4,426 Legally Registered Voters Ready for May 6th Primaries

BAIRD — The Tax Assessor's office reported this week that a total of 4,426 persons have registered to vote in the May 6th Primary Election. It was expected earlier in the year that 18 to 21 years olds would boost the registration far out front of all ages, however, that is not the case in Callahan County since only 240 in this age bracket registered to vote.

Clyde listed the largest number of voters with 1,521. This is not a large percentage since

the population is much more than that of Baird which listed 1,029 legal voters.

Cross Plains recorded 969; Putnam 225 Eula 272; Denton 176 and Oplin 154.

The May 6th Primaries will wind-up or extend some candidates' political aspirations when total tabulation is given in various races. The Commissioners race for Precinct 1 collected four candidates. Irvin Corn is seeking re-election and Tommy Tucker, Cecil Mings and Ralph E. McAdams are seeking the support and votes of residents living in Precinct 1.

County Sheriff Grayson Miller seeks re-election to head the law enforcement for a 2nd term, however has drawn an opponent in the race, Billy C. McMillian of Cross Plains.

Other races in the area pits State Representative of the 55th District, Lynn Nabers, seeking re-election and Charles E. Spellman Jr., campaigning for this position.

In the 42nd District Court Judge's race, Don Lane, who now holds this spot, has announced for re-election, draws an opponent in Chuck Erwin, who is working hard for this post.

The 4,426 legal registered voters will write the winners on May 6th. Be on hand and ready to vote early in the election, and support your candidates.

CLYDE — The Bulldog track team placed 5th in the district meet at Ballinger last Saturday, to end a five-year drought of cellar dwelling.

District winner Coleman monopolized the field events, where the Bulldogs could manage only 8 points as Timmy Payne placed 3rd in the

discus, with 120'1", and David Dunn took 5th in the shot with a throw of 46'3".

Clyde's 440 and mile relay teams, consisting of Paul Beeman, Rod York, James Stevens, Johnny Tucker and Jarrel Hurst took 6th and 5th respectively in 46.5 and 3:45.8. Hurst won the 440 in 53.0 after establishing a new BAA record record of 52.3 in the preliminaries. Johnny Tucker won 6th in the 880 in 2:13.1. Selan Canada won 4th in the 330 hurdles and 5th in the 120 high with times of 44.3 and 18.0. Kim Harles ran 17.1 for 4th place in the high hurdles. Richard O'Shields ran 7th in the mile with a time of 5:08.6. The Bulldogs were in the finals in all running events except the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

The season is over for all the boys except Hurst, who will go to Odessa Friday for the regional track meet.

It was a great season for these young men who scored 35 points to beat Comanche 34, Cisco 18 and Hamilton 12. Next year looks to be exciting in track as all of these boys return for action in 1973. Outstanding Freshmen and 8th grade teams this year should add depth to the squad next season.

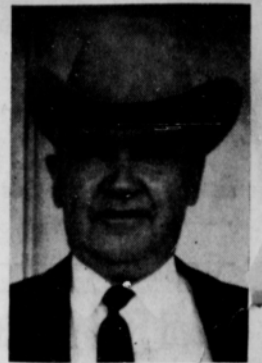

SCREWWORMS RETURN TO STATE WITH VENGEANCE

Livestock and household pet owners are reminded that screwworms have returned to Texas with a vengeance. They should take all precautions to reduce case numbers. County Agricultural Agent, Greg Gerngross says.

An unusually mild winter in many portions of Mexico and in overwintering areas in South Texas has resulted in large fertile fly populations that are now triggering case outbreaks in many areas of Texas. Although all known cases are receiving hot-spotting treatments

of sterile flies produced at the Mission Screwworm Eradication Center, nevertheless cooperation of all producers is needed now. A screwworm epidemic is in prospect.

Screwworm cases in Mexico have mushroomed during the winter and early spring, and Texas cases have spread from the Rio Grande Valley and South Texas through the Hill Country and into the Big Bend area, Hamilton County, in Central Texas, recorded its first case of the year this week, and 28 different counties have re-

ported cases since the first of April.

Before the screwworm eradication program began in 1962, southwestern livestock owners suffered hundreds of millions of dollars in livestock losses annually. Since the program has been underway, losses have been kept to a minimum and ranch workers have concentrated on other activities besides checking for screwworm cases.

"The time has come, however

when cooperation is again needed from all livestock owners and household pet enthusiasts. Ideal weather conditions and migrating fertile flies are posing a threat to all counties of the state," says Gerngross.

Thus far in 1972, 188 cases have been confirmed in a wide area of Texas. Through the end of April last year, only 21 cases were diagnosed as positive. No screwworm cases were confirmed through the end of March in 1970.

Livestock and pet owners are urged to check their animals regularly, and to treat all wounds found with a product recommended for that purpose. If worms are found in wounds, producers should collect 10 or more of the larvae from deep within the center of the wound and place them in a collection kit. Vials for mailing the samples may be obtained from County Agricultural Agents. The samples should be sent to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory, Box 969, Mission, Texas, for identification.

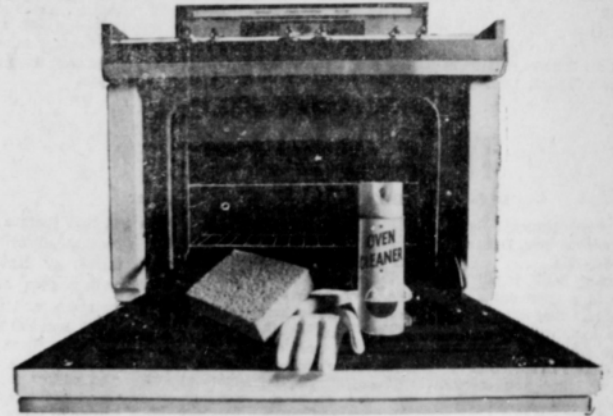
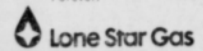

Thursday Club Fire Prevention Program

CLYDE — Mr. Bill Mooty and Mr. James Bragg, from the Fire Prevention Education Section of the Abilene Fire Dept., presented the program when the Thursday Club met in the home of Mrs. Gaston Swofford on April 13.

Mrs. E. A. Connel, vice president, presided in the absence of Mrs. R. O. Cloud. Mrs. Jerry Swofford, program chairman for the day, introduced the speakers.

Mr. Mooty demonstrated the explosive power of gasoline with a "bang" from only drops of the fuel. He stressed the necessity of storing gasoline in a "safety can" - a heavy gauge steel container with a spring lid and leak-proof construction. A glass or plastic container should never be used, he warned. The car motor should be off while the gas tank is being filled and No Smoking signs should be observed.

Mr. Mooty also explained the need for caution in using pressurized cans around the home. Such common products as hair spray and insect spray can ignite if used too near a flame. Even empty cans explode and become lethal weapons if tossed into a fire.

Mr. Bragg displayed several irons and a toaster that had caused household fires even though turned off, as a switch malfunction allowed the current to continue flowing. He suggested that all small appliances be unplugged when the family leaves on vacation. Frequently home fires originate in the kitchen, Mr. Bragg said. A common accident is grease catching fire. In such event, he suggested observing the following rules:

1. Leave the pan on the stove. Turn off the fire, and move pan to another burner if the stove is electric.
2. Place the lid firmly on the pan. Or cover tightly with anything available.
3. Sprinkle baking soda on the fire. Do not use flour.
4. Don't get excited.

The men gave some startling statistics on fire toll in the United States. Every day fire claims 33 lives, 1485 homes, 215 apartment buildings, 30 schools, and 10 churches, plus many farm, industrial and commercial buildings.

Each family should have a pre-arranged meeting place in case of home fire, so it will not be presumed that a missing member is trapped inside.

The fire prevention program was presented in a very interesting way, and was well received by the listeners.

Mrs. Frank Windham Jr. displayed a number of posters concerning safety in the home. She pointed out the dangers of leaded paint on household items and reminded members that many common plants are poisonous.

During the business session, Mrs. J. B. Hicks was elected to membership in the Club.

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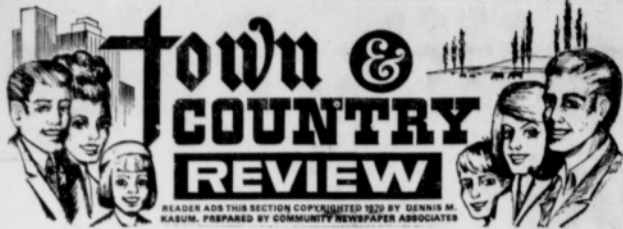
