"Whatever the claimed justifications, this problem of men deserting their wives and the comparable one of wive deserting their husbands is of such proportion that is now can be labeled epidemic. The epidemic has been fueled by some of the larger Protestant churches. As Richard Brookhiser phrased it in the August 26 Time essay. "Traditional structures against homosexuality, premarital sex (once called fornication), even adultery, are up to the theological debate... What we are witnessing is in fact a clash between two earnest and articulated theological impulses. Traditionalists and innovators disagree about sex because they disagree about the universe and about God." Mr. Brookhiser is correct in pointing to a changed view of God as the source of the current sexual revolution.
Many, even in the Many, even in the churches, no longer accept an authoritative God who has revealed an authoritative word. Once this mindset is given, it is a small step to compromise moral conviction in favor of the mores of scciety.
"By doing this we buy into a betraying concept of romantic love and sexual expression which is contrary to Bible teaching. To address the problem, Christians must recommit themselves to the authority of God, seeking a better understanding and application of His will for this part of their lives.
God has not been silent regarding sex. Genesis reveals the physical attraction between man and woman as placed by God in the nature of both sexes. In teaching that man and woman are to "become one flesh" (Genesis 2:24) portrays a degree of intimacy which is unequalled in all of infes other expressions. This fundamental ingredient is flesh and each accepting this sharing of themselves as a lifetime commitment."
