## Trustees hire counselor, extend Mitchell's contract

School trustees hired a new counselor for the elementary schools, and extended the superintendent's contract another year, during their meeting Thursday evening.

Diane Granbery, a 13-year veteran of classroom teaching with a Master's degree from Midwestern State Univ., was hired to succeed LaRae Collins as elementary counselor.

Mrs. Collins was reassigned to the high school campus to fill the position vacated by the resignation of Herman Escue. Escue had accepted a position midway through the fall semester at the Region Nine Education Center.

Supt. Glen Mitchell's contract was extended to June 30, 1995, following a 40-minute executive session during which trustees held a state-mandated evaluation of his work during the past year.

Requests from three different organizations to use the junior high school main gymnasium were all approved.

The local police department will sponsor a tournament Jan. 28-29, with the proceeds helping fund the drug awareness program.

On Jan. 25 and Feb. 8, the gym will be used by Faith Baptist Church.

Third and Fourth Grade girls, participating in the Little Dribblers program, will be allowed to use the gym twice this month, nine dates in February, and three more in March.

Bids for office furniture were ap-

proved, with a total expenditure of \$1,904.97. The successful bidders were Hoover Brothers, Indeco and Gibson.

Included were three reception chairs, two lamp tables, two bookcase units, a secretarial chair and desk, all to be used in the administration building.

The board voted against paying a share of an elevator improvement project in the Wichita County Annex Building in Wichita Falls.

All taxing entities in the county had been asked to participate on a prorated share of the Appraisal District's portion of the project.

The school district's share would have been \$1,492.

A request by tax collector Allen Shewmake to advertise for bids for a computer system for his office was approved. The system's cost was estimated at \$22,473.

Shewmake told the board 36.09 percent of the current taxes had been collected, which is about normal. Last year the figure was 39.22 percent, and the year before 37.67.

The tax collector went on to ex-

## Employee benefits on council agenda

The city council will consider during Monday's meeting whether to make an adjustment in employee benefits.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

To be proposed will be discontinuing of the city's paying of employee share of social security and medicare.

If approved, the city would then increase all staff salaries by 7.65 percent, and then deduct it from their pay.

The change, if approved, would

not go into effect until the first payroll of the city's third quarter of the fiscal year.

Another proposal for consideration will be a plan to install a culvert across a ditch that separates the access road along US 287, at the northwest side of Lake Gordon.

Also listed on the meeting's agenda is the consideration of a list of homes inside the city limits not being served by a sewer line.

City personnel plan to present a cost estimate at the Feb. 24 meeting so the council can consider providing sewer service to all homes and businesses in the city not now receiving the service.

Bids for grazing rights at Buffalo and Iowa Park lakes will be considered.

Authority also will be sought by Administrator Gary Jones to advertise for bids to construct additional concrete alley approaches.

Jones' regular administrator's report portion of the meeting will be going over the time table for this spring's council election.

## Police report four arrests

Iowa Park police recorded four arrests over a two-day period last week, two of them relating to family violence.

Two men were arrested in the early morning hours Thursday at Lake Iowa Park.

Greg Allen Terrell, 31, was charged for possession of less than two ounces of marijuana, and Robert Louis Bess, 24, for public intoxication. Both their vehicles were impounded.

The arrests were entered in the police blotter at 2:08 a.m.

Terrell was released after posting a \$200 cash bond, and Bess was released after signing a personal recognizance bond.

When called to the 700 block of West Coleman at 12:48 a.m. Friday, officers took Scott David Skinner, 19, into custody on a charge of assault on a parent. He was later released on a personal recognizance bond.

James Wofford Jenkins, 60, also was arrested on an assault to prevent family violence charge at 6:35 p.m. Saturday, when officers were called to the 900 block of east Cash.

Jenkins was released at 7:25 a.m. Sunday, according to the blotter entry, on a personal recognizance bond.

A resident in the 900 block of Foley told police someone had taken a hood ornament from his Cadillac, valued at \$50. He added that was the third time hood ornaments had been stolen from his vehicle.

Police and emergency medical technicians were called out Saturday evening after a motorist reported having seen a man lying on the side of US 287, near Pacific Ave.

They found the subject, identified as Dale Gene McLaughlin, 24, staggering across the ditch to the access

road. His head was covered with a large amount of blood.

The Electra resident was conscious, but did not explain to officers how he got there, or what happened. He was transported by ambulance to Wichita General Hospital.

## Emergency farm loans available to producers

Application for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rainfall, flooding, high winds and hail between June 1-12, 1991, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Wichita Falls, according to Joe W. Gilbreath, FmHA County Supervisor.

Wichita County is one of 10 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the flooding and high winds.

Gilbreath said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, which ever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Gilbreath said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until September 8, 1992.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

## Three locals among MSU's Who's Who

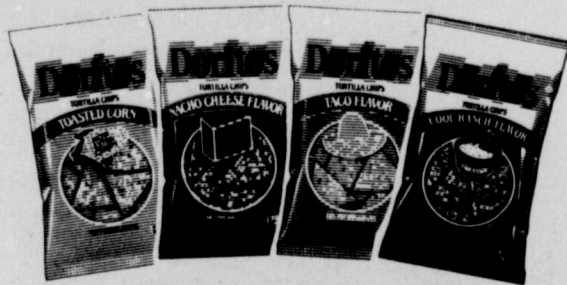
Three Midwestern State Univ. students from Iowa Park are among 55 who have been selected as national outstanding leaders.

She said that "Astoria Stew" is a good recipe for informal dinners and all you need is a salad and dessert to go with it. Her favorites for ladies' luncheons are "Luncheon Salad Supreme" and "Singapore Curry." The "Rich Rolls" recipe is one that she got from her mother who "always baked bread and rolls."

Louise graduated from high school in San Antonio, where she grew up, and received a degree from Abilene Christian College. She taught math on the junior high level for 37 years before retiring.

She and George met in Groves, where she was teaching and he was a coach. After living several years in the Texas Panhandle and South Texas, they settled in San Antonio where George had a practice in family counseling for 28 years. They have a daughter, Linda, who lives at Keller, and three grandchildren.

In addition to cooking, Louise likes to do all kinds of needlework. She is a member of the Iowa Park Arts and Crafts Assoc., Iowa Park Garden Club and Bridge Club at the Recreational Activities Center.

**Astoria Stew**

3 lbs. stew meat - salt, pepper  
2 cups sliced carrots  
2 onions, quartered  
2 cans green beans - use juice of one can  
2 cups celery  
1 Tbsp. sugar  
1 large can tomatoes and juice  
3 Tbsps. minute tapioca  
5 potatoes, diced over top  
Layer as given. Bake five hours, covered, in 300 degree oven. Serves 10.

**Creamy Tacos**

Heat:  
2 cans chili (1 lb. cans)  
4 cans ranch style beans  
1 can tomatoes  
1 can Rotel tomatoes & chilies  
Add:  
1 lb. Velveeta cheese  
1 pt. half and half cream  
Serve over Fritos.

**Luncheon Salad Supreme**

May use large can of tuna or  
2 cups diced chicken  
2 cups cooked rice  
8 1/2 oz. can sweet peas  
1 cup diced celery  
1/2 cup diced onion  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
Dash of Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 cup mayonnaise

Combine and chill. Serve on lettuce leaf with tomato wedges and avocado dressing.

**Avocado Dressing**

2 avocados  
1 cup sour cream  
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
1/4 tsp. garlic powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
1 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 tsp. onion, grated  
Blend in electric blender and chill.

**Singapore Curry**

Cook 1 fryer in water with celery, onion and salt. May use chicken breasts. Cool and cut into bite-size pieces.

Saute:

1 Tbsp. chopped onion in 6 Tbsps. oleo  
Add:  
5 Tbsps. flour  
1 Tbsp. (or less) curry powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
3 cups liquid made up of broth and half cream (equal portions)

Cook until thick. Add chicken pieces. Serve over cooked rice and have each person add various condiments - sprinkled over chicken:  
Chopped tomatoes Peanuts  
Sliced bananas Raisins  
Pineapple chunks Coconut  
French fried onion rings

**Rich Rolls**

1 1/2 cup warm milk  
Mix and add:  
1 cup sugar  
2 pkgs. dry yeast  
Add 3 cups flour and mix well. Place towel over bowl; place bowl in warm spot and let rise 1 hour.  
Beat 4 eggs; add 1/2 tsp. salt and 1 cup melted butter. Add this to yeast mixture and blend. Add 3 cups flour. Mix well. Cover and let rise several hours.  
Roll out on floured countertop. Cut with large cookie cutter. Brush with butter; fold over and press down with fingers. Place on cookie sheet. Cover with towel and let rise. Bake 10-15 minutes in 350 degree oven.

**Tomato-Aspic Salad**

1 1/2 cup V-8 juice - use regular and/or spicy  
1/2 cup catsup  
2 Tbsps. minced onion  
Mix and heat.  
Pour over 1 small package lemon jello.

**COOK of the WEEK**

Add:  
2-3 drops of Tabasco  
1/2 - 1 cup diced celery  
1/2 cup diced green pepper  
Place in refrigerator until firm.

**Cherry Chocolate Cake**

Grease and flour 9x13 pan.  
In bowl, mix:  
2 beaten eggs  
1 tsp. almond extract  
1 - 21 oz. can cherry pie filling  
1 pkg. fudge cake mix.  
Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

**Icing**

Combine in sauce pan:  
1 cup sugar  
1/3 cup canned milk  
5 Tbsps. butter  
Bring to a boil and boil one minute.  
Add 6 oz. semi-sweet chocolate.  
Stir until smooth and pour over cake.

**Microwave Pralines**

Mix:  
1 1/2 cup brown sugar  
2/3 cup half & half cream  
1/8 tsp. salt  
Cook 7-9 minutes on high until soft ball forms. (Turn once).  
Add:  
2 Tbsps. butter  
1 1/2 cups pecan halves  
Beat by hand until creamy and it begins to thicken. Drop by tablespoons on wax paper.

A Persian theme was featured as 23 Study Club's International Program was presented during the Thursday meeting in the home of Mrs. Erwin Soell.

Mrs. House gave historical facts about Persia, noting how it is mentioned in the Bible, and then she described some of the customs, living conditions and foods, of the country at the time she lived there.

She said there was some anti-American sentiment and that Americans could not take pictures during religious holidays. She added that the New Year celebration in the spring was one of the happiest holidays.

Mrs. House stated there were 25 American U.S. Air Force families in Tehran at that time. There was a

school for their children to attend. Also there was one supermarket, one department store and a Presbyterian mission.

The speaker revealed there were two experiences that will remain as vivid memories. One was an earthquake that trembled enough to excite some fear, and the other was the Cuban Crisis.

She displayed some of her memorabilia from Iran, including a trumpet on which she played a tune.

Preceding the program, Mrs. Joe Singer gave the mediation using "Too

Busy Not to Pray" for the theme. Mrs. Sam Hill gave the American Trivia on most common names of Americans and the most common places they visit.

Program finale was a musical selection, "Far Away Places With Strange Sounding Names," presented by Mmes. Delbert Todd, Charles Harrell, Aulds and Singer, with Mrs. Jim Medlinger providing the piano accompaniment.

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# As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



Before our governor, Ann Richards, continues any more of her bashing of the three judges who turned back the legislature's redistricting plan, I think she needs to look more closely at some of the district designs that were created. Or stop lying.

A true politician, the top Democrat of the state says the federal judges, all of whom were appointed by Republican presidents, are playing politics.

Folks, if you want to see the results of pure party politics, I invite you to look at two maps printed on page 18A of Monday's Dallas Morning News.

The first map shows the four U.S. House of Representative districts that

cut up Dallas County.

Beside that map is another, showing the "new" design, where the legislators have created a fifth "minority" district, District 30.

Oh, districts 3, 5, 24 and 26 still show on the new map, but the 30th literally runs throughout the county, from north to south, east to west, apparently reaching out neighborhoods where minorities -- or are they just Democrats -- are registered.

Creation of the district is a blueprint in gerrymandering.

It's gotten so that I hate to see the change of the decades anymore. It seems to always bring disappointment.

Disappointment created by redistricting, all based on census counts that no one believes.

Wichita Falls Ford dealer Ron Roberts called me Tuesday to comment on last week's column.

He was very cordial, and I appreciate that.

Roberts said he just wanted me to know that as far as he and his CPA knew, he was not, nor has he been, in any financial trouble.

As to the lack of sales by his firm during the past year, Roberts said his repair department picks up the difference, and in fact produces over 50 percent of his gross revenues.

I'll not try to argue with that.



## Worth Quoting

Regular readers of this space know that we have no undying love affair with the countries of Germany or Japan.

But the idea of the president of the United States leading a delegation of domestic auto manufacturers to Japan pleading for the easing of restrictions against U.S. products is downright ludicrous.

Japan is not the problem -- the problem is the U.S.

The market for American automobiles is here in America -- not in a tiny country that is about the size of Montana and doesn't have enough room to turn a baby buggy much less a Chrysler 4-door Imperial.

If American automobile manufacturers can't sell an American car to an American, how in the bejebbers can you expect to sell them in Germany or Japan?

Our problem is not in those far-away countries like Japan, Korea, Germany, and others who are whipping our ears down in manufactured goods -- our problem is here at home.

Anti-business laws, regulatory nightmares, capital depleting taxes, inefficient and overpaid management, and stranglehold unions have driven manufacturing out of the U.S. market place. The result is a downsizing or restructuring of almost every major domestic corporation with the accompanying loss of jobs.

No television sets are now made in the U.S. No typewriters are made here. It would appear that as far as manufacturing is concerned, we're gradually returning to the cottage-type industries common in the 19th century prior to development of assembly lines.

General Motors is a prime example of the domestic problem. The big company recently announced that it would close 19 plants here in the U.S. in a major downsizing of one of the world's largest manufacturing concerns. And 70,000 employees will eventually lose their jobs.

But did the \$3 million-a-year chairman of that company announce any pay cuts in management? Nope! Did he mention that perhaps GM would consider closing any of the 24 plants GM now operates in Mexico? Nope!

You can't sell a new car, a new television set, a new computer, a new hair dryer, or a new razor to an unemployed worker or to an hourly employee who goes to work daily fearing the receipt of a pink slip.

And neither Washington nor Austin can create the formation of private enterprise jobs. All they can do is drain the capital away from those who would create new jobs.

President Bush nor presidential candidates can lead this country out of a recession. Neither can Congress. All they can do is create an environment conducive to the creation of jobs.

And jobs come from a worker making a wanted, needed product with better quality and a better price than any competitor.

Workers, management, investors, and government have strayed too far from that basic, fundamental principle and the whole country is suffering because of it.

You and I are the problem -- not the Japanese!

If we would improve the quality of our products to equal that of our foreign competitors, and keep our prices in line as well, I don't know of anybody that would buy a Japanese car.

And if we would do that, we wouldn't have to worry about getting our share of the world markets. We'd have more business than we could

handle, and foreign imports would be no threat at all.

As Pogo said, we have found the enemy, and it's us.

There was sad news on the back page of last week's issue of *The Archer County News*. The space usually occupied by an advertisement for the town's lone grocery store carried these words: "CLOSED. The community that SHOPS together, STAYS together!! This message furnished by the Archer Chamber of Commerce."

An article on Page 1 explained that store owners decided to close the store because of low volume sales. One of the store's officials said a store of that size in that market should generate weekly sales of at least \$50,000; however, its sales were less than half of that amount.

Ken Barnes, who owned the Archer City grocery store, was quoted as saying too many of his potential customers shop at Wichita Falls.

Mike Aulds, president of the Archer Chamber of Commerce, explained the adverse ripple effects on a small community when such an important business closes.

"As of right now, you're going to have to drive to Wichita Falls to buy groceries, and if you drive to Wichita Falls, you're going to buy other items there, too," Aulds observed. "Everytime you take a dollar out of a town this size, you wind up taking \$7.50 out."

What happened in Archer City carries a message for all of us in small towns.

Total enrollment in the district dropped by two students from the December report, to 1,930. That figure is also two fewer students than the January 1991 report.

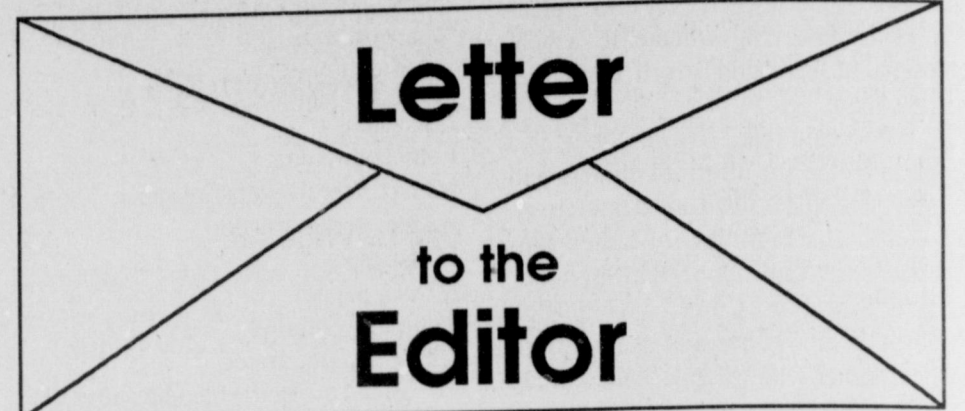
By campus, there are this month 490 enrolled at Kidwell Elementary, 472 at Bradford Elementary, 438 at junior high and 530 at high school.



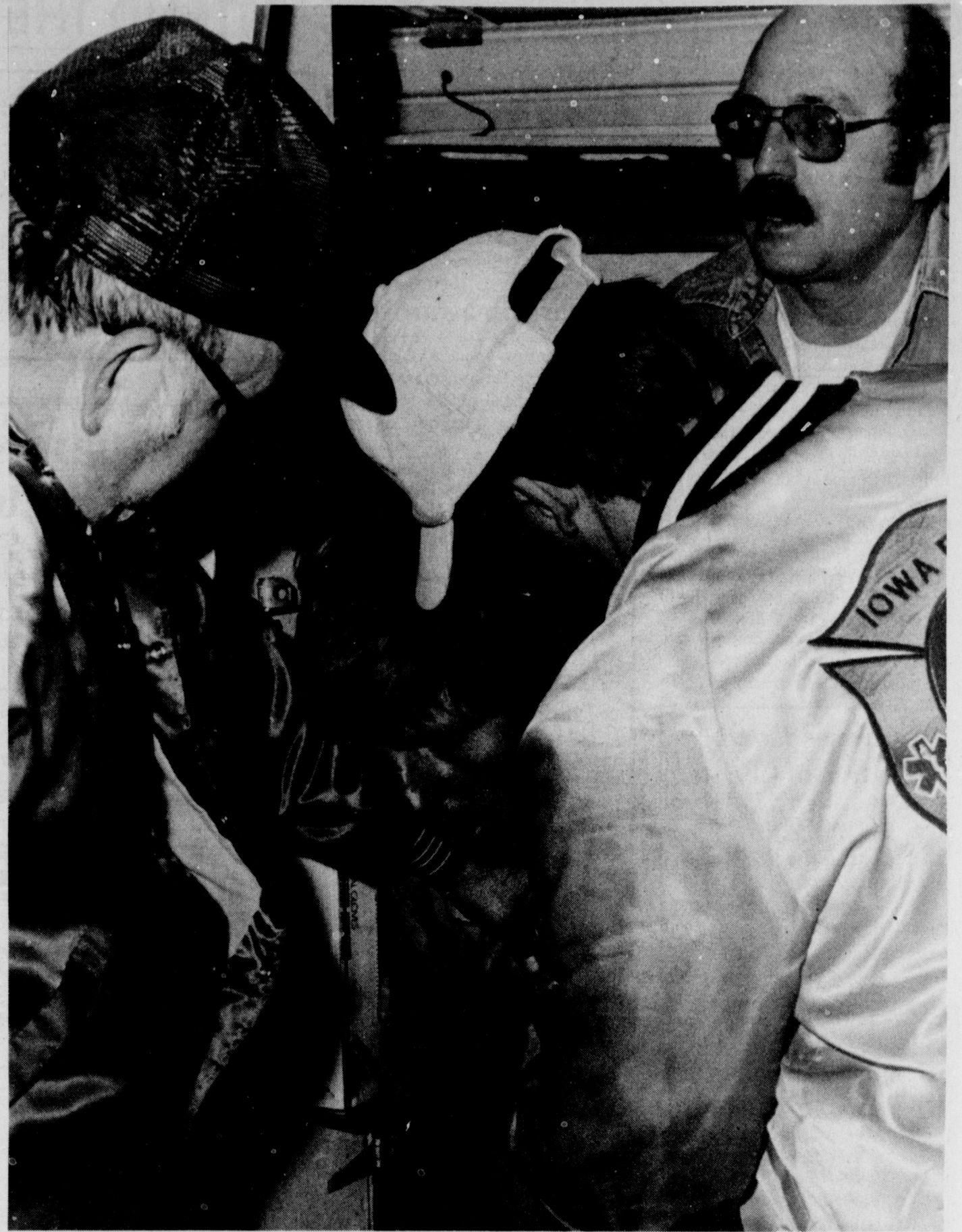

### UNDERSTANDING BIBLICAL AUTHORITY

What greater blessing could man desire than to come to a knowledge of the Bible, the revelation of the mind of God! Paul said, O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and the knowledge of God! How unsearchable are His judgments, and His ways past finding out! For who has known the mind of the Lord? Or who has been his counselor?" (Romans 11:33, 34). Just as it is impossible for one man to know the mind of another man except he reveal his mind, it is impossible for one to know the mind of God except God reveal his mind to us. (1 Cor. 2:11, 12). Whenever one is studying the Bible and finds two passages which seemingly contradict each other, the student can be sure that he misunderstood one or both of the passages.

To understand the Bible properly, one must understand biblical authority and his relationship to it. There are two basic approaches used by Bible students who are seeking authority for what men practice in religion. One approach may be stated, "We can do anything in religion that the Scriptures do not expressly and explicitly authorize." The other approach is whatever is done must be authorized from the word of God. There is a great deal of difference between the two approaches. The first suggests the Bible must state, "Thou shalt not" before an action is prohibited. The student is saying "God, I can do anything I want in religion unless you tell me specifically I cannot." The second approach differs in that a student states, "God, I cannot do anything in religion unless you give me permission."

The question is which one is the biblical approach. The Hebrew writer gives an insight into the matter. In Hebrews 7:11-14, the matter under discussion is that there has been a change of law. The reason we know there has been a change is because there has been a change in the priesthood. Under the law of Moses, priests could only come from the tribe of Levi. Under the New Covenant the priest is from the tribe of Judah. (see vs. 14). The thought is when God said that only priests could come from the tribe of Levi, he did not have to say they could not come from the tribe of Judah, Benjamin, or any of the others. The people understood what God meant and this is why the writer is using the proof to show a change in the law. Other examples could be cited such as Noah and the ark (Genesis 6:14), Nadab and Abihu (Leviticus 10:1, 2). "These were more noble than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the scriptures daily, whether these things were so. (Acts 17:11)

AUSTIN - The U.S. Supreme Court may have brought Texas, screaming and kicking, into a new decade where two bona fide political parties will compete for independent voters.

Last week, the high court rejected the state attorney general's request to throw out federal court redistricting plans which Democrats fear will give Republicans a majority in the Texas Senate and close to one in the Texas House.

#### Ruling Blasted, Praised

Immediately, various Democrats loudly criticized the three-judge federal panel, the Texas Republican Party, and even their own leaders for misplaying their legislative cards.

"What the Republican Party failed to accomplish at the ballot box, they've engineered from behind the bench, cloaked in the black robes of Republican judges," said Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

But the Republican Party of Texas hailed the ruling.

"For the first time, we're going to have fair elections for the state Senate," GOP chairman Fred Meyer said.

The court's ruling means that Texas will be among the 11 states holding presidential primaries on Super Tuesday - March 10.

Meanwhile, Attorney General Dan Morales said he will continue his investigation into allegations that state Rep. George Pierce, R-San Antonio, assisted James

Nowlin, a federal judge in Austin, in drawing the court's Senate plan.

Morales said he would not have made the investigation public and brought it to the Supreme Court's attention if Nowlin had not sealed the court's records detailing how it drew its maps.

#### First in Speaker's Race

The race to replace Speaker Gib Lewis drew two historical firsts last week: the first woman and the first black candidates.

State Rep. Betty Denton, D-Waco, became the first woman to announce, closely followed by Wilhelmina Delco, D-Austin, the first black to seek the post.

The rules reform movement seems to be all the rage with speaker candidates now, as the oft-criticized committee chairmen of Speaker Lewis now talk reform.

#### Judges Went Too Far?

U.S. Attorney General William Barr said federal judges went too far in trying to correct unconstitutional conditions in Texas prisons and will support efforts to remove court-imposed limits on prison populations.

State officials estimate 3,000 empty prison beds could be freed for use.

The population limit placed in Texas by federal judge William Wayne Justice prompted the early release of thousands of criminals from Texas prisons and spurred the Legislature to raise billions for new prisons with taxes and bonds.

#### New Ethics Commission

Some describe it as a "weak sister," but the new Texas Ethics Commission got a political football thrown at it right off the bat, nevertheless.

Tom Smith, director of Public Citizen, a watchdog group, asked members to regulate campaign contributions in the coming House speaker's race, and "fill in the

gaps" of a traditionally loose structure.

Smith said the commission also should decide if outgoing Gib Lewis can continue to use political funds to pay legal expenses for his upcoming ethics trial in Austin.

#### Lottery Start-Up

State Lottery Director Nora Linares said she has mailed out more than 56,000 applications to retailers who want to sell \$1 lottery tickets for the state.

Linares hopes to enlist 15,000 to 20,000 retailers in the next four months. The retailers will make a nickel on every dollar ticket they sell.

To receive a license, applicants must submit a \$125 application fee, a set of fingerprints, and undergo a criminal history check.

#### Other Highlights

■ Former Gov. Mark White resigned from the Hermann Hospital Trust board, the third trustee to do so amid a probe of trustee abuses. Media reports linked the Houston hospital's \$245,000 meat purchase from financially troubled Granada Foods to White, a partner in the law firm representing Granada.

■ State Sen. Chet Brooks, D-Pasadena, challenged Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, to a "street bowl," to promote anti-gang and drug efforts. The bowl will feature community teams fielding questions about gangs, drug abuse and school drop-outs in a college bowl format.

■ Some 25 House incumbents, or one-sixth of the membership, will not be returning to the Legislature.

■ San Antonio's state Sen. Frank Tejada was the only person from either party to file in its new congressional district.

■ With \$1.2 billion to build 12 new prisons, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice is getting proposals from several towns which would like one.



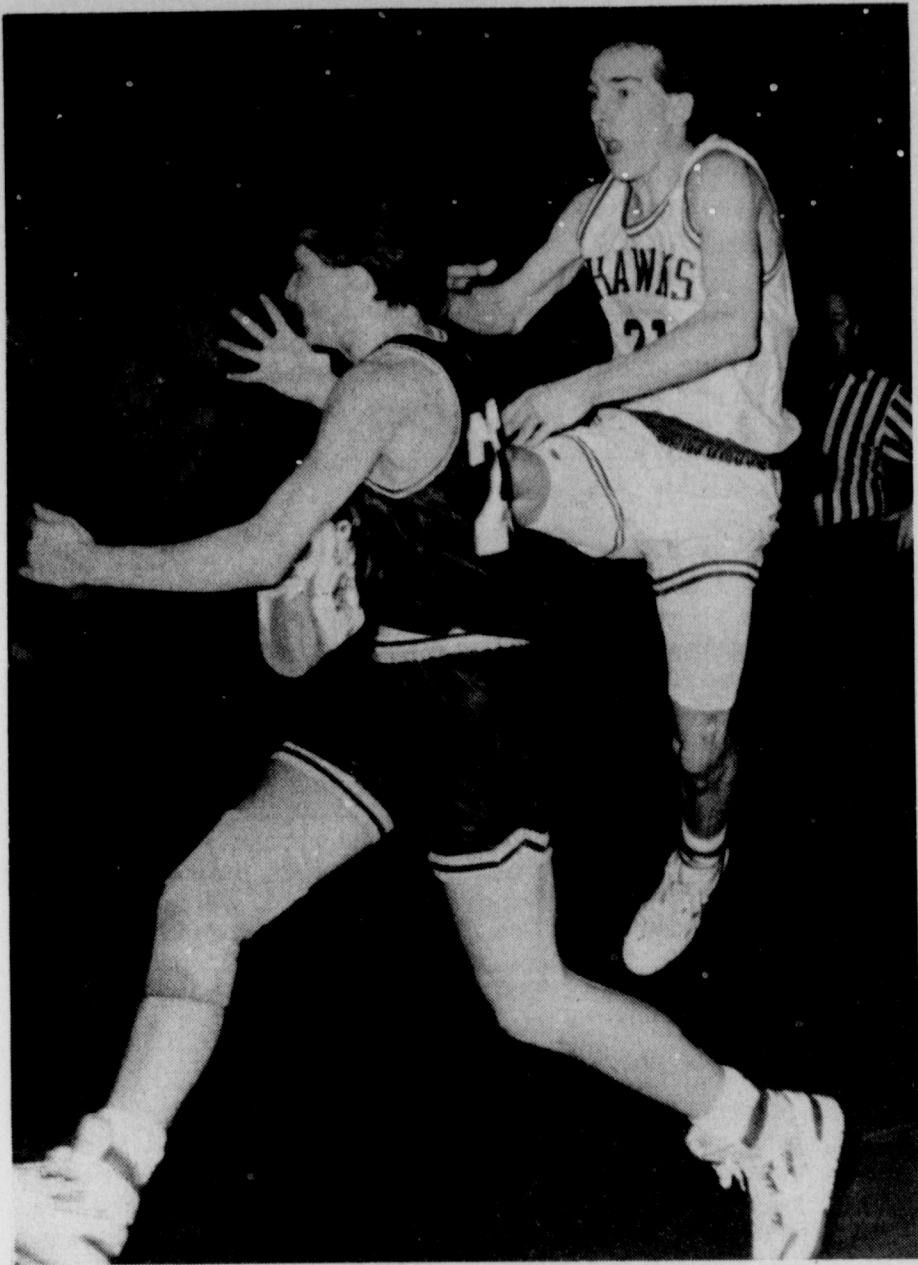

The clubs were even when they had their first official rest stop, 10-10, but Graham edged ahead by halftime to

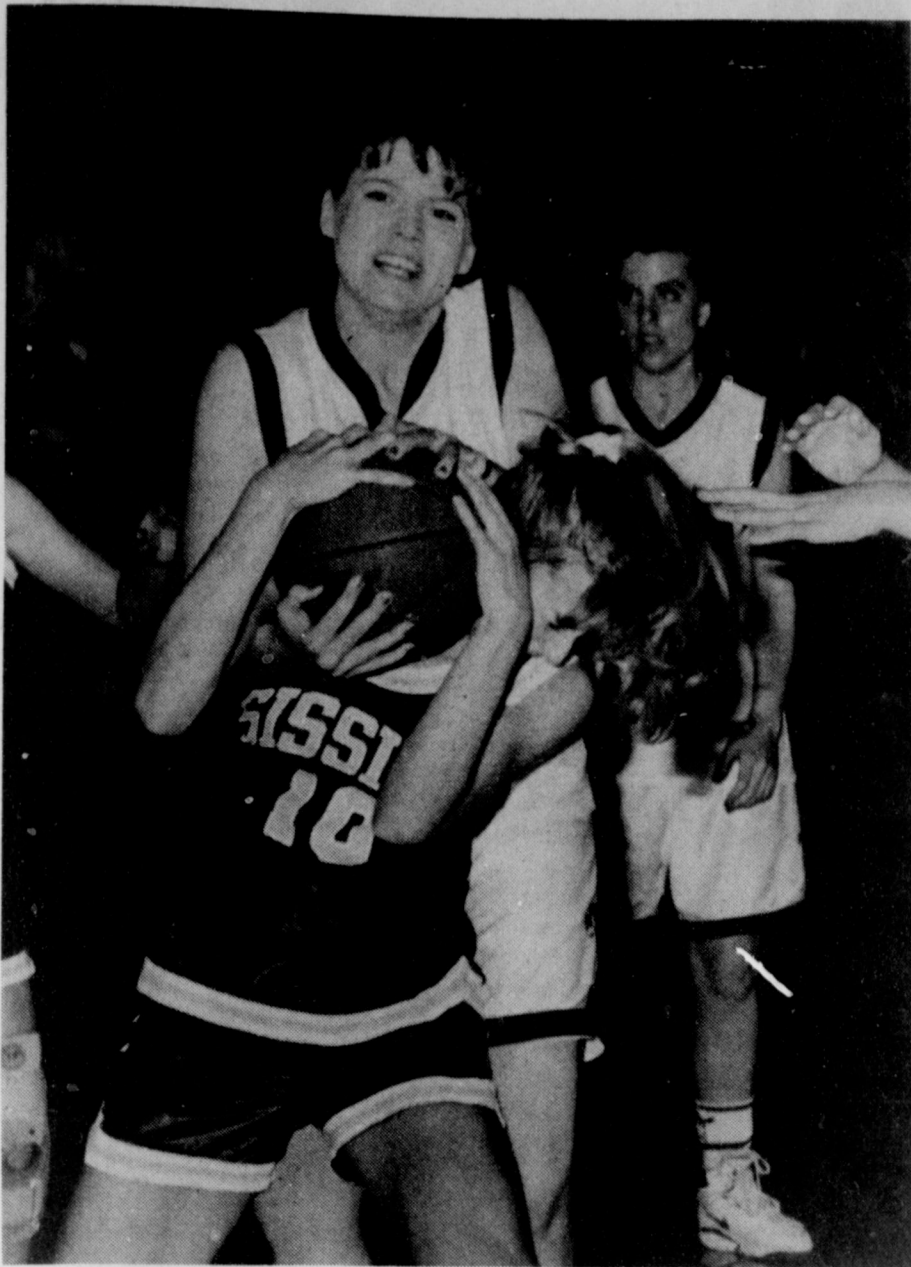
lead 30-26.

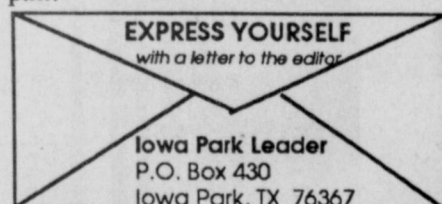

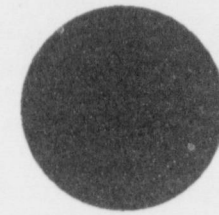
