Social Security Benefits Increased

Benefits Increased

A 10 per cent increase in social security benefits has recently been passed by both houses of Congress and was signed into law by the President on March 17th, and made retroactive to January 1st.

The first check including the increased payment will be received by some 26 million people who are eligible under the Social Security Law around June 4th, and will be for the month of May.

Later in June, each beneficiary will receive a check to cover the 10 per cent increase for the months of January through April, amounting to 40 per cent of the monthly check now being received.

Persons who are 72 years or older who do not qualify for regular Sociel Security benefits will receive a raise of 5 per cent. Their monthly payments will be increased from \$69.00 to \$72.50 for a couple.

ALMOST PERSUADED TO BE A CHRISTIAN

In Acts 26:28 King Agrippa is reported to have said to Paul, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." This is one of the most significant statements in the Bible and holds a lot of plain Bible teachings for us.

To "almost" be a Christian is not enough. One may be good in morals; he may be kind to his neighbors, he may be good to his family; he may believe in the Christian religion, but if he is not a Christian he will be lost in eternity. (Matt. 7:21).

King Agrippa said that Paul almost persuaded him to be a Christian. What Paul preached was not salvation by some miraculous call of God, something better felt than told. It was by the gospel which Paul preached. Paul said men are called by the gospel (2 Thess. 2:14). Becoming a Christian is not something mysterious. It is just a matter of obeying the commandments of the gospel of Christ (Rom. 6:17).

Paul did not persuade men to "get religion," but "to be" Christians. Christianity is not something vou "get" like catching the itch; it is something one "be-comes" by obeying the truth.

Paul did not teach men to "join a church." He taught them to become Christians. He did not teach them to be denominationalists of some sort. He persuaded them to become Christians, and Christians only. Why cannot men today be content to become ust Christians as people did in New Testament times? Why cannot they be content to be "added to the church" (Acts 2:47) when they have obeyed the simple gospel without wanting to "join some denomination?"
