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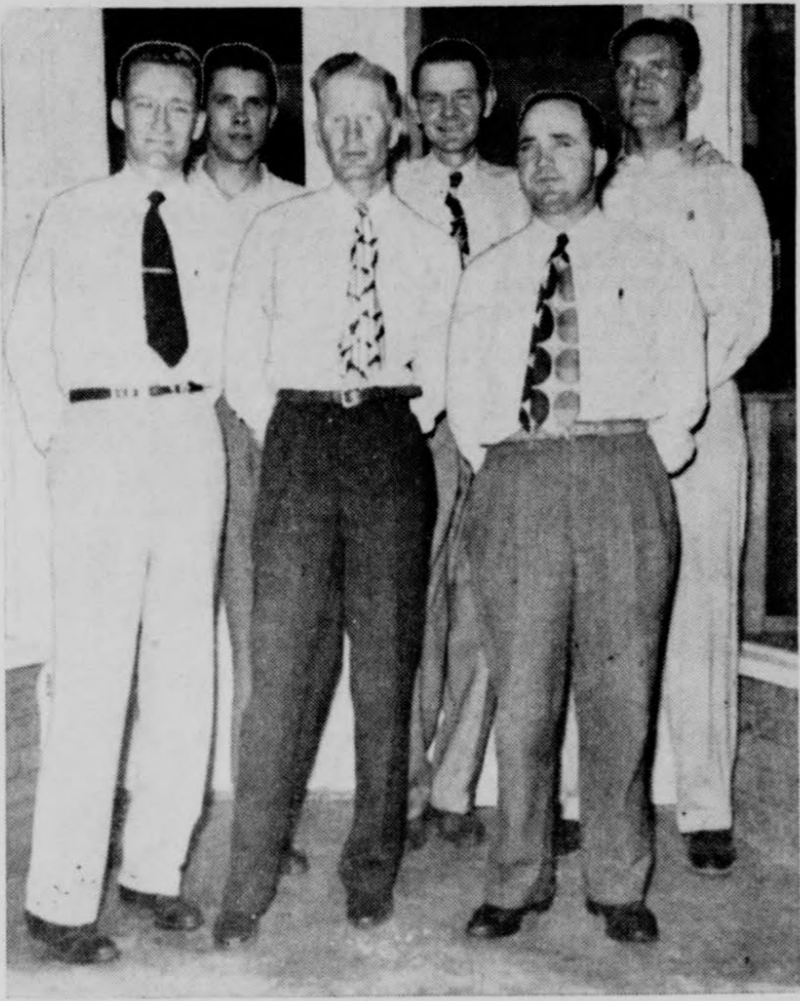

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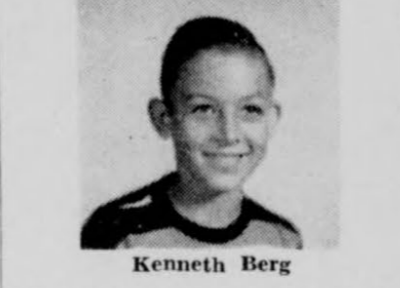
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For the past three years Miss Clark has served as a student assistant librarian in the university library.

Chamber Joins USCC, Names Birk Councillor For National Group

The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce this week became a member of the chamber of commerce of the United States, according to a letter recently received telling of the election.

At the board of directors meeting Tuesday evening at the City Hall, C. E. Birk was appointed as the national councillor on the National Council of the USCC, which represents every organization in the United States chamber and acts in an advisory capacity to the national board of directors.

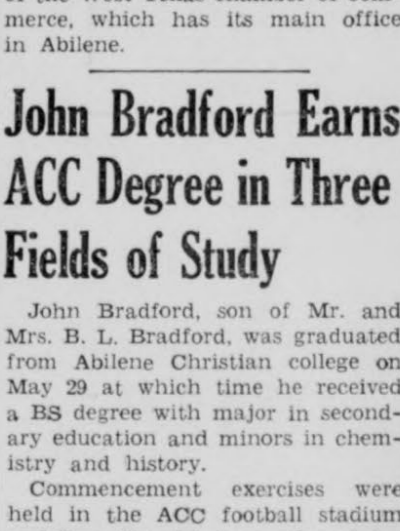
The duties of the national councillor as outlined by the by-laws, are "to bring to the attention of the national officers and directors all matters that come to his notice in his own locality valuable to the members of the chamber for purposes of information, or such questions of national character, timely in importance and general in application to business and industry as seem to him, for consideration of the national board of directors or membership at large.

"All questions submitted by mail for the consideration of members shall be brought to the attention of the national councillor representing each organization and shall be transmitted to his organization. It shall be incumbent upon the councillor to see that the question is given prompt attention by his organization and its expression of opinion returned in due order to national headquarters."

Thus will Iowa Park have a voice in questions of national importance. The Iowa Park C of C is entitled to one delegate and Mr. Birk as national councillor will be that delegate.

A. L. Reed is Iowa Park director of the West Texas chamber of commerce, which has its main office in Abilene.

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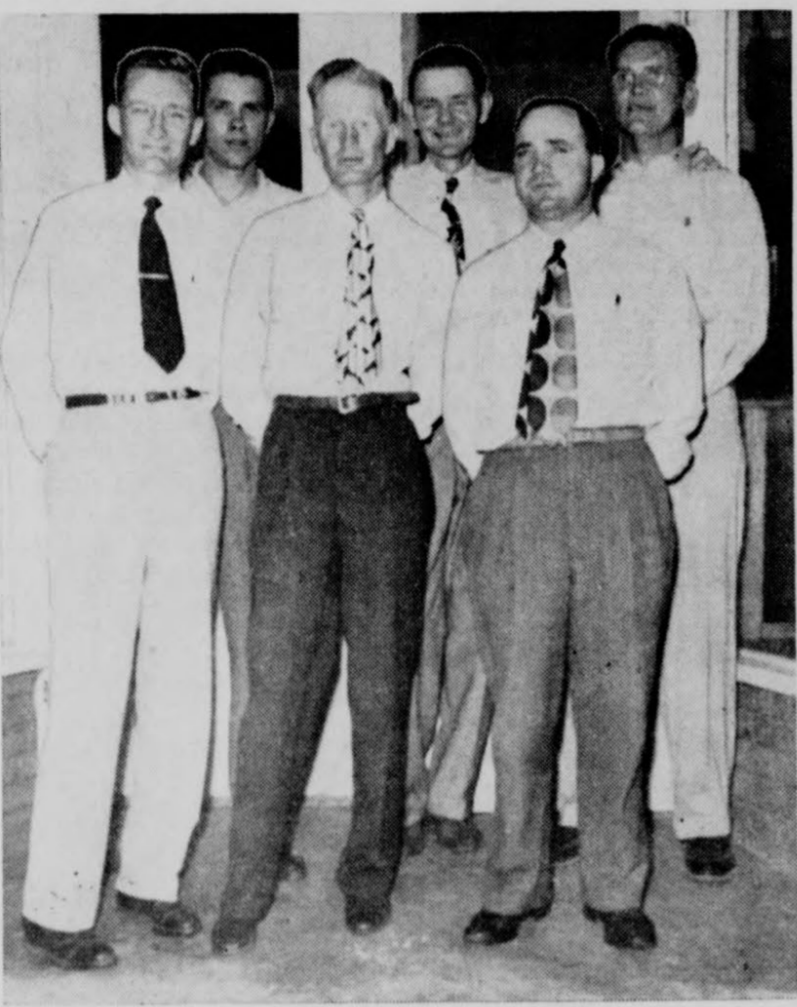
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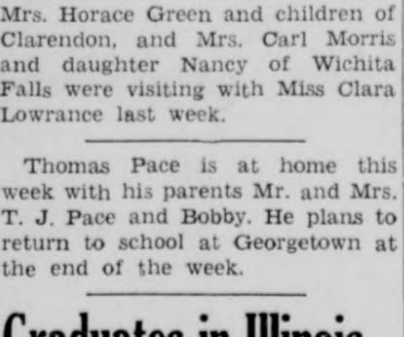

Barbara Gellmann Dance, John A. Gellmann, and Virginia Barbara Miller, wife of Stanley Miller, Plaintiffs,

vs. Otto Dombrowsky, and the unknown heirs and legal representatives of Otto Dombrowsky, Deceased, Defendants.

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A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: This is a suit to declare presumptive death and to declare property described below to be the separate property of Barbara Gellmann Dance, wherein Plaintiffs allege that the residence of Otto Dombrowsky, if living, and if not, the residence of his unknown heirs and legal representatives, is and has been for more than twenty-four (24) years prior to the filing of this petition, unknown to the plaintiffs;

That Barbara Gellmann Dance and Otto Dombrowsky were duly and legally married on or about November 12, 1912; that two children were born to this marriage, to-wit: John A. Gellmann and Virginia Barbara Miller; that said parties have never been divorced; that Barbara Gellmann Dance acquired title to property in 1926, which is more fully described as follows:

A Lot, or parcel of land, situated in Wichita County, Texas, and being all of Lot Number Eight (8) in Block Number Two (2) of the Jacob Renz Addition to the City of Wichita Falls, Texas, as shown by map or plat of said addition in the Deed Records of Wichita County, Texas;

That title was conveyed to Barbara Gellmann Dance, as Barbara Gellmann Dombrowsky or Barbara D. Gellmann; and that this is the separate property of Barbara Gellmann Dance.

Plaintiffs further allege that Otto Dombrowsky disappeared in the year 1920; that no member of his family has seen him since that date; that he has not been heard from since 1926 when Barbara Gellmann Dance was advised by the District Attorney's office of Wichita Falls, Wichita County, Texas, that defendant had been killed in an accident; that defendant is dead; that he died intestate; that Defendant left surviving him as his sole and only heirs Barbara Gellmann Dance, John A. Gellmann and Virginia Barbara Miller; that no administration was had upon the estate of said Defendant; and that none is necessary.

Wherefore Plaintiffs pray that Defendant, if living, and if not, his unknown heirs and legal representatives, if any, be cited to appear and that on final hearing they have Defendant adjudged dead as provided in Article 5541 R.S.C. of Texas, that Plaintiffs be adjudged sole and only heirs at law of Defendant, that said property be adjudged the separate property of Barbara Gellmann Dance or that Plaintiffs be awarded title and possession of the above described property, and for such other and further relief to which they may show themselves justly entitled.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved. The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

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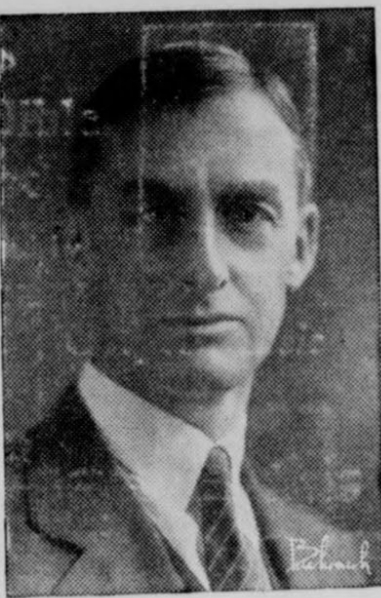
Picnic Supper Honors Bettye Birk's Birthday

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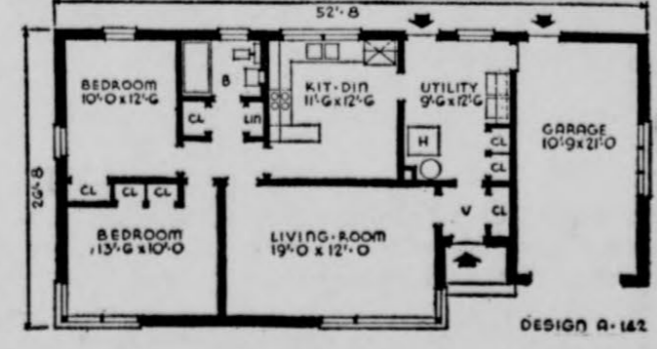
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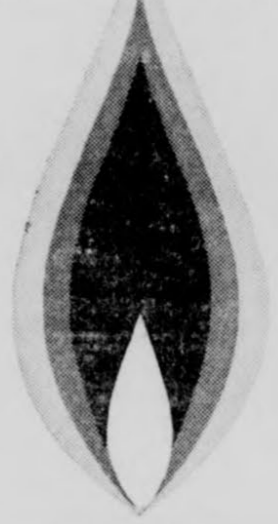
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
