## Fire Destroys Home, Shower Set July 26

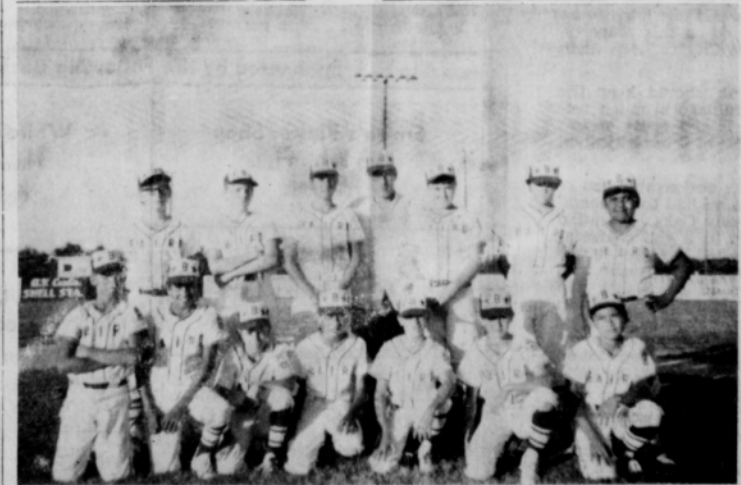

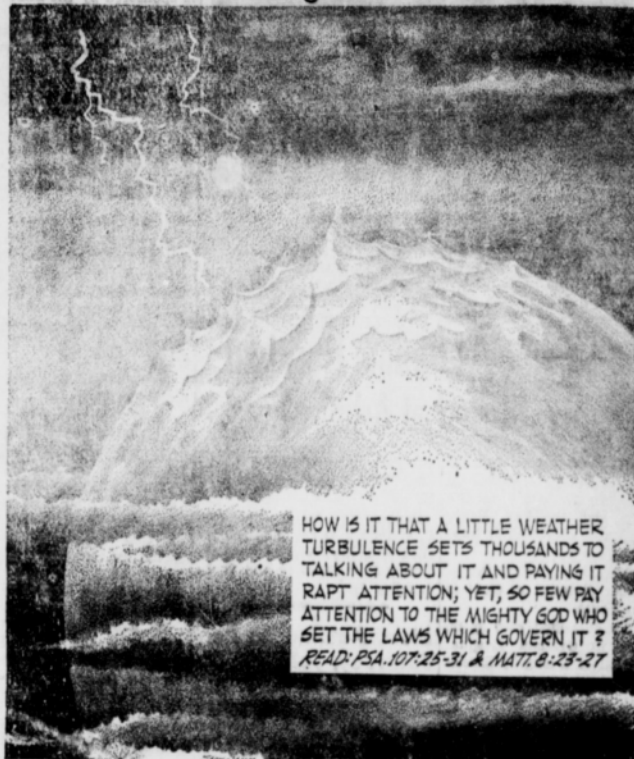

# TO THE CITIZENS OF BAIRD -

I write these first few paragraphs to explain the operation of the Government of the City of Baird. There are five Councilmen and your Mayor, elected by you, the people. We have a City Secretary and a City Superintendent. The City Secretary and Superintendent receive their instructions from said City Councilmen. Your Mayor, under this type of Government is the administrator of the affairs.

The Mayor then appoints a Councilman to head the various departments. This is fine, since an employee cannot take orders from five different individuals each day. The Departments are: Electrical, Sewer and Water, Park, Recreation and Cemetery, and Streets.

I am your Street Commissioner, but this is actually a joke. I turn the numerous complaints over to the man in charge of the actual work, but that is where my authority, if any, ends. So if the rough streets, rough alleys, or drainage problem is not corrected, as far as I am concerned it is right back where it started, the City Council and your Mayor.

I do not believe we, your City Commission, are representing the Citizens of Baird properly when we do not get together, decide what problems should be corrected or improved, and see that it is carried out.

Now I would like to discuss how the Citizens of Baird can be of help to the City Officials in solving some of the many problems we face.

In my opinion each business firm should have weeds cut in front and rear of their businesses. I do not believe it would be too much trouble for us to clean a little of the street or alley adjoining our home or business to make things more attractive.

A major problem in Baird is the vacant lots and buildings, someone owns these lots and buildings, and should keep the area around them clean, not the City.

There is a problem with non-resident lot owners, these lots are an eye-sore, but there is very little tax money collected on this property, therefore it is practically a dead expense for the City to keep them clean.

I will admit that we, your City Government, should keep the streets, alleys and ditches created by improper drainage in much better condition than they are at present. There is also a lot or two owned by the City that are not very good examples of a beautification program.

Now, I wish to give credit where credit is due, and remind you of a project that would not have been possible unless we had the cooperation of the City of Baird. The "againers" are now just as proud as these who worked and should welcome more opportunities to work for the betterment of Baird. Too often people are quick to forget that gains are made by hard working people, and future gains are only made by more work and effort by more people. Gains that give opportunities to you and adults.

Something CAN be done for the City in areas of beautification and maintenance by a concerted and unified effort, work, and cooperation of both you, the Citizens, and your City Government.

## New Conservation Practice In Farming, Minimum Tillage

A New Conservation Practice - It's minimum tillage, sometimes called no-till or mulch tillage. It's a new system of farming where residues from a previous crop are left on or near the surface throughout the cropping year, according to James Glynn, AC, SCS, Brownwood.

This better, faster, cheaper practice reduces erosion up to 95 percent. Glynn says specific advantages of minimum tillage are less labor, lower production cost, more moisture conservation, less soil erosion, protection from wind damage, and more food and cover for wildlife.

Here's how mulch tillage differs from conventional farming. In one trip across a field, a farmer simultaneously prepares a seedbed, plants his seed, applies fertilizer, and adds herbicides for weed control while disturbing only a small portion of the soil surface. In conventional methods, 6 to 10 trips are often required to do the same job, and almost all surface soil is disturbed on each trip; each soil disturbance destroys residue that might have been left on the surface for soil protection.

"Since it costs at least \$1.00 a mile to pull a plow, it pays to hold trips across a field to a minimum," Glynn points out. "With mulch tillage, herbicides are used to control unwanted vegetation instead of frequent cultivation."

Minimum tillage farming is not a substitute for good man-

agement. Before you attempt minimum tillage farming, you should not only know what you are doing, but why you are doing it. Visit a minimum tillage test plot, or attend a minimum tillage field day. Generally speaking, if soil conditions are such that they would not support a crop under the conventional approach, they can not be expected to yield well under no-till or minimum tillage practices.

Glynn said the Soil Conservation Service has a new leaflet which explains how much and what kind of crop residue is most desirable for erosion control, and how to estimate the amount of residues from crop yields. While the publication talks mostly about corn, soybeans and small grains, the principles also apply to grain sorghum and other crops.

Single copies of "Mulch Tillage in Modern Farming" are available from local SCS offices.

For additional information on no-till and minimum tillage contact your local Soil Conservation Service office.

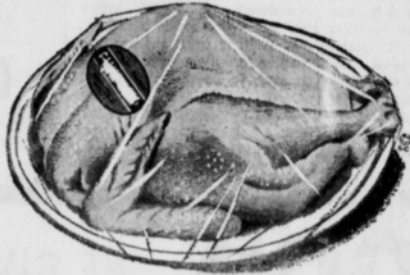
