Victory Rally set Sunday evening

The coordinators are encouraging everyone of the area to participate, and to wear patriotic colors, bring flags if they have them, and also bring candles.

Some candles will be available for those without.

Filing deadline draws more May 4 elections candidates

The local political pot developed almost to the full boiling point as the filing deadline for both the city and school May 4 elections came to a close Wednesday.

Three positions on both the city council and school board will be decided this spring, and all but one of those positions is contested.

City Alderman Virgil Woodfin, the only incumbent seeking reelection, has drawn two opponents for Place One: Ira Hambright and Bob Birk.

Place Three, currently held by Johnny Coker who last week said his 11 years on the council were enough, has three candidates: Bob Hamilton, Bud Mercer and Bill Guthrie.

Running for Alderman Place Five, being vacated by Diane Robnett since she also will not seek reelection, are Sherry Wood, Mark Raby, Bruce Palmer and Jo Lynn Cockrum.

Place Three school trustee incumbent Sherri Kennedy remained unchallenged as the deadline passed.

Place Two incumbent Wendall

House is being challenged by Max Henderson.

Three late filings for Place One, being vacated by John Sibley, brought to a total of five candidates for that position.

Joining Carmen Lozipone and Martha Dudley, who had filed before the final week, are Buddie Bridwell, Sandra Lehman and Walter Beeman.

Drawings for order in which candidate names will appear on the ballots will be held this morning: 10 a.m. for trustee candidates, at the administration building; 11:30 a.m. for alderman candidates, at city hall.

Deadline for candidates to file in both elections was the closing of offices Wednesday afternoon.

Council meeting slated Monday

Bids, work on the Recreational Activities Center and municipal court are dominant topics on Monday's city council meeting agenda.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Administrator Gary Jones is to report on advertisements seeking for bids on painting of water tanks and towers, lining of a new landfill pit, and sewer cleaning machine, all to be received and opened early in April.

Two bidding topics relate to the RAC, including one already advertised for materials to complete the interior walls, and a proposal to advertise for bids for plumbing fixtures to be installed in the Center.

Three appointments will be considered during the meeting, including appointing Sue Goodknight as municipal court clerk, and Donna Koehler as deputy municipal court clerk as well as assistant city secretary.

Also listed under Jones' reports to be made were:

- * received administrative order from EPA;
- * letter reference city depository;
- * city attorney's brief explaining conflict of interest reference persons filing for council;
- * and report on city limits and speed sign survey.

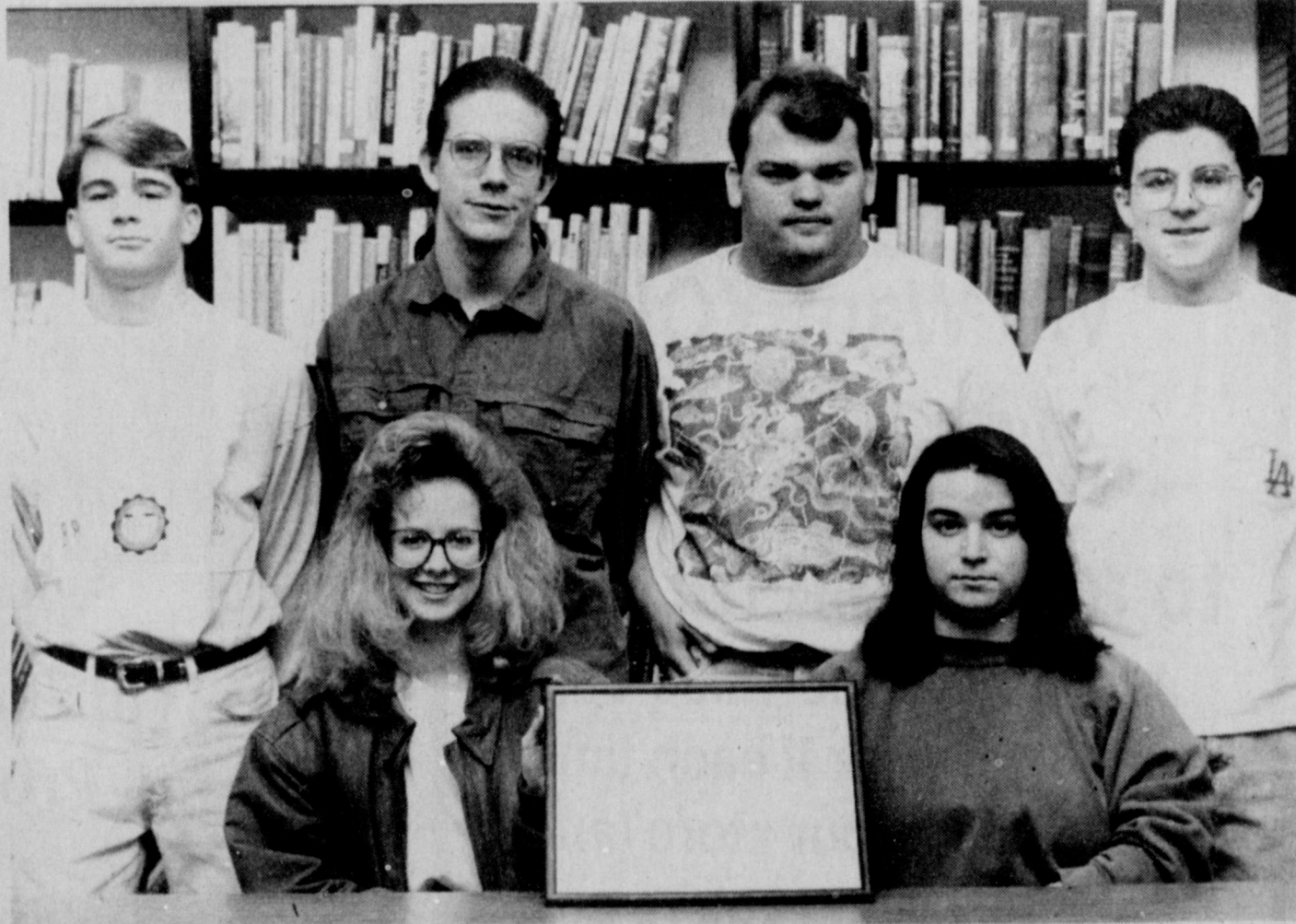
Street work is delayed

Mock trial team 6th at state

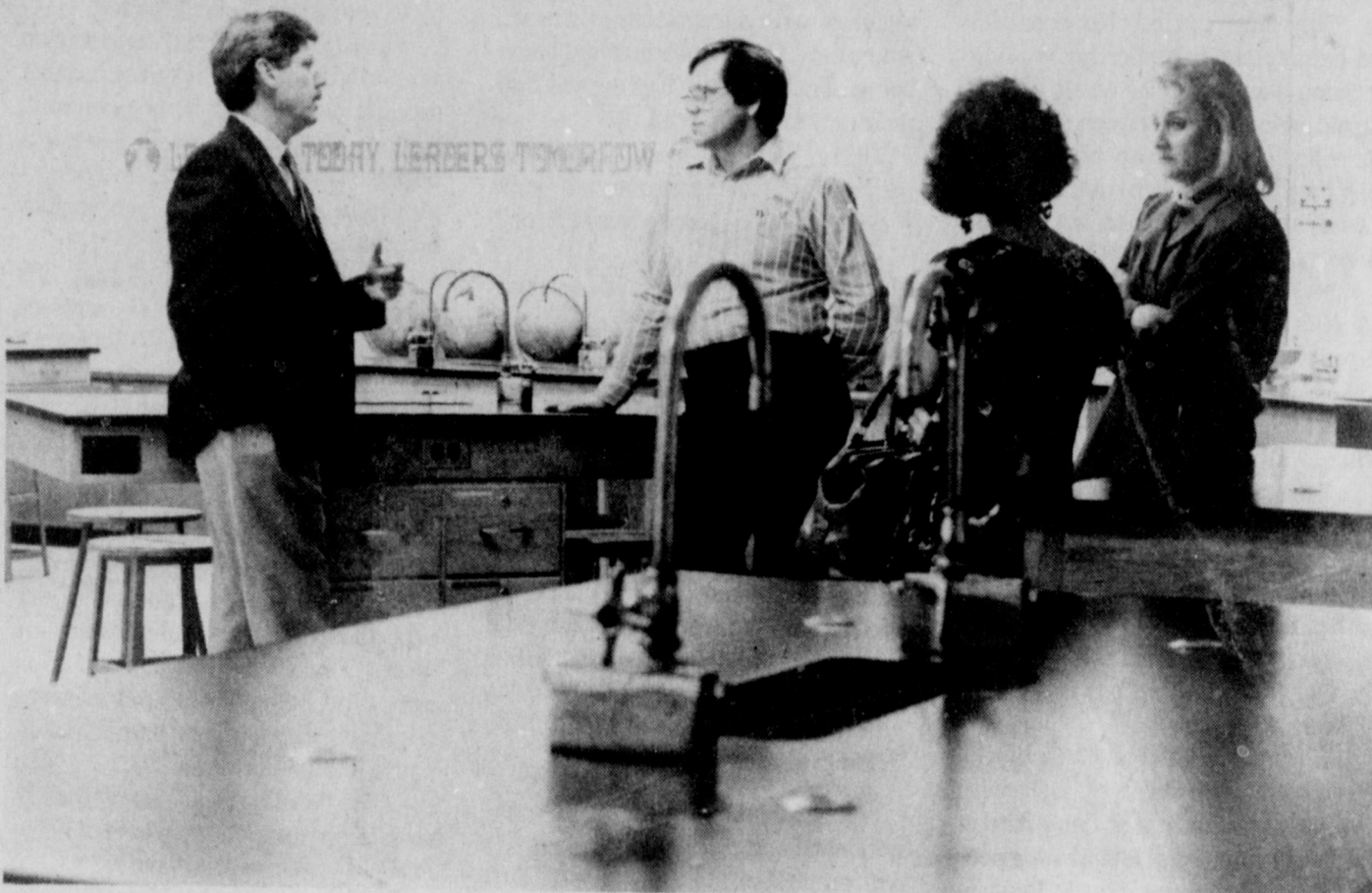

Teacher contracts extended

Contracts for 112 classroom teachers in the Iowa Park school system were extended through the 1992 year by trustees during their meeting Tuesday evening in the junior high school library.

Action on the contracts was taken following an hour-long executive session of the board.

But while the teachers have their contracts, more action will be required by the board at a later date, because the motion made by Trustee John Sibley included a phrase "...with salaries to be set when budgets are approved."

Two letters of resignation were received and accepted. These were from Bradford Elementary Principal Kenneth Davis and high school art teacher Cathy Norton. Both resignations become effective at the end of their current contracts.

Davis has been in the district 21 years, Miss Norton one year.

New Athletic Director Lucky Gamble remained with the board during the executive session, but no action

concerning coaching positions was taken when the session was reopened for business, nor was any action called for on the meeting agenda.

Executive sessions are closed to the public, and no information concerning any discussions during them is allowed to be made public, according to state law.

A delegation representing the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance met with the board and recommended adoption of a policy concerning churches and the school district.

Rev. Edward Prince, Alliance president, and Rev. Patrick Burke both spoke to the board.

The policy presented stated: "The Ministerial Alliance of Iowa Park is unanimously supportive of all student rights and the imposition of any of these principles is not to violate any constitutional right or privilege granted to any student, as outlined in the equal access law.

"No written announcements relative to religious or church sponsored activities should be posted or distributed on school property.

"Brief announcements should be allowed at athletic events, pep rallies, and like events.

"No announcement or promotion of any religious or church sponsored activities should be made over the public address system during school hours.

"All ministers and church staff should be allowed access to student assemblies and gatherings as allowed by school policy.

"These visits should be general in nature. No proselytizing or individual church promotion should occur during

these times of visitation.

"Anyone in violation may have this privilege revoked by the school board after undeniable and conclusive proof has been submitted to the school board that a violation has occurred.

"No church denomination or religious belief should be referred to by any teacher or school administrator other than from a historical or educational perspective.

"Only positive and supportive references to any church or religious belief presently established and in good standing in the community should be tolerated.

"No student should be identified as a religious affiliation by any teacher or school employee."

Rev. Burke said provisions of the policy would prevent occurrences he alleged have singled out students of his church when those of other faiths were not.

No members of the board voiced any objections to the document, but before it is adopted, it will be submitted to legal clearing and brought back for further action at the next meeting.

Trustees approved a proposal for amounts to be paid for Levels One and Two of the Career Ladder, \$1,500 and \$3,000, respectively to be made to those who are qualified in one payment, with their May checks.

Also approved was a recommendation by Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer to raise all cafeteria personnel salaries 45-cents per hour.

He explained those employees now on the lowest pay steps are below the

Time fails to dim memory, wit

Time has grayed her beautiful red hair, cataracts hinder her reading or doing handwork, she wears a hearing aid and spends quite a bit of time in her wheelchair because both of her hips have been broken-- but none of these have dimmed her wit or her memory.

Mrs. Carl Williamson will mark her 96th birthday June 20. She says, "I can't see, I can't walk or can't hear well, but I'm just fine." And she is physically strong. She can walk some with a walker.

"My goodness, I've been 39 so long, I'll have to stop and think how old I am," the intrepid nonagenarian joked, when asked how old she will be on her birthday. Grover Cleveland was serving the second time as president when Oma Brown was born in 1895 in Alvord.

Her mother died when Oma was 11 years old. Her brother, H.T., was five years younger and Oma helped care for him until her father remarried.

When Oma was 19, the Browns came to Wichita County. They settled in Burkburnett in 1914 where her father was a grocer and cotton buyer. She worked for Burkburnett Dry Goods Co.

She soon met her future husband, Carl Williamson, whose roots were deep in Burkburnett. His mother and grandmother had come by covered wagon to the area in 1878 from Champagne, Ill.

Williamson's father died at the age of 28, leaving his mother with two small children. She later married A.A. Morgan and two children were born to that union.

Oma and Carl were married Feb. 21, 1917, shortly before the United States entered World War I. They lived on a farm five miles northwest of Burkburnett.

Mrs. Williamson recalls standing on their front porch one summer day watching the first oil well come in that was drilled on their place by Sun Oil Co. The Williamson's land now has 137 wells. The beginning of the "boom days" came July 29, 1918 with the Fowler well.

Her youngest son, Stanley, said the oil companies would lease two to five acres. Wells were so close together one could almost walk from platform to platform and never touch the ground.

In the spring of 1918 the Williamsons sowed wheat on their Burkburnett farm. That was the first year of a two-year drought and they never had a crop come out of the ground.

That land, 412 acres, has been in the Williamson family more than 100 years. It was accepted into the Texas Family Heritage Land Registry for continuous ownership of land in agriculture production by one family for 100 years, and received recognition at the state capitol in Austin.

About three years after the Williamsons were married, he purchased from John Hirschi 105 acres of land about six miles southeast of Iowa Park.

While improving the land, the Williamsons lived in the house at 1827 11th St. in Wichita Falls.

They first built a barn and then a garage with an upstairs apartment, where they lived while their home was being constructed. They moved into their new home in 1923.

Mrs. Williamson still resides in the comfortable eight-room red brick home located on Farm to Market Road 369.

After getting settled on their farm near Iowa Park, the Williamsons also ranched and farmed near Dalhart, running cattle and raising wheat, corn and maize. They stayed there in the summer and came back to their farm here for the winter months.

Oma says she was just a housewife after she married. In Dalhart she cooked for the farm and ranch hands. Stanley complimented his mother as being a tremendous cook, and his wife, Jodie, agreed and added, "She made everything from scratch."

In Dalhart, Mrs. Williamson experienced some of the worst days she can remember. Those were the "dust bowl" days of the early 30s.

They had a well-built two-story stucco house on their farm, but that made little difference. She recalls that all you could see was dust in the air.

"After one of the sand storms you could sweep out a half tub of dirt," she said. Dust would come through the windows and doors and settle in the closets and cabinets and everywhere else in the house.

Dirt would pile up around the house like snow drifts. Chickens would go to roost in the middle of the day because it was so dark and streets had to be illuminated in the day time by street lights.

When they moved to their Iowa Park farm, the Williamsons gave three acres of ground facing FM 369 to be used for the Pleasant Valley School. When it was consolidated with Iowa Park schools, the land reverted to the Williamsons.

During the time Pleasant Valley School was in session, two teachers lived in the Williamson's garage apartment.

"That's where Stanley learned to play mah-jong," Mrs. Williamson recalled. Mah-jong, a table game of Chinese origin played with 144 pieces of tile, was a very popular game in those days.

When Stanley married, his parents built a house on their land for him and his bride. They lived there for 12 years.

Mrs. Williamson remembers Stanley and Jodie's three sons would run off with their dog to Grandma's house. "I would call Jodie and tell her they were there, but when they came home not to spank them," she commented.

Her grandchildren still love to go by to see her and check on her.

Due to the Great Depression years that came as a result of terrible drought years and poor economy, banks failed, many were homeless because of foreclosures, and unemployment forced many people into bread lines.

In the early part of the 30s decade, more than 5,500 acres of land, some joining the Williamson's land, was purchased from Hirschi and Bridwell with a Federal Grant and was divided into 91 farms, ranging from 42 to 82 acres.

This was done under the oversight of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration to give down-and-out experienced farmers a chance to start over. Thus, Wichita Valley Farms came into being. These places were improved with a house, barn, chicken house and pump house.

The Williamsons have had a reputation through the years of helping people when they could.

Williamson raised a lot of hogs in those years. At hog killing time, he would butcher five to 10 hogs at a time. He would get several of the men on the Valley Farms to help him and then give all of them meat to help them.

Quite often Williamson visited the farmers and if they didn't have the equipment they needed for certain crops or practices, Williamson would help them get their crops in, or land prepared.

He was a firm believer in soil conservation practices and preached soil and water conservation. He was honored by the state Soil Conservation Service for his farming practices.

Williamson taught his sons to conserve the land, a lesson they learned and have continued to practice through the years.

The Williamsons have been staunch supporters of First Baptist Church through the years. He was a member of First Baptist Church in Wichita Falls.

Mrs. Williamson's children and grandchildren attest to the fact that she has always been a generous, hard working person, who supported her husband in all of his major endeavors.

She could do anything with her hands and they were never still as long as she was able to get around, and before the cataracts developed, her children say.

Having an artistic bent, and being imaginative, she worked with various crafts and loved to crochet and quilt.

Mrs. Williamson still plays the organ occasionally. Her brother, H.T., played the fiddle and they used to enjoy making music together. Both of them played by ear.

She loved to garden and can its produce, and she made delicious jams and jellies. "She didn't do run of the mill things," said her daughter-in-law, Jodie, "she did exceptional things."

"I'm going to have some garden this year," she replied, "I know I'll have tomatoes, and more, if I can find someone who will put up the vegetables for me."

Before her health prevented, Mrs. Williamson worked in her yard and roses were a speciality. She still is concerned about them. A number of bushes still are bearing, even though she hasn't been able to tend them the last few years. Someone else cares for them part of the time.

She loves to play dominoes and will play with anyone who wants to take a chance. "She can still beat the best of them," Stanley says.

Other personality traits attributed to her by family members are that she is affectionate, soft-hearted, generous, has a wonderful disposition, can get along with anybody, and has always been well organized.

Mrs. Williamson still keeps to a schedule and knows everything that goes on at her farm. When cows are there, she knows all about them, and when it is time for them to be fed. When the cattle are moved to another pasture and horses are brought in, she is just as interested in them.

When the conversation was about cows, Stanley commented, "There are horses out there now," (his horses), his mother quipped, "I know, do you want to buy one?"

An unusual asset for a person her age are her natural teeth. She says the only reason she can think of that she still has them is because she always took good care of them and seldom went to a dentist.

She attributes her long life to "hard work and clean living."

She laughed as she told about an incident while she was in the hospital with a broken hip. She told a nurse, "I want to brush my teeth." The nurse told her, "Hand them to me, I'll clean them for you." She said the nurse couldn't believe her when she told her they were her own teeth.

Until Mrs. Williamson broke her hips, she and Jodie loved to shop for antiques. She has several beautiful antique pieces in her home.

Very thoughtful of her family, she always knows exactly what she wants for each member at Christmas, making it no problem for someone to do her shopping for her now that she can't do it herself.

Mrs. Williamson has three sons, eight grandchildren, 11 great-grandchildren and a brand new great-great-granddaughter, Sunny Leann Shotts, daughter of Christy Ann Williamson Shotts, who makes it a five generation family.

Her son, Richard of Parker, Colo., retired as captain after flying 28 years for United Air Lines. He visits his mother often, and they play dominoes. Yes, she always beats him.

Richard has three children, R.C. Jr., who lives in Austin and is successful in investments and real estate; Craig of Denver, who is in stocks and investments, and Rese Ann, a freelance writer, who writes for The Wall Street Journal. She speaks Russian fluently and serves as a translator.

Another Williamson son, John, is a farmer and resides on FM 369 about a mile south of his mother. His children are John W. Jr., of Iowa Park,

who has an agriculture service, and Myra Jane, who works at Sheppard Air Force Base.

Stanley is in farming, ranching and banking. His children are Bert of Iowa Park, who has farming interests in Wichita County.

Jeff lives on a ranch between Iowa Park and Electra. He is in ranching, farming and trucking.

And Joe Howard, who is in the ranching and cattle business in Archer County.

Mrs. Williamson said, "I love my three boys, but I guess my greatest disappointment is that I never had a daughter. I always wanted a little girl."

I guess my major disappointment to come out of Operation Desert Shield was the allegation that there was a disproportion of blacks among the military troops sent over there.

I totally reject the allegation that our government hand-picked those in the military branches who were to put their lives on the line during battle.

The statements, from those I read and viewed on tv, seemed to have been made by the same tiresome individuals who always have some kind of complaint about how blacks are treated in the United States.

While some complaints may have been made by those who were serving in Saudi Arabia, I never saw one being interviewed on tv make such a statement.

My second greatest disappointment was the complaining of many who are serving in the various reserve units, about being called into action.

One, from Louisiana, reported with his unit to San Antonio, and then took off AWOL. I've not seen whether they've ever caught up with him or not.

The complaining reservists were representative of all ethnic groups. In fact, I never saw a report of a single black reservist who complained.

But the reason there were so many blacks serving in Desert Storm, and so many complaining reservists, is simple: it all came about because of money.

No, I'm not saying the blacks were paid to go over there, or the whites paid to not go.

You must remember we are now served by an all volunteer military. And you must also remember times are tough and jobs hard to come by.

Hence, a lot of people, men and women, are volunteering to serve in the military in order to earn a livelihood. And many who have jobs, or are still in college, are choosing to supplement their income with military reserve duty pay.

The fact that there may have been more blacks serving in the Middle East possibly can be explained that many of them, according to all reports, have a difficult time finding employment.

And, after seeing the pay scale of today's Army, I can understand. Have you checked it out lately?

A private's monthly pay is \$854; private first class, \$1,001; corporal, \$1,167; sergeant, \$1,448; staff sergeant, \$1,707; sergeant first class, \$2,338; master sergeant, \$2,599, and sergeant major, \$2,910.

Those salaries, of course, don't include room and board, uniforms, free medical care, dependent allowances, and things like that. Plus a liberal retirement allowance.

I don't point to those salaries and benefits as criticism, but in order to understand why those who have a hard time finding employment would volunteer for military service.

It's not new. You could hardly get accepted into the military back during the Depression years of the 1930s, even though a private's pay was \$21.

Anyone who volunteers to serve in the active or reserve military should be aware that it's not just another job on the automobile assembly line or a clerk typist in the office.

Lives are at risk whenever duty calls.

That should be extremely plain now that Operation Desert Storm is over.

Driverless pickup hits house

A home struck by a driverless vehicle, the burglary of a business, and a bomb threat highlighted entries of the police blotter for the past week.

Mrs. R.D. Roach was not injured but was unnerved early Wednesday morning of last week when her home at 129 Chestnut began shaking.

A pickup parked across the street had rolled out of its driveway, across the street, avoided a deep ditch by passing over the driveway culvert and struck Mrs. Roach's house.

The house sustained damage to the interior and exterior walls, window air conditioner, window sill and frame and porch support, all estimated at \$500.

The pickup was owned by Jerry Sanders, who lives at 106 Chestnut.

A policeman on patrol Sunday found the back door of the Good and Plenty Restaurant open, and reported the incident at 4:56 a.m., according to the blotter.

Investigating with a representative of the business, it was determined a cash bag containing change money for opening that day had been taken from its hiding place. The bag reportedly contained \$209.

Investigation determined the door had apparently been forced open, but there were no marks made by any type of instrument.

The investigation continues. Another theft was listed on the blotter, but it was alleged to have occurred about a month earlier.

Police received a report Friday that a 12 volt Delco battery had been taken from one of the school buses while it was parked at the school's bus barn.

Two reports of criminal mischief cases were entered on the blotter, both Tuesday afternoon.

A rock was thrown through a window of a house in the 1100 block of South Wall, and a vehicle parked in the 1300 block of Mockingbird was egged, allegedly damaging the vehicle's paint.

That is to close Wagonwheel, from Johnson Road to Surrey, at 9 a.m. Monday, while equipment removes the asphalt and about six inches of base. That will take an estimated day and a half.

Wagonwheel will be closed to traffic while equipment is working on the street, but open all other times.

While the street is closed, access to and from the entire Shiloh Addition will be available by use of a dirt road that extends between Quail Valley and Yucca, Price said.

Bullock explains proposal

Dear Bob:

More than 10 years ago I tried to alert Texans to the fact that our current tax system was falling further and further out of step with the Texas economy, and that the day was coming when we would have to seriously consider a state income tax, despite my personal opposition and the historic opposition of most Texans to income taxes.

That day has now come, thanks to the Supreme Court ruling declaring our public school finance system unconstitutional. I think it is now time to discuss an income tax frankly and without emotion -- and I have so stated.

I did not suggest it as simply a means of raising more money to spend. I did it because your local school property taxes are going sky-high, and an income tax is the only way I know of to stop that.

I did it because the alternatives are few and far between, and those few options would certainly include a handsome increase in the sales tax rate and broadening of its coverage to include all services and many hard good items that are now exempt.

Opposition to my suggestion has been predictably partisan, emotional and in most instances without the benefit of facts and details as to what an income tax can do to get Texans significant property tax relief and to chart a stable and constitutionally sound course for the future of our schools.

I would hope that you would read the enclosed materials as you formulate your own thinking on the question. If you see fit, I would be most grateful for your publishing the commentary I have written as I feel it carries a good deal of information that would be of help to your readers as they reflect on the issue.

"Cake" were always big hits with employees of Casual Corner, and now the brownies are a favorite of her husband.

Sour Cream Coffee Cake

- 1 cup margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 pint sour cream

Cream margarine and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla and beat well. Add dry ingredients and sour cream, alternately, until smooth. Spread 1/2 batter in greased 9x13" pan

Sprinkle with one-half mixture of:

- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1 tsp. cinnamon

Add rest of batter and top with remaining sugar/cinnamon mixture.

Bake at 375 degrees 20-25 minutes. Test for doneness.

Homemade Brownies

- 2 cups sugar
- 4 Tbsps. cocoa
- 1 cup melted butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 cup flour

Mix by hand. Pour into greased and floured 9x13 baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes. When cool, sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Broccoli-Mushroom Quiche
Good for breakfast or after-church Sunday lunch

- 1 cup light mayonnaise
- 1 cup milk
- 4 eggs
- 1/8 tsp. ground black pepper

Mix until smooth and add:
1/2 small package frozen chopped broccoli (cooked)
Chopped onion to taste
1 1/2 cup mild Cheddar cheese, grated
1 small can mushroom stems & pieces, drained

Pour above mixture into 9" frozen deep dish pie crust. Sprinkle top with seasoned salt to taste. Bake at 375 degrees 35 minutes. Cover outside edge with strips of foil and continue to bake 10-15 minutes until center of quiche is set.

Fresh Vegetable Bake

- 2 sliced zucchini
- 2 sliced yellow squash
- 2 sliced tomatoes
- 1 sliced medium onion
- Butter or margarine
- Parmesan cheese

Cover bottom of 1 1/2 qt. casserole dish with zucchini slices. Continue to layer yellow squash, a couple pats of butter, slices of onions, tomatoes. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Start with zucchini slices and layer up again, creating 3-4 sets of layers. Cover. Microwave 6 minutes on high for crisper vegetables. 7-8 minutes for softer ones.

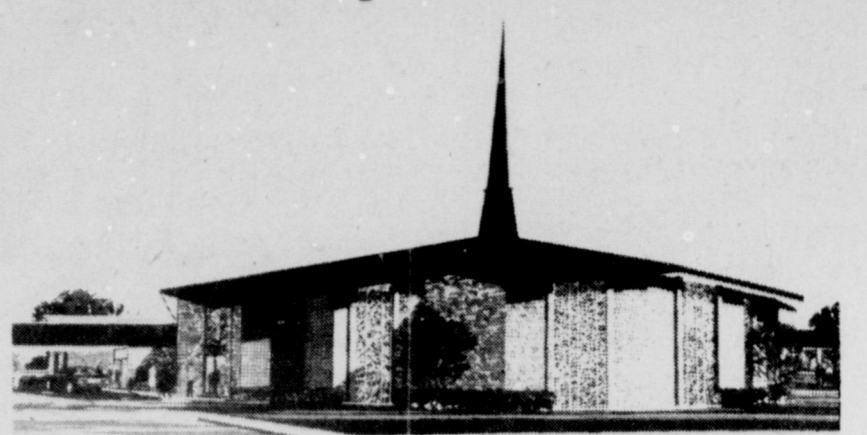

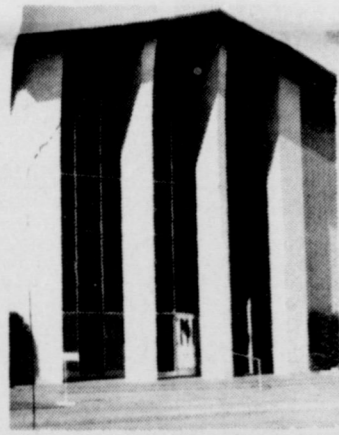

Work of home missionary told

Mrs. Roy Smith reviewed part two of "What Is A Missionary?" for the Thelma Smith Baptist Women of First Baptist Church in a meeting held Monday night at the church.

The topic of the review prepared by Wayne Grinstead was "The Right Thing," and is described the work of Paula Dickson, a home missionary, who is presently serving as director of Telegraph Baptist Center in Oakland, Calif. She began her work at the center when she was 46 years old and was finishing her studies at Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary and was serving as an intern at Telegraph Baptist Center. She realized that the Lord was calling her to continue working there and stayed on until she became the director.

Her first project was to restore three weatherwood buildings curling from neglect on a parking lot piled with broken glass, bottles, rusty cans

and old tires. After several years of hard work it is now a center for the homeless in despair, most of them coming from the People's Park, two miles away, who moved to the area searching for jobs and lost them when industries moved from the area. The center is on the fringe of an area infested with drugs and violence.

Mrs. Dickson is assisted at the center by her husband and several co-workers. They bring in several tons of food from the Alameda County Food Bank purchased for ten cents per pound every two weeks. In addition to ministering to the people's physical needs, they minister to their spiritual needs through Bible classes, Christian Social work, the People's Program, which provides opportunities for the mentally handicapped, as well as the others, to enjoy recreation, socialization, expression and trading ideas with others,

which is the complete goal of the program.

The annual People Award dinner is a highlight of the year and in 1989, the event started on "The Day That The Earth Moved" just as the people sat down at the dinner table. Fortunately, no one was injured, and since that time, Telegraph Baptist Center has served more than 8,000 meals.

Preceding the program, Mrs. V.I. Woodfin conducted the routine business and Mrs. E.T. Patterson was in charge of the prayer period for missionaries on the birthday calendar for the day.

Mrs. Patterson served as hostess and carried out a St. Patrick's Day theme in refreshment table decorations.

Fourteen members and one guest, Mrs. Garland Wimberly of Hobbs, N.M. attended the meeting.

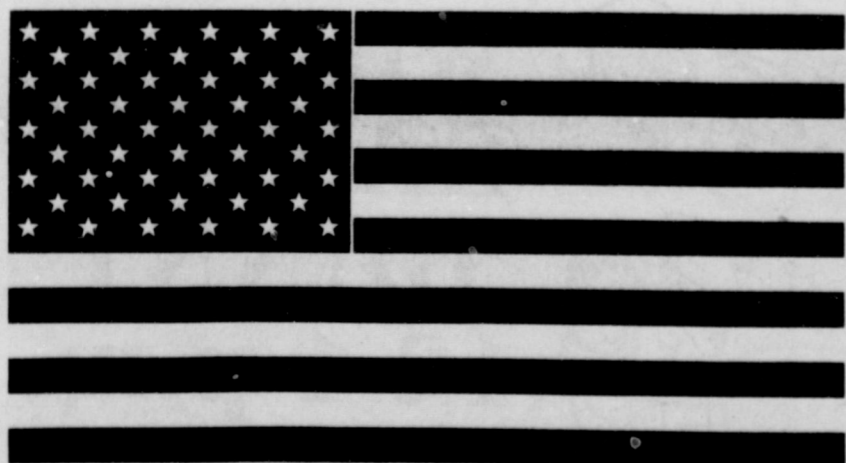

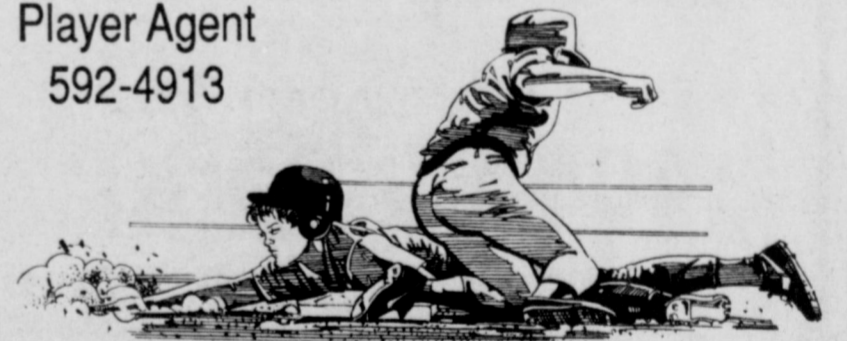

Two dates in March are special ones for the Charlie Metz family. March 2, Metz celebrated his 90th birthday, and Wednesday the couple will observe their 65th wedding anniversary.

Family members gathered March 2 to help celebrate the two events.

In the morning, several of Charlie's old coffee drinking buddies met at Texas Reddy Room and reviewed many good times of former years.

That evening family members gathered for a dinner party hosted by the couple's son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. (Bonnie) Jim Medlinger to honor the anniversary couple.

Metz arrived here on Texas Independence Day, his 23rd birthday, in 1924. He came from Madill, Okla., to the Mitchell Ranch a few miles south of Iowa Park, where he worked on an oil lease for Ross Drilling Co.

The Bob Carter family also lived on the Mitchell Ranch and he became friends with them. Two years after coming to Texas, March 27, 1926, Charlie was married to Bob and Bonnie Carter's daughter, Mildred.

Charlie and Mildred moved into town in the fall of 1927, and lived at 302 E. Magnolia. It is interesting to note that for the last several years they have lived at their present address, on the opposite end of Magnolia, at 803.

Their oldest daughter, Bonnie, was born Feb. 4, 1928 while they resided at their first home here. That same year Mr. and Mrs. Metz began their lifetime careers when they purchased the Jack Hoffman Cafe on Cash Street.

Their second daughter, Charlene (Mrs. Doyle Tate) of Pass Christian, Miss., was born July 11, 1933, when the Metz family lived on South Wall Street.

For many years Iowa Park citizens met at the Metz coffee shop to enjoy coffee or lunch and discuss the latest news.

From 1951 until 1957 Charlie and Mildred operated Metz Appliance and Construction. While he was in that business, Metz built 27 homes in Iowa Park.

In 1957 they returned to the cafe business and continued this endeavor until their retirement in 1975 when the cafe was sold. It is now operated as the 3-M Cafe.

Metz had served in France during World War I and during World War II he was in the Navy Seabees. During his second stint, Mrs. Metz continued to operate the coffee shop.

Through the years, both Charlie and Mildred has been very active, and have carved a niche for themselves in different facets of civic and community life.

Metz served as a city councilman for eight years, and as mayor for eight years. He has been a member of Iowa Park Masonic Lodge more than 50 years.

Many people remember his efforts in organizing the Iowa Park Buffaloes Baseball Team, which he managed for several years during the 1930s.

Metz, always a strong supporter of the high school football teams, he with others would provide transportation for the football players in order for them to participate in the sport.

Mildred's interests always leaned to the religious and aesthetics and she has made her prime contributions to

the area in these activities, and through social organizations, as well as through business contacts.

She has been very active in First Baptist Church activities through the 65 years. For many years she was Junior Department Sunday School Superintendent and Girls Auxiliary leader.

As a talented artist, Mildred has shared these talents with many people of the area. She oil paints, china paints, and does ceramics and has presented many programs for clubs and organizations.

Mrs. Metz has been a member of Iowa Park Eastern Star for over 50 years. She is a charter member of the

Iowa Park Garden Club and has been a member of 23 Study Club since 1950. She also belonged to the Porcelain Club of Wichita Falls and is a member of the Arts and Crafts Association.


In addition to their two daughters, the Metz have six grandchildren, and nine great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Medlinger was a business teacher in Iowa Park High School 20 years. The other daughter, Charlene, is an artist and teacher on the Gulf Coast. Two of her paintings now hang in Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

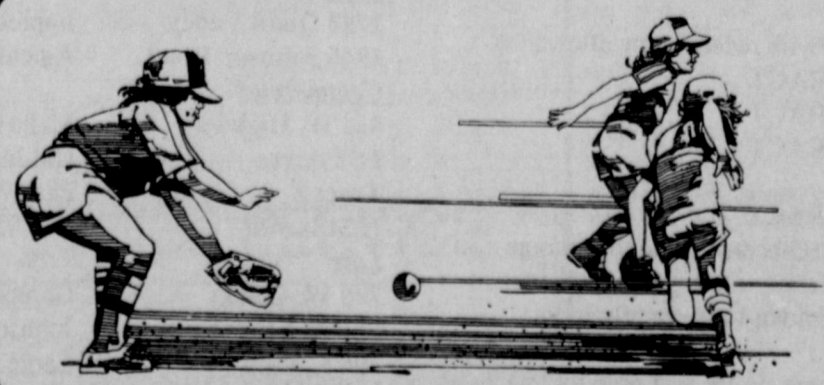

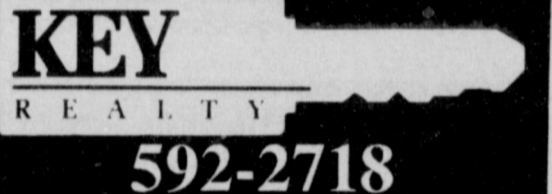

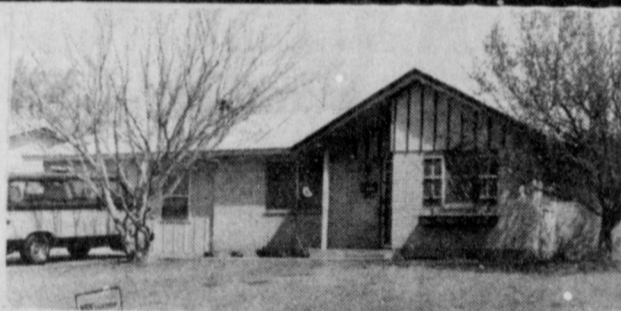
