Enrollment up for seventh year

For the seventh consecutive year, schools continued to climb.

There were 1,919 students in the classrooms here Monday, the first of a 180-day school year.

This year's increase of four was not as significant as the 67-pupil hike reported last year.

The numbers continue to climb, however, as administrators reported an additional 17 students enrolled Tuesday, raising the enrollment total to 1,936.

Part of the increase was a class of prekindergarten pupils that was not enrolled last year. There are 24 in that class at Kidwell Elementary.

> Bradford Elementary also had slightly fewer in its classes on the first day as were counted last year. There vere 462 enrolled Monday, compared with 468 last year.

> Junior high enrollment Monday was 435, as compared to 412 last year. That was because of a huge, 41-pupil increase in the sixth grade over 1990

No increase in taxes

City adopts \$3-million budget

required neither a tax increase nor hikes pass the document was approved.

valorem rate includes .6959 for general operating expenses and .1041 for retirement of general obligation bonds.

This is the second annual budget calling for the 80-cent rate, after the 1989-90 rate was lowered from .885.

Described as a "bare bones" budget by Mayor Wayne House, expenditures of \$2,999,282 for general operations and utilities are balanced by the same amount in anticipated revenues.

Anticipated revenues produced by the 80-cent tax rate is \$747,364.

Though the council voted unanimous approval of the budget, there was disagreement voiced prior to voting.

Alderman Bob Hamilton said he was dissatisfied with the salary increases outlined in the budget, and Alderman Virgil Woodfin offered his suggestions on salary changes in the police depart-

However, when it became apparent that if any changes were to be made

Iowa Park's city council Monday others would be wanted, and the budget's additional law enforcement officers to night approved a \$3-million budget that passage would be delayed, so action to

Prior to adopting the budget and The 80-cent per \$100 valuation ad tax rate, the required public hearing on the budget was held. Only three citizens other than city personnel and a reporter were in the audience.

Robert Forney commented that the small businesses in the community were beginning to hurt, tax-wise, because of the closing of other businesses such as the two automobile dealerships.

When reminded that no increase in taxes was called for in the 1991-92 rate, Forney indicated satisfaction.

The council approved the sale of property at 610 East Bank to Goldie's Day Care Too, the only bidder, for \$691.

Mayor House said action on a tax agreement with Cryovac would be tabled until the next meeting.

An agreement on mutual aid with law enforcement agencies in the county was approved. Action is still pending, requiring approval of Burkburnett and Electra councils, however.

The agreement would "...provide

protect health, life and property because of disaster, riot, threat of concealed explosives, or unlawful assembly characterized by force and violence or the threat of force and violence by three or more persons acting together or without lawful authority."


Administrator Gary Jones, during his regular reporting phase of the meeting, informed the council he had contacted a major officer with Wal-Mart concerning persistent rumors that the local store was to be closed.

Jones said the man, Dale Neighbors, said the firm had no intentions of closing the Iowa Park store.

Jones reported on progress of the parking lot at the Recreational Activities Center and equipment received for its furnishing; tiles for repairing the roof at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library; organization of a board planning the development of a regional sanitary landfill, and problems at the water treatment plant.

School trustees to adopt budget following hearing

A final study of the 1991-92 budget Tuesday night by Iowa Park's school trustees still gave no hint as to what the tax rate will be this year.

The board met in a called session to discuss the budget.

The reason no concensus was reached? They had no idea what the County Education District (CED) board would set as its rate when that group was to meet Wednesday night.

Iowa Park's board has set its required public hearing on the budget this evening. It is to begin at 7 p.m. in the

junior high school library. Supt. Glen Mitchell is encouraging the board to adopt a tax rate of \$1.02 per \$100 valuation.

Among the increasing costs involved this year are \$68,128 that will be held by the CED under the state-mandated "fund sharing" legislation passed

Additionally, the local district has lost more than \$100,000 in anticipated revenues for the 1990-91 year that had been withheld by the state on a "prorated" formula.

That meant, the state was not able to fund the amount of money it had indicated it would send to the IPCISD.

Mitchell said the Burkburnett district would apparently be benfitted by the \$68,128 lost locally to the CED. That is to make up for the "freeport tax" exemptions that district approved for its

"They (Burkburnett) have one industry that pays them \$1-million in taxes, and yet we're having to send them \$68,128," Mitchell told the board. "I just don't understand that."

While most discussions of the board in recent weeks have centered around a possible 99-cent rate, Mitchell pointed to the rates of several area districts, as one basis for his proposed \$1.02 rate.

He listed: Electra, \$1.18; Wichita Falls, \$1.13; Bowie, \$1.12; Graham and Breckenridge, \$1.20; Burkburnett, \$1.12; City View, \$1.10; Bridgeport, \$1.30; Vernon, \$1.05, and Decatur, \$1.44.

Sheri Kennedy was the most vocal of the group, stating she felt recommendations of administrators should be given more attention, rather than being cut or lowered each year.

Martha Dudley's comment basically was that needs were not being met and pointed to all other costs rising but local funding for education not meeting



Following Friday's scrimmage, Because the freshman scrimmage Gamble said, "We had our best workout will be held on the practice field, and of the season Monday."



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

AUSTIN - State workers' ardent hopes for a three percent pay raise next month were dashed last week, when the state's chief revenue estimator said funds for the raise will be unavailable when the new budget year begins Sept. 1.

The Texas Legislature approved a three percent raise for state workers for each of the next two years but made the raise contingent upon Comptroller John Sharp certifying that the money will be available.

Scrambling for Money

Tom Plaut, Sharp's chief revenue estimator, said he and others are scrambling to find enough revenue just to certify the \$59.1 billion spending bill without the pay raise.

"We're fresh out of money," Plaut said.

It would cost about \$385 million to give workers a three percent raise for the next fiscal year and \$584 million to fund the raise for the next two years.

Reacting to the news, spokesmen for employee groups expressed outrage, but pointed their fingers at the Texas Legislature, not at Sharp.

The comptroller does not write the laws and he doesn't pass the taxes," said Lane Zivley, executive director of the Texas Public Employees Association.

Judge Nixes Districts

In a move that could further complicate the current special session, a state district judge ruled

last week that recently adopted legislative districts and congres sional and board of education districts being mapped by the Texas Legislature are invalid because they are based on inadequate federal census figures.

Judge Mario E. Ramirez Jr. of Edinburg issued a temporary injunction that prevents lawmakers from using 1990 census figures to draw political boundaries. He ordered state officials to develop their own census figures and use them to draw new districts by Sept.

Attorneys for several South Texas residents, who filed a suit against the state because they were not counted in the census, had asked Ramirez to issue the preliminary injunction to force legislators to create new political boundaries. The lawsuit is set for trial Oct. 1.

Attorney General Dan Morales said he will appeal the decision either to the 13th Court of Appeals in Corpus Christi or the Texas Supreme Court. That will stay the court's order while the appeal is pending, Morales said.

House Okays Redistricting Meanwhile, the House last week

narrowly passed a congressional redistricting plan, over the objection of most of its Republican members and a handful of white and black Democrats. The vote of 74-65 differed only

slightly from the 72-63 vote by which the House passed a similar plan Aug. 7, during the first special session. That plan died when the Senate failed to act on it before the 30-day session expired on Aug. 13.

As expected, the plan maintains safe districts for Texas' 27 incumbent congressmen while creating three new districts in the Dallas, Houston and San Antonio areas that are predominately minority residents. Rep. Tom Uher, D-Bay City,

chairman of the House Redistricting Committee, said the preservation of incumbents is necessary to maintain Texas' clout in Congress. But House Republicans blasted

the plan which protects Democrats and ignores population growth in GOP strongholds.

"It looks like the birthmark on Mikhail Gorbachev's scalp," said Rep. Randy Pennington, R-Houston. "Really, this is silly because it's going to the courts."
