# Junior High seeks funds for sex education course

Iowa Park organizations, as well as individuals, are being solicited for funds to allow sex education to be taught in Iowa Park Junior High School during the spring semester.

A summary of the curriculum and costs involved were presented during Tuesday's luncheon meeting of the Iowa Park Lions Club.

Making the presentation were Randy Lovelady, principal, and Pat Davis, counselor.

The three-week course is designed for sixth grade students. However, since those already in the seventh and eighth grades have not taken the course, the administrators would like to include them as well.

Student workbooks cost approximately \$8 apiece, and there are slightly three grades.

An additional expense is the cost of a teacher-trainer who would provide staff training, Mrs. Davis said. The training, at a cost of \$300 plus travel of the community along with faculty.

Mrs. Davis explained the commit-

appointed last spring to decide which curriculum best met the local desires.

Because the committee did not reach its conclusion until after this school year's budget was adopted, no funds were set aside for the course the first

"We're asking for whatever support you can give," Lovelady said. "We're approaching other organizations. We feel like it is a good program."

Pointing to the need of the course, Lovelady said sixth grade students are not as they were in the past, when they were still "pulling little red wagons."

"Some of these students are already sexually active" at 11 and 12 years of age, Lovelady said.

The committee adopted a program more than 400 pupils enrolled in the entitled "Sex Respect, The Option of True Sexual Freedom.

Mrs. Davis emphasized the curriculum is abstinence-based. "We believe that teaching abstinence is in the best interest of our students as well as in expenses, would be open to all residents the best interest of our community," she

Also emphasized was the fact that tee, made up of faculty and citizens, was every student's enrollment in the course

will require permission from parents.

Those students not receiving parent permission will be given an alternate academic program for the three weeks, Mrs. Davis said.

A parent guide book will be made available for purchase, to enable parents to follow the course's progress during the three weeks.

A print-out of the program provided to the audience stated:

"Overall Objective (of the course): Realize that true sexual freedom includes the freedom to say 'no' to sex outside of marriage.

"Long-Range Goal: To enable each individual to progressively develop responsible behavior, positive self-esteem, and respect for others as he/she makes decisions involving the use of his/her sexual freedom.

Inclusion of the curriculum was unanimously approved by the school's board of trustees.

While voicing approval of the program, Lions Club members voted to table the request for funding until next week, giving them time to digest the

# Council 'swamped' by water

The city council was almost swamped by water topics Monday night.

Aldermen dealt with selling water to intities outside the city, bids on the water treatment plant, warning downstream residents when water reaches certain levels in a lake, and heard problems created by excessive rainfall.

A request for additional water from the Wichita Valley Water Supply Corporation was tabled.

Manager Steve Stone explained in his letter of request that a number of the corporation's customers along FM 1206 would be served by Iowa Park, rather than from the Lake Kickapoo treatment plant, in the near future.

Up to 50,000 gallons daily would

Council members said they had no problems with selling the additional gallons, but Alderman Bob Hamilton said he felt "uncomfortable" that no limit has ever been included in the contract between the city and the corporation.

Action on the proposal is expected to be taken at the Feb. 24 meeting.

The council voted approval of a revised contract for water prices with Sereno Lago Venture, which supplies water to residents at Horseshoe Bend Estates.

Action was taken after Administrator Gary Jones recommended a reduction of rates, which he termed "excessive."

Sereno Lago water is supplied from the large transmission line which serves Iowa Park from Wichita Falls.

Included in the motion was a request that both the city and Sereno Lago install valves on either side of the meter, about four feet below that level. which will allow continued service to the residences whenever repairs are necessary to the transmission line.

estimated at approximately \$8,000.

The lowest of five bids for a major renovation project at the city's water treatment plant was almost \$9,000 less to those in the media when levels reach than budgeted.

The low bid, submitted by Raydon, Inc. of Breckenridge, was \$190,559, and included the city's alternate plan. The other bids ranged as high as \$252,886.

ne near future, Jones said. At the direction of the Texas Water Commission, residents downstream of city-owned Lake Buffalo are to be warned whenever lake levels reach certain stages.

A policy of when and how notification will be made was adopted by the council. All warnings are to be made via newspaper, radio and television, and in some cases by personal telephone.

Excessive and persistant rains have caused different kinds of problems for the city, aldermen were told.

Besides preventing pot hole patching and creating deep ruts in the alleys with trash trucks, work was halted on digging a lagoon near the sewer treatment plant.

The lagoon is to be dug so repairs can be made to the 22-year-old treatment plant.

Bids also were accepted for street work materials. Lewis Hillard was the low bidder for crusher run materials, and Zack Burkett the low bidder for asphalt. Both were lowest of two bids received on each purchase.

# Tax refund takes drop

February's sales tax rebate, received this week by the city from the state comptroller's office, indicates business in December was slightly lower than the same month in 1990.

The check was \$20,423.06, down 2.30 percent from the \$20,904.39 check received this month last year.

February rebate checks are sales taxes collected by businesses during December, as well as the fourth quarter of 1991.

However, for the two months of 1992, the city has received slightly more than in January and February of 1991, according to the comptroller's release. February's check raised the 1992

total to \$32,620.59, which is 0.14 percent more than the \$32,575.42 reported at this same time last year. Two other Wichita County communities also are reporting a slight in-

crease for the year, but one total is considerably lower. Both Burkburnett and Wichita Falls

have an increase for the year, 0.33 and 0.20 percent, respectively. Electra, however, is a minus 14.11 percent. Holliday and the other five com-

munities in Archer City are all below their receipts for the two months in 1991. Holliday is a minus 12.15 percent.

Now, I'll agree the water has been deeper on FM 367, east of FM 369. But that was caused by a 10-plus-inch rain that fell overnight. That was in 1971, wasn't it?

Regular monthly reports will be made, including taxes, cafeteria, transportation and enrollment.



# Accuses man of stealing, and then marries him

woman working at a job thought of as man's work before it became common in the job market; a housewife, married to a major on the Wichita Falls Police Department she met when she accused him of stealing; a person working with neglected and dependent children; a mother of two daughters who became the third generation to graduate from Iowa Park High School; an excellent seamstress, who also is adept at crocheting; a person who volunteers her spare time at the nursing home, and last but by no means least---an addictive bridge

Linda Wynn could be typecast as any or all of these personages, and it would be indicative of her past or present roles.

Linda moved to Iowa Park with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Helms, from Seymour and started first grade here, graduating in 1961. Her mother, the former Louise Shook, graduated Iowa Park High School as did the Wynns' daughters, Kristi and Kami.

She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology with a psychology minor from North Texas State University

Her present title of instructor in construction at Sheppard Air Force Base might not sound like a job description for her BA degree. But, Linda says, she uses her psychology every day and her sociology training has proven helpful many times in the past 24 years of working with mostly male students in construction.

After graduating NTSU, Linda worked in Wichita Falls for Child Welfare Direct Services.

Linda worked for one and a half years with children under the age of 16 who had problems, most of them abused. She also worked closely with adoptive studies.

At that time there was only one foster home where children could be placed, so they had to be put in a state home. Each worker had a 100-family case load, she said, and the work was very stressful for her. She decided she would prefer a different type of

Linda was once shot at and was bitten and fought by children several times. She remarked that it did not seem to matter how badly the children were treated by their families, they hardly ever wanted to be taken away from them.

Linda lived in the same apartment house as the young Frederick,Okla., native she thought was "stealing" her daily paper, and told him so. She didn't know at the time he was a patrolman with the WFPD, but, it probably wouldn't have mattered if she had. "I still think that he might have been getting my paper," Linda quipped.

Nevertheless, within three months after that unvarnished introduction, Linda became Mrs. Roy Don Wynn.

After she quit work for Child Welfare, Linda knew she had to get a job and she wanted to go to work at Sheppard Air Force Base.

She shrewdly set upon a plan that eventually helped her get her first job at SAFB 24 years ago.

She rented her a typewriter and then went to Kemp Library and studied how to take an Air Force Civil Service Test. After several job titles, Linda is now preparing specific tests.

She began working as a clerk typist for the Air Force Aid Club that provided money to airmen for emergencies. From there she went to military pay clerk, then to civilian pay clerk. And, for seven years Linda was Medical Services Accounting officer.

Linda laughingly recalls, "I was so dumb when I went to work out there, I didn't know an officer from an enlisted person. I thought the highest ranking person there was a staff sargeant."

She continued, "I've never had a humdrum job at Sheppard. Shortly after I went to work an officer told me to burn him a copy of his order (meaning to get him a copy from the copy machine)."

But, Linda thought that sounded crazy, so she asked him to repeat his order and when he did, she got a cigarette lighter and almost burned his order before he could stop her.

When more women were allowed in the teaching field, Linda began looking over the various teaching opportunities. After scanning about 24 job descriptions, she decided carpentry made the most sense to her.

She was taken to a shop and taught how to use various carpentry tools. After learning carpentry herself, she has been teaching basic carpentry and she has loved her job.

They build 10x10 frame structures and do the inside work of cabinet construction, put up sheetrock walls and learn how to make the doors and frame windows. They also learn how to use various skill tools and remodel structures.

Linda says now that energy is one of the big problems, they have been learning to do suspended ceilings, insulation and panel walls.

"The young men and women can really keep you entertained, "Linda said. "They were not very receptive to me when I first started teaching basic carpentry skills," she added, " but I have no problem now, except to be sure and stay ahead of my students, and they are pure pleasure. Sometimes I wonder why I'm paid for such a pleasureable job, and at other times I feel like I earn all they pay me.

"I do not have discipline problems, I just make sure I get control of the class at the beginning."

Another plus for Linda's personal satisfaction, is that she has been able many times to use her psychology when her students have problems.

"I have never believed in just teaching, I believe in counseling and helping people when they are having problems, if I can. Many of my students are homesick, or have other problems they will talk about to me," Linda said. She added that she had also found that useful in doing volunteer work at the nursing home.

Currently Linda is Key Course Developer for a structural course merging masonry and carpentry. She is developing tests and study materials and works with a person who teaches sheet metal work to merge the

Linda has studied six years and is

now classified as Master Instructor. She is the only woman teacher in carpentry and the only one to teach in the merged course.

She has received numerous awards through the years at SAFB, but the one she is most proud of came this year. She received Instructor of the Year Award for 1991 for the 3770th Civil Engineer Training

Linda became especially interested in volunteer work at the nursing home while her grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. E.J. Shook, were residents there. She tries to spend three days a week at the home after she gets off work.

As she has time she sews and crochets and has crocheted many baby afghans. She also plays bridge with a group in Iowa Park and one in Wichita

The Wynns' daughters live at home. Kristi teaches at Burkburnett Junior High School, and Kami is a premed student at Midwestern State University and works at Beall's.

Wynn stays as busy as his wife. He is in charge of all police department employees who are not in uniform.

He also farms 80 acres of cotton and wheat on the family farm near Frederick. He raises Quarterhorses, and has one thoroughbred.

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
