## City adopts \$3-million budget

Iowa Park's city council Monday
night approved a $\$ 3$-million budget that night approved a $\$ 3$-million budget that
required neither a tax increase nor hikes in fees.

The 80 -cent per $\$ 100$ valuation ad valorem rate includes .6959 for general operating expenses and .1041 for retirement of general obligation bonds. This is the second annual budge calling for the 80 -cent rate, after the $989-90$ rate was lowered from .885 . Described as a "bare bones" budge by Mayor Wayne House, expenditures and utilities are balanced by the same amount in anticipated revenues. Anticipated revenues produc he 80 -cent tax rate is $\$ 747,364$. Though the council voted unanimous approval of the budget, there was disagreement voiced prior to voting. Alderman Bob Hamilton said h was dissatisfied with the salary increase outlined in the budget, and Alderman $V$ irgil Woodrin offered his suggestion

safe districts for Texas' 27 incumbent congressmen while creat ing three new districts in the Dal las, Houston and San Antonio ar-
cas that are predominately minor-
ity residents.

chairman of the House Redistrict chairman of the House Redistrict-
ing Committee, said the preservaing Committee, sais the preserva-
tion of incumbents is necessary to maintain Texas' clout in Congress.
But House Republicans blasted
the plan which protects Democrats and ignores population growth in GOP strongholds.
"It looks like the birthnark
on Mikhail Gorbachev's on Mikhail Gorbachev's scalp,"
said Rep. Randy Pennington, Rsaid Rep. Randy Pcnington,
Houston. "Really, this is silly because it's going to the courts.
