ENVY AND CRABS

I read the story of a young boy sleeping beside his basket of crabs. A passerby awakened him and told him his crabs were climbing up the sides of the basket trying to get away. "Mister," said the boy, "You don't know crabs. Just about the time a crab is ready to jump out, the rest drag him back down."

Isn't that the way human beings act sometimes? They try to drag down those around them. Often their actions are prompted by envy. When a person resents the good fortune of another he will criticize, slander, and attack in order to pull him down.

Envy and cruelty go hand in hand. Proverbs 27:4 tells us "wrath is cruel, and anger is outrageous; but who is able to stand before envy?" The cruelty suffered by Joseph from the hands of his own brothers was caused by envy. The patriarchs, moved with envy, sold Joseph into Egypt: but God was with him" (Acts 7:9). Envy, in fact, is credited with the most heinous crime of all -- the death of the Son of God. In Matthew 27:18 Pilate recognized the reason the people had delivered Jesus over to him; "for he knew that for envy they delivered Him." Envy's companions are dark and sinful as well. Titus 3:3 speaks of "malice and envy:" Romans 13:13 talks of strife and envying."

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Lawmakers had a rare good week: Queen Elizabeth II of England stopped at the Capitol, and House members approved a controversial redistricting plan for their chamber.

As expected, majority party Democrats drew a map aimed to increase their strength this decade, but House Republicans plan to challenge the plan in Washington,

The Democrat's plan could increase their majority from 93 to 100, giving them a crucial twothirds majority.

The number of Hispanic members could rise from 21 now to 30, blacks could gain two seats, and Anglos would, of course, lose

Democrats have done their best to make sure that Anglos who do not return will be Republicans.

GOP Got A "Raw Deal"

The outcome was totally expected, but House Republicans, as Rep. Kent Grusendorf said, "got a raw deal."

Grusendorf, R-Arlington, said in the Dallas delegation, Republicans were stripped of a 10-7 majority to a 7-9 majority, ignoring the fact that growth took place in GOP areas of town.

"Something's wrong. We will definitely appeal," Grusendorf told reporters.

Friends Are Paired

The Houston delegation had a similar pattern. One of the tragedies of redistricting is that some friends get paired, or forced to campaign against one another for re-election.

This happened with Angleton Rep. John Willy and Pearland Rep. Jack Harris, good friends, deskmates and Republicans. Two Democratic friends were paired, Beaumont Rep. Al Price and Port Arthur Rep. Frank Collazo, pitting black against Hispanic.

But Willy said rather than go against compadre Harris, he might move into the next county and challenge Redistricting Committee chairman Tom Uher, D-Bay City.

Uher said they were his buddies, too, but the pairing couldn't be helped.

'Political Slaves' Rebel

With new census figures indicating that Hispanics will soon outnumber Anglos, the Texas Democratic Party has been bending over backwards to draw several new Hispanic districts this session, angering Houston black lawmakers.

Last week, led by state Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, blacks rebelled by aligning with Houston GOP lawmakers to protect their own redistricting goals.

Wilson accused Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle and director Ed Martin of treating blacks "as political slaves" to their own selfish ends."

"They drew this plan and slammed us to the wall. We're going to have a better plan that protects us and doesn't throw us to the wolves," Wilson said.

Martin retorted that Wilson was invited into the process, "but chose to work with Republicans."

In the end, Democrats appeared Wilson by packing black districts with more minority strength.

Buy Prison Goods

Rep. Mark Stiles, D-Beaumont, succeeded in getting a bill added to another measure during debate in

His amendment would force state agencies to buy furniture and other products manufactured by state prison inmates. It was added to a bill that would continue the State Purchasing and General Services Commission.

Stiles argued that his measure, which does not take into account the cost of prison-produced items, would save taxpayers money. Opponents disagreed, saying it would eliminate competition.

Other Legislative Action

· A bill that makes it easier for authorities to prosecute husbands for raping their wives passed the Senate with an amendment requiring evidence of injury or serious threats to the woman.

- Senators also voted to allow the state to fill prisons beyond the 95 percent limit set by a federal judge.
- The House passed a bill outlawing open alcoholic beverage containers in vehicles, but it was expected to die in the Senate.
- bill to control the amount of outof-state waste imported to Texas. Other Highlights

· Cost overruns have hit the Capitol restoration project, which will not be finished on time, or at all, if the Legislature doesn't

cough up millions more. A key figure in the landmark school finance reform drama, San Antonio Edgewood Supt. James Vasquez, said he will resign to seek a job in higher education.

 The parole board released more than 600 felons last month to avoid prison population over the federal limit. More than twothirds of inmates considered were released after 547 cases were reviewed a second time.

Other Highlights

- · A new law signed by Gov. Ann Richards requires three state agencies to investigate whether the governor should grant clemency to battered women and juveniles which kill their abusers.
- Ron Lindsey, chief of the Texas Department of Human Services, will step down at the end of the month.
- · Houston is fourth and San Antonio is fifth on the Census Bureau's list of cities with Hispanicowned companies. In Texas, Hispanics own nine percent of all businesses, placing Texas second behind California.

Neighbors today were surprised to learn Melvin Kline, a seemingly quiet, well-mannered man was making extra money with classified information. When questioned earlier this morning, Kline professed surprise that everyone wasn't using the classified section to earn extra income and get rid of unwanted items.

"It's common," he said. Recent studies tend to bear Kline out. Consumer Data Service reported that over 85% of the public read the newspaper and over 80% of those read the classifieds. Kline claimed widespread use was being made of the classified information. "But you have to act quickly," he remarked.

"If I have something to sell, I can be in the paper by tomorrow. I do that a lot now," he confessed. "With classified, whether I'm buying or selling, I can reach a large market instantly. And it's easy...just pick up the phone."
