CITY COUNCIL

Incumbent Virgil Woodfin is seeking his third term as city alderman in

Place One. He has drawn opposition from Bob Birk and Ira Hambright.

Place Three on the council is being vacated by Johnny Coker, who is the dean of the council in tenure.

Candidates for Place Three, in the order they will appear on the ballots, are Bob Hamilton, Bill Guthric and Bud

Also not running for re-election on the council is Alderman Diane Robnett, who has occupied Place Five, and it's that position which has drawn the largest number of candidates on the city's ballot.

Place Five candidates include Sherry Wood, Mark Raby, Jo Lynn Cockrum and Bruce Palmer.

Woodfin earned his seat at the council table in 1987, when he defeated Keith Fisher 199-156.

Mercer is the only candidate who has previously served on the council. He ran unopposed in 1986 and '88, but lost last May to Charlie Helms, 557-

This will be the Hambright's third attempt to win a council seat. He lost 140-94 to Robnett in 1989, and last year was edged by former mayor Johnny Crawford 308-278.

Running a close third to Crawford and Hambright last year was Raby, who polled 244 votes.

'He's a good ole boy'

Mention the name Buck Voyles and the majority of people have the same comment, "He's a good ole boy."

These comments aren't confined to just people in Iowa Park where he has lived for more than six decades.

His "good ole boy" ways, his outgoing personality, ready wit and willingness to help people are pretty well known by many people throughout Wichita County.

Buck retired in 1980 after serving 32 years as county commissioner from Iowa Park. Prior to running for this office in 1948, he worked several years as dredger operator for the Wichita County Water Improvement District, with Carl Sullivan as his foreman.

He had an opponent in his first commissioner race and there was a run-off. He said, "I really didn't much think I would be elected." But, that was the beginning of the many times he was a candidate, without drawing an opponent. It also was the beginning of people thinking of him almost as a permanent fixture at the county courthouse.

There was a lot of difference in that first election and several of them after that," Voyles commented. He said the last few years he sat in front of the television to see how the votes were coming in.

That first year, he recalled, "The streets in the middle of town were roped off. There was a band on a truck and the celebration went on until one or two o'clock, with the town full of people."

Buck didn't choose to run in 1980. "After all, I was pushing 70, and I felt I had reached the age when a younger person should be in the of-

He continued, "The county needed long-range planning and I realized a younger person would have better vision and foresight. After all, when you approach that age, you can't tell how much longer you will be able

to look ahead and envision the needs of the county and determine what is best for the people like a younger person can.'

Voyles said the job was a challenge to him until the last day he was in office. "One of the things I liked most about it was that it gave me an opportunity for service and to accomodate the people," he com-

He pointed out that there was a lot of difference in what he could do for the people in his precinct when he first was elected and several years later. "There was not as much 'politics' involved then as there was in later years." he explained.

For the first 10 or 12 years after he was elected he maintained the streets for the city, because at that time there was not a street maintainance depart-

"One of the best parts at that time for me was that I could help to make things easier for people by helping them in some ways with their property. Then I could maintain the school yards, and the area around the schools. I built every ball field in Iowa Park.

"Now that there is more politics involved, it is against the law for the commissioner to do this type of work."

Buck said the people were always cooperative. When he purchased the right-of-way for the 287 freeway to come through, and for the rights-ofway for farm to market roads, he never had any problems obtaining them, because the property owners were always agreeable. He is proud of the fact that he never had to file a condemnation suit for a right-of-way.

He moved here from Childress with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E.E. Voyles in 1928. Buck was born in Megargel and was given the same initials as his dad, but they didn't have the same names.

On Nov. 2, 1940, Buck was married to Theda Brittian, a native of Burkburnett who had moved to Iowa Park, and who, incidently was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.E.

From 1942 until he was discharged in 1945, Buck served in World War II in the U.S. Army, 7th Infantry Division, 17th Regiment, serving in the Asian-South Pacific Theatre. On May 17, 1945, he was wounded in Okinawa in an artillery explosion.

He has several ribbons and medals from his service, including the Philippine Liberation medal, a good conduct medal and a Bronze Star. But he wouldn't say what he did "beyond the call of duty" to receive the Bronze Star.

He did recall that he went 11 months one time in the army without a pay check. "But that probably wasn't 'beyond the call', since there was no place to spend it where I was," he said.

Since Buck's retirement he has helped other local veterans find work and he still gets calls from those who have been wounded in service, asking how to go about getting their com-

Through the years Theda has been a Merle Norman Cosmetic representative, and until the first of the year she was working at the Merle Norman shop in Sikes Senter Mall. Now, she considers herself retired.

The Voyles have a recreational motor home and they do quite a bit of traveling. They have spent some winter months in Arizona, but they prefer to stay in Texas.

Each summer they go to the Rio Grande Valley and into Mexico for a while. Also during the year they attend several musical jamborees.

A favorite is at Glen Rose. Buck says the park there is beautiful and family oriented. There is always seven or eight Bluegrass bands there. and usually there are one or two that are nationally known.

Another reason he probably likes it so well is that they give him something to do. They made him sheriff, with all the trappings, complete with badge. He collects fines from those who break the rules and the money is used for a "big feed". Buck also is the official greeter. That figures, since he had plenty of experience greeting people during his 32 years in a politi-

They enter several activities other senior citizens do, and Buck is a member of Senior Citizens, but with tongue in cheek, Theda says she is waiting until she gets old enough to join. He responded, "And I can hardly wait."

It's been weeks since the school reform bill was passed, but just what all the effects will have on individual districts is still unknown.

Who's surprised?

Anyone who kept up with House Bill 72 and other legislation relating to public education in Texas should know that it takes time, and more time, for all the interpretations of intent to be defined and determined, and then handed down to the local levels.

"The good news about S.B. 351 passed and signed into law on April 15 is that school districts know approximately how much money to expect from the state next school year," says Iowa Park Superintendent Glen Mitchell.

But he goes on: "The bad news is that the legislature is still in session and they will be considering bills that may require additional mandates that would take the additional money that school districts expect to receive from the state next year."

Then he puts on the zinger, "The really bad news about the bill is that the only way that it can be financed is through a state income tax."

Based on this year's average daily attendance figures, Iowa Park should receive between \$250,000 and \$300,000 more state funds for the 1991-92 school year.

That's a big should.

Mitchell also expressed concern about the effect of Iowa Park being placed into a county-wide county education district, along with Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and Electra, which has already been mandated.

Some people feel that new district will be responsible to collect the mandated minimum tax levy of 72-cents (and that doesn't include the local 11cent bond retirement tax).

But Mitchell reports others feel the individual districts will be allowed to continue to collect the taxes as in the past.

The local administrator joins others around the state in worrying about the legislation's mandate of 180 days of school, a five-day increase.

And they have multiple reasons for their concerns.

Mitchell points out the additional five school days will increase the cost of operating the buses, cafeteria and buildings.

He then points out the legislation calls for an additional 40 hours of inservice for teachers --- to be accomplished during the school day.

"This will require early dismissal time throughout the year or employing substitute teachers, while teachers re- Park. ceive inservice training," he says.

Another of Mitchell's concerns is, "The ability for the state to prorate the amount of money each school district will receive if there is not enough money available to pay school districts because of a short fall of money."

State Rep. Rick Williamson was Clayton A. Rust recently quoted in the Wise County Messenger, "Right now, there are no ideas about where to raise the money." Another legislator, Rep. John

Smithee, was quoted in the Canyon News, "There is a fallacy. People are saying 'yeah, we're getting \$2 million.' What they don't realize is this isn't pennies from heaven. It's got to come from somewhere and Texas is broke."

Now is when most school districts are putting together their 1991-92 year budgets, so they can hold the required public hearings and make adjustments some taxpayer might prove necessary.

Well, Dr. Wayne King of Hamlin told the Hamlin Herald, "Any budget planning would be premature at this point...If there is no funding available, we could be faced with only seeing a pro-rated share of state funds and would be no better off than we are now."

Concerning the county-wide taxing districts, the Bowie News quoted the Bowie superintendent, Dr. Bobby Bain, "Bowie ISD has been in a holding pattern under \$1 (tax rate) since its inception. Meanwhile, every school in Wise County and most in Montague County are well over the \$1 mark... As a result, after running a tight ship financially and keeping the tax rate low for citizens, Bowie ISD will suffer in the amount of state funding they will receive."

But, all this concern over the bill may be for naught, despite what Judge McCowan says.

You see, the constitutionality of the reform bill apparently will be challenged by school districts with large tax

Among other points, they plan to base their appeal on a 1931 ruling of the Texas Supreme Court on the "Love vs. Dallas" case, which prohibited taking money from one district and giving it to another.

An example of the "Robin Hood" attack on local school districts was given by James Pennington, superintendent at Andrews.

Shrimp Creole

- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 large bell pepper, chopped 1 large can tomato sauce
- 3 cans water
- Parsley flakes
- Hot, cooked rice
- 3 lbs. raw shrimp, cleaned 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 2 stalks celery, chopped
- 1 small can tomato paste
- 2 Tbsp. oil

Put oil in skillet. Add chopped ingredients and cook until tender. Add tomato sauce and paste and water. Put lid on and bring to boil. Lower fire and simmer 1 hour. Add shrimp and simmer 30 minutes longer or until thick. Serve over rice.

Barbecued Shrimp

- 10 lbs. fresh cleaned shrimp (prefer-
- able with heads) 2 lbs. butter or oleo
- 2 cups olive oil
- Garlic to taste (squeeze through garlic
- Freshly ground black pepper to taste 2 tsp. oregano
- 4 bay leaves
- 4 or 5 lemons 2 cups cooking sherry
- Salt to taste

Combine above ingredients, except shrimp. Spread shrimp in large baking pan; cover with sauce mixture; place in broiler about 5 inches from heat. Stir frequently. Cook about 10 minutes. Serve with hot French bread.

Best way to mix is to take a large bowl and put some rice in it and take some of the

rice and more ground mixture. This should make the rice brown and will be moist

Creole Chicken Sauce

- **Piquante** 1 (3 lb.) frying chicken, cut up
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 cup sliced mushrooms 1 (16 oz.) can whole peeled tomatoes,
- chopped 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper Flour
- 1 green bell pepper, chopped 3 garlic cloves or 1 tsp. minced garlic
- 1 (6 oz.) can tomato paste
- 1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper 2 Tbsp. chopped parsley or flakes
- 1/4 cup olive oil

Season the chicken pieces with salt and pepper and dredge lightly in flour. Brown chicken well on all sides in olive oil in a skillet. Add all ingredients except mushrooms. Add salt and pepper to taste. Cover and simmer slowly for 1 hour. Add the mushrooms and cook 15 minutes more. Serves 4. This recipe should be served over rice.

A lavender and white peony was brought by Mrs. Mikkelson for the horticulture specimen display.

Mrs. James stated that of all the countless creatures that belong to the insect world there are none as beautiful and interesting as those in the order of insects the scientists call Lepidoptera, from the Greek meaning, "scaly-winged".

She explained that "scaly-wings" are made up of two primary groups, the butterflies and the moths.

"The butterfly is most active by day, has a long, slender body, anten-

nae that are long and knobbed at the end, and rests with wings up like sails,"she said.

She described the moth as "most active after dusk, has a heavier body, antennae that are short and either fuzzy or feathery, and rests with wings either flat out or back across its body."

She continued, "The creatures are called "scaly-winged" because if you touch a wing, a substance that appears to be like a soft powder is left on your fingers. Actually, the grains of powder are loosely attached irridescent scales, overlapping like scales of fish."

Members viewed the various stages of development of the butterfly and learned of its migration habits. The butterfly has plenty of natural predators, and because of this, only about one percent of butterfly eggs reach the adult stage.

Mrs. James said that the activities of modern man poses the ultimate threat to the butterfly's survival. The free-flowing streams and fields of flowering wild plants that are part of the required habitat of the butterfly are rapidly disappearing because of what is perceived as human needs.

The speaker challenged members to plant flower gardens, prepare hanging baskets, or window boxes that provide flowering plants for the butterflies.

Hostesses for the meeting were Mrs. Avis Wilson and Mrs. Gene Young. Sixteen members were present.







An unusual situation developed during the discus competition, Coach Tim Clark said later.


Three times during competition, Green's disc struck highline wires that were strung across the course. "They never thought anyone would hit them out that far," Clark explained.


