## Hawks to host Lions Friday

Playing the number one ranked team in the state in their final game of the season has not intimidated Iowa Park's Hawks.

"We're tired of hearing about them," said Head Hawk Len Williams about the Vernon Lions. "Our players are ready to get it on."

Iowa Park will host Vernon in Hawk Stadium Friday, with the kickoff set for 7:30 p.m.

After defeating the Hawks 48-14 last fall, the Lions advanced all the way to the state championship game, where they were edged 22-21 by Mexia.

That was the third consecutive loss to Vernon for Iowa Park, whose Hawks haven't defeated the Lions since 1986, with the unusual score of 5-0.

Since the two clubs began playing each other in 1970, Iowa Park has won nine, lost 10 and tied once. The Hawks have shut out the Lions five times, been shut out four, and that tied score, in 1984, ended 0-0.

Coach Leo Brittain returned 22 lettermen from 1989, which is part of the reason the Lions have remained the top-rated Class AAA team in the state since before the start of the season.

The key player of the Lion offense is tailback Derrick Richardson, who rushed for more than 2,200 yards and scored 32 touchdowns in 1989.

Ken Collums, the district quarter mile champ last spring, passed for more than 1,200 yards last season, completing 16 for touchdowns.

Coach Brittain, who is in his 15th season at the helm of the Lions, admittedly has the best line ever. Nine of them are 200 pounds or more, including Willard Wilson, who tips the scales at 278.

Because of the strength of the Lion line, several of the teams that have faced Vernon this season have taken to the airways.

In the season-opener, Altus completed nine of 16 pass attempts for a whopping 253 yards, while being held to only 83 rushing. Vernon won that game 35-26.


Wichita Falls High, which lost 48-13, completed five of 16 passes for 54 yards, but was able to pick up 91 rush-

In the game with Burkburnett, won by the Lions 33-0, the Bulldogs were able to get off the big play through the airways, but none of them long enough to reach the end zone. Completing only four of 31 attempts, Burk still had 215 yards passing and 113 rushing.

Junior quarterback for the Hawks, Robert Denton, likely will be called upon to test the Lion secondary.

While he suffered his poorest completion test of the season last week at Breckenridge, completing only 28 percent of his 32 attempts for 65 yards, he entered that game with a 56 percent completion rate.

After sitting out the season opener against Burkburnett with a bruised

shoulder, Denton has completed 68 of 134 attempts in eight games for 760

His leading receiver is another junior, Greg Steger, who has snagged 15 for 184 yards, a 12.3-yard average.

Steger is also the club's secondleading rusher. He has carried the ball 51 times for 332 yards, a 6.5 average.

Another junior, Johnny Duggins, continues to lead the Hawks on the ground, however. Thus far he's been handed the ball 111 times and gained 474. His 75 yards against Breckenridge last week was his second-best effort of

The Hawks have suffered throughout the season with injuries, having at least two starters on the sideline each of their nine games.

Coach Williams listed starting guard J'Bill Merrick, who missed last week with a shoulder injury, as being questionable for the season finale.

## Area's voters turn out in near-record numbers

Despite many predictions by the media that voters wouldn't turn out for Tuesday's general election, voting was heavy in the four Iowa Park area boxes.

In fact, 55 percent of all registered voters in precincts 32, 33, 34 and 60 cast ballots, either at the polls or absentee.

As usual, the largest turnout of voters was in precinct 32, where 1,649 ballots were cast. That was 57.4 percent of the 2,871 who were registered.

Precinct 60 had the highest percentage of responders, 62.6, when 293 of the 466 registered voters cast ballots.

Precinct 34 also was high, with 53.8 percent voting (209 of 395).

Only precinct 33 had fewer than half its 923 registered voters to mark ballots. Four hundred twenty four, or 45.9 percent, were counted there.

An exceptionally high number, 594, of those casting ballots were straight ticket voters. That was 23 percent of those who cast ballots in the four area

Local voters were about as equally divided between the two gubernatorial candidates as were those across the state.

Democrat Ann Richards received eight more votes, 1,079 to 1,071, than did Republican Clayton Williams.

Williams carried precinct 32, 706-649, and precinct 60, 141-108, but Richards made up the difference in precinct 33, 216-145, and precinct 34,

Incumbent U.S. Representative Bill Sarpalius was an easy winner in the area, carrying all four boxes handily. The same was true of incumbent U.S. Senator Phil Gramm.

On the county level, incumbent District Attorney Barry Macha carried all four of the boxes, and easily defeated challenger Ron Poole.

In the race for 30th District Judge, incumbent Bob Brotherton carried only two of the area boxes, but they were enough to overshadow his challenger Perry Wesbrooks.

Brotherton carried boxes 32 and 60 to total 1,153 of the area votes. Wesbrooks' two boxes were 33 and 34, but his total was only 1,088.

Both Macha and Brotherton were declared overall winners.

Also, Marsha Watson handily defeated Glenn Criswell for the office of county treasurer. She also was the across-county winner.

The only local candidate whose name was on the ballot was incumbent Justice of the Peace for Precinct 3, Bill Robinson. He was unopposed.

In two major races where area voters were outnumbered on the state level concerned those of commissioner of agriculture and railroad commissioner.

None of the four area boxes were dominated by votes for Republican Rick Perry in his challenge of incumbent Democrat Jim Hightower for commissioner of agriculture.

Hightower won in the four boxes 1,252-919, but Perry was declared the winner over the state.

Republican Beau Boulter carried two of the four boxes in his race for railroad commissioner, but Democrat Bob Krueger carried boxes 33 and 34, as well as the state.

A 19-year-old Iowa Park woman was allegedly sexually assaulted in the area during the early morning hours

The woman lodged her complaint with Iowa Park police at 4 a.m., according to the police blotter.

But, because the assault reportedly took place at Burnett Park, at the FM 368 crossing of the Wichita River, the case was turned over to the county sheriff's department.

Deputy David Duke, who is investigating the case, said medical evidence indicates there was an assault on the woman with a foreign object, and he is narrowing down a list of suspects in

A convenience store clerk who saw the victim and suspect earlier in the evening described him as a white male, 20-30 years of age, dark brown hair and driving a 1977 or '78 Monte Carlo style vehicle, according to the blotter.

Police arrested a Vernon man for public intoxication late Tuesday evening who was later arrested at Vernon for theft of approximately \$7,500.

Johnny Harris was taken into custody at 11:30 p.m. in the 400 block of East Highway, on a charge of public intoxication. His car was impounded.

While he was being booked in at

the station, it was discovered he was carrying a large amount of cash.

He was allowed to pay his fine, \$69, and also paid to have his car taken out of impoundment, all apparently with the money he was alleged to have taken.

## "Supercities" program of Baptist Women

## Red Cross slates screenings

Wichita County Chapter of the American Red Cross will conduct cholesterol, glucose and blood pressure screenings Nov. 10-18 during the fourth annual "Know Your Number" project.

Screenings will be offered in Iowa Park Saturday, Nov. 10 and Monday, Nov. 12 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. A \$5 donation for each screening is requested, however, no one will be turned away if they are unable to pay.

Screenings also will be offered in Burkburnett and Electra. The Red Cross will be set up at Sikes Senter Saturday, Nov. 10-16, and at 1809 Fifth Street Nov. 12-16.


The Red Cross has served more than 30,000 people in community screenings throughout the North Texas, Southern Oklahoma area.

Wichita County Chapter of the Red Cross has the largest cholesterol screening program of any chapter in the United States. Results from these screenings indicate about two-thirds of those persons tested have cholesterol levels borderline or above.

Cholesterol is a waxy substance found naturally in the body and essential to the body's functioning. It becomes dangerous when it gets to high level since heavy deposits in the arteries restrict the flow of blood.

The National Institutes for Health released findings in 1987 which indicate that a desirable number is defined as being less than 200 milligrams of cholesterol. To find out what your number is, drop by at one of the sites Nov. 10-18.

Cholesterol and glucose screenings use a non-fasting specimen. Blood is drawn from the fingers and placed in a reflotron analyzer which returns the results in about three minutes. After the reading is taken, counselors will talk to each participant.

## Buckaroos overcome Hawks' halftime lead

The Breckenridge Buckaroos overcame a 2-0 halftime deficit with a pair of field goals and a long touchdown run in the third period to earn a 20-10 decision over the Hawks Friday night.

Actually, the host Bucks were credited with only six offensive plays that gained 11 or more yards, and scored on two of those.

Iowa Park's young Mean Green almost totally dominated the first half, especially the second quarter. In that 12-minute period, the Bucks were held to a minus 13 net yards on offense.

Meanwhile, Charles Jolly sacked the Breckenridge quarterback for a two-point safety. And time ran out on the scoreboard clock with the Hawks only inches away from the goal line.

Both teams exchanged touchdowns in the final period. Breckenridge again scored on a long run. But that was offset by a seven-yard TD pass reception by Greg Steger that was followed by another Robert Denton aerial to Steger for two more points.

On the fourth play of the game, Todd Pulley covered the first of four Breck fumbles, on the Bucks' 49. The Hawks appeared to have their first penetration to the Bucks' 10 on a 17-yard pass to Steger, but a 10-yard holding penalty killed that drive.

Eventhough the Hawks completely dominated the second quarter, during which Johnny Duggins compiled 42 of his evening's 75-yard total and Denton completed four passes to four receivers for 33 more yards, Iowa Park was able to put only two points on the scoreboard.

When Breckenridge kicked off following the safety, Steger returned the ball from his own 30 to the Bucks' 26. Duggins carried three times and Steger once to reach the eight where, on fourth down and needing four yards for a first, Denton ran to the two

Steger gained one and Denton put the nose of the ball on the line on a quarterback sneak. With 13 ticks still on the clock, a snap from center Lewis Skinner to Denton didn't connect. Iowa Park maintained the ball, but time ran out and the Hawks were denied their touchdown.

Iowa Park took the second half opening kickoff, but was forced to punt four plays later from the Hawk 27. But a major penalty on the play set the ball back on Iowa Park's 14, and Joel McIlroy's kick was taken on the Hawk 37.

A 22-yard pass advanced the ball to the Iowa Park 15. But Breckenridge was held to a minus two yards on three plays, and kicked a 33-yard field goal.

On their next possession, the Hawks picked up a first down, but finally had to punt. From the Hawks' 47, Breckenridge got off two of their longest runs, 16 and 11 yards, but stalled on the eight yard line. That set up Breck's second field goal, a 28-yarder, and gave the hosts a 6-2 lead with 3:04 remaining in the third quarter.

Pulley returned the following kickoff to the Hawks' 49. But a gamble to gain two yards for a first down four plays later backfired when Chris Williams was held without a gain.

Breckenridge picked up 15 and two yards, and then broke on the longest play of the game, 39 yards, to lead 13-2 with 1:05 still to play in the period.

After the teams exchanged possession with two punts each, Denton suffered his first interception of the evening, and the ball was returned from the 50 to the Iowa Park 30. Breckenridge broke for its second touchdown on the next play and kicked the extra point with 2:35 remaining in the contest.

Unable to advance the ball after three incomplete passes, McIlroy again punted. This time he sailed the ball 55 yards downfield to the Buck 25. A fumbled pitch on the first play was covered by tackle Robert Cargal on the hosts' 22. Denton hit Pulley for eight and then completed a pass to Williams for a first down on the seven. Steger made his two scoring receptions after that. Only 23 seconds remained on the scoreboard.

Everyone in the stadium knew the Hawks were going to try an on-sides kick next. They did just that, and Mike Brewer covered it on the 50. A five-yard run by Denton and Breckenridge drew a major penalty to the Breck 30. With two seconds on the clock, Denton attempted a "hail Mary" pass into the end zone, but it was intercepted and the game was

Other major defensive plays by the Hawks included a fumbled punt covered by Don McIlroy and an interception by Brewer, as well as major big tackles by Gary Green and Brian Luney.

Duggins finished the game with 75 yards on 14 carries. Steger carried 12 times for 51 yards and had three receptions for 24 yards.

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
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



## SCHOOL SCENE

Information prepared by Iowa Park School Counselors

In a continuing effort to increase everyone's knowledge and awareness of the problems of drug abuse, Drug Free North Texas is coordinating the third annual area wide Drug Awareness Week.

Area school children are wearing "Be Drug Free" buttons and participating in special activities this week.

In America today, the most serious threat to the health and well-being of our children is drug use. No one is going to solve the drug problem alone. But when parents, schools, and communities pull together, drugs CAN be stopped.

The following recommendations describe actions that can be taken by parents to stop drug use:

Teach standards of right and wrong and demonstrate these standards through personal example.

Children who are brought up to value individual responsibility and self-discipline and to have a clear sense of right and wrong are less likely to try drugs than those who are not. Parents can help to instill these ideals

Setting a good example for children and not using drugs themselves;

Explaining to their children at an early age that drug use is wrong, harmful, and unlawful, and reinforcing this teaching throughout adoles-

Encouraging self-discipline through giving children everyday duties and holding them accountable for their actions;

Establishing standards of behavior concerning drugs, drinking, dating

Encouraging their children to stand by their convictions when pressured to use drugs.

Help children to resist peer pressure to use drugs by supervising their activities, knowing who their friends are, and talking with them about their interests and problems.

When parents take an active interest in their children's behavior, they provide the guidance and support children need to resist drugs. Parents can do this by:

Knowing their children's whereabouts, activities, and friends;

Working to maintain and improve family communications and listening to their children;

Being able to discuss drugs knowledgeably. It is far better for children to obtain their information from their parents than from their peers or on the street;

Communicating regularly with the parents of their children's friends and sharing their knowledge about drugs with other parents;

Being selective about their children's viewing of television and movies that portray drug use as glamorous or exciting.

In addition, parents can work with the school in its efforts to fight drugs

Encouraging the development of a school policy with a clear no-drug

Supporting administrators who are tough on drugs;

Assisting the school in monitoring students' attendance and planning and chaperoning school-sponsored

Communicating regularly with the school regarding their children's

Be knowledgeable about drugs and signs of drug use. When symptoms are observed, respond promptly.

Parents are in the best position to recognize early signs of drug use in

their children. In order to prepare themselves, they should:

Learn about the extent of the drug problem in their community and in their children's schools;

Be able to recognize signs of

drug use; Meet with parents of their children's friends or classmates about the drug problem at their school. Establish a means of sharing information to determine which children are using drugs and who is supplying them.

Parents who suspect their children are using drugs often must deal with their own emotions of anger, resentment, and guilt. Frequently they deny the evidence and postpone confronting their children. Yet the earlier a drug problem is found and faced, the less difficult it is to ovecome. If parents suspect their children are using drugs, they should:

Devise a plan of action. Consult with school officials and other par-

Discuss their suspicions with their children in a calm, objective manner;

Do not confront a child while he is under the influence of drugs; Impose disciplinary measures that

help remove the child from those circumstances where drug use might oc-

Seek advice and assistance from drug treatment professionals and from a parent group.



## Retired teacher maintains interests, self-reliability

A retired teacher, an artist, an animal and bird lover, a determined and self-reliant lady. Helen Reed continues these pursuits she has had since childhood.

Miss Reed retired from the Iowa Park Independent School District 14 years ago, after teaching here 27 years.

She said of all the years she taught and as many new buildings as were constructed, she never got to teach in a new one until shortly before she retired. She added, "And that was when the new wing was built on Bradford Elementary School."

Helen's early years were spent on W. T. Waggoner ranches. Her father began working for Waggoner as a boy and remained with him 40 years. Most of the time he was a foreman.

She was born in Electra when her father was foreman of the White Face Ranch near there. When she was small her daddy was moved to Zacaweista Ranch near Vernon as foreman.

In all the years she spent on a ranch Helen rode only one horse, "Mexico," the only one they would let her ride. He was an easy going, slow gaited horse that more or less handled himself.

She recalls one time they were killing prairie dogs on Zacaweista and someone brought her a baby one. She kept it for three years. "They make good pets," she said.

When they moved to a ranch at Encinal, 38 miles from Laredo, the big interest there was bobcats. Naturally, Helen wanted a little bobcat. "I was just sure I could tame him as he grew." Soon she realized that was a bit of folly.

After her graduation from Vemon High School in 1929, Waggoner sent her to Texas Woman's College in Denton for

she wanted to go to McMurry College in Abilene. Waggoner was not in favor. "He told me that all I wanted to do was go down there to that co-ed college and look for someone to marry," she laughed.

Through her growing up years, all she was ever interested in as a career was teaching and drawing. After receiving her teaching certificate, she finally attained her goal. She had majored in public school art. Her first school was at Rock Crossing.

She kept having her teaching certificate renewed each year. She commented, "It took me 20 years to get my degree."

When she was hired to teach in Iowa Park in 1949, she had to have her degree. She took summer courses at the University of Boulder and some at Midwestern State University.

She taught fourth grade and taught art in fifth and sixth grades. Miss Reed really preferred to teach fourth grade. That way she had longer to foilow her pupils and see how they did in the higher grades and follow through to becoming young men and women with careers.

"I never gave retirement much thought," Miss Reed said. "I guess I thought I would teach forever."

But one year a little girl came up to her and told her, "You were my mother's teacher." Helen said, "That was sort of a shock. But I finally had to face the fact that I was getting close to retirement age."

"I made big plans of what I would do when I retired." She planned to do a lot of traveling and a lot of painting. Miss Reed became even more interested in art after retirement.

She took art in continuing education courses at Midwestern University and took a watercolor workshop in Ruidoso, N.M. by Naomi Brotherton of Dallas. She also has taken several one-day workshops.

Watercolor is her favorite medium, however, she does some pastels. She does not care for oils.

Helen has done a lot of painting since her retirement, but she commented, "If what I've read by a noted artist is true, I certainly cannot consider myself an artist yet." He made the statement that one had to do thousands of paintings to be called an artist.

"I love to do Southwest scenes and still life, particularly florals and especially roses and iris." She also does some landscapes. She has either sold or given away many of her paintings. She has executed a number of landmark sites around Iowa Park.

At the recent annual Whoop-T-Do, Helen took first and second places on both watercolors and pastels and also received the Peoples Choice Award.

She has one frame that she always uses to exhibit one of her paintings. She said, "I don't know if it is the frame that makes the painting show better, or what, but I've always taken a first place on the one that I put in that

An interesting painting she has done is one of a pet parakeet, now deceased. She saved his feathers as he lost them and glued them onto the painting, making it very realistic.

Miss Reed had done some traveling since her retirement, but not nearly as much as she planned. In 1987 she had to have two surgeries very close

Earlier this year she had two surgeries in three weeks. After she was released from the hospital she had to spend two months in the nursing home. Her physician thought she probably needed to stay there indefinitely because it would be too much for her to care for herself.

She argued with him and won. She had already thought out all the answers and ways she could handle any of the situations that concerned

Helen's current pet interest is a beautiful parakeet called "Patches" because of the twin markings that look like--you guessed it--patches on his black and white feathered back.

Patches is well known to all of Miss Reed's friends and when he gets to know a person he is very friendly and will sit on their shoulder--or their

The next painting she has planned will be of Patches. She plans to save his feathers like she did for the other parakeet and do the same type painting of him.

She says the only problem she has with that is breathing. Because when she is gluing the feathers on the painting, if she breathes the feathers will fly everywhere, she explained.

Miss Reed has many mememtos that she is proud of. Her pupils gave her gifts through the years, especially at Christmas and she has saved many of them.

Another of her favorite keepsakes is a doll Tommie Smith made for her. She used one of Miss Reed's pillow cases for the dress and has an overskirt

which was Helen's baby dress. She has a picture of herself in that dress made in 1910.

A small mesh bag popular in the 20s and used many times as an evening bag is special to her because it was given to her by W.T. Waggoner.

She recently has started collecting Precious Moments, because many of her friends have given them to her.

Miss Reed keeps busy with her painting and is a member of Iowa Park Arts and Crafts Club, the Music Club, American Association of Retired Persons, Texas Retired Teachers Asso-

ciation, First Baptist Church, Thelma Smith Baptist Women, is a life member of Parent- Teachers Association, and stays interested in school and new teaching methods.


