Hawks needing win #2

A victory Friday night at Childress is of vital importance to the Hawks and coaching staff.

Besides improving their season record to 2-3, Coach Lucky Gamble knows a winning momentum is vital as the Hawks enter Dist. 4-AAA competition the following week against Graham.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. at Childress.

There are no advance tickets offered for sale, according to Richard Davis, Iowa Park High principal. But admission at the gate will only be \$3 for adults and \$1 for students, Davis said.

Childress mentor Charlie Johnston also would like a win, after his club dropped its first contest of the year last

week, 37-20 to Class AAAA Canyon Randall.

That was the team's first loss, having defeated Tulia 15-12, West Texas 20-13 and Quanah 26-0.

The two clubs met here last year for the first time since the Hawks' 41-14 victory in 1969.

But Johnston lost 23 lettermen from the club that not only beat Iowa Park 22-6 last year, but continued undefeated through 13 contests before finally losing out 42-6 to state champion Vernon in the quarterfinals.

Among those 23 no longer with the club is runningback Teddy Hopkins, who gave the Mean Green defense all it could handle.

But the scouting report now says

the back to watch most is senior quarterback Ryan Gerber, both because of his passing arm and running ability.

Three of the four returning starters for Childress, Otis Garcia (250), Anthony Salas (190) and Chad Poling were all-district performers.

Hawk quarterback Robert Denton wasn't fazed too much by the Childress defense last year, however. In that game, he completed 15 of 23 attempted passes for 134 yards.

It was still unknown early this week whether two key players on the Mean Green club would be available for the contest. Both are counted on heavily for offensive and defensive duty.

Todd Pulley saw action the second half last Friday only as a kicker after a nagging thigh bruise was aggravated.

And Jason Dudley, who plays both tight end and defensive end, suffered a shoulder bruise a couple of weeks ago and has been undergoing therapy so he can get back into action.

Despite their 1-3 record, the Hawks' offense is showing improvement on the scoreboard. After being held to single touchdowns against Burkburnett and Abilene Wylie, they racked up 35 points in the win against Decatur, and 18 last week against Clyde.

Defensively, the Hawks have been working hard to eliminate giving up the big play, which Coach Gamble attributes to inconsistency in concentration and effort on every play.

Homecoming weekend termed huge success

With but one exception, the general consensus was that this year's annual Iowa Park High School homecoming weekend rated among the largest and best ever.

The one exception was the Hawks' loss to Clyde in Friday's football game.

Many who have attempted to provide reasons for the large turnout Friday and Saturday have given excellent weather conditions, primarily because this year's homecoming was scheduled earlier in the fall than in most previous years.

Observers generally felt the first event, Thursday night's bonfire, was one of the largest and attracted as large or larger crowd than usual. (The embers of the fire continued smoldering until extinguished by firemen Tuesday.)

Seldom, if ever, has there been more floats entered in the homecoming parade held Friday afternoon. And the entire route was lined several persons deep along the sides of the streets.

Approximately 700 persons were fed hamburgers Thursday, compliments of State National Bank and prepared by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

Senior Melody Gray was crowned 1991 Homecoming Queen prior to the football game. The other candidates included Jan Parkey, Lisa Wiggins, Marcy McCarthy and Kelly Gridler.

Nina Quick was recognized as this year's "Coming Home Queen," by the Ex-Students Association, and received a mum from All Occasions.

Saturday's Whoop-T-Do crowd was as large or larger than in years past, according to those who have been involved over the 20 years of its existence.

Chamber of Commerce Secretary Susan Dillard said workers commented that the number of people, especially during the morning hours, was far greater than any year in the past.

During Saturday, Classes of 1931, '41, '51 and 61 held reunions.

At Saturday night's annual banquet held by the Ex-Students Association in the high school cafeteria, Lila Beasley and Ruth Reed, both of the Class of 1921, were recognized as the oldest graduates in attendance.

Utility tax on month's bills

Residents of Iowa Park likely will not be able to detect a new tax they will be billed this month, but it will be there.

The city council passed an ordinance in June, requiring the two utility companies, TU Electric and Lone Star Gas Co., to commence assessing a one-percent sales tax on their monthly bills.

As the money is needed during the year, the money will be withdrawn from Texpool, where it is earning approximately 10 percent interest.

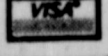
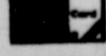
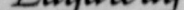
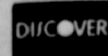
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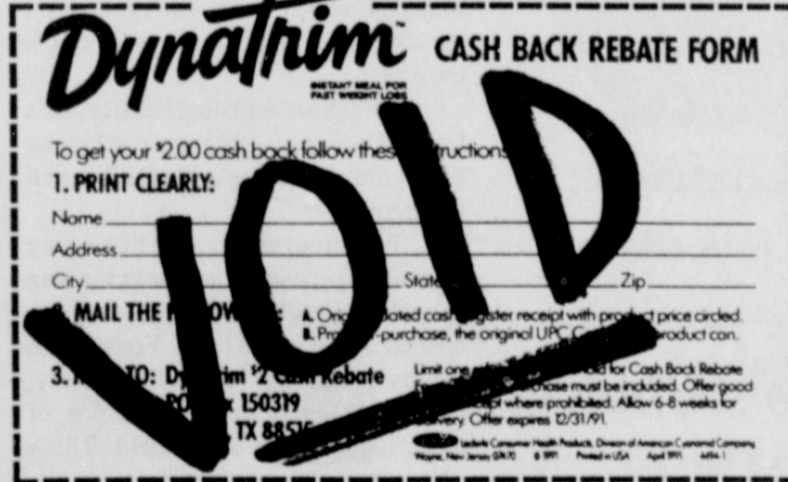
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As I See It . . .

I want to congratulate all of you who continue to re-elect all our state legislators year after year.

I was reminded how badly we needed them and the newly-passed \$2.7-billion in additional taxes as I filled up this week with gasoline en route to play a round of golf.

How, you might ask, did that remind me?

Well, it cost five cents per gallon more for my gasoline that I used to drive to La Vista Country Club where I play golf.

This new tax bill has added on a sales tax to my club's monthly dues bill. That really helped my feelings, because everything I pay for out there also is taxed.

In other words, I pay a tax so that I can pay more tax!

The only sensible thing that came out of the last session was the repeal of a tax to collect a tax.

That's right, the state no longer

charges businesses a \$25 annual fee in order to collect state sales taxes.

Oh, and there's another hidden tax we all will pay. Any equipment purchased for the city by a contractor, whenever the city has a project needed, the sales tax will be added onto that bill.

And another one will be that when we purchase manufactured items made by Texas industries, such as candy, bread and the like, we will have a hidden tax added to it. The wrapping is not considered a part of the product, and the industry has to pay sales tax on that wrapping. And that cost is passed on to you, the consumer.

And if you've already purchased your tickets for the Lee Greenwood and Paul Harvey events that will take place

during the Sheppard AFB 50th anniversary celebration, you saved money.

Sales tax, as of the first of this month, will be added onto all amusement and concert ticket sales.

It's amazing to me how our legislators can expect to continue cutting the state's contribution to public education, and still find \$2.7-billion additional monies are lacking.

It might not be a bad investment if that money is used to finance their retirement, so we could have a fresh approach to operating our state in the future.

In fact, based on the past eight years state tax increases, spending that much on their retirement might save us a lot of money by the year 2001.

Worth Quoting

Talk about obscure. Gregg Young isn't even profiled in the University of North Texas football media guide.

One can't find anything about him until page 29 of the guide, and then it only lists his name, position, height, weight, class and hometown.

And Saturday night at Fouts Field, he couldn't be seen with the naked eye.

He even had his number changed from 91 to 76 on the flip chart to make it even more difficult to locate him.

We in the press box had to use binoculars to spot him on the field, but it didn't take long for use to realize where all those holes in the offensive line were coming from.

See, Gregg Young is an offensive lineman, one of those guys you only hear about when the official gives a team 5-to-15 yards for illegal motion or holding.

But, ladies and gentlemen, Gregg Young might have been the most valuable player during UNT's 24-0 win over Abilene Christian University in the Eagles' season opener.

The 6-foot-4, 275-pound junior offensive tackle from Iowa Park actually would have shared the award with the rest of the offensive line.

Hard to find

Face it, being an offensive lineman won't make you a candidate for Big Man on Campus, and it won't get you on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* very often either.

It's kinda like being Paul Revere's horse. The horse -- bet you can't name him -- did all the work, but Paul got all the credit.

"We get our satisfaction by looking up and seeing one of our backs running down field for a 40-yard gain after we've opened a hole in the line," Young said, "or by watching Wendell (Mosely, UNT's quarterback) complete one of those long bombs down field. That's where our glory comes from in the game."

Any sports writer worth his salt couldn't help but notice it was the offensive line, Young and Scott Dukatnik in particular, that carved out those holes

Cryovac buys out competitor

Cryovac Division has acquired a food service packaging business, but its effects are not expected to be felt at the company's Iowa Park facility.

W.R. Grace & Co. announced an agreement in principle to acquire Du Pont Canada's U.S. and Canadian food service packaging business in a transaction valued at more than \$20 million.

The transaction, expected to be completed shortly, has received approval of the board of directors of Grace and Du Pont leadership and is subject to finalizing a definitive agreement.

Included are Du Pont Canada's vertical form fill seal equipment and plastic packaging materials sold for pumpable food applications in North America.

Grace's world-wide annual sales of packaging materials total about \$1.5 billion.

"The acquisition represents a significant commitment to the rapidly growing food service industry," said Donald H. Kohnken, Grace executive vice president.

"Equally important, however, is that this acquisition responds to and is consistent with Grace's publicly announced corporate strategy to divest non-strategic units and concentrate on high growth strategic businesses.

"The combination of the two businesses complements Grace's world class positions in other markets of the packaging industry," Kohnken continued.

An indication of the company's divesting activities was also announced recently.

Grace sold its Iowa-based Walnut Grove Products and Colorado-based Farr Better Feeds operations to the Nutrena Feed Division of Cargill.

W.R. Grace & Co., with corporate offices in Boca Raton, Fla., is the world's largest specialty chemicals company,

with leading positions in health care and other major niche businesses. Sales and revenues in 1990 approached \$7 billion.

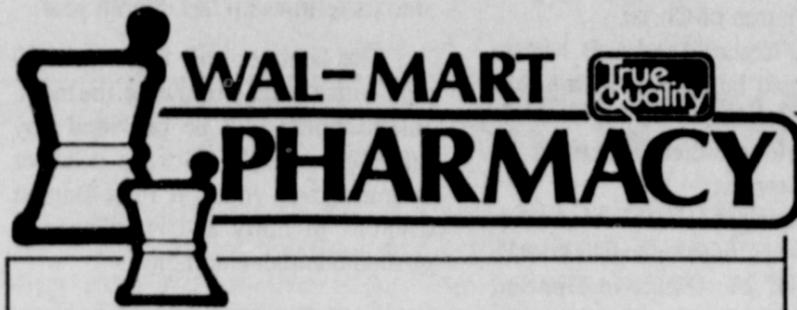

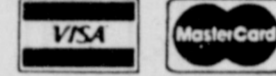

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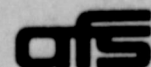


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Bulldogs speed past Hawks

Bulldog backs broke on four long runs. And scored on three of them. Those three TD runs accounted for 169 yards, more than the Mean Green defense had allowed Abilene Wylie. And, in fact, Clyde gained 359 yards on 49 carries, only 26 fewer yards than Burkburnett, Wylie and Decatur had accumulated.

But twice, after Clyde had lit up the scoreboard the final time with 8:40 remaining to play, Iowa Park had opportunities, and couldn't cash in on either.

The first was when they drove the final kickoff all the way from their own 31 to the Clyde 11, and, on fourth down and lacking a foot for a first, came up four inches short.

That was with 3:14 left on the clock.

Then, Clyde moved the ball out to the 'Dog's 45, and was forced to punt. The ball was snapped well over the punter's reach. He picked it up on the 15, and was able to kick it out of trouble, all the way to the Hawk 36.

Four incomplete passes during the next 24 ticks on the clock, and Clyde reclaimed possession to run out the clock and retain the victory.

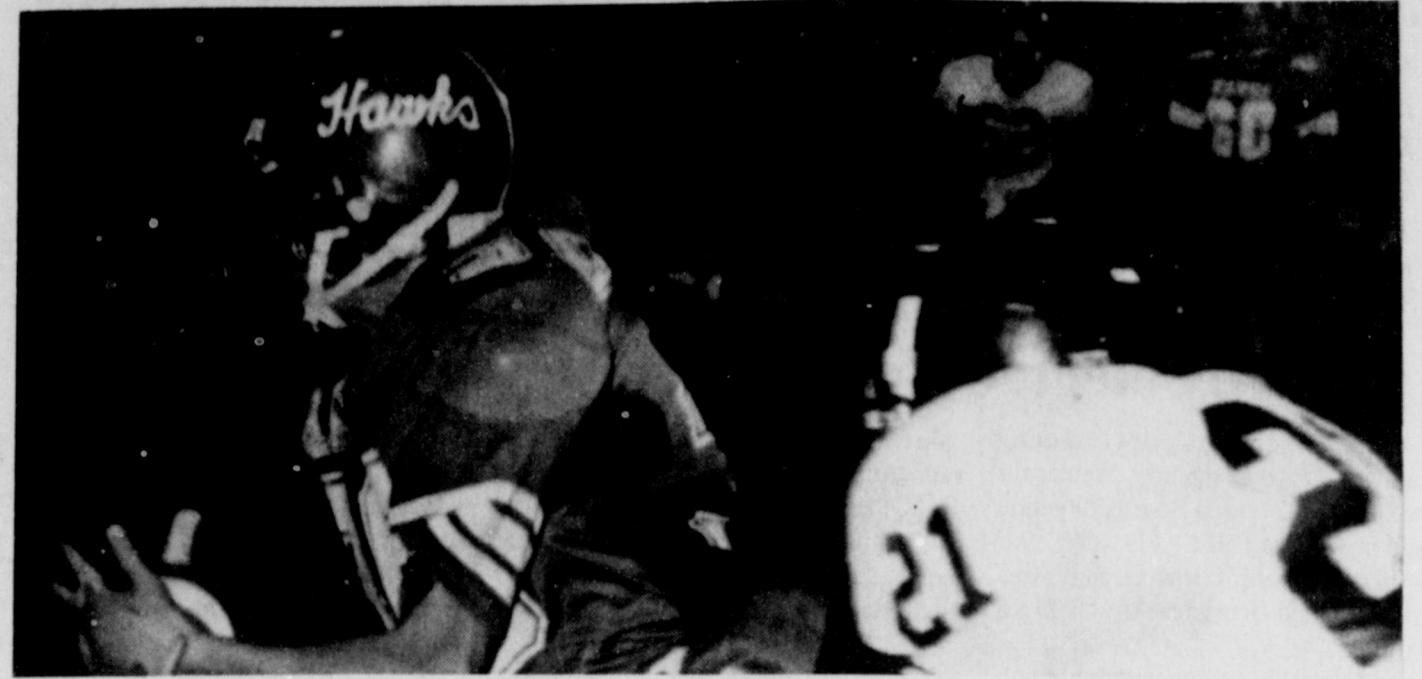
Todd Pulley put the Hawks in the lead initially, with a 21-yard field goal, after Iowa Park had taken the opening kickoff and moved the ball all the way to the Clyde four before stalling.

On their second possession, the Bulldogs lit up the scoreboard with a 62-yard draw play and added the extra point.

Early in the second period, Iowa Park drove to the Clyde eight yard line and quarterback Robert Denton had thrown to Mark de la Rosa for a gain right down to the goal line. But an interference call not only nullified the play, but put the ball back on the 25 yard line. Pulley attempted a 32-yard field goal, but missed.

Three plays later, Clyde raised the score to 14-3, this time on a 55-yard run and extra point. The clock showed 6:16 remaining until halftime.

The next three minutes had the crowd's attention, as possession changed four times. Denton attempted to pit the ball to a runner, it was tipped, and Clyde covered on the Hawk 17. Three plays later the visitors missed on a 32-yard field goal attempt, giving the Hawks possession on their 20.

On the first play, a handoff from Denton to Chris Williams was muffed, and Clyde covered the ball on the 21. But three plays later, Clyde attempted to pass, the ball was tipped by linebacker T.J. Bean, Pulley grabbed it and raced all the way to the Bulldog 15 before being dragged down from behind.

Joel McIlroy made a sliding catch of a Denton pass at the one. Then Denton scored on a quarterback keep over left guard. Pulley's extra point kick was called back on a five-yard motion penalty, but he easily cleared the bar on the next attempt, and the half ended with the Hawks trailing 14-10.

Clyde threatened to score twice more in the third period, but failed both times. The 'Dogs drove to the Hawk nine, and attempted to pass for the score. But it was intercepted by McIlroy, ending the threat. Later the Bulldogs turned over possession on the Hawk 11 after two big defensive plays stalled the drive.

Just before the start of the final period, Iowa Park began a drive from the Hawk 48, and climaxed it with a 15-yard pass from Denton to McIlroy.

That was followed by a trick play for the two-point conversion. The ball was snapped to Greg Steger, who was standing far to the left behind six linemen, and he scored to make the score 18-14 with 9:59 remaining in the game.

The following kickoff was fumbled by the Clyde receiver, at the Bulldog 28. But during the scramble for possession, Iowa Park was charged with an unsportsmanlike penalty which not only allowed Clyde to

retain possession, but moved the ball out to the 43.

Three plays later, Clyde broke for another of those long runs -- this time a 52-yarder -- for the go-ahead, 20-18 score. The extra point kick sailed right of the standards.

Clyde almost totally dominated control of the ball throughout the third quarter of the game. The Bulldogs ran 20 offensive plays and picked up five first downs, but failed to score. During that same period, Iowa Park got off only eight offensive plays and gained but one first down.

Pulley was unable to play, other than function as a kicker most of the second half after aggravating a thigh injury that sidelined him earlier in the season. Also sidelined with a shoulder injury was Jason Dudley, a tight end and defensive end.

Leading ground gainers for Iowa Park were de la Rosa, with 63 yards, and Steger, 47, both on 11 carries.

Denton had a .500 night passing, completing 10 of 20 attempts, including eight consecutive, for 47 yards. Among his receivers of record was guard Charles Jolly, who snatched a tipped pass out of the air, but was tackled for a two-yard loss.

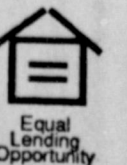

The daughters of Mr. and Mrs. James Foster returned from the State Fair with awards for their Angus entries after judging held over the weekend.

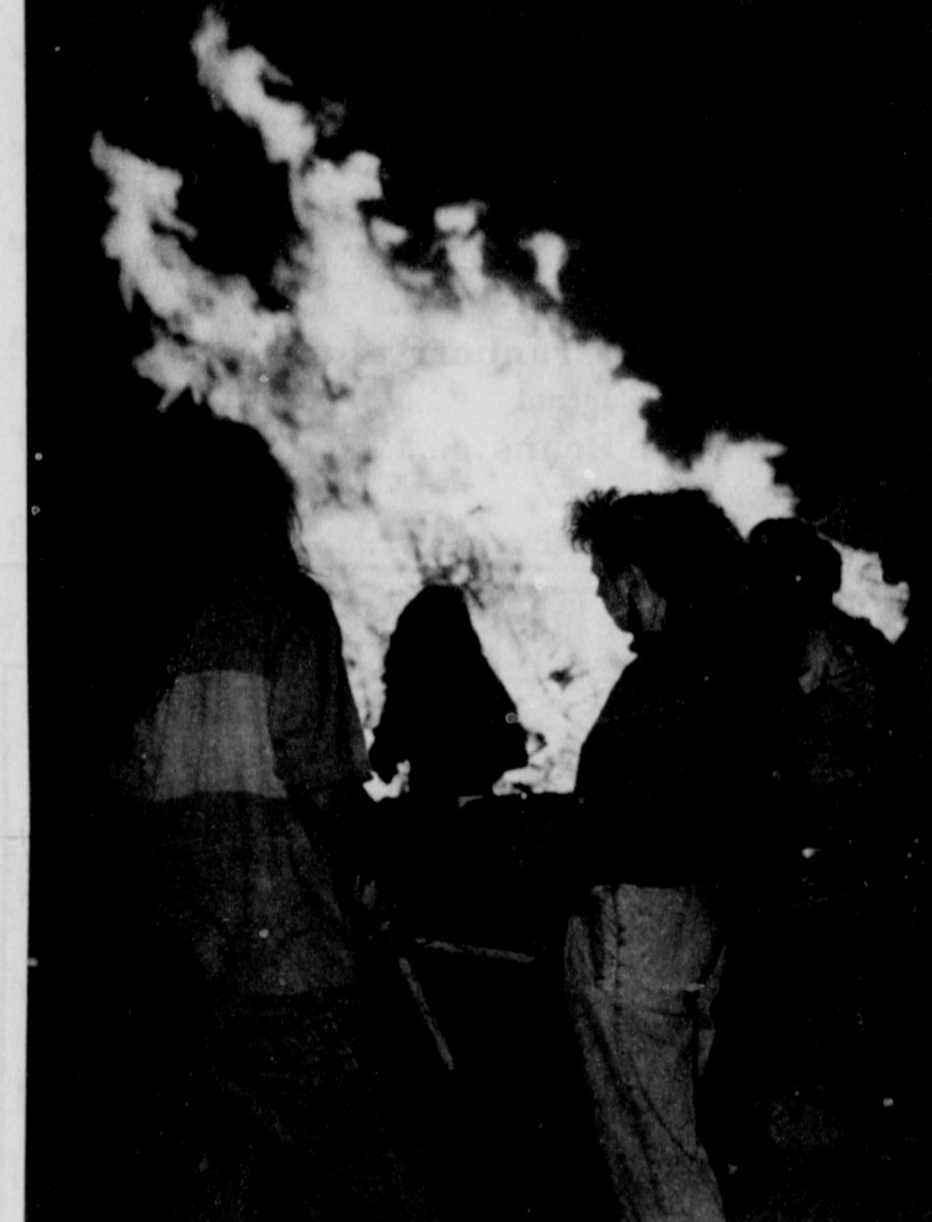
Alora showed the first place heifer in the junior Angus division, as well as second place in the late junior yearling class.
