## No change in beard nix Two petitions support Kirkpatrick

Iowa Park school trustees took no action on either of two proposals: to change the school policy concerning faculty members growing beards, or an unofficial request to name a new head coach.

Eight-year Iowa Park resident Eddie Miller asked the board to change its policy concerning faculty members growing beards, therefore enabling him to at least obtain employment as a substitute teacher.

And though no formal presentation was made, the board had individually received two different petitions asking that assistant coach Dean Kirkpatrick be named to succeed Len Williams, who has resigned.

Miller explained he has completed his degree in education. He pointed out he was unable to be permitted to do his practice teaching here, as well as not qualifying for employment either as a

substitute or full-time, because of the board's policy against beards.

Though he made no major point of the issue, Miller said courts have ruled such policies to be unconstitutional.

A motion was moved by trustee Sheri Kennedy to amend the policy, but the motion died for lack of a second.

Prior to the meeting, copies of two different petitions seeking Kirkpatrick's naming as head coach and athletic director had been distributed to board members and Supt. Glen Mitchell.

One of the petitions apparently had been signed by 170 students. The other had 79 signatures of non-students, most of whom appeared to be adults.

At the latter part of the meeting, an executive session was called, closing the meeting to the public. It lasted an hour and seven minutes.

When the meeting was reopened to the public, the board in quick succession approved three motions, and then adjourned without further comment.

The first motion was to hire Sheila Gholson to replace Steve Moody as junior high teacher, effective Jan. 2.

Another was to employ William Ray Sefcik Jr. as a teacher/coach, effective Dec. 17 for coaching duties and Jan. 2 for teaching.

Sefcik's coaching duties will be those previously carried out by Tim Clark. Clark was elevated to fulfill the duties of Barry Lucy, as head track coach and assistant football coach, when Lucy resigned last summer.

Also approved was a motion to hire two teacher aides, one for English as a Second Language, and the other for

## Slight slump in sales taxes

Business in Iowa Park took a slight slump during October, when compared with the same month in 1989, according to a report from the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park received a check this month for \$11,559.81 which reflected sales taxes collected in October. That was 8.56 percent less than the same months' check last year of \$12,642.

However, sales taxes for the year are running less than one percent behind 1989, the report states.

For the year, the city has received \$161,785.58, only a slight reduction from the \$162,115.06 reported at this time in 1989, a minus 0.20 percent.

With a 38.64 percent increase in October sales tax collections, Electra is now the only city in Wichita County on the plus side for 1990, with a gain of 7.76 percent for the year.

Wichita Falls is a minus 0.72 percent and Burkburnett minus 1.13.

Holiday, having received \$62,247 thus far this year, is a minus 9.69 percent.

### City aware of dark colored water

Residents began calling in complaints Tuesday night about the dark color of their drinking water, according to City Administrator James Barrington.

The color was the result of a line-flushing project earlier in the day which apparently resulted in some sediment not being completely flushed.

## Two facing theft charges

Warrants are being issued by the Iowa Park Police Dept. for a man and woman suspected in the theft of approximately \$6,000 worth of property from a home in the 1300 block of North Fourth.

The theft is alleged to have occurred during the evening of last Thursday, and involved a number of guns, stereo and CD equipment, two VCRs, and a wrist watch valued at \$1,000, according to the complaint.

Two male juveniles were arrested early Sunday morning on a charge of theft over \$20.

The two, and a third boy is also suspected, were between 13 and 15 years of age. They allegedly took snuff and

cigarettes from a convenience store.

After their arrest at 1:10 a.m., the two were turned over to their parents about three hours later, according to the police blotter.

In an unusual series of events, two black females from Wichita Falls were arrested here Sunday evening, after they reportedly had returned possessions they took from a local family's car while the occupants were shopping in that city.

The man, who asked to not be identified, said a VCR camera and other items that had just been purchased were taken from his vehicle's locked trunk, while they were doing more shopping.

The two women had acted suspicious while in the same store, and the

man's investigation turned up one of the women's names.

He said he called the woman the next day, said he knew they had taken the items, and demanded they be returned.

Sure enough, the next day the women returned the items, but they were arrested in the 500 block of North Pacific by local police.

Taken into custody were Brenda Myshell Fleeks, 24, and Ruby Kay Fleeks, 28, both of Wichita Falls, according to the blotter entry.

They were transported to county jail.

A resident of Woodbriar Apartments told police someone had apparently attempted to burglarize his unit, marking the door frame, and also broke out a window of his parked car.

Only one criminal mischief complaint was received during the past week by the police department. That was a report Wednesday of last week that someone had removed several bulbs from an outdoor Christmas lighting display in the 1000 block of Van Horn.

Police were called to assist in a dog bite case Tuesday afternoon.

A seven-year-old boy in the 1300 block of Mockingbird had been bitten by a dog the family had obtained about two weeks earlier.

The boy's father took him to a Wichita Falls hospital for treatment. His exact injuries are not known.

## Council's agenda heavy

A heavy agenda awaits members of the city council when they hold their only scheduled meeting of the month at 7 p.m. Monday.

Aldermen agreed last month to slate only one meeting in December, mainly because of conflicts with the holidays.

An ordinance to be considered would, if passed, amend the street assessment requirements. That ordinance addresses the city's process of assessing property owners for street construction.

Bids on three different purchases that have been advertised will be considered. They are on a one-ton dump truck, slurry application equipment and lights for the Senior League baseball field.

A report is expected to be made on the city's sewer system, resulting from a

study that was authorized and begun in early summer after spring rains overloaded the present transmission lines.

Aldermen will consider a policy of accepting used tires at the landfill.

Also to be considered is a proposal to either take action on a boat ramp installation project at Lake Buffalo. Inaction apparently will result in the city having to refund monies received in grant form from the state.

As result of an accident recently in which the city's dump truck was heavily damaged, sealed bids have been sought to consider whether to repair the vehicle or replace it earlier than planned.

Also to be considered is whether to authorize a project which had been approved by the previous council, which has to do with dirt work at the sewer treatment plant's drying beds.

## Christmas tour of homes Saturday to benefit RAC

Seven Iowa Park homes in their festive decking will be featured on the Christmas Tour of Homes Saturday from 3 to 7 p.m.

The annual event is sponsored by the Iowa Park Recreational Activities Center.

Tickets are \$4 each and may be purchased at the chamber office, Tom Burnett Memorial Library, Iowa Park Leader, RAC office, Watermelon Patch, and from any RAC board member. Tickets also may be purchased at the door of any of the homes.

Homes on the tour include the traditional home of the Joe Singers, 1508 Rita Lane, filled with sentimental heirloom pieces and collections they have acquired during their 40 years of marriage; the Dale Thompson home, 611 W. Texas, featuring antiques and Victorian appointments; the John Rains' historic two-story brick home at 700 N. Jackson that was built in 1923 and displays an old-fashioned Christmas theme;

Also the dwelling of the Robert Hortons, 1011 Cornelia, that is appointed with antique toys and traditional Yuletide decorations, along with

many heirloom ornaments; the home of Harold and Linda Smith, 1508 Bentwood, with decorations ranging from contemporary to old-fashioned in a modern setting;

And two homes in Pleasant Valley Estates, east of Iowa Park on Loop 370. The Howard Marlar home, 2376 Lindie Lane, with an attractive snow family and eaves bidding "welcome," and the Don Decker home at 205 Cindy Lane, where a country theme will showcase Christmas quilts belonging to and made by Mrs. Decker's mother, and where refreshments will be served to those making the tour.

The Singers and Thompson homes both were on last year's tour, however, they have made several changes in their decorations. The Singers seem to have a never ending supply of decorative and sentimental Christmas pieces.

The Singers home has been on tour many times, but Mrs. Singer vows this will be the last year, at least for a while.

Avid collectors, the Singers highlight their traditional religious decorative theme with their many collections.

At this season of the year when one enters the Singer home they will always find emphasis on the religious aspect of Christmas, "so people will immediately think about the reason we celebrate Christmas and what it means."

They have several nativity scenes which they have collected through the years, but the one usually receiving the most prominent place at the entry is a carved alabaster set of 12 that Singer remembers his mother getting when he was four years old.

Noted throughout the home are pieces from their collections of more than 300 Santa Clauses, Singer's collection of David Winters New England Village, her collection of Christmas post cards on easels, red handled kitchen gadgets, nutcrackers, and more.

Mrs. Singer says nothing is the same as it was last year in the decorations. She has added a wooden Noah's Ark with the animals that she has painted this year.

There are two new nativity scenes that are from Mexico and are very primitive, hand carved of balsa wood.

In one bedroom there is a "keep-

sake" Christmas tree, decorated with such items as baby diaper pins, her's and her children's baby shoes, her mother's ID bracelet and her dad's rubber stamp, Singer's mother's New York apartment key, a sterling silver baby rattle and 12 three-dimensional china bells the couple bought the first Christmas they were married.

The Thompsons' decorations are similar to those of last year. There is a Christmas tree in every room.

Mrs. Thompson's emphasis in her decor is on angels and the beauty of Victorian embellishment.

She is using more candles this year in her decorations, as well as burgundy satin roses and apples. She also has many handmade angels.

On the long dining table Mrs. Thompson has centerpiece of a white-washed grapevine swan filled with burgundy satin apples and decorated with tiny burgundy roses.

Pinecones, apples, metallic bows, gold beads, greenery, several sentimental pieces, and lacy objects reminiscent of the Victorian era are incorporated in the decorations of the home.

Red, white and green are the pre-

dominant colors used throughout the Smith home with the exception of the dining room where light blue is added to the color scheme.

Three Christmas trees will be found in the home. One features all handmade paper ornaments made by Mrs. Smith. Her knack for handwork and decorating are noted throughout the house. Many candy canes and red bows are used in the decorations.

The Christmas tree in the sitting room features a tree skirt that is a Texas Star quilt made by her mother. This tree has garlands Mrs. Smith made of foil wrapped candy, candy canes, and garlands of paper snowmen which she made. It also has some tin ornaments that are more than 50 years old and were given to her by her mother.

Under the tree in the living room are three lighted miniature villages. The tree has red and white decorations and garlands.

In one bedroom are some dolls that are about 25 years old. They are dressed in velvet and lace, made by Mrs. Smith. The room is decorated like one for a little girl.

In the blue dining room she has used garlands and pine cones and set

the table with blue depression glass. Centering the table is a sleigh filled with pine cones of red and blue.

The John Rains home is of nostalgic importance and they have stayed with the traditional colors of Christmas and articles that blend with the early day home.

The Rains have just finished remodeling their home that was built in 1923 by early-day settlers, the late Mr. and Mrs. Jim George.

They have a tree upstairs and one downstairs, which are decorated with lights and ornaments, but have no bright colors on it. Many of the decorations they have used have accumulated over more than 20 years.

Nativity scenes and a lighted village add to the decorations. The staircase is entwined with sparkling tinsel roping.

One unique feature Rains plans to show those on the tour is the old cistern inside the house which now serves as the utility room. The house also has a basement.

Antique toys and antique bells are displayed on and around Christmas

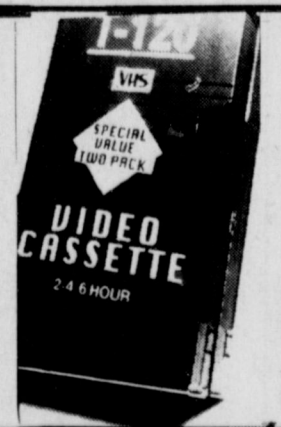
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# As I See It. . .

Higher education has a weird way of slapping the wrist of its people, especially administrators.

The president of West Texas State Univ. at Canyon was recently replaced by the Tarleton State Univ. president. The move was made by the Texas A&M University System, under which both schools are now administered.

When outgoing WT head Dr. Ed Roach was reassigned as associate deputy chancellor for academic program planning at the Bryan school, he reportedly retained his salary of \$112,000 he had been receiving at Canyon.

In other words, no cut in pay. The new WT president, Dr. Barry Thompson, for making his move from Stephenville to Canyon, will now receive a salary of \$132,000.

This Dr. Roach is the same man who's WT faculty gave him a majority vote of "no confidence" over a year ago.

Under Dr. Roach's administration, the WT athletic department has accumulated a \$2.2-million debt to the school's auxiliary accounts. Those accounts include such groups as housing, book store and food services, which are profit-oriented.

This Dr. Roach is the same college president who authorized the expenditure of about \$500,000, without the authority of his board of regents, a few years ago to buy the Amarillo home of a former state senator.

The house was to be the school's home for its president.

That didn't work, however. Not only

were the funds spent, as "good faith" payment toward the final purchase, without board approval, but a few folks felt the college president should reside in the same town as the institution was located. Not 25 miles away.

The house deal fell through, but the money was lost.

Now that Dr. Roach's administration has led to the athletic department's indebtedness, folks up there are talking about either cutting back the football program to non-scholarship, and even the possibility of cutting out football all together.

The loss of money by the athletic department possibly explains why, a couple of years ago, WT demanded the Canyon public schools pay several thousand dollars for each game played in "Buffalo Bowl." Canyon schools just decided to build two other stadiums at a cheaper price, and did.

The problems of WT have been many during Dr. Roach's tenure.

But his weren't the first for that fine old institution. If memory serves me correctly, the president before him took a similar job out of state, and once he had moved, sent the school a bill for all his overtime accumulated by attending athletic, social and other functions that were school events after 5 p.m.

I know WT and Canyon are more than 200 miles from Iowa Park, but there are a lot of reasons why I wanted to make comment.

First of all, we've got a freshman, Bruce Palmer, on the football team there. He's been redshirted this year and didn't

play a down. But he's on a scholastic scholarship, not one for football.

And then we've got a lot of former students who went on to attend, and graduate WT.

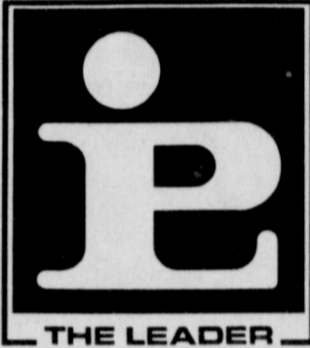
Also, my acquaintance with the institution goes all the way back to when it was known as West Texas State Teachers College.

I've always liked WT, and I hate it when bad things, like Dr. Ed Roach, contribute to any bad publicity it might receive.

And as far as I'm concerned, the Aggies are pouring \$112,000 down the drain for moving him to Bryan.



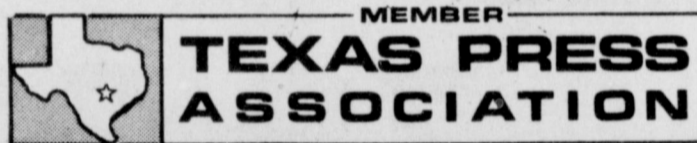

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## United Way sets funding

Though neither of Iowa Park's two agencies that are funded by the United Way received what they had requested, neither will be in financial trouble this year, their directors reported.

United Way announced its funding to 33 agencies Friday.

The Friendly Door was allocated \$13,331 and Recreational Activities Center \$17,586.

The RAC did not receive its requested funding of \$19,495. However, the year's funding was an increase over last year's \$15,765.

"We won't be able to hire summer help," commented RAC Director Pat Raby. She added, "It's kinda disappointing, but we'll be able to handle it."

The Friendly Door not only failed to receive its \$14,888 requested, it was cut below last year's allocation.

The local senior citizen center was allocated \$13,331, \$1,247 less than the \$14,578 it received last year.

Director Myrna Robinson said yesterday, however, that she plans to meet with Jamie Henderson, chairman of the UW budget and allocations committee, in an attempt to have that amount increased.

"But I'm a positive thinker," Mrs. Robinson said. "We can cut (our spending)."

She said many of her staff expenses, such as Saturday trips for members, were often paid for out of her own pocket.

Chairman Henderson and her 33 other volunteers submitted their recommendations to the United Way executive board.

The meditation was given by Mrs. McIlroy, who read "What Do You Want For Christmas?" The story dealt

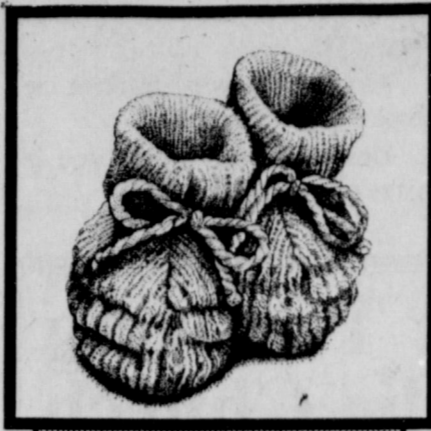
with building memories from childhood, and emphasized that the best gifts are those that money can't buy.

Dr. Greg Ammons, pastor of the Faith Baptist Church, was the after dinner speaker. Lee Pelz, program leader, introduced him and Mrs. Ammons.

Dr. Ammons spoke on "What Christmas Really Means," and used a poem, "Suppose" by Fred Jarvis to introduce his talk that challenged his listeners to let the Christ of Christmas have first place in the giving and receiving of gifts and celebration not

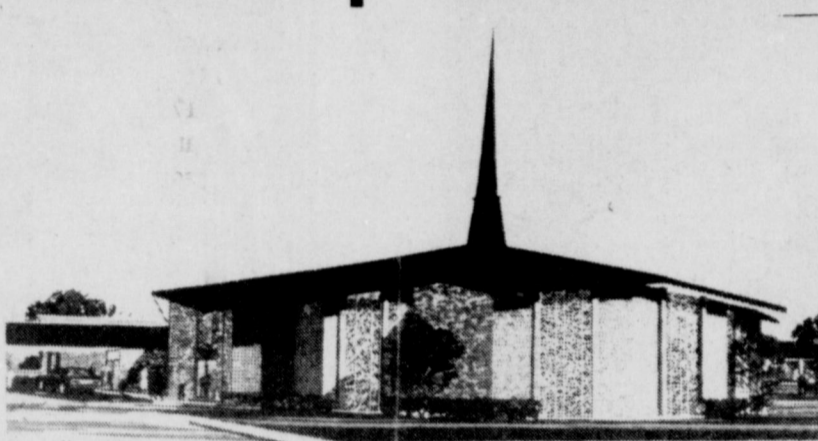

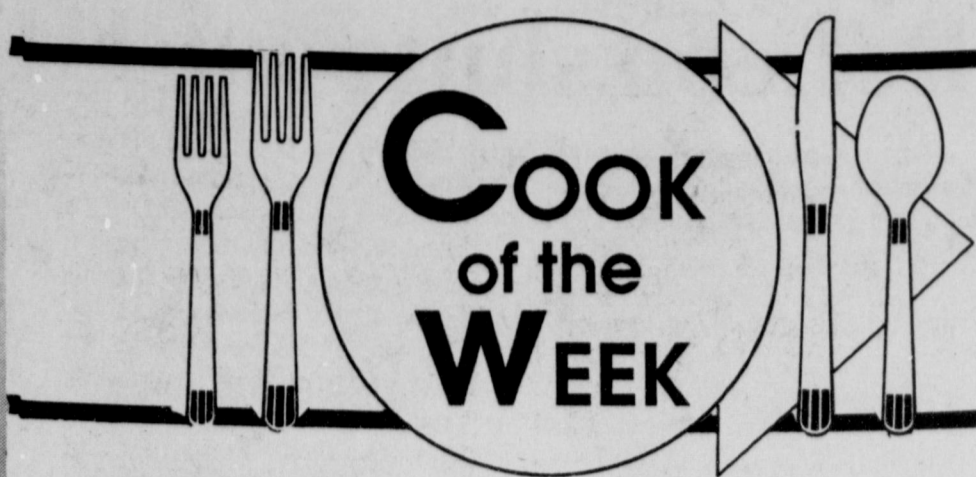

**SNOWBALLS**

1/2 lb. butter  
5 Tbs. sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 cups flour



1 cup finely chopped pecans  
Powdered sugar  
Softened butter, add sugar and mix well. Add salt, flour and nuts. Roll into small balls. Bake at 325 degrees. When done, roll in powdered sugar.

**HOLIDAY MULL**

1 - 1 1/2 qt. bottle cranberry juice  
2 - 1 qt. bottles apple juice  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
4 cinnamon sticks  
1 1/2 tsp. whole cloves

Combine cranberry juice, apple juice, brown sugar and salt in slow cooker or crock pot. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Tie cinnamon sticks and cloves in cheese cloth and place in liquid. Cover pot and cook 2 hours on low. Do not boil. Remove spices and serve.  
Yields 28 - 4 ounce servings.

**SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE**

3 cups cooked, mashed sweet potatoes  
1 cup sugar  
2 beaten eggs  
1/3 cup melted margarine  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup milk  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Mix and pour into 9x13 casserole dish.

**TOPPING**

1 cup brown sugar  
1 cup chopped pecans  
1/3 cup flour  
1/2 cup margarine  
Mix well until crumbly and sprinkle over top (add cinnamon if desired). Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes (until bubbly).

**HERSHEY BAR PIE**

1 graham cracker pie shell  
6 Hershey bars with almonds (1.35 oz. size)  
18 to 24 marshmallows  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 - 9 oz. tub whipped frozen topping  
Place milk, candy bars and marshmallows in top of double boiler and melt. When melted, set out of water and cool completely. Fold frozen topping into chocolate. Pour into pie crust and chill in refrigerator for at least 3 hours or until ready to serve.

**SAUSAGE ROLL**

4 cups flour  
1/4 cup corn meal  
1/4 cup sugar  
2 Tbsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. salt  
2/3 cup vegetable oil  
1/2 cup milk  
2 lbs. ground sausage  
Combine flour, meal, sugar, baking powder and salt. Sift together in large bowl. Stir in vegetable oil. Add milk and blend. Add a couple extra tablespoons of milk if necessary to form a stiff dough. Roll in a rectangle

on a lightly floured surface. Spread on sausage and roll, jelly roll fashion, lengthwise. Wrap in waxed paper and chill or freeze. When ready to use, slice and bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes.

**CURRIED FRUIT**

1 cup sliced peaches  
1 or 2 cups pineapple chunks  
1 cup fruit cocktail  
1 cup Mandarin oranges  
1 jar Marachino cherries  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 stick butter  
1 Tbsp. curry powder  
Drain all fruit 1 hour ahead. Put into baking dish. Mix brown sugar, butter and curry powder. Pour over fruit. Bake, uncovered, 1 hour at 350 degrees. In the last 5 minutes, sprinkle with slivered almonds. This is very good with ham or pork.

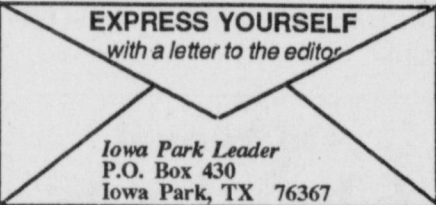

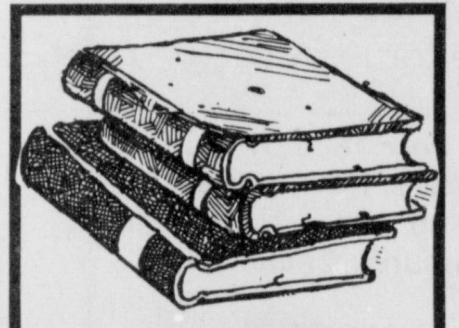
