Hawk quarterback Robert Denton wasn't fazed too much by the Childress defense last year, however. In that game, he completed 15 of 23 attempted passes for 134 yards.

Todd Pulley saw action the second half last Friday only as a kicker after a nagging thigh bruise was aggravated.

And Jason Dudley, who plays both tight end and defensive end, suffered a shoulder bruise a couple of weeks ago and has been undergoing therapy so he can get back into action.

Despite their 1-3 record, the Hawks' offense is showing improvement on the scoreboard. After being held to single touchdowns against Burkburnett and Abilene Wylie, they racked up 35 points in the win against Decatur, and 18 last week against Clyde.

Defensively, the Hawks have been working hard to eliminate giving up the big play, which Coach Gamble attributes to inconsistency in concentration and effort on every play.

# Utility tax on month's bills

Residents of Iowa Park likely will not be able to detect a new tax they will be billed this month, but it will be there.

The city council passed an ordinance in June, requiring the two utility companies, TU Electric and Lone Star Gas Co., to commence assessing a one-

percent sales tax on their monthly bills. The lag time between passage of the ordinance and implementation by

the utilities was necessary because of time required for the companies to incorporate the collecting feature into their computer programs. Thus, a resident who may have

been charged \$100 total for both natural gas and electricity consumed during the past month will have a total of an additional dollar added onto the bill.

The ordinance was approved at the June 10 council meeting.





An indication of the company's divesting activities was also announced recently.

Grace sold its Iowa-based Walnut Grove Products and Colorado-based Farr Better Feeds operations to the Nutrena Feed Division of Cargill.



# SCIATICA

Sciatica can be a severely painful condition. It is caused by irritation of the sciatic nerve, a nerve which runs from the lower back through the hip and down the leg. The sciatic nerve is the largest nerve in the body, as anyone who has had sciatica can attest. The most common cause of sciatica is pinching or irritation of the nerve in the lower spine. Slipping of a disc, subluxation or minor misalignment of spinal joint, bone spurs or combinations of all of these problems are the typical causes of sciatica nerve

Sciatica is one of the most common conditions for which back surgery is recomended. Back surgery however, is only successful about 60% of the time and has a fairly high risk of complications. More recent interest in nonsurgical treatments for sciatic nerve pain has caused several researchers to look at chiropractic manipulation as an alternative. Researchers at St. Thomas Hospital recently reported the results of their study for back and sciatic nerve pain in the British Journal Of Rheumatology. They found manipulation to be the single most effective treatment in the 513 patients studied.

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# Bulldogs speed past Hawks

Speed -- Clyde's advantage going into Friday night's homecoming game that had the Hawk coaching staff most concerned -proved to be Iowa Park's 20-18 downfall.

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You can trust us even if you can't

trust the weather.

Bulldog backs broke on four long runs. And scored on three of them. Those three TD runs accounted for 169 yards, more than the Mean Green defense had allowed Abilene Wylie. And, in fact, Clyde gained 359 yards on 49 carries, only 26 fewer yards than Burkburnett, Wylie and Decatur had accumulated.

But twice, after Clyde had lit up the scoreboard the final time with 8:40 remaining to play, Iowa Park had opportunities, and couldn't cash in on either.

The first was when they drove the final kickoff all the way from their own 31 to the Clyde 11, and, on fourth down and lacking a foot for a first, came up four inches short.

That was with 3:14 left on the clock.

Then, Clyde moved the ball out to the 'Dog's 45, and was forced to punt. The ball was snapped well over the punter's reach. He picked it up on the 15, and was able to kick it out of trouble, all the way to the

Four incomplete passes during the next 24 ticks on the clock, and Clyde reclaimed possession to run out the clock and retain the


Todd Pulley put the Hawks in the lead initially, with a 21-yard field goal, after Iowa Park had taken the opening kickoff and moved the ball all the way to the Clyde four before stalling.

On their second possession, the Bulldogs lit up the scoreboard with a 62-yard draw play and added the extra point.

Early in the second period, Iowa Park drove to the Clyde eight yard line and quarterback Robert Denton had thrown to Mark de la Rosa for a gain right down to the goal line. But an interference call not only nullified the play, but put the ball back on the 25 yard line. Pulley attempted a 32-yard field goal, but missed.

Three plays later, Clyde raised the score to 14-3, this time on a 55-yard run and extra point. The clock showed 6:16 remaining until halftime.

The next three minutes had the crowd's attention, as possession changed four times. Denton attempted to pit the ball to a runner, it was tipped, and Clyde covered on the Hawk 17. Three plays later the visitors missed on a 32-yard field goal attempt, giving the Hawks possession on their 20.

On the first play, a handoff from Denton to Chris Williams was muffed, and Clyde covered the ball on the 21. But three plays later, Clyde attempted to pass, the ball was tipped by linebacker T.J. Bean, Pulley grabbed it and raced all the way to the Bulldog 15 before being dragged down from

Joel McIlroy made a sliding catch of a Denton pass at the one. Then Denton scored on a quarterback keep over left guard. Pulley's extra point kick was called back on a five-yard motion penalty, but he easily cleared the bar on the next attempt, and the half ended with the Hawks trailing 14-10.

Clyde threatened to score twice more in the third period, but failed both times. The 'Dogs drove to the Hawk nine, and attempted to pass for the score. But it was intercepted by McIlroy, ending the threat. Later the Bulldogs turned over possession on the Hawk 11 after two big defensive plays stalled the drive.

Just before the start of the final period, Iowa Park began a drive from the Hawk 48, and climaxed it with a 15-yard pass from Denton to McIlroy.

That was followed by a trick play for the two-point conversion. The ball was snapped to Greg Steger, who was standing far to the left behind six linemen, and he scored to make the score 18-14 with 9:59 remaining in

The following kickoff was fumbled by the Clyde receiver, at the Bulldog 28. But during the scramble for possession, Iowa Park was charged with an unsportsmanlike penalty which not only allowed Clyde to

retain possession, but moved the ball out to

Three plays later, Clyde broke for another of those long runs -- this time a 52yarder -- for the go-ahead, 20-18 score. The extra point kick sailed right of the standards.


Clyde almost totally dominated control of the ball throughout the third quarter of the game. The Bulldogs ran 20 offensive plays and picked up five first downs, but failed to score. During that same period, Iowa Park got off only eight offensive plays and gained but one first down.

Denton had a .500 night passing, completing 10 of 20 attempts, including eight consecutive, for 47 yards. Among his receivers of record was guard Charles Jolly, who snatched a tipped pass out of the air, but was tackled for a two-yard loss.


