Junior High seeks funds for sex education course

Iowa Park organizations, as well as individuals, are being solicited for funds to allow sex education to be taught in Iowa Park Junior High School during the spring semester.

A summary of the curriculum and costs involved were presented during Tuesday's luncheon meeting of the Iowa Park Lions Club.

Making the presentation were Randy Lovelady, principal, and Pat Davis, counselor.

The three-week course is designed for sixth grade students. However, since those already in the seventh and eighth grades have not taken the course, the administrators would like to include them as well.

Student workbooks cost approximately \$8 apiece, and there are slightly more than 400 pupils enrolled in the three grades.

An additional expense is the cost of a teacher-trainer who would provide staff training, Mrs. Davis said. The training, at a cost of \$300 plus travel expenses, would be open to all residents of the community along with faculty.

Mrs. Davis explained the committee, made up of faculty and citizens, was

appointed last spring to decide which curriculum best met the local desires.

Because the committee did not reach its conclusion until after this school year's budget was adopted, no funds were set aside for the course the first year.

"We're asking for whatever support you can give," Lovelady said. "We're approaching other organizations. We feel like it is a good program."

Pointing to the need of the course, Lovelady said sixth grade students are not as they were in the past, when they were still "pulling little red wagons."

"Some of these students are already sexually active" at 11 and 12 years of age, Lovelady said.

The committee adopted a program entitled "Sex Respect, The Option of True Sexual Freedom."

Mrs. Davis emphasized the curriculum is abstinence-based. "We believe that teaching abstinence is in the best interest of our students as well as in the best interest of our community," she said.

Also emphasized was the fact that every student's enrollment in the course

will require permission from parents.

Those students not receiving parent permission will be given an alternate academic program for the three weeks, Mrs. Davis said.

A parent guide book will be made available for purchase, to enable parents to follow the course's progress during the three weeks.

A print-out of the program provided to the audience stated:

"Overall Objective (of the course): Realize that true sexual freedom includes the freedom to say 'no' to sex outside of marriage.

"Long-Range Goal: To enable each individual to progressively develop responsible behavior, positive self-esteem, and respect for others as he/she makes decisions involving the use of his/her sexual freedom."

Inclusion of the curriculum was unanimously approved by the school's board of trustees.

While voicing approval of the program, Lions Club members voted to table the request for funding until next week, giving them time to digest the proposal and decide on how much to donate.

Council 'swamped' by water

The city council was almost swamped by water topics Monday night.

Aldermen dealt with selling water to intities outside the city, bids on the water treatment plant, warning downstream residents when water reaches certain levels in a lake, and heard problems created by excessive rainfall.

A request for additional water from the Wichita Valley Water Supply Corporation was tabled.

Manager Steve Stone explained in his letter of request that a number of the corporation's customers along FM 1206 would be served by Iowa Park, rather than from the Lake Kickapoo treatment plant, in the near future.

Up to 50,000 gallons daily would be needed, the council was told.

Council members said they had no problems with selling the additional gallons, but Alderman Bob Hamilton said he felt "uncomfortable" that no limit has ever been included in the contract between the city and the corporation.

Action on the proposal is expected to be taken at the Feb. 24 meeting.

The council voted approval of a revised contract for water prices with Sereno Lago Venture, which supplies water to residents at Horseshoe Bend Estates.

Action was taken after Administrator Gary Jones recommended a reduction of rates, which he termed "excessive."

Sereno Lago water is supplied from the large transmission line which serves Iowa Park from Wichita Falls.

Included in the motion was a request that both the city and Sereno Lago install valves on either side of the meter, which will allow continued service to the residences whenever repairs are necessary to the transmission line.

Cost to the city for its gate was estimated at approximately \$8,000.

The lowest of five bids for a major renovation project at the city's water treatment plant was almost \$9,000 less than budgeted.

The low bid, submitted by Raydon, Inc. of Breckenridge, was \$190,559, and included the city's alternate plan.

The other bids ranged as high as \$252,886.

Work is to begin on the project in the near future, Jones said.

At the direction of the Texas Water Commission, residents downstream of city-owned Lake Buffalo are to be warned whenever lake levels reach certain stages.

A policy of when and how notification will be made was adopted by the council. All warnings are to be made via newspaper, radio and television, and in some cases by personal telephone.

Initial warning is to be made when water level reaches an altitude of 1,048 feet, which is when water reaches the service spillway, sometimes known as

the concrete drawdown tube.

At the present time, the lake level is about four feet below that level.

Second warning level is 1,051 feet, which is the emergency spillway.

Final warning, which requires immediate evacuation, is when the water level reaches 1,051 feet, the height of the dam.

Telephone warnings will be added to those in the media when levels reach the second and final warning heights, according to the adopted policy.

Excessive and persistent rains have caused different kinds of problems for the city, aldermen were told.

Besides preventing pot hole patching and creating deep ruts in the alleys with trash trucks, work was halted on digging a lagoon near the sewer treatment plant.

The lagoon is to be dug so repairs can be made to the 22-year-old treatment plant.

Bids also were accepted for street work materials. Lewis Hillard was the low bidder for crusher run materials, and Zack Burkett the low bidder for asphalt. Both were lowest of two bids received on each purchase.

Another three-year contract was

Gamble had parked his vehicle on the north side of the main building.

It had not been located by noon Wednesday, according to the police

department.

When called to an apparent domestic disturbance in the 200 block of Poe at 9:03 Tuesday evening, police arrested Bobby Dee Stockinger, 29.

After being placed in the jail cell, Stockinger reportedly began banging his head on the cell floor, injuring himself.

Police summoned EMTs to treat the suspect before transporting him at 10:46 p.m. to county jail, where he was held under a \$200 bond.

One officer received numerous

bruises when kicked by the man, according to Chief Wayne Parsons, who said he took photographs of Stockinger banging his own head on the cell floor to disprove any allegations the injuries were caused by arresting officers.

Police arrested Bryon Faux Jr., 61, Thursday on a charge of theft of service. He was later released after signing a personal recognizance bond.

Faux is alleged to have tied onto a cable television line and hooked it up to

Tax refund takes drop

February's sales tax rebate, received this week by the city from the state comptroller's office, indicates business in December was slightly lower than the same month in 1990.

The check was \$20,423.06, down 2.30 percent from the \$20,904.39 check received this month last year.

February rebate checks are sales taxes collected by businesses during December, as well as the fourth quarter of 1991.

However, for the two months of 1992, the city has received slightly more than in January and February of 1991, according to the comptroller's release.

February's check raised the 1992 total to \$32,620.59, which is 0.14 percent more than the \$32,575.42 reported at this same time last year.

Two other Wichita County communities also are reporting a slight increase for the year, but one total is considerably lower.

Both Burkburnett and Wichita Falls have an increase for the year, 0.33 and 0.20 percent, respectively. Electra, however, is a minus 14.11 percent.

Holliday and the other five communities in Archer City are all below their receipts for the two months in 1991. Holliday is a minus 12.15 percent.

IDC has no new prospects

Iowa Park Industrial Development Corporation has no active prospect to locate on its proposed industrial site north of US 287.

H.M. Nipper, IDC president, gave a report on his organization's activities during Monday's monthly meeting of Chamber of Commerce directors.

Pointing to the national slack of industrial activity, Nipper said the IDC has the land and is seeking prospects to locate on it, but at the present time no "feelers" have responded to advertisements concerning the tract.

The tract fronts the access road about midway between Pacific and Johnson Road, and is approximately directly north of Fourth Street.

After purchasing the land, the IDC had it cleared of trees, fenced, and leased it for grazing. Should an attractive prospect demonstrate a desire to locate here and want the land, it would be given to the prospect, Nipper said.

Efforts of the IDC bore fruit by attracting the location of the Cryovac plant here in the early 1970s.

The IDC is a non-profit organization incorporated under state statutes, and is a wing of the Chamber.

City Administrator Gary Jones gave a report in response to questions posed during the January board meeting.

Among the questions he answered were:

Streetsweeper - the city is hoping to purchase a surplus unit that will be made available by the state highway department, at considerably less cost than purchasing a new one.

Street improvements - a list of streets the council has set by priority to be worked on this summer, as long as

budgeted money lasts, was provided for the board's viewing. Progress is hampered by wet weather.

Sidewalks - the city has no program at the time to improve sidewalks, but if there is a perceived need, will look into it.

Downtown improvement - an asphalt covering of the concrete street in front of city hall was applied, as a test to decide whether similar applications will be made.

Jones also answered several other questions posed by directors.

The annual Clean-Up Week, which is co-sponsored by the Chamber and city, will be March 30 through April 4, Sue Dillard, Chamber secretary, announced.

It will be coordinated again this year, on the Chamber's part, with a community-wide garage sale promotion.

Director Joe Winkler, manager of the local Wal-Mart store, told the board his firm is planning a major remodeling of the building this year.

A noticeable influx of people from out of town can be expected here March 6 and 7, Director Derrell Monday told the board.

He said the Lions Club-sponsored Hawk Relays will attract schools from 15 to 18 schools for the meet.

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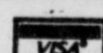
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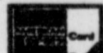
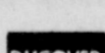
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As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



In a column back last fall, I made a prediction that this would be a cold, wet winter.

Well, the winter isn't over yet, but thus far I'm batting .500.

I spent most of my younger years out in West Texas. In that area, you learn early never to complain about how much it rains. They never seem to get enough in that part of the country.

We may not be setting any kind of record on moisture received thus far this year, but we've got to be right up there with the wettest of them all.

The problem is, very little of what has fallen seems to be drying. We've had a lot of cloud cover. That, along with cool temperatures and very little wind has kept the ground soggy and spongy.

And as it continues, more and more

problems will arise.

I understand farmers are already having to resort to pilots to apply their herbicides, insecticides and even fertilizer on this winter's wheat crop.

Many, if not most, farmers have pulled their cattle off wheat and began feeding them, because the cattle were losing so much weight bogging down in the wet fields.

And dairymen with pens not on slopes are in serious trouble with their cattle wearing themselves trying to get to the milking barns and feed.

The muddy conditions have been especially bad for oil well pumpers. Those guys, who normally have to check the wells and tanks daily, are almost having to use horses to get into some of the off-road areas.

Anybody given thought to mud-uggies?

I've only been able to come up with two types of businesses that might be appreciating the conditions of winter '91.

Businesses that sell tire chains and mud lug tires have got to be doing a

landslide business.

And then there are the radio and tv weather people. Everybody's wanting to know if it's going to rain, or stop raining.

All our lakes and stock ponds are at or near capacity.

Lake Buffalo is at an all-time high. Sunday, it had started rising above the base of the concrete drawdown flume. It's never been that high since the dam was completed about 25 years ago.

Another account of Buffalo's record height is given by Denny McCarthy, who reports the bridge on Burnett Road is under water. That's a first.

Now, I'll agree the water has been deeper on FM 367, east of FM 369. But that was caused by a 10-plus-inch rain that fell overnight. That was in 1971, wasn't it?

Anyway, unless you're about to drown, all you can do is grin and bear it.

It may help to think back to 1970-71, when it was so darn dry we were having to drink that salt water taken from the irrigation ditch.

Living trusts explained

Dan Campbell, attorney with Nutt, Brooks and Campbell in Wichita Falls, spoke to the Evening Lions Tuesday on "The Living Trust," which he described as a wonderful management tool, an asset to a properly drawn will, and something that everyone should consider. He was introduced by C.L. Thompson.

He said that the one who creates the trust is a trustee and could name a corporate trustee, and he stressed the importance of transferring assets to the living trust. Some of the advan-

tages of the living trust, according to Campbell, are: a privacy element, avoiding disgruntled relatives from protesting the will, and avoiding probating of the will. He did say, however, unlike most states Texas allows people to have independent administrators, and probating of the will is not as complicated or expensive as it is in many states.

During the question and answer time, Campbell said that the expense of setting up a living trust was approximately \$1,500.

Young Farmers receive SWC award

Named recipient of the Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District's Outstanding Conservation Business/Professional award last week was the Wichita County Young Farmers Chapter.

Announcement was made during the district's annual awards banquet.

Current officers of the Young Farmers are David Phillips, president; Kevin Wells, vice president, and Robert Hinkie, treasurer. Wells was presented to receive the award.

The Young Farmers are active in numerous areas of agriculture, including the annual Wichita County Livestock Show. They not only coordinate the show, but also solicit funds to purchase animals at the auction.

The Chapter schedules speakers representing various facets of the agriculture industry at monthly meetings, to stay abreast of current trends and practices.

The most important activity of the Young Farmers in helping the Conservation District is their sponsorship of the meal in connection the district di-

rector election.

The Chapter began sponsoring the elections about seven years ago, and has been instrumental in boosting attendance and participation, virtually tripling the turnout since becoming involved.

Two Chapter members serve on the District's board of directors. Members also are active in the information program, finding time to assist in conservation programs with the local schools.

Listed on the meeting agenda is an item to accept a donation from the Junior High School Student Council to renovate the area between the cafeteria and new addition.

Regular monthly reports will be made, including taxes, cafeteria, transportation and enrollment.

Supt. Glen Mitchell also will ask the board to review calendars which might be adopted for the 1992-93 school year.

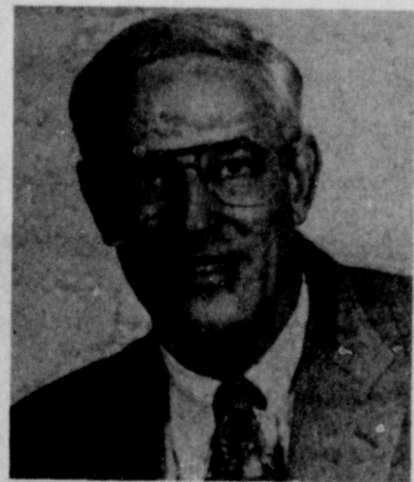

The recipes submitted by the couple are ones that both beginners and seasoned cooks will want to try. Daniel and Malisia agreed that their favorite is "Hamburger Cheese Casserole."

Hamburger Cheese Casserole

- 2 lbs. hamburger meat
- 1 large pkg. egg noodles
- Large amount of cheese
- 1/4 cup onion
- 3 Tbsp. bell pepper
- 2 Tbsp. bacon drippings
- 2 small cans tomato sauce
- 1 small can corn
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- Salt, pepper, garlic salt to taste

1. Grate a large amount of cheese.
2. Cook egg noodles in water until done.

3. Chop onion and bell pepper and brown in skillet with 2 tablespoons bacon drippings. Add hamburger meat and cook until done. Drain grease off meat.

4. Add to meat: can of cream of mushroom soup, tomato sauce, corn (drain water off corn). Add salt, pepper and garlic salt to taste.

In casserole dish, add half of noodles; pour half of meat mixture over noodles; cover with cheese. Repeat with noodles, meat mixture, and top with cheese. Bake 20 minutes in pre-heated 375 degree oven.

Poppy Seed Bread

- 3 cups flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 1/2 Tbsp. poppy seeds
- 2 1/4 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 cup oil
- 1 1/2 cup milk

- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 tsp. almond extract
- 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1 1/2 tsp. butter flavoring

Combine all ingredients and mix with an electric mixer one to two minutes. Pour into three small loaf pans (greased and floured). Bake at 350 degrees 50 minutes or until top cracks and toothpick comes clean.

Remove from pans. Poke holes in loaves with a fork and pour glaze over loaves while bread is still hot. (Put loaves on a cookie sheet and let glaze run over sides of bread.)

Glaze

- 1/4 cup orange juice
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. butter flavoring
- 1/2 tsp. almond extract
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract

Sour Cream Apple Pie

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 Tbsp. flour
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 egg
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 can apples

Combine all ingredients. Place in 9-inch pie shell and bake 15 minutes at 450 degrees. Lower oven temperature to 350 degrees and bake for an additional 30 minutes. Remove from oven.

Combine 1/3 cup sugar, 1/3 cup flour, 1 tsp. cinnamon, and 1/4 cup butter. Sprinkle over pie and return to oven for 20 minutes.

Smoked Sausage Jambalaya

- 1 cup instant rice
- 1 lb. smoked sausage
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 med. onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1 can Rotel tomatoes
- 4 drops hot pepper sauce
- 1/4 tsp. pepper

Cook rice according to directions. Heat skillet, coated with Pam, and add sausage, onion, green pepper, celery and pepper. Saute until veggies are tender. Add tomatoes and hot pepper sauce. Drain rice and stir into mixture. Cook over low heat, stirring frequently, until heated thoroughly. (Flavor is better after it has time to set.) Serves 4-6.

Hawaiian Banana Bread

- 3 cups flour
- 3 cups sugar
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 1 1/2 cups vegetable oil
- 2 cups mashed bananas
- 1 - 8 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
- 2 tps. vanilla

Combine dry ingredients; stir in nuts and set aside.

Combine remaining ingredients and add to the above, stirring until batter is moistened. Spoon batter into 2 greased and floured loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees 1 hour and 5 minutes or until done. Cool 10 minutes before removing from pans.

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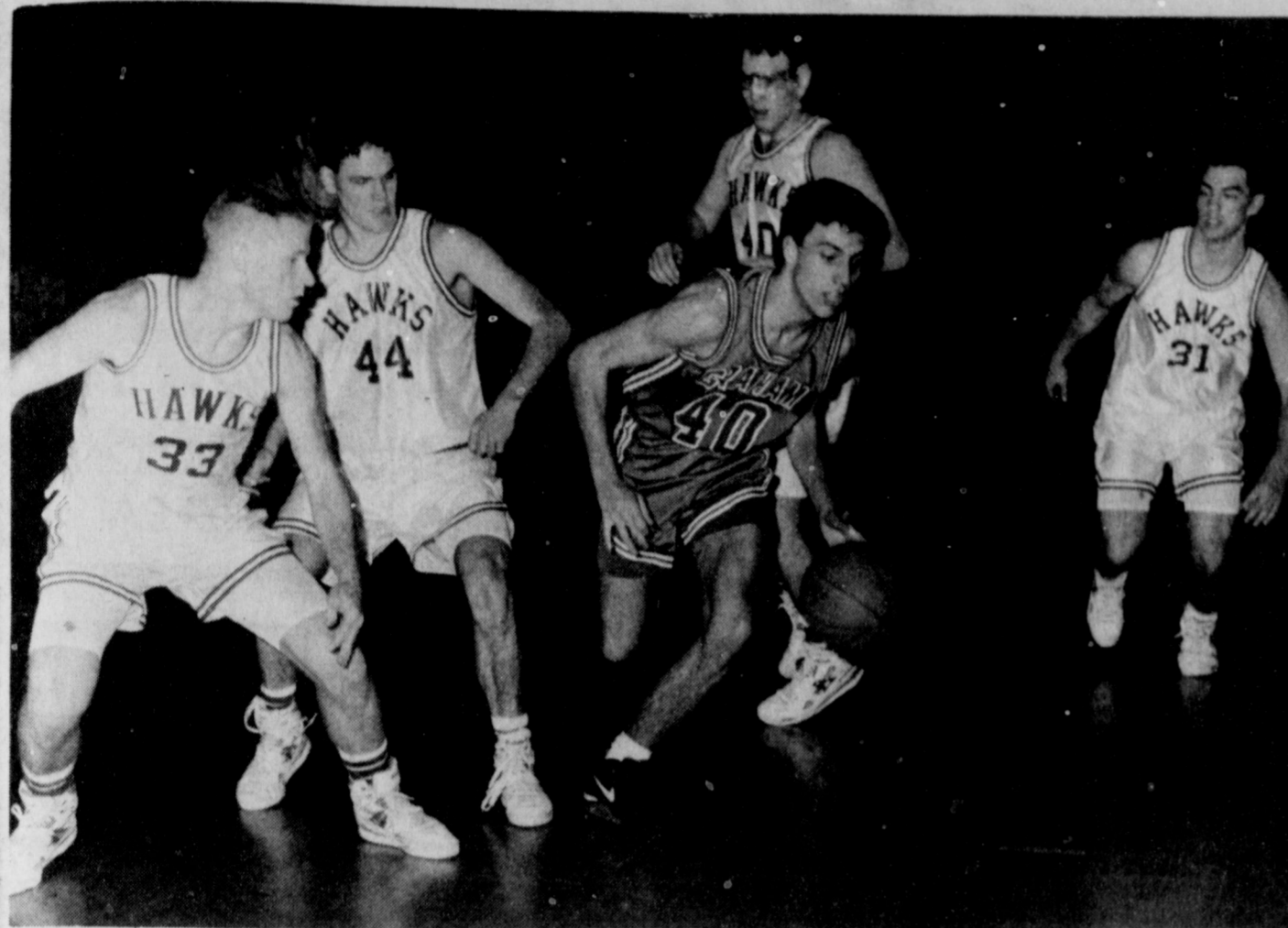
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DEFENSE WAS CREDITED WITH THE HAWKS' WIN OVER GRAHAM HERE FRIDAY

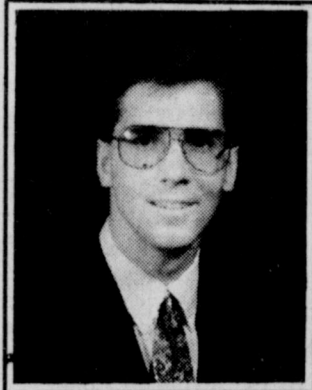
