





Denominational people tell me that you don't have to be members of their denomination to be saved. They say that there are many who are saved who are not in their denomination, nor any denomination. They admit that you do not have to hear their peculiar denominational doctrine in order to be saved and to go to heaven. But, they say that you must hear the gospel of Christ and accept Christ as Savior or you cannot be saved. This is an admission that their denominational doctrine is not the gospel of Christ.

We are affirming that "our denomination is the only one that is right," for the church of our Lord is not a denomination. Our plea is "no denomination", but just simple New Testament Christians in the body of Christ which is His church (Eph. 1:22,23). Let us do away with denominational names, denominational organizations, and just worship and serve God in the way He directs in His word apart from all human organizations.

Let us wear no human names, have no human authority for what we do and maintain the divine pattern of the church and worship of saints just as we read about the church the Lord established over 1900 years ago. In this way we can have ALL spiritual blessings (Eph. 1:3).




