and endings in Roman mythology, seems to have had an influence on the activities of Garry Stamm.

January, the month named for the Roman patron, has figured prominently in the beginnings and endings in Stamm's life.

They have had many beginnings and endings in trying to get their yard started. But, perserverance has paid off and as a result their yard was named Yard of the Monn en Club.

The Stamm bought their home at 10 Bentwood in 1987 and had the yard Bentwood. Because of an exyard landscaped. Because of an ex-
tremely cold winter (part of it in January) many of their shrubs died. So they had to start over.

They decided they would do the work themselves. Stamm was not well acquainted with the soil in Texas. In his home state of Nebraska, he says,
the ground and it grows." He hasn't exactly found that to be true in Texas. Stamm bought oak trees and set them out only to have them die. He decided maybe they were too young, so he bought larger ones and planted them. They are doing well. The Stamms have lived in Iowa Park almost 13 years, moving here U.S. Army as a Grecn Beret. His entry into the military was the eginning of his January experiences. Stamm was born on a farm in Nebraska. He graduated high school in 1952, worked on a farm and did construction work until 1958. At that time he enlisted in the army
called fell in January. He first was told he would start training in October or November, then in December, but he decided to wait until after Christmas, and that was when his affair with January started.
He was sent to Okinawa in 1966 and there he met his future wife, Kinuko. Later that year he was sent
back to the United States and heme ack to the United States and home. In the meantime he had volunI told my mother what I had done of told my mother what I had done of course

Whiie he was at home he and his ather went to see his brother, travelling the interstate. That was Stamm's first experience. "But I knew you could not pass up the right exit and back up so you could take it," he ommented.
His dad went about 100 yards beyond the exit he was to take. Stamm
said, "I was scared and
had a few words about ii.
had a few words about it. my mother she net bacdn't wome I told about my mother she needn't worry about
me. I would rather go to Vietnam as a Green Beret than to try to drive on an interstate. I was trained for what I did as a Green Beret. She felt better about me going to Vietnam after that," he added.

After a year in Vietnam Stamm's orders were to go back to Okinawa. There he found Kinuko again. She ha been afraidied Jan 31, 1969 were married Jan. 31, 1969

Then in January 1971 Stamm was sent back to the United States. He
retired from service Jan. 31, 1978 at Fort Deven, Mass.
The Stamms had a home in North Carolina, but did not want to go there to live. They didn't want to live in Massachusetts and they sure didnt

## PHYSICIAN SAYS:

## Flu shots suggested

Montus recommended for persons to take flu shots have varied in the past, but one physician now says November sthe recommended period.
Dr. Earl Watson said a package insert provided by the manufacturer of the vaccine says November is the time or the shots.
"We used to start giving flu shots in August when the vaccine wasreccived" he recalled. "Teacher physical exam forms used to say September. Then October was suggested.
"No one knows when the worst of the flu season will arrive, so we shouldn't wait too late. The flu shot won't help if you already have the disease," Watson said.

Senior citizens will receive a $\$ 10$ discount on their flu shots Tuesday immediately after the lunch period at the Friendly Door.

Residents at the nursing home are receiving flu shots, without charge. Pneumonia shots are still considered "permanent," Dr. Watson said for the information of those who have already received them

They are to build protection against 23 kinds of bacteria that causes pneumonia. "A person weakened by flu may have both for best protection," Wauld have bo

Every 10 years, diphtheria and tetanus shots should be taken, and can be administered at the same time. Hepatitis B immunizations are be ing given as a disease preventative for the health care workers in the city.
"But these are not as necessary for everybody to consider as are flu, diphtheria, tetanus and pneumonia shots,"
the physician said.

and the loss of two starting linemen led to the 9-7 Hawks' loss here Friday to Bowie. The defeat, only the second-ever to a Jackrabbit team, virtually eliminated any hope Iowa Park may have had for a playoff berth. The Hawks are now 1-2 in district and $2-6$ on the season. When Bowie scored its touchdown in the third period to take the lead, it was only the first touchdown given up by the Mean Green defense to a Dist. 4-AAA opponent.

Quarterback Robert Denton was sacked by the aggressive Hare defenders seven times for 49 yards. The junior also suffered three interceptions, though none of them aided Bowie's scoring.
The fourth turnover, a muffed handoff from Denton to Johnny Duggins on the Hawk 15 early in the second period, did set up the visitors' 35 -yard field goal.
lowa Park scored on its second possession to cap a 67 -yard drive. Greg Steger sprinted around his right end four yards with 36 seconds remaining in the opening quarter, and Todd Pulley added the extra point. En route to the goal line, Steger caught a pass for 23 yards, Pulley scampered 16 yards, and two penalties against the Jackrabbits were major plays.

On the first of the two penalties, Steger

Bowie was called for being off sides when the ball was snapped. Then, three plays later, sophomore Chris Williams had picked up four yards to the eight, and one of the Bowie players was charged with unsportsmanlike actions and four more yards were tacked on, setting up Steger's run from the four.

After the Hawks' fumble at their own 15, Charles Jolly caused a fumble that was reclaimed by Bowie at the 18 . Two pass attempts fell incomplete, and Bowie was forced to kick for its first points.

Shortly after Bowie lit up the scoreboard with its three-pointer, the first of the two Hawk linemen left the field. Tackle Jeremy Pruitt walked off the field on his own with a shoulder injury.

Unable to pick up a first down after taking the second half kickoff, the Hawks were forced to punt. Joel Mcllroy, who handled the punting chores in the game, sailed the ball to the Bowie 32. But his brother, Don, arrived a bit too early and was flagged for interfering with the punt's receiver.
That advanced the ball to the Hares' 47. From there, Bowie alternated runs and passes until they reached the Iowa Park

There, on second down, Bowie was held to no gain, but sophomore tackle Scott McNeely suffered a season-ending injury on the play. His right leg was broken just above the knee, coaches report.

On the next play, Bowie completed a seven-yard pass to score, with 5:32 remaining in the third period. The extra point kick was blocked, and Pulley caught the ball and was pulled down from behind, 17 yards downfield.
The Hawks earned six first downs in the first period of the contest, and only two more the rest of the evening, one each in the third and fourth periods. Bowi's only first down of the opening half was on picked up four on the touchdown drive, and added two more in the final 12 minutes.
Steger wound up being the Hawks' leading rusher with 35 yards on 12 carries; Duggins had 23 on eight. Steger also caught three of the five completed passes for another 43 yards.
