Council's election dates outlined during meeting

Dates to be observed for this year's city council election were explained during the council's meeting Monday night.

Three positions on the council will be voted on May 2, including those held by Mayor Wayne House and Aldermen Johnny Crawford and Charlie Helms.

None of the three has indicated as yet plans to seek re-election.

Candidates can begin filing for a place on the ballot Feb. 17, and the final date to file is Mar. 18. A drawing will be held Mar. 23 by candidates for the order in which names will appear on the ballot.

Early voting, a term which has replaced "absentee voting" now that voters are not required to give an excuse for casting ballots other than on election day, will begin April 13 and end April 28.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, the council approved a proposal that the city cease paying its employees' portion of social security and medicare.

But, at the same time, the 7.65 percent of employee salary that has been paid by the city will be paid directly to the employees, offsetting the cost to employees.

Administrator Gary Jones explained the reason for the proposal was that all government reporting forms call for the deductions to be made from payroll checks. Under the current policy, considerable staff time is required to make the calculations and adjustments to fill out the reports.

The change over will begin with the first payroll of the city's fiscal year third quarter, Jones said.

Leases for grazing rights at the city's two lakes were split among two bidders.

Ervin Beisch bid \$8.30 per acre for the 1,310 acres at Lake Buffalo, for a total of \$10,837, and Denny McCarthy's bid of \$5 for the 90 acres at Lake Iowa Park, for a total of \$450, also was ac-

cepted.

McCarthy has had the lease at both lakes, with a contract that ends Feb. 4. He also had bid for another term at Lake Buffalo, but Beisch's bid was higher.

Aldermen voted 4-1 to accept the two highest bids, with Mark Raby casting the dissenting vote.

The council approved authorization for the administrator to advertise for bids to have approximately 2,250 square feet of concrete alley returns built.

In response to a request made at the last council meeting, Mike Price, public works director, said a 30-foot culvert would be placed in the drainage ditch which separates the access road and northwest parking area at Lake Gordon.

Because the culvert was already in inventory, having been replaced by a concrete culvert at another location, actual cost of the project was estimated at \$300, for surface materials.

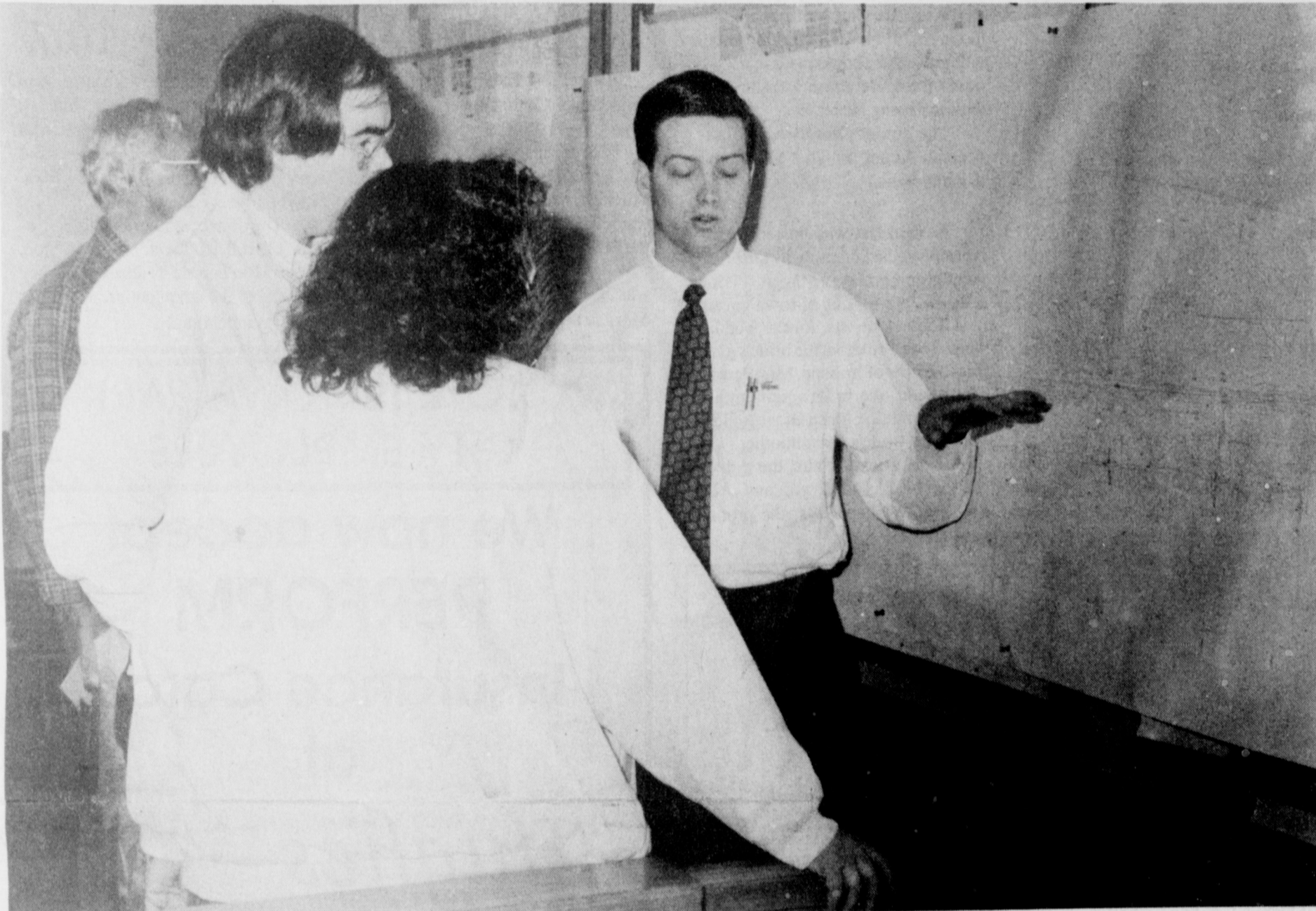
Price also explained a small stock tank just west of the fence by the entrance which is believed to have been causing constant leakage into the ditch is actually on city property.

The tank will be cut, in an effort to stop the constant leakage.

Another response by city staff to a project proposed at the last meeting was a list of 41 residences and businesses inside the city not now receiving sewer collection service.

The council has tentatively agreed to lay out a three-to-five-year program to provide service to those properties.

A cost estimate for the project is planned for the Feb. 24 meeting.



HEARING EXPLANATION - About 30 property owners along Washington Street attended a public hearing at city hall Monday afternoon to hear improvement plans proposed by the Texas Department of Transportation. Washington is to be rebuilt from Loop 370 (West Highway) to Atlantic, a distance of 1.4 miles, according to Ralph Self, resident engineer, with the federal

government paying 75 percent and the state paying the remaining 25 percent. Self estimated that if all plans and the bidding procedure can be accomplished to allow work to commence in January of 1993, it should be completed by early fall the same year.

Local man charged with indecency

A 26-year-old Iowa Park man was arrested Saturday after officers investigated a complaint of indecency with a child.

Cipriano Elias Carrizales was taken into custody and charged with sexual assault, a second-degree felony, after a complaint was filed by the mother of a 14-year-old male.

Carrizales remained in Wichita County jail early this week en lieu of a \$7,500 bond, police reported.

A resident in the 800 block of North Jackson turned over to police a 16-year-old male juvenile shortly after 2:30 a.m. Sunday, whom he had caught in his home.

The resident said he was in his bedroom when he heard a noise in the house. When he investigated, he saw an individual run out the back door from another bedroom.

Checking further, he found the juvenile in the room, and in possession of coins allegedly taken from a bureau drawer.

The juvenile was charged with burglary of a habitation and transported to the county juvenile detention center.

A similar charge is expected to be filed before week's end on an unnamed male adult identified as also having been in the house.

Clay Michael Williams, 20, was arrested Saturday afternoon after a theft of service complaint had been filed against him by a local business. He was transported to county jail.

Friday afternoon, officers took a 15-year-old male into custody at K&K Food Store, after he had been accused of shoplifting.

Charged with "theft under \$20" for allegedly taking candy, the juvenile was later released to a parent.

Lonnie Christian Briscoe, 18, was taken into custody in the 300 block of East Diamond at 5:40 a.m. Thursday, and charged with assault to prevent

family violence.

He was released four hours later after signing a personal recognizance bond.

An organizational meeting of the Iowa Park Little League Girls' Softball Association will be held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 2, at the Recreational Activities Center.

Parents of girls ages six to 15 are encouraged to attend.

Officers and board members will be elected.

Chamber supports prison plan

Directors of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce voted to support the effort of the Wichita Falls Board of Commerce and Industry to attract a prison to the area.

Only one of the directors attending the monthly board meeting Tuesday cast a vote against the proposal.

In general, the directors said they felt the proposed prison site, which is

about two miles north of US 287 on FM 369, would benefit businesses in Iowa Park.

Several of the families of prison staff might be attracted to live here, it was suggested.

Monday's meeting was the first to be chaired by the Chamber's new president, Gene Jordan, who was installed earlier this month at the organization's annual banquet.

Jordan received full support from the board when he proposed a letter be sent by the Chamber to the Iowa Park MuleSkinners, who catered the banquet, expressing appreciation for the outstanding steak dinner.

"I've not heard one comment except that the meal was excellent and the program moved well," Jordan said.

The new president reported he had

been approached by three different business representatives asking that the Chamber write a letter, representing the entire business community, asking the city to make certain improvements.

The improvements included new striping of parking places in the business district, filling pot holes, doing sidewalk repairs and purchasing a street sweeper.

It was decided that Gary Jones, city administrator, would be invited to speak before the board on the city's plans for street improvements, and other projects being planned.

A request was made that a spokesperson for the Industrial Development Committee make a report at the February board meeting on what is being done to attract new business and industry to the community.

Donkey ball Friday night

A version of a sporting event that originated in Iowa Park promises to both entertain and generate revenue for one of the local non-profit organizations.

Instead of donkey baseball, which Iowa Park volunteer firemen originated here in the 1930s, this new version is called donkey basketball.

It will begin at 7:30 p.m. Friday in the Iowa Park Junior High gymnasium. Four teams will be playing, repre-

senting faculties from the junior and senior high schools, as well as KLUR radio and TV-3 from Wichita Falls.

Advance admission is \$4 for adults and \$3 for school-age children, and \$5 and \$4, respectively, at the door. Tickets are on sale at the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

Pre-school children will be admitted free of charge.

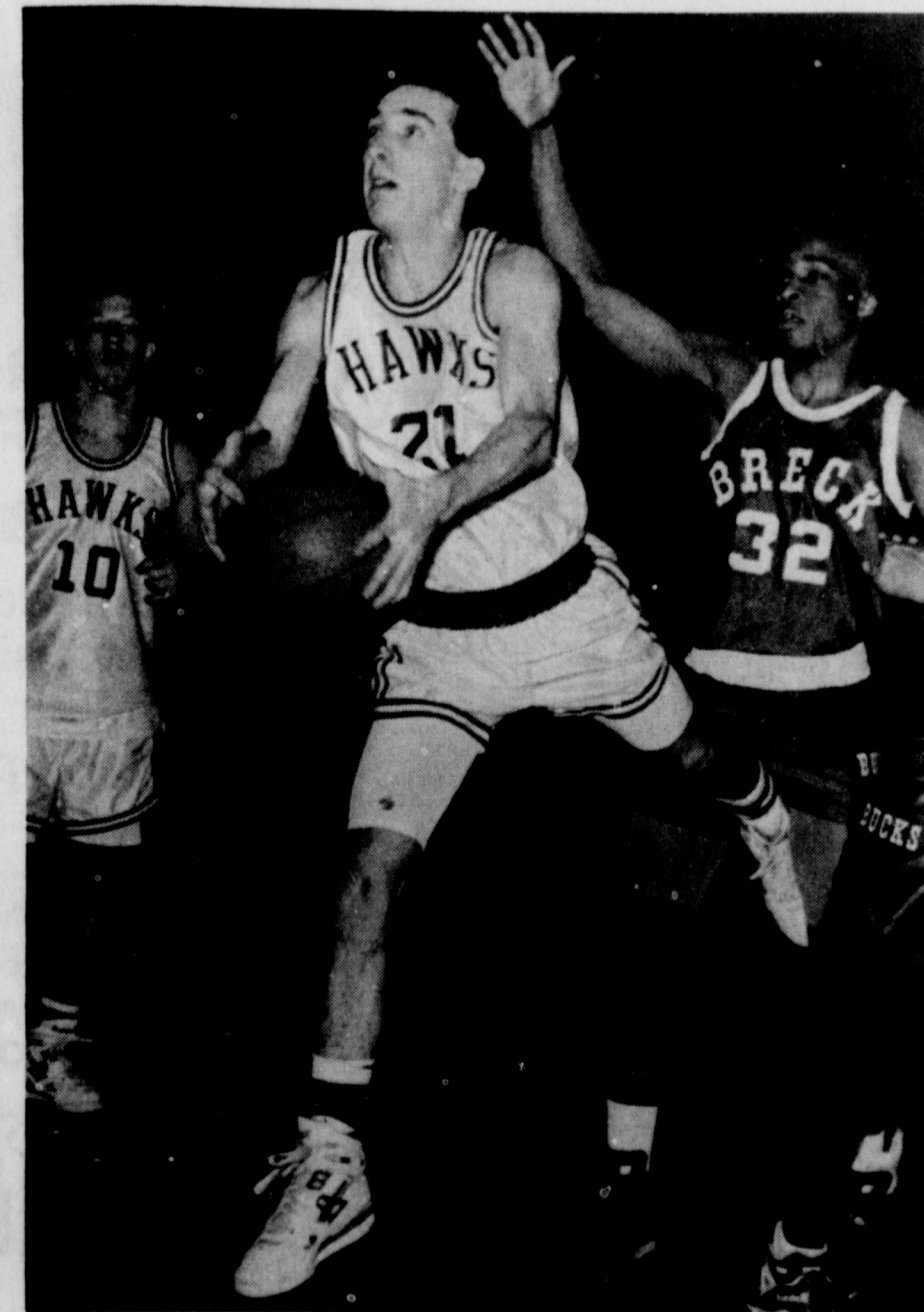
Proceeds will go to projects sponsored by the Iowa Park FFA Booster Club, sponsors of the event.

Firemen have always been a major influence in the life of Francis (Mrs. Danny) Skinner. Not only is she a fireman's daughter, she is the wife and mother of a firefighter.

Her late father, Bob Gibbs, was on the Electra Volunteer Fire Department, and her husband, Danny, has been a member of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. since 1974, and Fire Chief since 1979. Their son, Lewis, has been a member of the local department since March.

Born in Electra, Francis moved to Iowa Park in 1960. She is a 1968 graduate of Iowa Park High School, and graduated from Bethania's Licensed Vocational Nursing School in 1969. She is employed at the Sheppard Air Force Base Hospital.

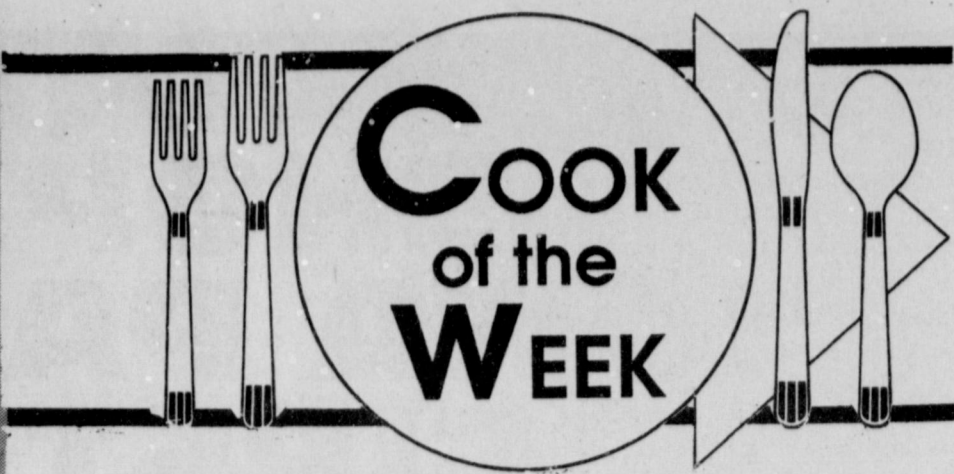
Danny grew up in Iowa Park, and is a Civil Service employee at Sheppard AFB. Their son, Lewis, who will be 19 soon, is a student at Midwestern State Univ., and works for Fire & Safety, a firm that sells and services fire extinguishers.

Activities involving the fire department pretty well dominate Francis' social life. She is vice president of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Iowa Park VFD. The members take food and water to the men when they are fighting fires; help with the Toys for Tots program, and have fundraisers. This year they bought two personal alert devices for the department.

She is president of the Ladies Auxiliary of West Texas Firemen's and Fire Marshall's Assoc., and a member of Eastern Star, where she is one of the Star Points.

Other interests include crochet and needlework. She likes to do cross stitch and has just completed the emblem of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshall's Assoc. She is working on duplicating, in cross stitch, the Iowa Park VFD patch.

Francis was taught to cook by her mother and grandmother. The recipes for "Pecan Pie" and "Oatmeal Cake" belonged to her grandmother, the late Hester Hofer. Francis also included an unusual "recipe" for a "1929 Fire Extinguisher," and emphasizes that it is just interesting reading and not recommended for household use today.



Fire Extinguisher (1929)

Every household should be equipped to combat a chance blaze at its inception. There are many patented extinguishers on the market, but their cost has prevented them from coming into universal use.

To fill the gap, a homemade extinguisher is recommended and while of utmost simplicity, the following equipment ranks with the high priced.

Fill an ordinary 1 pt. thin, flat whiskey flask with a strong brine of salt water, using all the salt the water will take up. Cork tightly and bind flasks together in pairs to ensure their being broken when thrown into a blaze; place about the house in convenient places for instant use in an emergency.

To extinguish a fire in the chimney, quickly close all the doors and windows in the room to decrease the draft; throw a few handfuls of salt on the fire in the range or grate, and the chimney fire will be at once extinguished by the gas evolved from the burning salt.

NOTE: Although these homemade extinguishers were used in the 1920's, they are not recommended for household use today.

Always remember when there is a fire, it should be reported immediately to the fire department by calling 911.

Pecan Pie

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup dark Karo
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 Tbsp. flour
- 2 Tbsps. butter

Mix eggs, Karo, sugar, vanilla, flour and butter well. Add pecans. Pour into pre-baked pie shell. Bake 10 minutes at 450 degrees, then 45 minutes at 300 degrees.

Sausage Snacks

- 2 cups Bisquick
- 1 lb. sausage
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 1 cup milk

Brown sausage, keeping it crumbly. Drain off fat. Put all ingredients in a bowl and mix. Drop by teaspoonful onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees 20 minutes or until lightly brown.

Mrs. Brooks Oatmeal Cake

- 1 1/4 cup boiling water
- 1 cup 3-Minute oats
- 1 stick oleo
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 1/2 cup flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- Pinch salt

Pour hot water over oats and oleo. Cover and let stand 20 minutes. Add other ingredients; mix well. Pour into greased and floured pan. Bake at 350 degrees 35 minutes.

Topping

- 1 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 stick oleo
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1 cup coconut
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Mix all ingredients well and spread on cake; brown under broiler.

Sopapillas (Hollow Bread)

- 3/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 pkg. yeast
- 1 large egg
- 1/4 cup soft shortening
- 2 1/4 cup flour

Dissolve yeast in water. Add salt, sugar, shortening and slightly beaten egg. Put flour in a large mixing bowl. Make a well in the middle of the flour and add the yeast mixture. Mix well. Cover and let rise for 30 minutes.

Roll on a floured surface to approx. 1/8 inch. Slice in squares approximately 3 inches. Deep fry at 375 degrees until brown, turn and brown other side. Drain well. May cover with cinnamon and sugar and/or serve with honey.

Jalapeno Cheese Roll

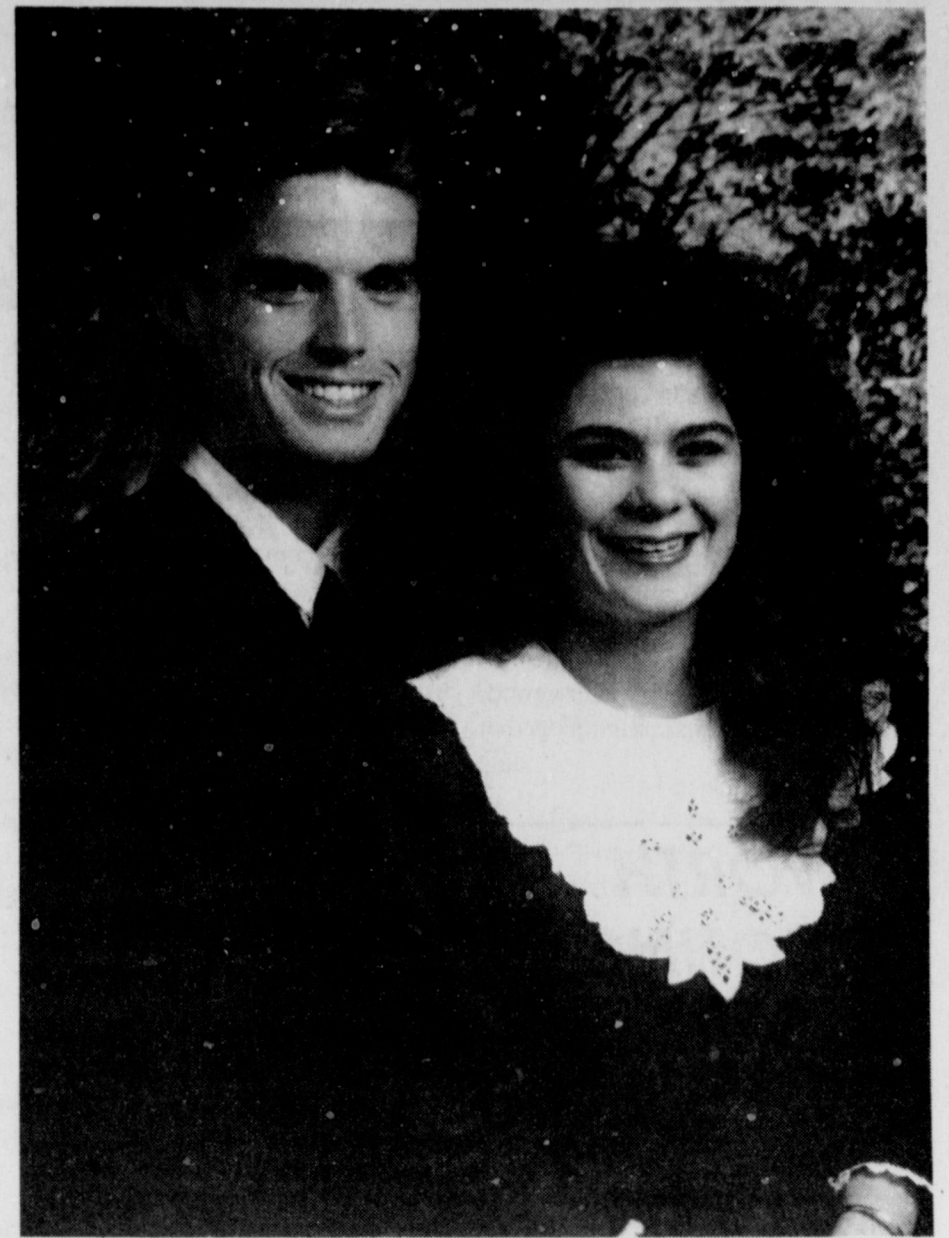
- 1 lb. Velveeta cheese
 - 1 small tub soft cream cheese
 - 1 small can chopped jalapeno peppers
- Roll Velveeta between 2 pieces of waxed paper to approx. 1/8 inch thickness. Mix jalapeno and cream cheese together and spread on top of Velveeta. Roll up and chill. Slice and serve with crackers of choice.

Mexican Corn Bread

- 1 1/2 cup corn meal
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 1/4 cup milk
 - 1 can cream style corn
 - 1/2 cup bacon drippings
 - 1/2 lb. hamburger meat, browned
 - 1 large onion, diced
 - 1 1/2 lbs. Cheddar cheese, grated
 - 1 small can jalapeno peppers, diced
- Mix together first 5 ingredients. Pour 1/2 of mixture into a skillet, then place a layer of the next 4 ingredients on top of mixture. Pour remaining cornbread mix on top. Bake at 450 degrees 40 minutes.

Mr. and Mrs. Sam McLroy are announcing the engagement and future wedding plans of their daughter, Angelia Gail, and Joel Fisher Galloway.

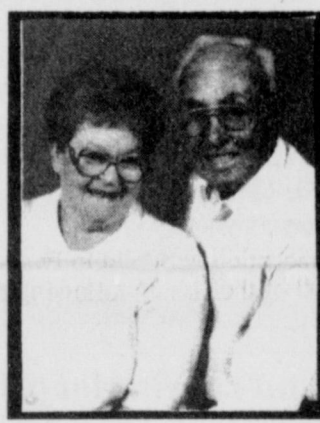
Parents of the groom-elect are Mr. and Mrs. Joe Galloway of Iowa Park.

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



One of the most important issues, from all I read and hear concerning the upcoming presidential election, is a government program for health care.

Could someone tell me how and when all this came up, and who started it?

I watched a young woman on television recently flatly state that health care was constitutionally owed her.

An older woman being interviewed, who was identified as self-employed in

a small business, complained she had no health insurance and whatever the government did about it was a major issue to her.

Hadn't these people read or heard that this was the kind of thing that brought the communist government of Soviet Russia to its knees?

There is no free lunch.

Or, maybe they're jealous about the health care given indigent persons who can't pay for it.

Maybe they think the elderly are getting something they aren't, with medicare. Surely they can't know much about that program, either.

More and more, we keep hearing from those who feel the government

owes them something. Usually that something is a living.

Another big thing that seems to be on the lips of the politicians is a break in taxes.

That sure does sound good. But who's going to pay the nation's debt?

Maybe all these free lunches and health care programs would be affordable to the government, once we get the nation's debt paid.

But by the time the debt is paid, none of us alive today likely will be around to enjoy all those goodies.

I'm still firmly convinced, despite all I read and hear from the politicians and free-lunchers, that the government doesn't owe me a living.

WORTH QUOTING

Now that it is tax-paying time, I'm sure many people have found cause to wonder about the so-called Robin Hood school finance scheme hatched by our Texas Legislature.

The added County Education Districts were supposed to take money from the richer districts and give it to the poorer districts, weren't they? The scheme was supposed to equalize things, wasn't it?

In a speech reported last year in *The Mirror*, Supt. Jack Keltner warned people that the scheme was going to cost people more money. He was right.

I received a news release last week from State Senator David Sibley. In it he said 846 districts increased their property taxes, while 97 made no change and only 72 were able to cut taxes.

Here's what happened in McLennan County: Axtell, 10% increase; Bosqueville, 16.36%; Bruceville-Eddy, 4.78% increase; China Spring, 18.28% increase; Connally, 12.57% increase; Crawford, 17.64% increase; Gholson, 37.16% increase; Hallsburg, 61.68% increase; La Vega, no change; Lorena, 27.56% increase; Mart, 11.87% increase; McGregor, 14.02% increase; Midway, 17.73% increase; Moody, 13.83% increase; Riesel, 1.67% increase; Robinson, 9.82% increase; Waco, 10.71% increase; West, 12.30% increase.

It seems Robin Hood had a field day. But where is the poor?

If the seller does their job -- provide the inventory, the competitive prices, the necessary operating hours, the friendly service, the information needed -- the local buyer should feel an obligation to give them first shot.

A good buyer-seller partnership in Granbury and Hood County could solve lots of problems.

Let's give it a try this season.

Warns against prison

Dear Sir:

I wonder how many people in Iowa Park are aware that, thanks to the B.C.I., we are committed to support a prison that will have a negative economic and social impact on the community?

The prison itself will be tax free and the nearby properties values will fall substantially, further lowering tax revenues. It is anybody's guess as to how much the B.C.I. has offered in incentives, but there will be an enormous outlay for roads, gas, electricity, and water. In addition, there will be very few local jobs. Prisons promote within their own system, hiring those already trained. Childress got 82 of the hundreds promised; Three Rivers got none.

Furthermore, prisons grow their own food and buy most goods from prison factories. There are 29 in Texas. Competition for jobs in the community will be unfavorably slanted toward the prisoner if he is part of the on-the-job training programs where half of the salaries are paid by the state.

The furlough system releases convicts into the community for a week at a time. While some may be trustworthy, no one can be absolutely certain. An inmate convicted of two counts of armed robbery or two counts of sexual assault can be furloughed for a week if he has accumulated enough "good time." Even a murderer can slip into a furlough slot if he has plea bargained to a lesser crime. Again, while many families of inmates may be law abiding citizens, many may not be. Families and friends will become part of the local community life. Just last Monday a parolee in Houston murdered an elderly couple in their home. And, don't forget! Many who are released here will stay.

We should not be stampeded into a panic stop-gap "solution" to the search for jobs. Even a few jobs may have been

worth the detractions of a prison in Childress, but we have many opportunities Childress lacks -- an expanding air force base, a university, international businesses. Let's work for more businesses that will bring productive people to live among us.

If we were concerned enough about "image" to build a water fall, surely we can be concerned enough to stop a prison. Imagine how attractive our area will be when the first sign the traveler on 287 sees warns "DON'T PICK UP HITCHHIKERS!"

Junior High to implement 'Sex Respect' curriculum

Optimist Club members last week heard an explanation of the specific curriculum to be used in a Sex Respect program to be taught at the junior high school in April.

Program participants were Junior High Counselor Pat Davis, Principal Randy Lovelady and George Brandt, science teacher.

Mrs. Davis explained that this three-week abstinence-based course will be taught at the junior high level in the sixth grade science classes.

The over-all objective is to help students realize that true sexual freedom includes the freedom to say "no" to sex outside of marriage.

Mrs. Davis said the program will provide greater moral support to those students who want to abstain from sexual activity and who previously have had little support from the people around them.

The Sex Respect curriculum has a multi-faceted approach to attain the long-range goal, which is to enable each individual to progressively develop responsible behavior, positive self-esteem, and respect for others as he or she makes decisions involving the use of his or her sexual freedom.

It was pointed out that when each person in the class has heard the many reasons to save sex for marriage, a positive peer pressure can be created. Although parents have some control over teen's environment, they have little control over peer pressure, the counselor said.

Classroom presentations will be designed to be mutually supportive to the parent-teen discussion of healthy sexual values.

It is planned to have a certified Sex Respect teacher trainer come here to provide a day-long seminar in preparation for implementing the program.

Mrs. Davis mentioned the importance of each student having his or her own text to take home and read or reread when no one else is around to watch, tease, or to be impressed.

Principal Lovelady told club members these student workbooks cost \$7.95 each. "So, we will be needing funds for at least the 185 sixth grade students. However, we would like to also provide this program for grades seven and eight this spring if we can raise funds to purchase enough workbooks for them all," said Lovelady.

Another facet of the program is the parent program that consists of parental permission or notification, an informative discussion session for

parents before the classroom program begins, and offering the opportunity for parents to purchase a parent guidebook designed to accompany the student workbook for use at home.

It was pointed out that this joint venture will enable parents to work together with the school in order to give ongoing support to family values and health beyond the presentation of the Sex Respect unit at school.

Mrs. Davis commented on the fifth facet of the program. "There are many valuable contributions an involved community can make to the success of the program," she said. She added, "Parent groups, service clubs and the local business community can have the opportunity to begin to support our young people in their choice to avoid the situations that lead to sexual activity. Also they can be involved through funding a part of the initial expense to implement the program in the Iowa Park schools."

First Step explained to Evening Lioness'

Laura Grimsinger, executive director of First Step in Wichita Falls, spoke to the Evening Lioness Club at a regular meeting Thursday.

Miss Grimsinger, former funding director of the Guadalupe County Women's Shelter at Seguin, was introduced by Mrs. Homer Blalock, vice president.

The speaker introduced her talk with a quote from a German philosopher which stressed the importance of thinking a year ahead to plant a seed, 100 years ahead to plant a tree, and a thousand years ahead to educate the people. She closed with "work is love made visible", a quote from an Arabian prophet.

Miss Grimsinger said First Step, an organization designed to prevent family violence, was started in Wichita Falls in 1976 and it now serves a 12-county area. Through the years, it has been a place of refuge for women and

children (and a few men) who have been victims of family violence.

At present, the shelter has 23 people living there in a three bedroom and two bath structure. Through the help of the community, a new half-million dollar shelter will be opened in March. It will have 10 bedrooms and will house 36 women.

The speaker stressed that First Step provides 24-hour services in an effort to help families turn bad things into good things.

She said counselors are provided for women who have suffered severe beatings and verbal abuse, and for children who have seen their mothers abused. She explained that special efforts are made for mothers and children to become closely knit because in most cases they have to face life without husbands and fathers.

During the question and answer period, club members asked the executive director how individuals, clubs and other organizations could help. She said there is always a need for monetary donations, food, clothes for women and children, particularly for boys at this time, and school supplies.

During the business session directed by Mrs. Kenneth Via, members voted to express their appreciation to Miss Grimsinger by giving a donation of \$35 to First Step.

At the start of the meeting, Mrs. Joe Kennedy gave the meditation on "Take Time", using scripture references and quotes on the value of taking time to do things that have lasting value.

Hostesses for the meeting were Mmes. Grover Cleveland, Gerry Thurlo and Sam Hunter.

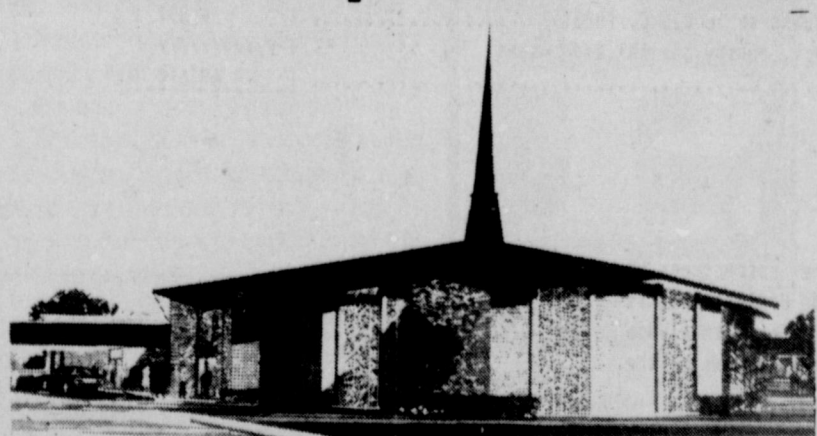

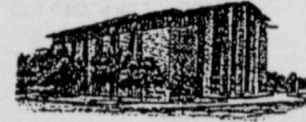

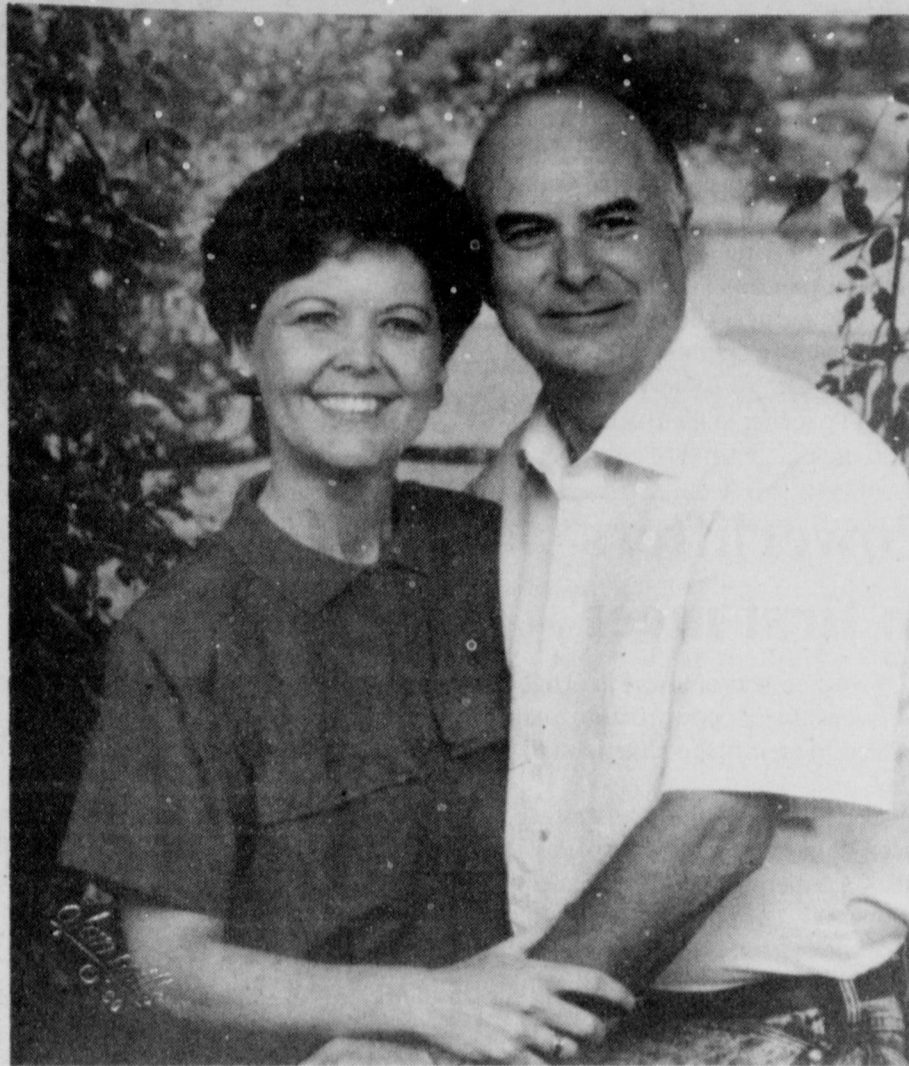

Mrs. Palmer said, "It's not where you start that counts, it's where you finish, and it's not what happens to you, it's what you do with what happens to you."

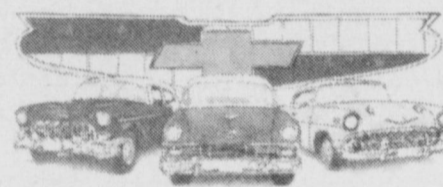

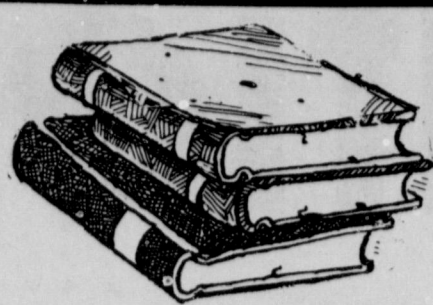

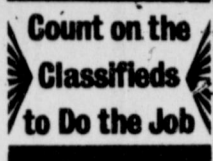
