industrial activity, Nipper said the IDC industrial activity, Nipper said the IDC has the land and is seeking prospects to "feelers" have responded to advertisements concerning the tract.
The tract fronts the access road about midway between Pacific and Johnson Road, and is approximately directly north of Fourth Street.

After purchasing the land, the IDC had it cleared of trees, fenced, and leased it for grazing. Should an attractive prospect demonstrate a desire to locate here and want the land, it would be given to the prospect, Nipper said.
