Council votes to pay share of Annex costs

The city council Monday night voted to pay a proportional share toward improvements at the County Annex Building in Wichita Falls, but the issue drew the only split vote of the meeting.

All taxing entities of the county have been asked by Commissioners

Court to pay a share, based on taxes collected, to repair an old freight elevator in the annex building.

One of the occupants of the annex is the Wichita County Tax Appraisal District, which serves all the taxing entities.

The city's share is estimated to be less than \$500.

Aldermen Virgil Woodfin, Charley Helms and Johnny Crawford voted for the proposal, while Mark Raby and Bob Hamilton voted against it.

Approval was given authorizing Administrator Gary Jones to advertise and accept bids for six different topics: a three-year contract for auditing financial records; renovation of the water plant; additional sewer lines; leasing grazing rights at Lakes Buffalo and Iowa Park; asphalt overlay to streets on the council's priority list, and purchase of crusher run base for those streets.

Authority also was granted to the administrator to contact property owners in the 400 block of West Park, the block on which Park West Shopping Center is located, to see if they are agreeable that the city assume responsibility and extend the street from Colorado to Pacific.

Council members briefly discussed how the street would be distinguished from the rest of the parking area, but no final decision will be reached until the desires of the property owners is known.

Jones was instructed to commence the digging of a lagoon next to the city's sewage treatment plant, which will be

put into use later in the year while the plant is undergoing repairs.

Among the unanimous votes of the council during the evening was one concerning a resolution in support of the Wichita Falls BCI in attracting a state prison, to be located north of US 287 and off FM 369.

The administrator told the council a public hearing will be held in council chambers on Jan. 27, by the Texas Department of Transportation.

The hearing concerns the state's rebuilding of Washington Street, under the same program as was applied on South Wall a few years ago.

During the general discussion period of the meeting, Alderman Hamilton offered four projects he said he would like the council to take action on in the future.

They included: having the city staff to formulate a plan and cost estimates to extend sewer service to all residences and businesses inside the city limits not now served; place an all-weather ditch crossing off the access road to the northwest side of Lake Gordon; consider releasing water from Lake Iowa Park, which is at capacity, before the spring rain season, and prepare a parking lot at the sand volleyball courts next to the RAC, with entry off Fourth Street on the alley, instead of off West Highway.

No action could be taken on the proposals, because they were not on the meeting agenda.

Warrants being prepared after Vernon man's scam

Arrest warrants are being prepared for a Vernon man who bilked two local businesses out of money Saturday.

Clifford Leon James, 27, was identified as having represented himself as an employee of "Iowa Park Conoco" needing \$25 with which to make change for a customer, and promising to return the money "in 15 to 20 minutes."

But he never returned. Police were informed by a clerk at K&K Food Store on Johnson Road at

1:06 p.m. of the situation. The clerk had ask for the man's driver's license before giving him the money.

At 9:26 that evening, a clerk at Allsup's told the police a similar story.

Both clerks believed they were just helping a local business in a time of need.

Police, using the information provided by the clerk, contacted Vernon Police Dept., and learned the same man

Phone system changing to digital switching

Iowa Park residents will notice a strangely different dial tone Saturday morning when they attempt to call someone.

That's because the local phone system will be switched over to digital switching at 12:30 that morning.

"This new system will serve over 3,000 customers in the Iowa Park telephone exchange," said Bob McJilton, area manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone.

The community will receive the latest in telephone digital switching as part of an agreement announced in 1990 by the Texas Public Utility Commission and Southwestern Bell.

The company is installing the

switch as part of an accelerated program designed to help boost the Texas economy and provide customer benefits worth more than \$1.2-billion through 1994.

"When our customers wake up Saturday, they will have a new telephone system," said McJilton. "They may notice a slight difference in the sound of the dial tone. They should also notice that local calls will connect immediately upon dialing the last digit of the telephone number."

McJilton emphasized that customers with rotary dial telephones will not need to exchange them for push button equipment, because both work equally well with the new switching system.

The new digital switching system is the most advanced piece of equipment used to route calls to their destinations.

Digital switching breaks the voice into digital code, transmitting and reassembling it back into voice patterns at the receiving end. This results in instantaneous dial tone and crystal-clear transmission, free of distortion and outside interference.

Digital switching will provide more accurate switching with less chance of malfunction. It has greater capacity, runs on less power and takes up less than half the space of the electromechanical system it is replacing.

In addition, the new switching system will bring all of Southwestern Bell's

custom calling services to Iowa Park, including call forwarding, call waiting, three-way calling and speed calling.

McJilton said another benefit of digital technology is its cost-effectiveness in terms of space requirements and maintenance. Computers in the system allow it to perform millions of switching functions each second. The system can diagnose itself, and in many cases, correct a problem before customers are affected.

"We'll have telephone personnel on duty around the clock to make sure the transition is as smooth as possible," McJilton said. "The first thing we'll do is check all emergency numbers to be sure they are operational."

A decision also is expected on a request that the school district share in the expense of a maintenance project at the Wichita County Annex building in Wichita Falls.

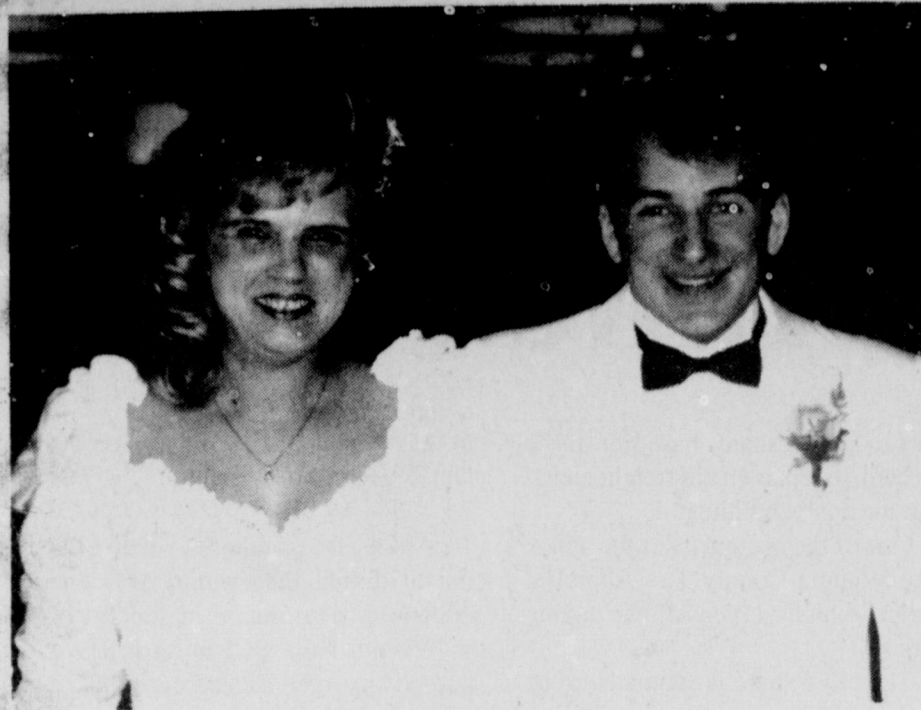
All taxing entities in the county have received the request, because the Tax Appraisal District is located in the building.

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As I See It...

When you're carrying a chip on your shoulder and feelings on your sleeve, you can jump to all kinds of conclusions.

That's apparent from the two letters I'm printing on this page this week, both in response to last week's column -- not editorial -- about Decatur's three new car dealers and Iowa Park's lacking of a single one.

My two critics read things into what I said which were not intended.

For instance, I said some dealers I know sit on their behinds and complain

about how bad business is. If these two thought I was talking about them, then so be it. But I really had neither in mind when I wrote that piece.

As to Decatur not having as much competition for vehicle sales as Iowa Park, I quickly point out there must be 100 within 20 minutes to an hour of that community. I'd call that competitive.

And to have into my meaning that a lack of advertising in this paper led to the demise of our two dealers couldn't have been more a mistake.

I only said I admired the dealer

advertising in Decatur's paper.

As to Decatur dealers being aggressive, you bet they are. In fact, one was the low bidder on two vehicles our city advertised to purchase. By far the lowest!

When I said I knew what happened to our two dealerships, I must admit I think I know. But I have no proof.

I believe we lost the Ford dealership because of an experiment by that giant corporation.

I think that when Luther Shaw decided to retire, the franchise was bought by Ford Motor Company.

Ford then put Leon Stevenson in the management position, as part of the company's affirmative action program. The program allowed Leon, a black, to earn a certain amount of stock in the local franchise.

Leon decided to move to greener pastures, although admitting the dealership was making money.

But the decision was made at a time when the Ford dealership in Wichita Falls was, and is, in trouble, and Ford people wanted to protect the dealership in the larger city.

So, the big corporation has not actively sought anyone to purchase the franchise in Iowa Park.

The Chevrolet dealership here was victim to an outfit that wanted to be in Wichita Falls, and used Iowa Park as a pressure point.

I was told Herb Easley had tried to buy out George Davis even before it was announced Easley was buying the Iowa Park dealership.

That move out on the highway, coupled with the firm's aggressive advertising in Wichita Falls media, was all designed to force Davis into selling.

Davis, like the Wichita Falls Ford dealership, also was in big financial trouble, my source told me.

It worked. In hardly no time, Davis sold to Easley. The Iowa Park dealership was closed out.

And folks, the prospects of our having another new vehicle dealership in the near future is virtually nonexistent.

And you can go to the bank on that statement.

With the national car sales picture as bleak as it is, you better believe no one is going to sink a pile of money for a franchise here. Not any time in the near future, anyway.

I hope that explains my meaning a little more fully to my critics, and gives some meaning to the rest about how Iowa Park became one of the state's largest communities without a new car dealership.

Says facts incorrect

In response to your editorial Jan. 9th "As I See It".

Your answer to why Decatur has three dealerships and Iowa Park has none is written with the preamble, "I'm not confused as to what happened to ours. I think I know."

You implied that your past dealerships sat on their behinds and cried how bad everything was.

Novels contain fiction. Newspapers are supposed to have the responsibility of reporting the facts. Your article has done more of the former than the later.

You have arbitrarily picked Decatur to compare your community with. You couldn't have picked a worst contrast. Decatur is a community that is distant from any other large community so it is much easier to retain local business.

Iowa Park like other small towns in this area is rapidly becoming a bedroom community of Wichita Falls, the shopping hub of what we refer to as Texoma.

A comparison of sales tax receipts will support this as fact. I live in Burkburnett and have seen that our tax receipts to be one-fourth of Vernon's. Yet we are a city of a few thousand more people.

Sales tax figures of autos of course are not included as they do not pay into

the city coffers.

You went on to say that the dealers in Decatur went out and got the business, many of which were major rental fleets. You should have checked your sources before alleging such. ALL. I repeat ALL major rental companies have agreements directly with the manufacturers. The repurchase of these vehicles by these same manufacturers and the subsequent resale to their dealer bodies is why their is the current glut of these so called "program" cars on the market.

Dealers deliver these rentals as a courtesy and are paid for dealer prep.

The reason of the success of the Decatur dealers is not limited to the following.

1. The closeness of the metroplex to Decatur. These three megadealers are within driving distance of a disgruntled car buying public who sometimes would prefer to deal in a more country atmosphere. This has also been very successful for Bob Tomas Ford in McKinney.

2. Misassumption of public on the large stock of vehicles in Decatur. Many of the public believe that these three dealers do not own their stock but provide a storage facility for the manufacturers. In face these megadealers own and have financed (floor plan) all stock on their premise and do not receive special considerations.

3. These dealers are usually the last ones shopped. In marketing every sales person does not want the first "shot" but the last, where he just sees what he has to beat. The first dealer, usually the hometown dealer loses everytime.

4. By selling to "out of towners" these dealers avoid costly warranty problems that are not always reimbursed by the factory and therefore places themselves in a position that they can take a smaller profit. This leaves the hometown dealer the unenviable position of absorbing warranty losses to any repair that compensation could be in jeopardy.

The point of the article I believe is summed up with the following. "Decatur has aggressive dealers. I've commented in this space long before that the *Messenger* has more automobile advertising than any other weekly in Texas. I stand by that statement."

If you want more people to advertise in the Leader, than you work harder. But to allege that the previous dealers were not successful because they just sit back, (and lost hundreds of thousands) is a disservice to those people.

If you believe that all you have to do to sell 7,500 vehicles a year is to advertise heavily in a small circulation weekly and look to sell rental cars, than just jump in.

Iowa Park is looking for a new dealer. You allege that you have the answers. Put your money where your mouth is.

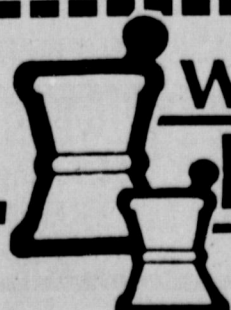

WORK HABIT POLICY

Work Habit Grade:

Each student begins the six weeks with a 100. Each offense reduced the work habit grade by five (5) points.

Offenses:

1. Tardy to class. (Must be in the seat when the bell stops ringing)
2. Failure to have all necessary materials for class. (Book, paper, pen or pencil, folder, notebook, workbook - any required materials)
3. Failure to have assignments completed on time.
4. Failure to use class time wisely.
5. Failure to take responsibility for own materials when leaving - responsible for work area.

The work habit grade will affect the honor roll beginning with the fall semester of the 1992-93 school year.

The work habit grade must be a 90 to be eligible for the honor roll.

The work habit grade will be recorded on the permanent record - transcript starting with the 1992-93 school year.

The homeroom teacher will average the work habit grades at the end of the school year. The grades will then be recorded on the permanent record. A form will be provided for the teachers to record the grade.

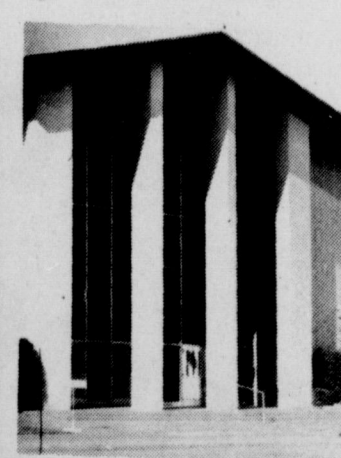

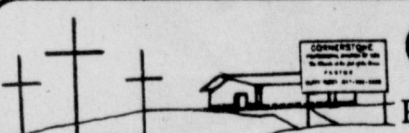

Pineapple Cake

2 cups flour
1 1/2 tsp. soda
1 1/2 cup sugar
1 - #2 can crushed pineapple
Mix all ingredients. Beat by hand until moistened. Pour into a well greased 9x13 metal pan. Bake 35 minutes at 350 degrees. While cake is still hot, pour icing over it.

Icing

Prepare about 4 minutes before cake is done.
1 1/2 cup sugar
1 stick margarine
1 small can evaporated milk
Mix all ingredients together in pan. Boil 4 minutes. Pour over hot cake.

Strawberry Bread

3 cups flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. salt
2 tps. cinnamon
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
2 - 10 oz. pkgs. frozen sliced strawberries (do not drain)
1 1/4 cup cooking oil
1 1/4 cup chopped pecans

Mix dry ingredients. Mix remaining ingredients and add to dry mixture. Stir carefully and turn batter into 2 well-greased loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees 1 hour and 15 minutes. Cool in pans 10 minutes and turn onto cooling racks. Makes 2 large loaves or 3 small loaves.

Earthquake Cake

1 cup chopped pecans
1 box German chocolate cake mix
1 stick margarine
1 lb. powdered sugar
1 cup coconut (opt.)
1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 tsp. vanilla

Spray 9x13 pan with Pam. Sprinkle chopped pecans and coconut into bottom. Prepare cake mix according to package directions and pour over pecan mix in pan. Beat together: cream cheese, margarine, vanilla and sugar. Spoon mixture on top of cake batter. Bake 50 minutes at 350 degrees. Cake will crack open when done. Test for doneness.

Chicken & Rice with Cheese & Broccoli

4-6 chicken breast halves
1 can creamy chicken mushroom soup
1 soup can full of rice
1/2 - 16 oz. bag frozen broccoli

Cook skinless chicken breasts (brown, steam, microwave), then dice into bite-size pieces; set aside. Prepare soup with milk. When soup is boiling, add 1 can of rice, chicken, cooked broccoli and top with cheese. Cover and let stand 5 minutes. Serve with quartered onions and crackers.

Quick Ghoulish

2 lbs. ground chuck
1 small yellow onion, chopped
1 can tomatoes
1 tomato can full of macaroni
1 tomato can full of water
1 small can corn
1 can ranch style beans

Brown meat and onions; drain. Add tomatoes and water and bring to a boil. Add macaroni; cover and cook until macaroni is tender, about 15 minutes (adding small amounts of water if needed). Add corn (drained) and ranch style beans. Heat. Serve with corn bread. (Banana peppers are great in this when in season).

VHMA is an international, non-

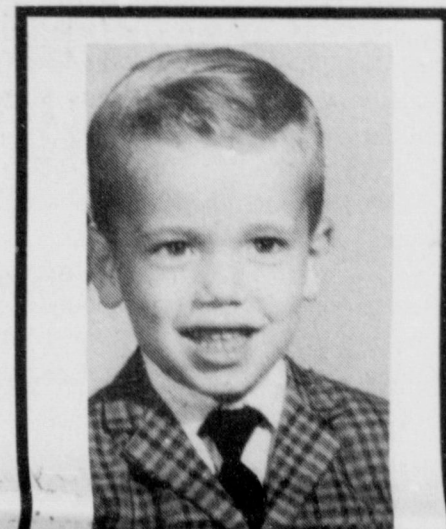
profit educational organization founded in 1981. The membership is comprised of 1,200 veterinarians, hospital administrators, practice managers and office managers.

Despite Vernon's height advantage, the Lady Hawks racked up their 14th victory against eight defeats here Tuesday with a 42-39 win over Vernon.

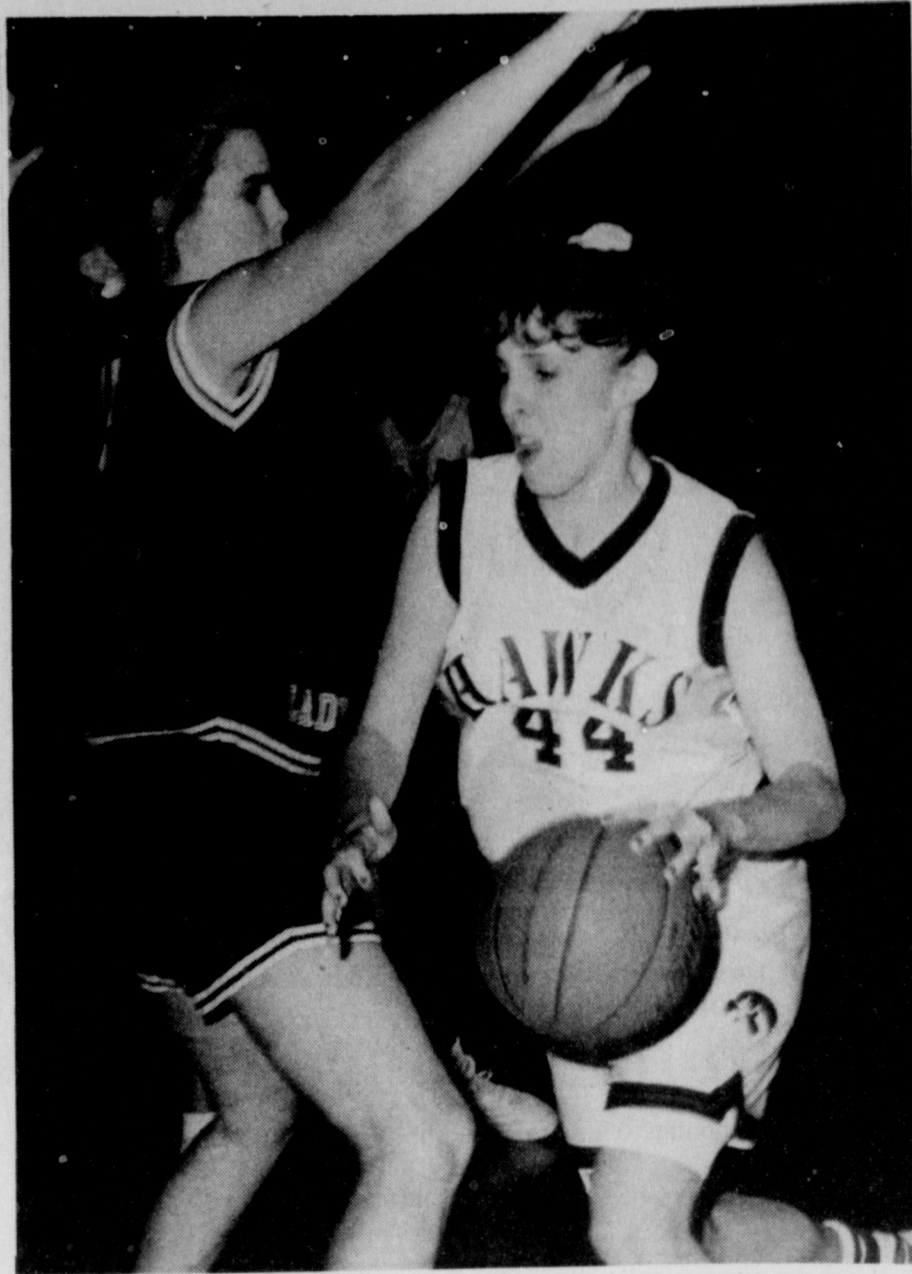

Silver-Haired Legislature candidates filing underway

The filing period is underway for people who want to run for the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature (TSHL), an all-senior elected body that advocates on behalf of older Texans.

Filings began Jan. 2 and will continue through Feb. 28, with elections set for May 26.

The TSHL is a nonpartisan 116-member group that represents 28 districts in Texas.

Members hold model legislative sessions every two years in Austin to identify the issues that are most important to senior Texans. Then they suggest appropriate action that the governor and Texas legislature might take to address the issues.

In recent years, the TSHL has claimed a success rate of more than 70 percent in instigating legislative action on their highest priority issues.

Members who are elected in May will convene the Fourth Texas Silver-Haired legislature this fall.

Candidates must be 60 or older by Jan. 1, 1992. They must also be registered Texas voters and live in the area from which they are seeking office.

Filing forms may be obtained from the North Texas Area Agency on Aging, which is affiliated with the Texas Department on Aging. Completed forms must be returned to the area agency along with a \$5 filing fee.

Polling places will be announced by the agency at a future date.

Filing forms and additional information is available at the North Texas Area Agency on Aging at 322-5281, 2101 Kemp Blvd., Wichita Falls.

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State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - The million dollar special session adjourned last week, and nobody could say for sure whether anything had been accomplished.

What is certain is that until a federal court speaks, the Texas primary election is now in chaos on several fronts:

■ Candidates meeting the Jan. 10 filing deadline did so amid the uncertainty of unfinished boundary lines;

■ Texas voters may not be balloting with the rest of the South in the March 12 Super Tuesday presidential primary; and

■ The primary, whenever we finally get around to having it, may cost taxpayers an extra \$1.4 million.

In the House, the end of an era came into sight when Speaker Gib Lewis announced he will not seek re-election, but told members he intends to remain presiding officer for another year.

Lewis, a conservative Fort Worth Democrat, faces trial on two misdemeanor ethics charges, but some insiders say he is tired of being hounded by liberals in his party.

The Gib Lewis Legacy
Since 1982, flush with new seats, liberal Democrats have sought to organize the Texas House along party lines, like the U.S.

Congress, in order to control it. But Lewis swept into the first of five terms in 1983, heir to the system of predecessor Billy Clayton which handed out a fair share of plums to Republican lawmakers.

Since then, the Legislature has increased expenditures and taxes despite Lewis' attempts at restraint.

In 1993, a new era begins in the Texas House, perhaps with Democrats sitting on one side of the aisle and Republicans on the other.

Senate Democrats Prevail
In the Texas Senate, Democrats ran over their Republican colleagues and won approval of a re-districting plan that would preserve a Democratic majority in the Senate.

Last week, Attorney General Dan Morales was in Washington to plead with U.S. Justice Department officials to quickly accept the Senate plan.

"I remain hopeful and optimistic we're going to be able to keep the elections on time, March 10. A delay would have a negative impact," Morales said after meeting with officials.

The Senate plan must be "pre-cleared" by the federal agency even though it is identical to a plan approved by the Justice Department last year.

More Speaker Hopefuls
One thing is certain, there will be no shortage of candidates to succeed Speaker Lewis.

As two more candidates jumped into the race, Capitol lobbyists moved to distance themselves from involvement in the campaign.

Reps. Sam Russell, D-Mount Pleasant, and Tom Uher, D-Bay City, said that they are officially candidates for the speakership.

The two lawmakers joined five other House members who have announced they will seek the

post. The other candidates are Reps. Billy Clemons, D-Pollock; David Cain, D-Dallas; James Hury, D-Galveston; Pete Laney, D-Hale Center; and Jim Rudd, D-Brownfield.

Lawmakers and lobbyists predicted that the race for speaker will be a long battle that might not be settled until November's general election or the start of the next regular session in January 1993.

House Reforms Eyed
One day after Lewis announced his retirement as speaker, a government watchdog group started campaigning to reform the chamber's rules and power structure.

Common Cause of Texas wants to make the House function more openly and democratically after the five-term speaker leaves office next year, said Mary Nell Mathis, state chair of the self-styled citizens lobby.

Electing the speaker by secret ballot is one of the reforms Common Cause is pushing. "This is the only secret vote Common Cause would ever support," Mathis said.

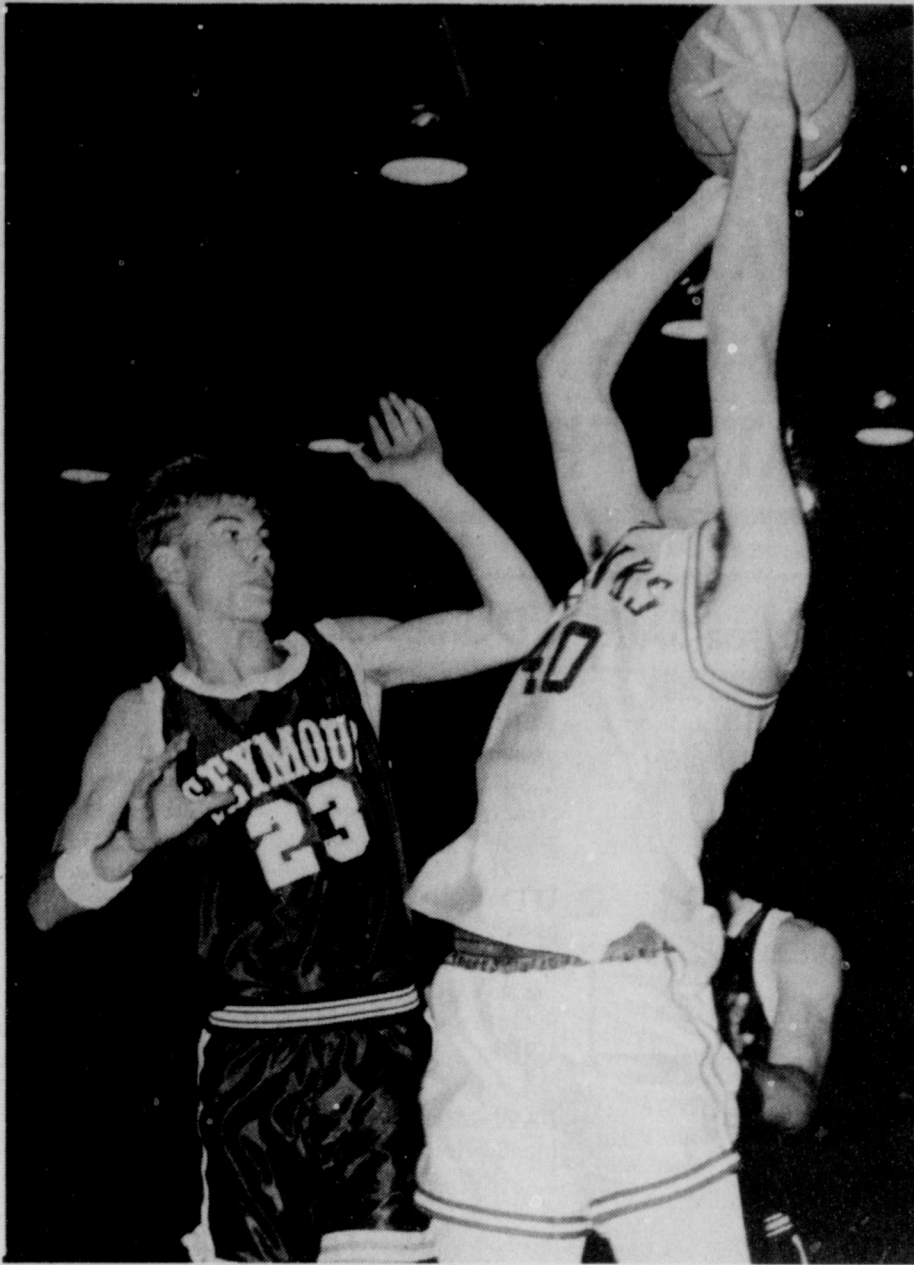
But a 23-12 run in the third quarter appeared to frustrate the visiting Panthers, and their starting five began to get into foul trouble.

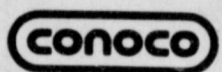
