Be that as it may, the legislature has created a whole new
crach the CEDs.

In case you haven't kept up with what the CEDs are all about, their purpose is to develop an equalized tax rate among the member districts, and disrribute monies from one to another if the
district has inadequate district has inadequate tax base. - hat is supposed to give educatio equality," which is demanded by the court.

But, local districts can add to their
local taxes what is desired to fund any and all other programs they wish. That's called "local enrichment." And, the legislation calls for an nual increases in the base tax rates. Left out of the legislation was who would pay for the cost of administration of the CED. That, apparently, is to be borne by the member districts.
What kind of costs, you might well ask, if each district is to continue to
collect its own taxes? Well, those taxes collected must be immediately sent to the CED, which is o distribute it back to the members.
That means that the CED musthave a depository bank to handle the money which will, in Wichita County, all be handled by electronics.
But there is a catch. That deposiory bank, because of the smalliness of
e paid for its services.
There's no telling what such a service fee will be. Especially when you consider the size of the bank will by You see, the T You see, the Texas Education
gency requires a depository to have enough securities on hand to cover any size deposit on any given day

So, even if the money is held, even electronically, by the depository over a night, that depository must have adequate securities to cover it. When you consider how much money lowa Park, Burkburnett, Electra,
City View and big ole' Wichita Falls could put in the bank on any given day could put in the bank on any given day,
you're talking about a bunch of monies. And unless the bank can be earning

oney on those securities by using the school money deposited, the bank is going to have to charge a fee for having those securities available.

## SOME ALTERNATIVE STATEMENTS WHEN CONFRONTING THE CRISIS OF ILLNESS

Illness and hospitalization are critical times when a patient not only is fighting to regain health, but also facing patient not only is fighting to regain health, but also facing
constant companions of isolation, loneliness, and anxiety. The sick need their friends to be by their side, people in whom they trust. Many people shun hospital visits because they do not know what to say, a fear of hospitals and/or an awareness of our own mortality.
The following are suggested alternative statements when visiting the seriously ill.
Instead of: "I don't want to bother you with my phone
alls and visits. calls and visits,: try: "Is this a good time to visit?" Instead of: "You've got a long, hard road ahead of you," try: "No matter what happens, I want you to know you are not alone.
Instead of: "My uncle had the same thing, and he died," ry: "What's going on with you today?"
Instead of: "God knows you can handle this illness or He wouldn't have let you get it," try: "In times like this, do you find your faith makes a difference?"
Instead of: "Don't take it personally, but I just don't like being around slek people, try: "Being with you is more important than my fear of hospitals."
Instead of: "Wouldn't it be better if your husband/wife stayed at work rather than spend time with you," try: Serious illness affects the family too, doesn't it?" Instead of: "Don't worry about your job or the house. Everybody is covering for you," try: "The work is getting done, but you know no one can take your place." Instead of: "Don't talk about dying, you're going to outlive us all," try: "Even though it's difficult, I'm willing to alk when you are."
Instead of: "I'm sure God has a reason for this," try There's a lot in life we don't understand, isn't there?" Instead of: "If there's anything I can do, let me know." try: "I'm praying for you. I would also like to (name a specific act). What time is best for you?"

This proposed amendment would authorize the new districts to hold elections to allow voters within the districts to decide whether to grant an exemption on a percentage of the assessed value of residence homesteads; whether to grant an additional exemption on the homesteads of elderly and disabled persons; and whether to impose taxes on certain types of personal property. In the enabling legislation that
waspassed during the regular session of the legislature, the amount of the the legislature, the amount of the
homestead exemption was specified as 20 percent, and the exemption for elderly and disabled persons was set at $\$ 10,000$ exemption on homesteads of elderly and disabled persons and the freeze on property taxes for elderly and disabled persons.

The enabling legislation also directed the county education districts to

in an election to be held on Aug 1991. The wording of the proposals on local ballots will be identical across the local ballots wilf be identical across
state, but the order may vary. Decisions made by voters in a district would apply in that district only, contingent upon the decision of voters statewide on the proposed constitutional amendment which authorizes these elections.
Thus, voters who go to the polls on
Aug. 10 will be asked to vote simultaneously on a constitutional amendmen and to vote on the local tax options authorizad by he proposed amendment. If voters approw the propally amend ment statewide, the locally adopted options would go into effect without
