### Pioneer Day Queen To Be Chosen for Fair

Citizens of this area are asked to make nominations for the Pioneer Day Queen. Any woman having lived within a 100-mile radius of Iowa Park for as many as 40 years is eligible for nomination. The selection will be made by a special committee of judges, according to Oral Jones, Wichita Falls, chairman of the Pioneer Day committee.

Pioneers living in the area from 40 to 60 years and from 60 to 75 years will be identified by special ribbons while those living within the surrounding 100-mile radius for more than 75 years will receive a gold ribbon and will be given due recognition during the special entertainment program on Tuesday, October 3.

Mr. Jones announced this week that Sid Kring, T. J. Waggoner and Marvin Smith, all of Wichita Falls, have agreed to head up the entertainment features of Pioneer Day. Mr. Kring will act as master of ceremonies and introduce the different events.

### W. D. Jeter to Coach Hawk Teams, Beene Gets Principal Job

The Iowa Park school board met Thursday night in special session and elected W. D. Jeter coach of the high school athletic teams. Mr. Jeter will fill the vacancy caused by resignation of Tommy Beene, who has taken a ward school principal position at Anson, Jones county. Mrs. Beene has also resigned from the Iowa Park school faculty and will teach with her husband at Anson.

The new Hawk coach is well known here, having worked at Holiday three years and at Olney one year. During the past school year he was coach at O'Donnell. His experience also includes two years as coach at Eastland and three years at Strawn.

Mr. and Mrs. Jeter and their 12-year-old daughter, Leilani, will move here as soon as a home can be obtained. He will be on hand to start fall practice, Tuesday, and has issued a call for all football players to show up for the first workout.

The Jeters are members of the Methodist church. Mrs. Jeter will not become a part of the Iowa Park school faculty. Coach Jeter's teaching field is the social subjects.

### Church School Starts Monday at Christian Church; Lasts a Week

The annual Vacation Church school of the Christian Church will begin Monday morning August 14 and will continue for six days. The pupils will meet for 2 1/2 hours each morning, from 9:00 to 11:30. Children will be enrolled Monday morning and the school is open to all children of the community between the ages of four and 15 years.

The school will be divided into three departments: kindergarten, Primary and Junior-Intermediate grade combined. The course for the kindergarten will be entitled "Happy Times in Our Church." Wallis, recreation chairman will be Mrs. Burk Scott, and chairman of the worship, Mrs. Grady Henderson.

Superintendent and instructor of the Junior-Intermediate department is Mrs. O. R. Owens assisted by Miss Hazel Crites. Music chairman is Miss Crites; recreation, Rev. Chester Gleason; Mrs. Mark Cannon and Mrs. I. W. Corder will have the workshop. The study prepared by Mrs. Owens is to be on Korea.

Refreshment committee for the school includes Mrs. Pete Hall, Mrs. Boyt Smith and Mrs. Gilbert Steele. Miss Helen Dale Clark is director of the Vacation Church school, assisted by A. L. Reed, superintendent of the church school; Mrs. Rollins Woodall, secretary; and Mrs. Gleason, minister.

All children of the community will enjoy the school and are welcome to attend.

### Midwestern Revue, Square Dance Contest Are T-O Fair Extras

Highlight in the news this week concerning the Texas - Oklahoma Fair and Southwestern Oil Exposition was the kick-off of advance ticket sales to the Midwestern University Revue and the Southwestern Championship Square Dance contest when Rhea Howard and B. D. Jonnell of the Wichita Falls Times Publishing company purchased the first 125 tickets sold by Dr. James B. Boren, university president.

The Midwestern University Revue is scheduled to be held the first four nights of the fair, Oct. 1-5. It will feature university students of music and drama and will be under the direction of Dr. Jennie Louise Hindman, member of the speech department, while background music will be furnished by the well-known Indian Band under direction of Jim Jacobsen.

Among other special attractions to be presented during the four night run will be crowning of the Pioneer Day Queen on Tuesday night.

The last two nights of the fair, Oct. 6-7, will be given over to the Square Dance contest which will draw entries throughout the Southwest. Winfield Ikard of Archer City, one of the top-ranking square dance callers of the area, will have supervision of the contest with Cliff Brodgen of Electra as chairman of the general arrangements committee.

All sales of advance tickets will be made by Joseph W. Keith and associates, with an office in the Holt hotel, Wichita Falls. By purchasing advance sale tickets a considerable savings will be made and the purchasers will be assured comfortable seats in the new outdoor theater which will be completed by fair time.

### Consumers Asked to Sign Hoarding Pledge

The Iowa Park Camp Fire girls will co-operate in a "Hoarding Is Harmful" service project in September, with 360,000 other Camp Fire girls across the country, according to Mrs. I. W. Corder.

Mrs. Richard W. Blalock, national president of the organization, has advised President Truman that members of the Camp Fire will ask shoppers to sign the following pledge:

"I promise to purchase only what is necessary for the normal everyday needs of my family. I will not hoard items such as sugar, fats, nylons or canned goods."

Purpose of the campaign is to alert people to the need for buying only necessary consumer goods.

Mrs. Blalock stated that Camp Fire's program has always stressed wise buying through its homecraft and giving service to and for the community through its citizenship craft program. She said also that conservation of resources and consideration for the needs of others are two of the most important things a Camp Fire girl learns.

### New Home Economist Hired by Lone Star

Appointment of Miss Robert Reed as home economist for Lone Star Gas company in this territory was announced this week by G. P. Williams of Wichita Falls district manager. With headquarters in Wichita Falls, Miss Reed will serve homemakers at Iowa Park, Henrietta, Byers, Petrolia and Wichita Falls. Miss Reed, a native of Holland, Texas, recently completed a course in the gas company's home economics department in Dallas.

Miss Reed will be available for consultation on recipes, menu and party planning, laundering and household problems. She will also be a source of information on how to produce balanced meals at minimum cost and will counsel with home builders planning modern gas kitchens. She will conduct cooking schools and give demonstrations on the care and use of gas equipment.

Miss Reed graduated from grade and high schools at Holland and received the degree in home economics from Southwestern university, Georgetown. She is a member of the Methodist church at Holland. Her hobbies are collecting snapshots and collecting homemaking material.

### Milburn Tells Lions Of Financial Needs In Wichita County

Ralph Milburn is a trained tax expert. He knows what he is talking about. All the Iowa Park Lions club members who heard him last Tuesday will agree that he has made a pretty thorough study of Wichita Falls' financial obligations, and that he and the Citizens Committee with which he is working, have come up with the best possible solution for that city's municipal difficulties.

In speaking before the Lions at the invitation of Program Chairman Al Reed, Mr. Milburn quickly outlined the conditions which are strangling Wichita Falls' growth. He then sketched in quite fully all that the Citizens Committee has discovered that needs to be done. That they will get it done is demonstrated by the fact that Wichita Falls voters okayed their report to the tune of a new \$3,250,000 bond issue.

Mr. Milburn also touched briefly on the need for Wichita Falls and the other municipalities in Wichita county to equalize tax assessments, so that each piece of property, real and personal, will carry its pro rata share of the tax load. This, he said, is a must, if the county wishes to bring its credit up.

Sam Hill reported that the food committee had met and recommended to the board that the feeding arrangements of the club be kept as they now are.

### Pumping Station to House Electric Units

Riprapping of the slopes of Iowa Park's new dam is proceeding at a lively pace, according to Al Reed, secretary of the Water Board.

The spillway is completed and the intake tower is finished. When riprapping is completed, the gap in the center of the dam will be closed, and Iowa Park people can start hoping for rain.

In the meantime two other operations are going ahead. The entire lake is to be fenced with a five strand barbed wire fence. Bois d'arc posts are being used. Foundation has been poured for the pumping station, which will be equipped with two electric powered pumps.

The directors of this week and selected W. J. Beasley Jr., Herman Mahler and Justin Butts to serve as an equalization board for the taxing district. The board will meet at an early date to consider the assessments. An opportunity will be given all taxpayers to meet with the equalization board.

### Summer Program Offered Fun to Many Local Youngsters

Dissatisfaction that the young people of Iowa Park showed Thursday night when the eight weeks summer recreation program closed, and their expressed wish that it continue several more weeks are satisfactory answers to the query "Is the program worthwhile?"

The project was started in the summer of 1947 when the Council of Church Women was organized, this being the first project voted by that group. Mrs. Joe Harris, the former Miss Betty June Smith, served as the first paid director of activities which included baseball, volleyball, tennis, croquet, storytelling, dramatics, choral singing and handicraft. With the exception of baseball all activities have been held on the lawn of the Methodist church during the four years of progress.

George Koonce was over all director for the second summer. Last year Miss Ethyle Kidwell had the job, and the fun and games have been under the supervision of Mrs. Taylor George this summer.

Of invaluable assistance has been Mrs. Gordon G. Clark, president of the Iowa Park Council of Church Women. Compelled by a deep desire to provide wholesome recreation for youth, she has put other things secondary and given unselfishly of her time and energy to the program.

In summation, Mrs. George says that a large number of young people in the town and area have participated in the recreation. She has been delighted with the response of the five co-operating churches in furnishing adult chaperones for the eight weeks since the program began Monday, June 19.

Serving as general chairmen of the workers have been Mmes. Carroll Duke, Herman Mahler, J. B. Ridenour, Steve Brown, Rollins Woodall. Mrs. George also praised the boys and girls for their splendid behavior, spirit of co-operation and consideration of others while on the playgrounds. She expressed her thanks to all for everything they have done to make the program a great success.

The closing program Thursday evening was opened with prayer and Mrs. Clark made an introductory talk in which she recognized those who had served as chairmen of the different activities and expressed her appreciation of everyone who had contributed in any way toward making the program an interesting one.

The chairmen presented were: Mrs. O. R. Kelly, story telling; Mrs. Ray Shook, junior girls; Mrs. Joe Bell, croquet; Miles Thompson, volleyball; Joe Chandler, tennis; Jimmy Hooten, Steve Brown and Randolph Clark, baseball.

Plaintiffs further allege the Five (5) years and Ten (10) years Statute of Limitations; that plaintiffs and those under whom they claim by mesne conveyances and those whose title they hold, have had peaceable and adverse possession of the above described property, cultivating, using and enjoying the same, paying taxes thereon before delinquency, if any, for more than ten years preceding the filing of this petition, claiming under deed or deeds duly registered purporting to convey such lands and tenements, and such lands and tenements have been actually enclosed and that plaintiffs and their predecessors in title have claimed same openly, adversely and notoriously as owners during said period.

Wherefore, plaintiffs pray that citation issue and that on final hearing they have judgment for title and possession of the above described premises, for their damages, costs of suit, and for such other and further relief as they may be entitled to, either in law or in equity.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make the return as the law directs.

Stick with that little gremlin that seems to put out advance warning signals in time to

avoid any if not all trouble.

We have reference to one incident in particular, and that deals with a character we wrote about last week. His name was Hectic, and he was a black and white dog that took up with the airport here, and he liked to ride in planes. We told the mut to stay off those dangerous highways—that they were not safe for man or beast—but like so many creatures he must 'a' thought it wouldn't happen to him. Well, it did, and if ever he gets around to solving it won't be in a plane.

Fay Laxson is a little girl who lives in Iowa Park, and she will be in the third grade this coming school year. She will be able to tell some of the children, who have never ridden in a plane, about her trip up to Oklahoma last week. 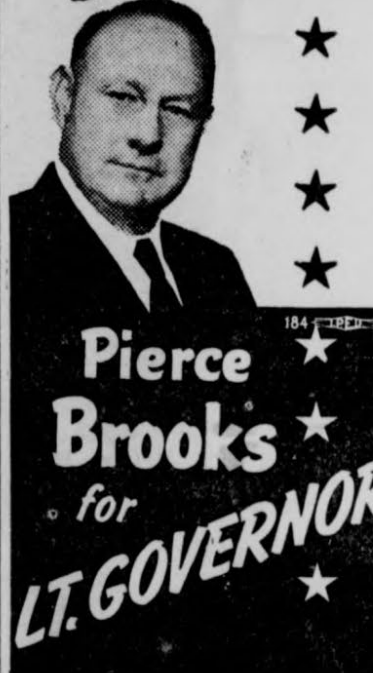

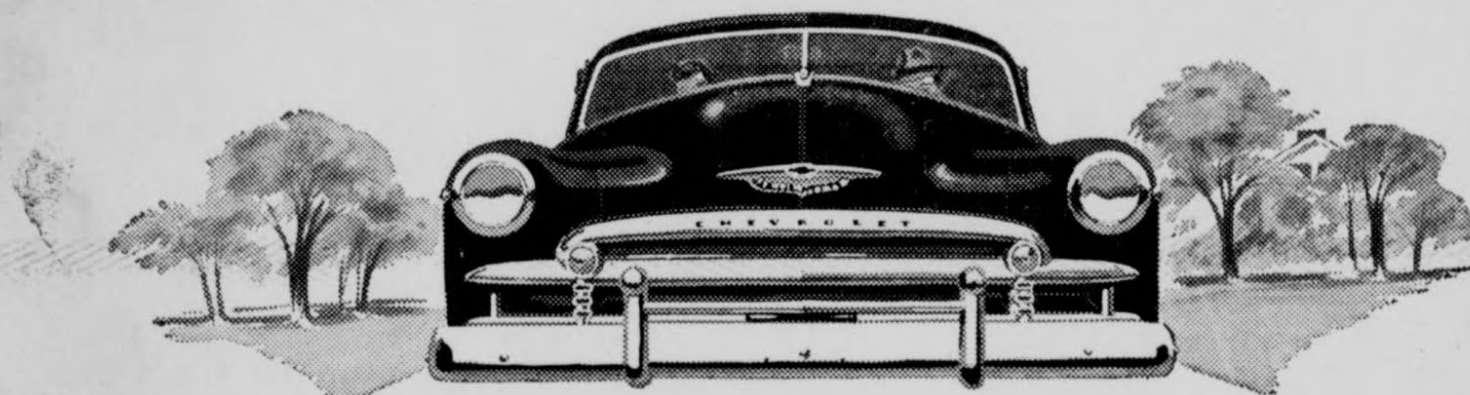

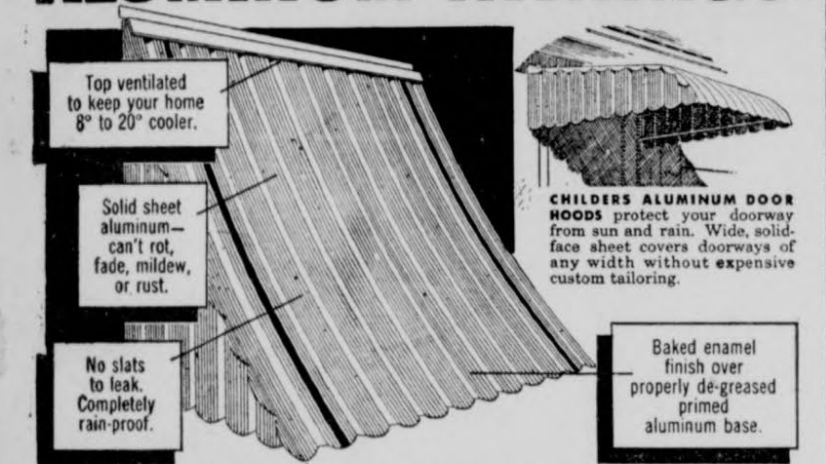
