tured by the Japanese on the island of tured by the Japanese on the island of
Corregidor while serving in the U.S. Army during World War II. He thereafArry during Worid War II. He thereaf-
ter spent four years in a Japanese concentration camp in northern Manchuria. When he was freed from captivity, he returned to the United States and after several months recuperating from this ordeal, he attended college and thereafter went to work for the Cuero
Record newspaper and eventually be Record newspaper and eventually be-
came its editor. Mr. Towery was apcame its editor. Mr. Towery was ap-
pointed by the President of the United pointed by the President of the United
States to the United States Information States to the United States Information
Agency, where he served for a time as Agency, where he served for a time as
Acting Director, and twice appointed to Ace Board of the National Corporation for Public Broadcasting serving part of his tenure as its Chairman. In both aphis tenure as its Chairman. In both ap-
pointments to the NCPB, he was approved by the United States Senate without a dissenting vote. Mr. Towery presently owns three small newspapers, writes a regular editorial column, and is personally involved in the operation of
the newspapers. Space does nowspapers.
Space does not permit the mention of all of Mr. Towery's accomplishments
and services to our Country and State, and services to our Country and State,
but we feel compelled to mention that in 1955, Mr. Towery was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for outstanding achievement in the field of journalism, which is the highest and most prestigious award that can be given to any journalist.

This is the man that Sen. Carriker does not think "qualifies as a journalist." It is our sincere opinion that Sen. Carriker has done a disservice to all of the citizens of our State. Joe Boerner and Bob Blake

Pickup trucks were donated to 24 universities throughout the United States and Canada by General Motors Corp. The project focuses on reducing the nation's dependence on foreign oil and utilizing the natural gas reserves in Texas.

The Tech student team was selected to participate in the project last September after submitting a detailed proposal for a natural gas conversion method to the Society of Automotive
Engineers, according Engineers, according to Tech faculty
advisor Timothy Maxwell, professor of mechanical engineering professor of mechanical engineering. undergoing extensive testing at the undergoing extensive testing at the

All of the universities that oullined an efficient method of conversion will receive cash grants totaling $\$ 5,000$ from Geneal Moiors
Norman campus Friday as student team members make oral presentations to a judging committee. General Motors engineers will perform General motors Unified Test Standards on the trucks to assess the driving of a cold engine. Throughout the day the vehicles

Your quiet presence will be more appreciated than you ever know. The person who brings the most comfort is the one who simply comes and sits beside the mourner. The fine art of listening, answering briefly, and a prayer helps far more than most of us realize.

Those who comfort must have a heart full of wisdom and understanding. One does not come to quote verses or leave a mountain of pamphlets. They come to comfort simply because they care. There are few things that help heal the hurt more than a supportive embrace.

When I read John II, I am mindful of how Jesus Christ reacted when a friend died. Jesus simply took an angry rebuke, wept with those who were mourning, and stayed by their side. Jesus never made an attempt to correct misunderstanding nor did anything that suggested the disapproval of their actions. Jesus let grief run its full course. Perhaps this explains why so many are grieving and so few are comforting.
