## City buying 3 vehicles

Action by the city council Monday night will lead to the purchase of three new vehicles.

Aldermen accepted the low bids on an automobile for the public works director and pickup for the water meter reader.

Both low bids were submitted by Karl Klement Ford of Decatur: \$11,900 for the 1992 Taurus L car; \$8,200 for the 1992 Ranger pickup.

The third vehicle will be a police cruiser which will be included in a joint purchase by the City of Wichita Falls.

Aldermen authorized Administrator Gary Jones to enter into a joint purchase agreement with the neighboring city.

The cruiser will be a 1992, to cost \$13,100, also will be supplied by the Klement dealership.

By a split vote, the council nixed a proposal to increase the annual individual dumping permits at the landfill.

Mayor Wayne House had proposed the annual fee be increased to \$12, from its present cost of \$2.

Voting to not change the fee were Johnny Crawford, Charlie Helms and Mark Raby. Virgil Woodfin and Bob Hamilton voted in opposition.

Unanimous approval was given for the expenditure of up to \$5,000 with which to purchase playground equipment for at least three city parks.

To be placed in Hope, Oscar and Crawford parks, the equipment is the first purchased since the early 1980s.

Final action was taken to annex a nine-acre tract of land on FM 368 south of the city, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Smith. A series of three hearings were held before the final ordinance could be approved.

During the hearings, no negative comments were ever made from the audience.

Tens of thousands of dollars likely will be expended on a major maintenance project at the city's sewer treatment plant.

The plant has operated over 20 years without ever having been shut down for maintenance, it was explained, and problems are arising which must be

## Two die in one-vehicle wreck

A one-vehicle wreck on the Pacific Ave. overpass about 8 o'clock Friday night took the lives of two children.

The two youths and an older brother were uncovered by emergency workers from beneath the pickup and camper shell in which they were riding.

The family, including five children, was enroute to their Edinburg home after having visited with relatives in Quanah.

As the 1967 Dodge pickup reached the US 287 overpass at Pacific, the right rear wheel broke away. That apparently

led to the accident.

The incident happened while the truck was in the right-hand lane. Marks dug by the axle plate indicate the vehicle was pulled into the left lane.

As the vehicle was about to strike the guard rail, the driver apparently attempted to steer it back to the right. The bare plate and heavy metal bumper dug into the asphalt, causing the truck to flip onto its top.

The two adults and two children in the cab were thrown onto the pavement, where they were discovered by oncoming traffic, and Randy Davis, who was in the Expressway Restaurant and rushed to their aid.

As police, emergency workers and volunteers arrived, they immediately launched a search for the three missing children. Unable to find them outside the vehicle, they began searching the inside of the camper.

One of the men with a flashlight got down on the pavement, and saw what he believed to be a child pinned inside.

Men began tearing the outer shell of the camper away, and then literally picked the bed of the truck up and pivoted it around to expose the shell's interior.

There, among the family's belongings, lay three youngsters. Two of them were pronounced dead at the scene. The third had at least a leg injury, and was transported with the other survivors by ambulance to hospitals in Wichita Falls.

The driver was Jefferson Lee Davis, 40. Maria Carrasquillo, 25, was identified as the mother of the five children.

The deceased were listed as Jessie Carrasquillo, eight, and Saraie Lewis Gonzales, four months.

The other children's names and ages were Albert Carrasquillo, six; Christina Carrasquillo, four, and Dixie Lee Lewis, one.

All south-bound traffic was routed around the overpass, as the rescue, investigation and cleanup lasted approximately two hours.

One lug bolt was missing from the axle plate, three were sheered off, and no lug nut was on the other bolt.

The three remaining wheels were of aluminum.

It was not until Tuesday afternoon that the missing wheel was found, and because it was in an area which had been searched that night and the next day, it is believed someone found it elsewhere and returned it to the scene.

Two dump trucks and a backhoe of the highway department were needed to clean up the debris which remained after salvagable belongings were put in bags and placed in the pickup bed.

Davis, the driver, was reportedly suffering from an injury before the wreck. He is said to have sustained a gunshot to his right leg in a family disturbance at Quanah.

The injury explains why a metal cane was inside the cab when it was wrecked.

Because some empty and full cans of beer also were in the cab, the driver's blood is being tested.

Police say two counts of involuntary manslaughter are pending against Davis.

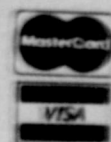
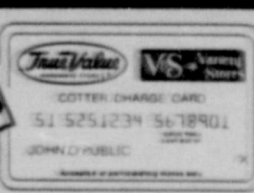

# Harper, Haddock vows exchanged Saturday in double-ring ceremony

Wearing an exquisite wedding gown of elegant white taffeta embellished with imported alencon lace reembroidered lavishly with pearls, Miss Cynthia Ann Harper became the bride of Matthew Ernest Haddock in a ceremony performed Saturday evening at the Faith Baptist Church. Dr. Floyd E. Haddock, father of the groom, officiated the double-ring ceremony.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert O. Harper of Iowa Park and the groom is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Floyd E. Haddock of Marvel.

Presented in marriage by her father, the bride reflected her happiness in her gown fashioned with a contrasting fitted, shaped and dropped bodice of lace featuring a bateau neckline with a small pearl-button back closing from neckline to waistline. The long fitted sleeves closed at the top, dipped low over the hands and closed at the wrists with small pearl buttons. Her full skirt featured a detachable train that swept to chapel length.

The bride wore a floor length veil of bridal illusion that fell from a caplet lavishly embroidered with pearls. She carried a bouquet of fresh red roses and greenery on a Bible covered with white taffeta overlaid with pearl-embroidered lace.

She played "Prelude in Classic Style" for the attendants to take their places in the nuptial space, then changed to "Trumpet In D Major" for the bride and her father to walk to the altar.

During the service, Clay Morgan, pianist, furnished accompaniment for solo renditions by Buddy Mercer and Marcus Haddock. The first sang "On My Way To You," and the latter, who is a brother of the groom, sang "The Lord's Prayer."

The bride was attended by Miss Tina Escue of Bowie as maid of honor, and by Mrs. Scott Young of Dallas and Mrs. Terry Escue of Lubbock as bridesmaids. They wore identical street-length fitted sheath dresses with princess seaming. In design, they featured bateau necklines, short puffed sleeves with rhinestones highlighting the pleated detail just above the elbows. Each carried a long-stemmed fresh red rose.

The groom, his attendants and ushers wore black tuxedos with white shirts. The groom wore a white rose boutonniere and the others wore red rose boutonnieres.

Bob Green of Lubbock stood by the groom as best man, and the groomsmen were Chad Floyd of Lubbock and Tony Carter of Seagraves. Guests were ushered and seated by James Harper of Iowa Park, brother of the bride.

For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Harper chose a cranberry and jacquard fabric dress designed with a surplice neckline, straight skirt with draped front, long sleeves with pleat cap, rhinestones and pearl buttoned cuffs, and self-fabric belt with a rhinestone buckle.

# As I See It...

Well, they didn't get the West Highway widening project completed by last weekend, as I had been told. But by Wednesday, all the thoroughfare's surfacing with asphalt appeared to be complete.

Now, all that's left is the surfacing of the many street and driveway approaches -- those with the gravel still exposed -- and the markings with paint.

Maybe some other touchups also are yet to be completed.

But, almost 24 months after the first work on the project was started, we've got us a widened major roadway.

Now comes the hard part for some of our local drivers: recognizing and using that center lane ONLY as a left turn area.

It is not a passing lane, folks. Let me explain.

The first three-lane roadway I ever saw was when the highway department expanded the old Highway 60 stretch between Amarillo and Canyon, back in

the late 1940s.

It had always been two lanes, and some of the minds down at Austin figured they could assist motorists who were caught behind slow-moving trucks (I seem to recall a truck's speed limit in those days was about 50 miles per hour).

How to do it? Make a passing lane. After all, it was cheaper than constructing two lanes, making it a four-lane, which was almost unheard of back in those days.

That center lane became a death trap.

South-bound drivers would whip out around a slower driver about the same time a north-bound driver got the same idea. And there they met.

In only a few short years, someone had marked each of the head-on death sites with roadside crosses. One cross for each life lost.

That roadside soon began to resemble Arlington Cemetery.

The pressure soon paid off, and, finally, that heavily-traveled highway was widened to four lanes.

So, that's why no one should attempt to use West Highway's center lane as a passing lane.

It is to be used only as a place to stop while waiting for on-coming traffic to pass, and proceed with a safe left turn.

My column last week got some readership, and results.

Our neighboring paper finally did a story on the Wichita Falls High boys' basketball coach and his hearing with the district committee for violating a UIL rule.

The story, however, appeared on the sports pages, and not at the top of the

front page, as did the two stories about our coach, Lucky Gamble.

Anyway, one of our readers called a coach on the WFHS staff and read it to him. He, in turn, called me.

This guy, and I won't name him, was very polite, pleasant and helpful. He wanted to let me know that my column was basically correct, but had a point to be corrected.

The infraction to which I referred to was that the Coyote basketball team held a scrimmage on the Saturday before the first Monday permitted by the UIL.

The infraction was not as I had said, that the team held practices before the first date permitted by the rules.

I'll admit my mistakes, and told the coach that I appreciated the information.

And, because of the column, Iowa Park almost -- almost -- almost -- got fair treatment from Brand X.

Police could find no paperwork or evidence that Davis had either insurance or a valid drivers license.

The bodies of the two children were flown to McAllen, to be buried in Pharr. A Wichita Falls businessman reportedly volunteered to fly the two adults and one child there also.

Relatives from Quanah transported the other children to the South Texas city.

Iowa Park Police investigator Ray Smock said he had determined the man's real name and age to be Ronald Lee Lewis, born June 15, 1950.

Smock could not explain why a false name was given originally, but said yesterday afternoon he was investigating further.

Another mystery connected with the accident is the odor of the fuel that spilled from the pickup's tank while it was turned upside down.

Several around the scene questioned the odor, saying it did not smell like gasoline.

Finally, two of the volunteer firemen said they believed it to be the odor of paint thinner.

## Trustees to meet Monday

Iowa Park school district trustees will hear a report on how their students are testing, in comparison with other schools of comparable size, when they meet Monday evening.

The meeting will be held at 8 p.m. in the junior high library.

The newly-mandated Academic Excellence Indicator System District Report is supposed to analyze how local students are doing, in comparison with similar districts.

The report was mandated by the legislature in its latest school reform action.

Immediate area schools may not be included in the report along with Iowa Park, however. The comparison is sup-

posedly made of districts with similar enrollment, as well as economic and ethnic makeup.

Trustees are to act on bids for copy machine toner, and requests for student transfers, as well as a request for use of the junior high gymnasium for a tournament.

At least three policy revisions are to be considered, according to the agenda, as well as adoption of "administrator evaluation instruments."

addressed, the council was told by an engineer.

Because the city has no alternate where sewage can be put while the maintenance is being done, a permit is being sought from the state to dig a two-acre shallow pond where it can be held for short periods of time.

Recognizing the need, the council was united in agreement to proceed with the application, as well as making plans and purchases for the repair work. State approval is not expected in less than three months, and then the lagoon construction will require three or four months, aldermen were told.

The plan is for the raw sewage to be pumped back into the plant for treating, after repairs are made.

But complete repairs may require more than one shutdown, and each shutdown will last two to three days.

Mayor House said he had appointed Gary Jones, Woodfin, Mike Price, Wayne Parsons, Sue Manes and Jay Cantrell to serve on a self evaluation committee for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Though no formal action was taken on a request by Graig Toby of Grapevine, to de-annex a 16-acre tract of land in the northeast part of the city, the consensus of the council appeared to be negative.

## Sales taxes up for year

Sales taxes generated by Iowa Park businesses have exceeded 1990 by 4.88 percent, according to the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park's rebate check from the state this month was \$11,124.78, raising the year's total to \$169,674.88.

For the same period last year, the total was \$161,785.58.

This month's rebate check is for taxes collected by local businesses in October and reported in November.

2 cups sugar  
Add 4 eggs, one at a time, beating well after each.

1 lb. candied orange slices, cut up  
1 cup chopped dates  
2 cups chopped pecans  
2 cups Angel Flake coconut

Mix well and pour into greased and floured 10-inch tube pan. Bake 2 hours at 300 degrees.

### Glaze

2 cups powdered sugar  
1 cup orange juice  
Stir well, and slowly pour over hot cake. Leave in pan overnight. NOTE: To store, wrap in clean cloth well saturated with apricot brandy and then in foil or covered container. For gift giving, may bake in small loaf pans.

For best results, bake 2 weeks before and freeze it till needed.

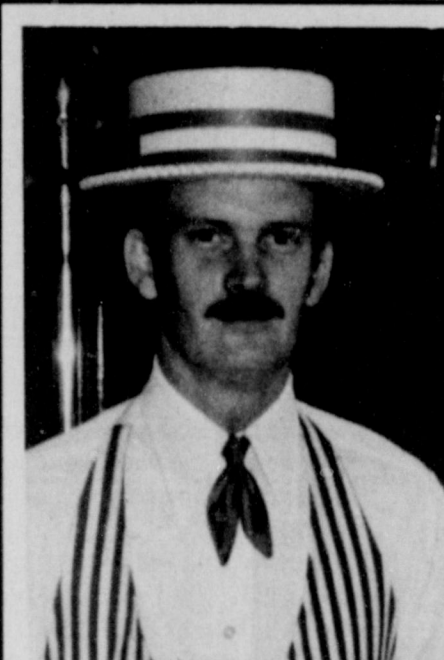

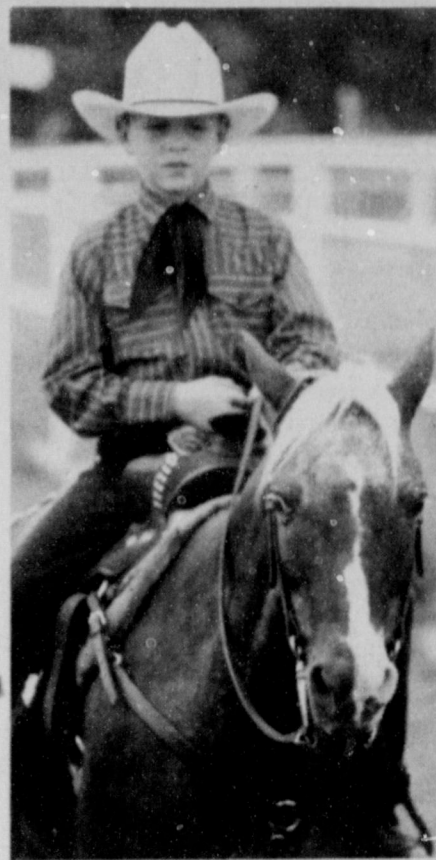

## SCHOOL SCENE

Information prepared by Iowa Park School Counselors

Study time at home can often be a struggle for both students and parents! Everyone concerned is interested in the same outcome -- for the student to be successful in school. Studying at home does not have to be stressful if a few strategies such as the ones discussed below are followed.

Children need a place to study. Whether you live in a one-bedroom apartment or a sprawling ranchhouse, you can set aside a study area. It can be a desk in a bedroom, or the kitchen table. But it must be fairly quiet with good light.

Children also need a time for studying. Help your children create schedules. If they set aside time for chores, work, fun, and study on a weekly basis, they can make better use of their time. These schedules should be flexible enough to allow trade-offs and shifts when necessary. Once a place and time are set for studying, the following steps should help:

**PREVIEWING MATERIAL.** Encourage children to begin an assignment by previewing the material -- for example, by reading the introduction to a chapter, the headings, and summary. This is like looking at a road map. Here they create a mental "map" of what is ahead. They complete the "map's" details when they read the chapter.

**READING AND THINKING.** When reading the chapter, they should try to fit details into their mental "map." It helps if they pause before each new section to "test" their understanding. Using the strategies for learning and remembering, they can ask: "What conclusions can I draw from them? How should I categorize the information? Do I see analogies? What are the main ideas?"

**TAKING NOTES.** Children can't remember everything they read. It will help them, though, to take notes of the main points. These notes serve as a summary of the most important points.

The act of taking them and reviewing them will help the student to categorize the material, understand, and remember it. And the notes will help in preparing for tests.

**SELF-TESTING.** Children should test themselves to see what they know and don't know. They can then apply their study time more efficiently to the sections on which they are weakest. You can help by making up test questions, for example, "What are the chief food products of the country being studied? Why? Do we use these in our home?"

**PREPARING FOR TESTS.** Encourage your children to prepare for tests by spacing studying over days or weeks. They should make sure they understand the material and relate it to what they already know. They should review it more than once. "Cramming" the night before is not a good idea, and it is important to get a good night's sleep.

These steps to success in studying can help all students -- from elementary to high school. They can help poor students improve, and they can help good students get better.

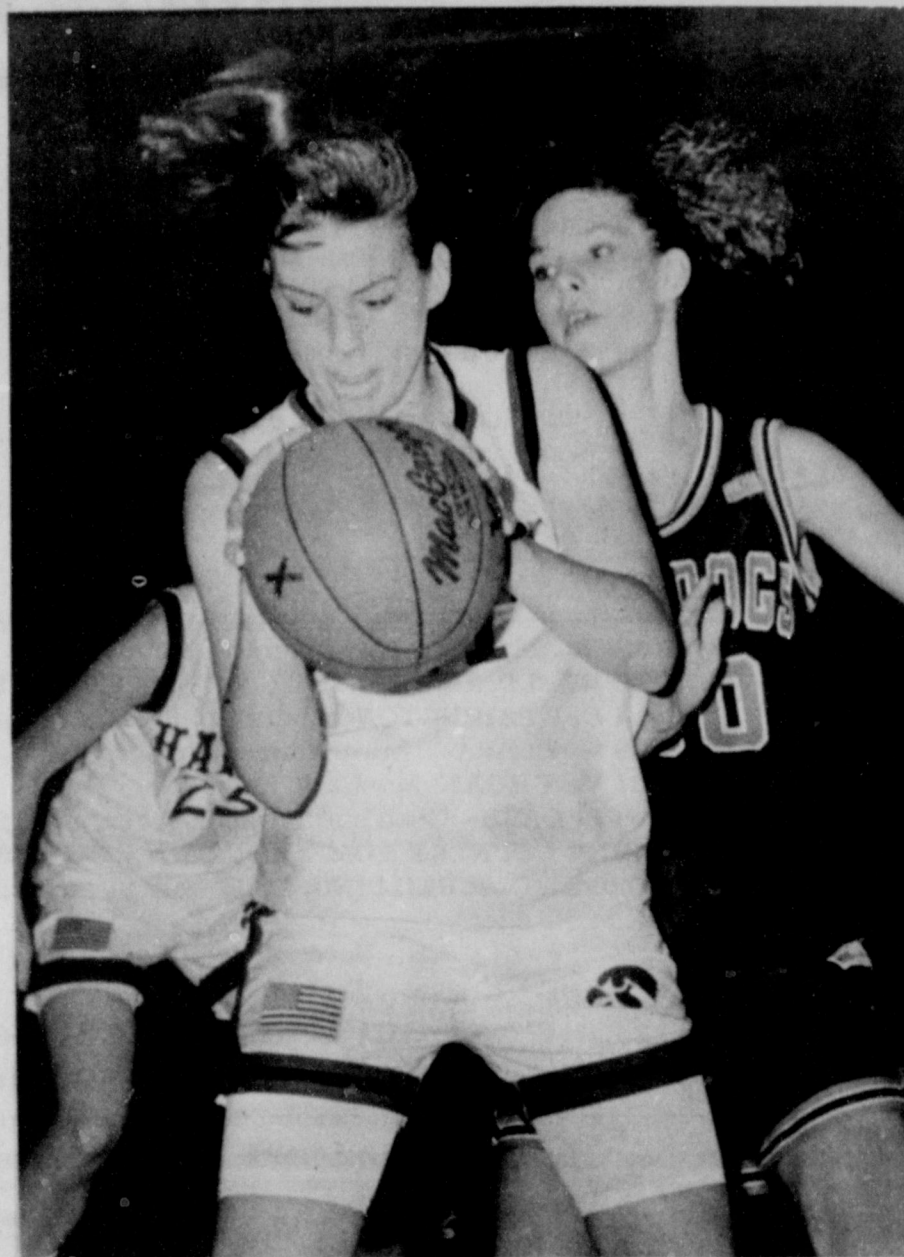



Thirty-two United Way agencies in Iowa Park, Burkburnett, Sheppard AFB and Wichita Falls received funding commitments Thursday for 1991-92. Announcement of the funding recommendations followed two weeks of budget and allocations conferences between agency representatives and United Way community volunteers. "We changed our allocations process slightly this year," said Jamie Henderson, committee chairman. "Agencies met with one of four panels of volunteers rather than the entire budget and allocations committee. Each
