the late Hill Spruiell and his family. It is sad to say, but Mr. Pinson's funeral was held Sept. 14 at the Church of the Good Shepherd in Corpus Christi. He was the victim of a car crash and was 90 years of age. One of Hill's sons, Glenn, brought

me the information about the famed, but little-known Mr. Pinson. I'd like to share it with you. Pinson was a 150-pound running back and defensive back for the Aggies in the early 1920s, earning a varsity letter in 1921. He was indirectly responsible for the creation of the 12th man. In the final game of the '21 regular season, Pinson broke a leg in a scoreless tie with Texas. So the Aggies were a man short at a key position for their meeting with Centre College in Dallas' Dixie Classic. That Classic, a forerunner of the Cotton Bowl, was when Coach Dana X. Bible sent word to E. King Gill just before halftime to "get suited up" because he "might be needed." Gill had quit football to play basketball at the close of the regular season but was used as a press box spotter for that post season game. Beneath the stands, he swapped clothes with an injured player but he wasn't needed or used as the Aggies won that game, 22-14. Ever since, however, A&M's student body has stood during all Aggie games, volunteering their services.

SCHOOL SCENE

Iowa Park teachers are incorporating the "assertive discipline" method of behavior management in all classrooms.

Teachers had an opportunity during fall in-service to attend a one day workshop on the discipline plan. Assertive discipline is a positive, skill-based approach to classroom management--a system of rules and consequences, balanced with rewards for appropriate behavior.

Emphasis is on "responsibility" and what students can do to succeed in school and in life.

In order for any discipline plan to be effective, it must have the support of the community. The information given here will help parents better understand the concept behind this new approach to discipline in the schools.

At the beginning of the school year, teachers explain their "student responsibility" plans to all of their classes. Each teacher's rules, consequences and rewards may differ, but they all present their plans in the same way.

Students are told they are in control of their own behavior. The choice of how to behave and what will hap-

pen as a result of that behavior is completely up to them.

Strength of the program is that it teaches the students that they have the power to make decisions in their lives, and that with that power they can create and define a successful future for themselves. And if students do make a wrong choice, they receive the appropriate consequences, but the emphasis remains positive.

By focusing on positive reinforcement to reduce disruptive behavior, teachers hope to help their students maximize their success in school.



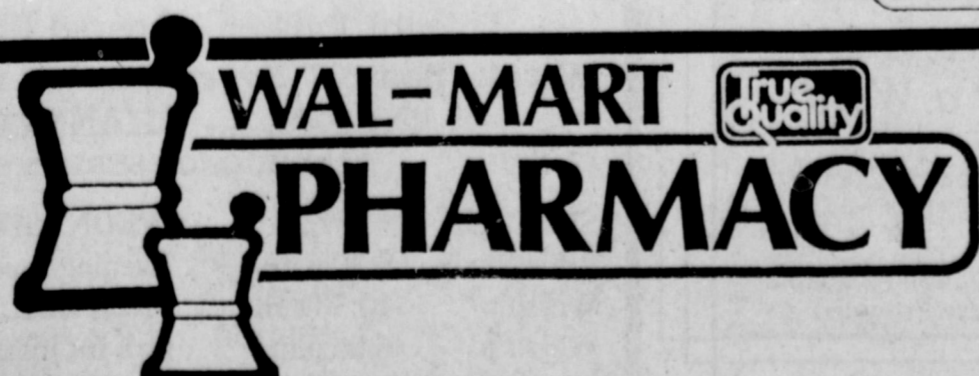

Middle East work explained to Baptist Women

Mrs. S. B. Reaves gave an interesting review of Jordan, one of the five countries on a newspaper format that describes some of the ways that Southern Baptists are performing in the Middle East, Monday Night for a meeting of the Thelma Smith Baptist Women. The meeting was held at First Baptist Church and the hostesses were Mrs. O.S. McLemore and Mrs. V.I. Woodfin.

The format was prepared by Irma Duke, assistant vice president of communications operation for the Foreign Mission Board's Printing Department. It was prepared with a two-fold purpose: to take away the mysticism of Islam, and to bring about understanding of this world's religion and love for the millions of Muslims in the Middle East, United States and other parts of the world.

Mrs. Reaves gave a brief history of Jordan which she described "as old as the Bible and as new as video games

and wax-floored skating rinks." She said that the first inhabitants settled in Cannan on the bank of the Jordan River around 2000 B.C. The Jordanian Christians trace their religious roots to the Christians that came to what is now Israel in the 11th, 12th and 13th centuries. Mrs. Reaves said that only seven percent of the population of Jordan today is Christian and the rest is Muslim.

Special interest in the study Monday night was placed on the Baptist schools in Ammon and Ajloun, and Mrs. Reaves, being a classroom teacher for many years and having visited Jordan on two occasions, was qualified to handle the subject of schools.

She also discussed five things that characterize the Muslims: Allah, the Supreme Being of Islam, the creed, Mosque, Mohammed, and the annual pilgrimage to Mecca. She showed a

bottle of water from the Jordan River that she brought back from one of her tours, and described mansaf, a dish that is as traditional in Jordan as the turkey is in America, to enhance interest.

Mrs. Woodfin led the prayer period for missionaries on the birthday

calendar and conducted a brief business meeting before the mission program. Fourteen members were present.



WHAT ABOUT CLAIMS OF TONGUES TODAY?
Apostles can no longer lay hands on people and impart this special gift. Of all the people who had these special miraculous gifts, only the laying on of the apostles' hands would give them special powers. Philip was a spirit-filled evangelist from Jerusalem who could work miracles. When Philip went to Samaria, because he was not an apostle, he had to wait for the apostles Peter and John to come and lay hands on certain people. (Acts 8:14-19). Since the death of the apostle John at the close of the first century, there has been no possibility of men receiving miraculous spiritual gifts through these means. When the last man on whom the apostles had laid their hands died, miraculous gifts in special measure by the hands of men (like healing incurable diseases such as cleansing lepers, restoring sight to the blind, drinking poison, raising the dead or speaking in a tongue or language they had never heard or known so that people could understand) ceased to exist.
Paul said by inspiration that miraculous gifts would cease when the Perfect thing was revealed to men. (1 Cor. 13:8-10). The purpose for these gifts was to confirm and establish the gospel and to edify the Christian until such time as: (1) the revelation of the gospel was complete; (2) the church was growing strong within; (3) church leaders could be developed by normal means.
We have in the Bible, the perfect law of liberty (James 1:25) which will give us all that pertains unto life and godliness (2 Peter 1:3), and we can be thoroughly furnished unto every good work (2 Timothy 3:16, 17).
Spiritual gifts were helping hands to an infant church. God has removed the miraculous, direct help from the church's grasp and walks by our side giving us direction, aid, and warning in His Word. We do not need special miraculous helps, for our Lord is not a respecter of persons and has given every Christian adequate instruction in His wonderful Word, the Bible.
The obvious conclusion is that miraculous gifts, such as speaking in tongues, is not available to men today. Whatever else may be said of modern day claimants of such powers, it cannot be said that such claims are based on scriptural authority. It therefore becomes our duty to refute such false claims and to brand those who make the claims as false teachers. They may fool you, but not the Lord. Beware!



Mrs. Reaves shares memories

Last weekend the thoughts of many residents turned to the past as ex-students returned to Iowa Park for homecoming.

An Iowa Parkan remembered one person, Grace Reaves, who graduated here 75 years ago, and reported it to the Leader.

Mrs. Reaves, who was Grace Mills, is one of five graduates out of the class of 16 who is still living. One lives in Wichita Falls, two in Dallas and one in San Antonio. Mrs. Reaves keeps in touch with one, Alma Hall of Dallas.

In 1915 the high school was near the present location of the current junior high school building. In those

days of mostly "readin' 'ritin' and 'rithmetic" there was very little extra-curricular activity.

Part of the curriculum was elocution (public speaking) and music. Mrs. Reaves remembers that her music teacher was Sally Harbour, a member of an early day Iowa Park family.

The high school principal in 1915 was Miss Bess Sherrod, who later became Mrs. Bob Brubaker, long time residents of Iowa Park.

After graduation, Mrs. Reaves received her BS degree from West Texas State Teachers College, now West Texas State University, Canyon. After receiving her degree, she taught school for 52 years.

Mrs. Reaves did graduate work at the University of Colorado at Boulder and the University of Denver.

Her first school was at Deep Creek, south of Iowa Park, where she taught two years. In 1921 she was married to the late S.B. Reaves

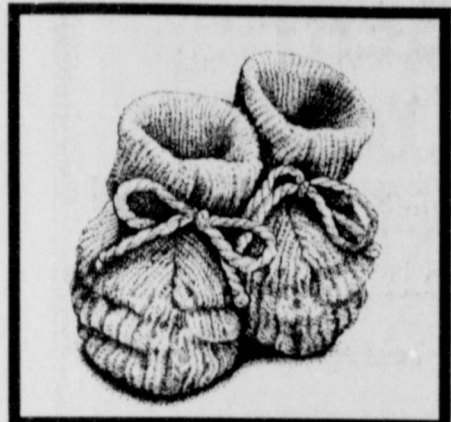
She was principal of Valley View School for 14 years. She taught fifth and sixth grades and in junior high school in Iowa Park 29 years.

After she quit teaching in Iowa Park, she was asked to help out three weeks at Our Lady Queen of Peace in Wichita Falls until they could find a teacher. She taught there seven years.

She has not completely retired from the teaching field. She doesn't teach in public schools anymore, but is a substitute teacher for her Sunday School class at First Baptist Church, where she has been a member for 76 years, and is one of the teachers of mission books in Thelma Smith Baptist Women.

Mrs. Reaves and her husband traveled extensively and she continues to do so.

She has just returned from a trip to Austria and Germany, which is her third time to tour those countries. She says she would be ready to return there tomorrow.

Graham edges Hawks in loop opener

Friday's Dist. 4-AAA opener between Iowa Park and Graham lived up to its advance billing as being evenly matched, and could very well have wound up in a 3-3 tie.

As it was, however, the Hawks dropped the contest, 10-0, before a capacity homecoming crowd, and their season record fell to 1-5.

Graham took the lead with 2:25 remaining in the second quarter on a 29-yard field goal.

With only 3:53 left in the game, the Hawks' Todd Pulley attempted to tie the score with a 39-yarder. The kick had plenty of distance, but narrowly missed the upright to the right.

Shortly afterward, Graham's Johnny Reddell stole a fourth-down desperation pass by Robert Denton and raced 46 yards to virtually put the game on ice. When the extra point was kicked, making the score 10-0, only 1:13 remained on the scoreboard clock.

Reddell's defensive touchdown soothed his failures on offense. He had coughed up all four of the fumbles Iowa Park had covered during the contest.

Graham's field goal was set up by Iowa Park's only lost fumble, which ended the

Hawks' most serious drive.

Early in the second quarter, Graham was forced to punt, and Greg Steger returned the ball six yards to his 31. In quick order, Denton completed a 15-yard pass to Chad Reis and Johnny Duggins had runs of 15 and 11 yards.

Then, on the fourth play, the handoff between Denton and Duggins was muffed, and a Steer covered the miscue on the Graham 29.

Eight plays later, Graham was on the Hawk eight yard line. But two tackles behind the line of scrimmage that lost a net three yards back to the 11, forced the field goal attempt which easily cleared the bar.

Reddell's fourth fumble was covered by Brian Luney on the Graham 29 yard line with 6:21 remaining in the game. Sophomore Chris Williams earned a first down on runs of eight and two yards, and then Steger advanced the ball to the 17.

But Denton threw one of his three incompletions of the evening, and then was sacked for a five-yard loss, and that was when Pulley was asked to try the field goal.

Reddell actually lost two of his fumbles to Luney, while the other two were covered by Steger and Gary Green. Robert Cargal

forced one of the fumbles and Green another.

The Steers kept pressure on Denton all night, allowing him to get off only nine passes. He completed six of them. But he was sacked for losses seven times, five of those coming in the first half.

Pulley hauled in three of the passes, one of them a 47-yarder that had been tipped by a Steer safety. The other receptions were by Luney, Don McIlroy and Reis.

Johnny Duggins was the leading rusher for Iowa Park, carrying 12 times for 59 yards. Williams, just pulled up from the Junior Varsity, carried three times and gained 17 yards.

The Hawks had to play the entire second half without the services of junior tackle Cory Bridwell, who dislocated his right shoulder just before halftime.

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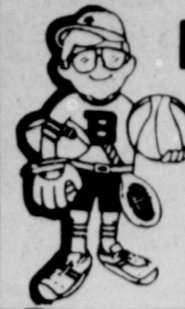

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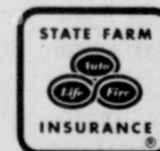


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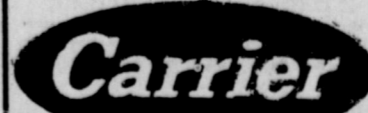
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7th graders stomp Burk

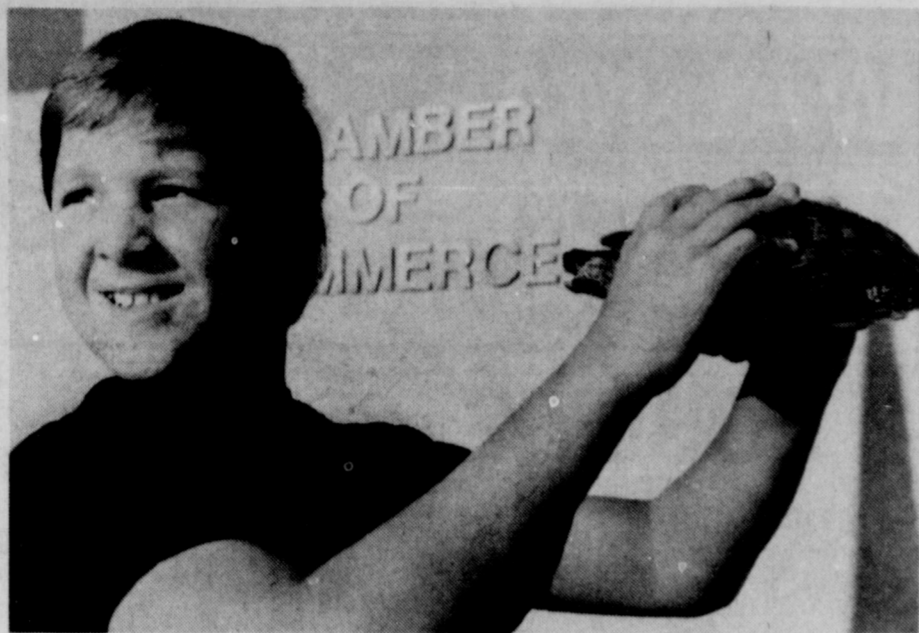

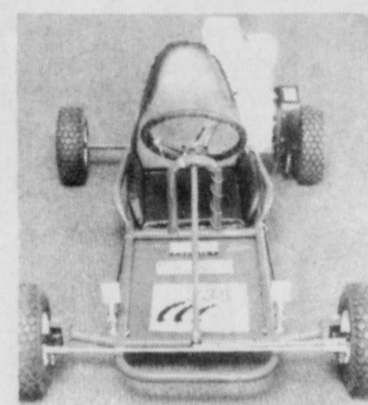

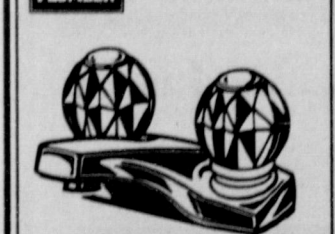
