Large turnout expected to cast runoff ballots

Voting is expected to be heavier than in other runoff elections, when Democrats from Precincts Three and Four decide the winners of three races Tuesday.

And the majority of the voting is expected to take place in Precinct Three, where both the county commissioner and constable are to be decided.

The third race is for constable of Precinct Four.

Because no candidate drew the majority of votes when the Democratic Party primary was held Mar. 11 in the three races, the runoffs were dictated.

Incumbent commissioner Gordon Griffith of Iowa Park is challenged by J.C. Thompson of Wichita Falls, in one

of the races.

Two newcomers are seeking the post of Precinct Three constable, being vacated by the retirement of A.L. Bohannon.

One challenger is Bohannon's son, Aubrey C., and the other is Sam Fairchild. Both are Iowa Park residents.

Facing off in the Precinct Four constable race are Don Brewer and Jerry Jones, both of Electra.

Early voting was begun Monday and will conclude Friday. Early voting polls are at the County Agriculture Building, 220 W. Park, county courthouse, and County Precinct Four Barn north of Electra.

All Democratic Party polls used in the Mar. 11 primary will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday for voting.

Those who voted Democrat in the primary, as well as all others who did not vote in either Democratic or Republican primaries are eligible to cast ballots Tuesday.

Republicans who voted in their primary election are not eligible to vote in the runoff.

Griffith received 1,294 votes, or 39.22 percent of all votes cast, in the primary, while Thompson got 739, or 22.4 percent.

Three other candidates for commissioner, Mary Ward, Denny McCarthy and Jerry Dean Simmons, received 550, 228 and 186 voters, respectively.

City forced to shut off water lines

All water customers in Iowa Park were inconvenienced for a brief period Wednesday afternoon, while city crews made necessary repairs.

Mike Price, public works director, explained an apparent one-inch line had been connected onto a 16-inch main sometime in the past, and in order to correct that problem, the entire city system had to be shut down.

"They just could not do the work with that kind of (water) pressure," Price said.

The problem appeared to be in the area of Magnolia and West Highway.

The entire city system, including the treatment plant, had to be shut down because of a malfunctioning bypass valve, Price explained.

In order to shut down the entire system, a main valve at the ground water storage tanks, near the treatment plant, has to be closed.

Price, who had city workers notifying as many major users in advance of the 4:30 p.m. shutdown, expressed the hope that service would not be discontinued longer than an hour.

Parade, games Saturday mark season opening

Saturday is Little League Baseball Day in Iowa Park.

The traditional parade, to include approximately 600 youths, their coaches and managers, is to get underway at 9 a.m.

Following the parade, all the boys' teams will play. Girls' softball teams will not begin their seasons until the following week.

The parade is to organize in the street and parking lot between Dutton Funeral Home and the Church of Christ.

It is to follow a route down Park Ave. to Colorado, make a "U" turn back to Wall, turn south one block to Cash, and then proceed east and be dismissed in the junior high school area, according to the coordinators.

All the boys' teams will be in their uniforms.

The first of 12 games is to begin at 11 a.m. at the W.F. George Fields on West Magnolia.

City, school early voting opens Monday

Early voting in both the city and school elections will begin Monday and conclude April 28.

The elections will be held May 2. Early votes can be cast on weekdays only, at the school administration building for the school election, and at the city hall for the city election.

Two school trustees will be elected this year, while the city ballot will have two aldermen and mayor to be decided. Seeking school trustee Place 4 are Max Henderson and incumbent Jerry Reed.

Place 5 candidates include incumbent Denny McCarthy, Jennifer Stewart, Robert Cook and Carmen Lozipone.

Incumbent mayor Wayne House is being challenged by Mike Grubbs.

Alderman Place 2 listing on the ballot will not include Charlie Helms, who has decided not to run for a second term.

Candidates for that post will include former alderman Bud Mercer, Ira Hambricht and Walter Beeman.

Place 4 incumbent Johnny Crawford has one challenger, Mike Sellers.

City, school meetings slated Monday

Both the city council and school board will hold meetings Monday evening.

The council is to meet at 7 p.m. in council chambers, while trustees are to begin their meeting at 7:30 p.m. in the junior high library.

School board meetings are seldom held on Mondays, but because two trustees wanted to attend the varsity baseball game Tuesday afternoon in Bowie, the meeting date was changed, Supt. Glen Mitchell explained.

Aldermen will be asked to consider action on two items concerning bids.

The first would authorize the city administrator to accept the low bid and enter into a contract for a sewer improvement project.

The other proposal is to advertise for bids to lease 17 acres of pasture land

at the wastewater land for a three-year period, with options.

A spokesperson for Wichita Falls, Jan Strickland, is to brief the council on joining that municipality in a program for self insurance, workers' compensation and employee health insurance.

Three resolutions appear on the

council agenda. One, if approved, would continue membership by the city in the North Texas Regional Drug Enforcement Task Force.

The other two resolutions concern retirement investments for Administrator Gary Jones.

Under the administrator's report on

the agenda, Jones is to brief the council on correspondence with residents using septic tanks who might want sewer service, the municipal wastewater audit, and organization restructuring.

Trustees, at their meeting, will hear a request for all-day kindergarten, consider seniors with 19 credits at the beginning of the 1992-93 school year to be dismissed at the end of sixth period daily, and consider contracts with auxiliary employees for next year.

Regular reports on transportation, cafeteria and enrollment also will be given during the meeting.

Prior to the auxiliary personnel contract action, an executive session is called for on the agenda.

Coach saves man with heart attack

The quick response of an Iowa Park assistant coach is credited with possibly saving the life of a heart attack victim Saturday afternoon.

Rick Barker said a woman came running across the street asking his help, because a man had fainted while shopping a garage sale at 1119 Cornelia.

Barker said he was unable to detect any sign of pulse and the victim had begun losing color in his skin.

He immediately began giving the victim mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and chest massage, and was later joined by Curtis Williams.

Fire chief Danny Skinner said his first-responder unit was notified by the police dispatcher at 3:03 p.m., and he arrived at the scene three minutes later.

He described the victim as breathing, but his skin was cold and very sweaty.

The EMTs put an IV on the victim and assisted his breathing with a forced

ventilator.

"They (Barker and Williams) definitely saved that old boy," Skinner later said.

The victim, M.L. Frie, 70, of 901 Cornelia, was transported by ambulance to Bethania Hospital.

Frie, contacted Wednesday by telephone, said he had been told by doctors he would need a double surgery, replacing a valve and opening clogged arteries.

He said the surgery might be as early as Friday, or possibly Monday.

"I don't remember anything about it (fainting)," he said from his hospital bed. "But they tell me that when I get out of here I need to go thank those two fellows."

Distrusts TRN reasoning

Dear Sir:
Two very recent items in the *Wichita Falls Times Record News* shocked me in warning to ask thousands of County voters living outside the city limits of Wichita Falls.

On March 26, 1992, Carroll Wilson had an item in the *Times Record News* concerning elimination of the commissioners court in favor of Wichita Falls city government handling all civic affairs. On April 6, 1992 was another item implying the need for such a change.

Presently, three members of the Commissioners Court reside in Wichita Falls. Their voting record, their attitude and their actions support the Wichita Falls Bureau of Commerce and Industry, Chamber of Commerce, and City Council's thoughts, desires, and activities without regard to what the voters want or favor.

Only two members of the present commissioners court have publicly supported the desires of the non-city voters they represent. They are Weldon Nix and Gordon Griffith who represent the geographic areas of Burkburnett and Iowa Park respectively.

All Iowa Park voters and other precinct voters living outside Wichita Falls city limits must vote in the April 14 runoff primary because failure to do so may cause you to lose Gordon Griffith's vote in the commissioners court as all of four commissioners will live in Wichita Falls. There will be one less vote to support your views if Gordon Griffith is not on the court.

Despite what the *Times Record News* prints, the city council is not always correct in their more efficient governing efforts.

For example: on the last two occasions, the voters of Wichita Falls have voted down money to build or construct an activities center, but the city has an activities center and is pushing to get an activities center project costing perhaps 10 million to 20 million dollars in tax money. They want the commissioners court to support the project with tax money.

Iowa Park had the old Texas Oklahoma Fair with exhibition barns etc. for agricultural related activities but Wichita Falls did not support keeping it; yet, now they have the 4-H show barns on Midwestern Parkway and want to construct another fairground along with the large events center.

In the years from 1947-1963, the city dads and the Wichita Falls council joined all the other big cities along Highway 287 to insist that the 4 lane interstate version of 287 would be routed through town. The big cities they joined were Saginaw, Rhome, Decatur, Alvord,

support of J.C. Thompson."

First, it was to be held Wednesday, and I told her that would be impossible, because that is press day for us and I just don't have the time to cover anything.

Then I tossed in the comment, "It's just as well, though, because I would probably be pretty disruptive. I don't appreciate you doing this."

The female on the other end said, "Oh," and hung up.

A little bit later, McCarthy called me, explaining he had been out of town and had just returned. Information picked up at a store and calls on his telephone recorder were the first to his knowledge that he was supposed to be announcing support of any, Thompson or Griffith.

And, at that time, he wasn't going to go on record as supporting either. "How I vote in the runoff is nobody else's business," he said.

I've already used this space to warn you about my concern that two commissioners and the county judge already are residents of Wichita Falls, and I didn't think a fourth member of the court from that same city would be in the best interest of the rural area.

I've said I've felt for years that the power structure in Wichita Falls wants

to rule the county as it does that city.

Griffith pretty well confirms my suspicions. He tells me those other court members, Harold White Sr., Woody Gossom and the judge, Nick Gipson, had been instrumental in not only recruiting Thompson to run for commissioner, but also at least two of the white candidates as well.

It was a similar situation that was responsible for White being elected to the Precinct Four commissioner's post.

Two strong candidates from Electra ran, along with White, and they so diluted the Electra and rural southern Wichita County voting that the big city guy got in without a runoff.

If you voted in the Democratic Party primary, I encourage you to mark your ballot Tuesday for Griffith.

If you didn't vote at all in the Mar. 11 primary, you are still eligible to vote in the runoff.

Griffith represents Iowa Park and rural Wichita County, and that's good enough for me.

It's rare that I ever get involved in county politics, when it comes to elections. But I'm deeply involved in this one.

And I encourage you to do the join me.

Questions commissioner

To confuse or not to confuse? That is the question. Precinct 3 County Commissioner has said few words publicly but has confused many people about his position on the prison, taxes, and his ability to govern decisively. For the prison or against the prison? For a 5% tax cut or for overspending? For accomplishing something or against accomplishing anything? How much does a ton of rock cost to produce from the Precinct 3 rock quarry? If he could give all the detailed reasons as to why the prison is good or bad, there would be less confusion about his position. 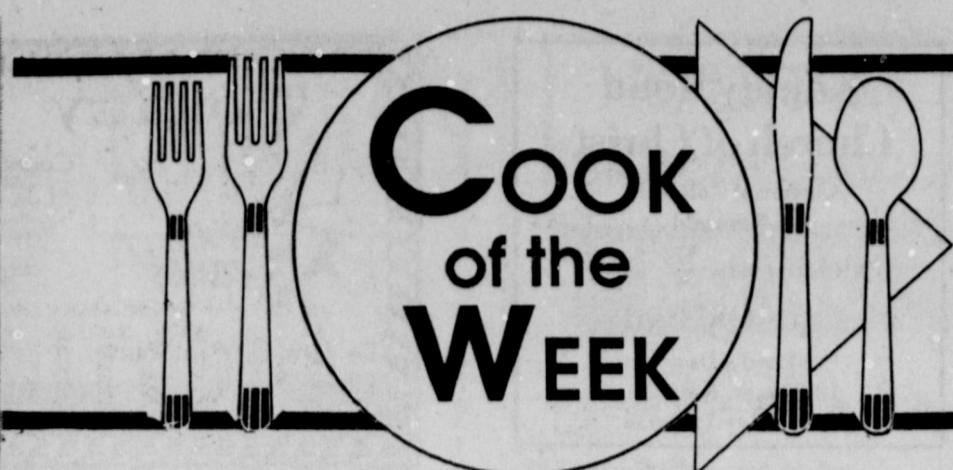

King Ranch Casserole

- 1 cup diced onion
- 1/4 lb. fresh mushrooms (or canned)
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 - 10 oz. can Rotel tomatoes
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 Tbsp. chili powder
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. soft tortillas
- 1 lb. (4 cups) Cheddar cheese, grated
- 2 cups cooked chicken, diced

Saute onion and mushrooms in butter. Add soups, tomatoes, garlic and chili powder. Place tortillas in broth for 10 minutes. Line a casserole dish with tortillas and fill with alternate layers of diced chicken, sauce and cheese. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

NOTE: I use diced Rotel tomatoes, and Wylers' instant chicken bouillon to soak tortillas.



Face Lift

- 1 lb. mild sausage
- 6 eggs
- 2 cups milk
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. dry mustard
- 2 slices white bread, cubed
- 1 lb. hard cheese, grated

Fry and drain sausage. Beat eggs; add milk, salt and mustard. Gently stir in bread, cheese, sausage. Put in 8x12 buttered dish and refrigerate overnight. Cook for 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Let stand 5 minutes before servings. Serves approximately 12 to 15 people.

Apricot Nectar Cake

- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 1 - 6 oz. can apricot nectar
- 1 box lemon jello
- 3-4 eggs
- 3/4 cup cooking oil

Bake in a tube pan 45-60 minutes at 350 degrees.

Glaze

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 4 Tbsps. lemon juice

Pour over hot cake.

Strawberry Cake

- 1 white cake mix
- 1 box reg. strawberry jello
- 1 cup cooking oil
- 2 Tbsps. flour
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 box frozen strawberries (use 1/2 in cake)

Mix all ingredients together and pour into 2 greased and floured 9-inch cake pans. Bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

Icing

- 1 box powdered sugar
- 1/2 box strawberries
- 3/4 stick oleo

Mix together and spread on layers.

Cherry Jello

- 1 large pkg. cherry jello
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 large can crushed pineapple, drained
- 1 large can cherries
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 Tbsps. lemon juice

Boil cherries. Boil water. Dissolve jello in water. Dissolve sugar in boiling cherries. Combine with other ingredients and pour into mold or serving dish.

Buttermoist Poppy Seed Cake

- 1 - 18 1/2 oz. pkg. yellow cake mix
- Orange juice
- 2 Tbsps. poppy seed

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees.

In large mixer bowl, prepare cake mix according to package directions, substituting orange juice for water and adding poppy seeds to cake batter. Pour into greased and floured 12-cup bundt pan or 10-inch tube pan. Bake according to package directions or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean.

Glaze

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup orange juice
- 1/4 cup sweet cream butter

In 1-quart sauce pan combine glaze ingredients. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until butter is melted.

Before removing from pan, poke holes in cake with wooden pick and drizzle all but 1/4 cup glaze evenly over cake. Allow cake to absorb glaze. Remove from pan immediately; place on serving plate and drizzle reserved glaze over top of cake. Yield: 12 servings.

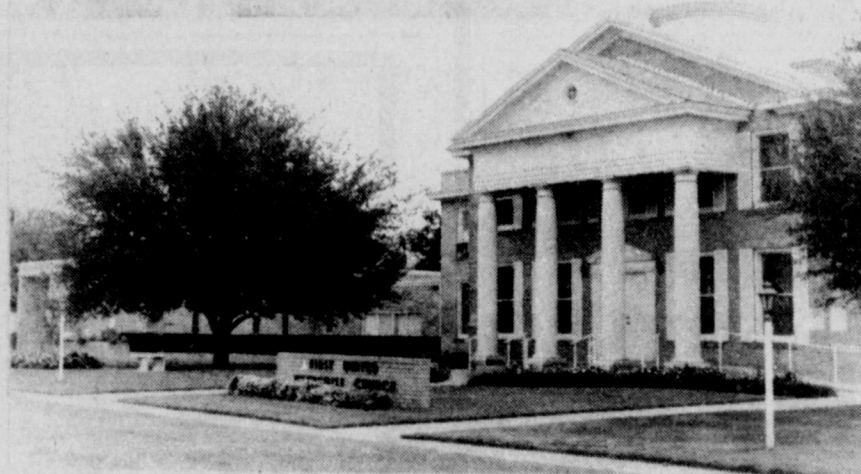

"I THINK I BROKE MY ARM"

These are the words I spoke just a few days ago. I was fortunate, no break, just a dislocated shoulder. It's strange how when minor suffering happens to you that it causes your mind to go back almost two thousand years and think of the major suffering of Jesus Christ as atonement for sin at Calvary.

At the cross, we find Jesus voiced His pain, His loneliness, but never once do we find Him doubting the existence of God. Never does Jesus cast God aside as unworthy of service or worship! In the Savior we realize God has joined us in our pain by reconciling the world to Himself by the cross. In Jesus Christ we learn the presence of pain does not mean the absence of God. We learn that God has no intention of always intervening and bringing suffering to a halt.

Remember it was Christ, who rejected Peter's military solution. It was Christ who insisted on drinking the cup of suffering for sinful man. It was Christ who rebuked Peter when Peter rebelled at "suffering talk." (Matthew 16:21-24)

We speak to and admire people who have seen suffering and come through it courageously. Above all else, we are not suggesting a simple solution on why people suffer. It may very well be that one's suffering will enable someone else to bear a burden a little easier. Most of all, let us remember that suffering servant of God, Jesus Christ, loves us and cares deeply for us. (Hebrews 4:14-16; 1 Peter 5:7)

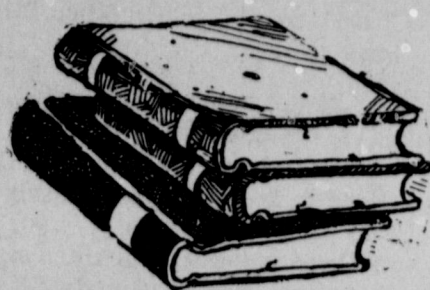

AUSTIN - Gov. Ann Richards admitted last week that legislative leaders still have no agreement on how to change the state's school finance system, which has been struck down by the Texas Supreme Court.

Richards said she won't call a special legislative session until an understanding is reached.

"I don't want to spend taxpayer money unless I get a consensus, and I can get a bill," Richards said after meeting with Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and House Speaker Gib Lewis. "There is no consensus among the members."

Last session, lawmakers created County Education District school property taxes; the Texas Supreme Court later ruled them unconstitutional, but they're still being collected.

Lawmakers now may be delaying until U.S. District Judge James Nowlin rules whether those taxes can still be collected.

If he says they cannot be collected, the heat will be on lawmakers to defuse taxpayer anger over higher property taxes that were illegal, but collected anyway.

The Supreme Court has given the state until June 1993 to act.

Black Inmate Rate

Speaking of heat and education, state Rep. Ron Wilson, D-

Houston, charged the lack of a decent education system is one of the reasons for skyrocketing increases in black state prisoners.

Wilson, whom many regard as the voice of influence in the House Black Caucus, was reacting to a study which shows that last year Texas had 1,414 black prisoners per 100,000 black citizens, more than double the 683 prisoners per 100,000 rate in 1985.

Other groups on the prisoners-per-100,000 scale: Hispanics rose from 173 prisoners in '85 to 293 in '91; white prisoners increased from 122 in '85 to 167 last year.

Overall changes in prison populations that period, based on ethnicity, are: whites, down 12 percent; Hispanics, up 2 percent; and blacks, up 10 percent.

Wilson said most black prisoners probably function on the sixth grade level. "They deny us the money and the resources," he said.

Remember The Old Gang?

El Paso U.S. Rep. Ron Coleman found his name high on the list of the worst check bouncers at the U.S. House bank.

Coleman, a former state representative, was a member of "The Gang of Four," the media's moniker for four firebrand members who plagued the regime of House Speaker Billy Clayton.

Other members were Luther Jones of El Paso; John Bryant of Dallas; and John Whitmire of Houston, all attorneys.

Like a group of blitzing linebackers, the four liberals constantly dogged Clayton and his lieutenants during floor debate and committee hearings, providing serious and amusing diversions amid Clayton's business-as-usual dynasty.

Bryant, the leader, ran for speaker against Clayton in 1981, made a decent showing, but lost and the rebels' outlook was grim.

In 1982, the scene changed: Clayton fell out of power in

the Brilab scandal, Coleman and Bryant won congressional seats, Whitmire crossed the rotunda to the Senate, and Jones went home to become county judge.

Bryant hasn't changed. Last week, he fired the first shot of open revolt against congressional leadership by urging U.S. Speaker Thomas Foley to step down.

"Foley refuses to be a political leader for Democrats," Bryant charged in a speech on the House floor. Foley says he's staying put.

And the rest of the gang? Whitmire went on to become a Democrat power runner in the Texas Senate, but lost his seat in last month's primary.

Jones later did some maneuvering as a possible opponent to entrenched Texas Democratic

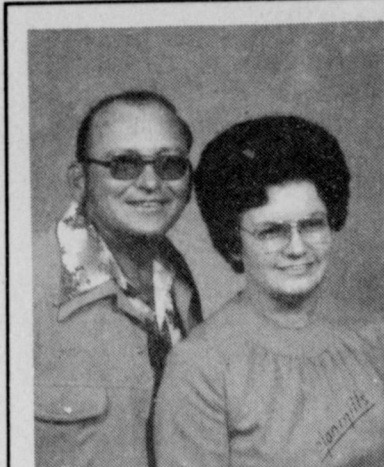
Party chairman Bob Slagle, but he hasn't sought public office in recent years.

Slagle's Post Secure

Meanwhile, Slagle seems destined to keep the chairmanship he has held for 12 years.

Party executive committed member Hazel Obey, leader of the Rainbow Coalition in Texas, was challenging Slagle until her name surfaced in a media probe of political campaign activities in the Texas General Land Office.

With Texas Republicans calling for a federal investigation of that agency, Democrats weren't about to elect a party chairman who might later face indictment and a grand jury trial.

Catcher Todd Pulley had two hits on two official at-bats and scored twice.

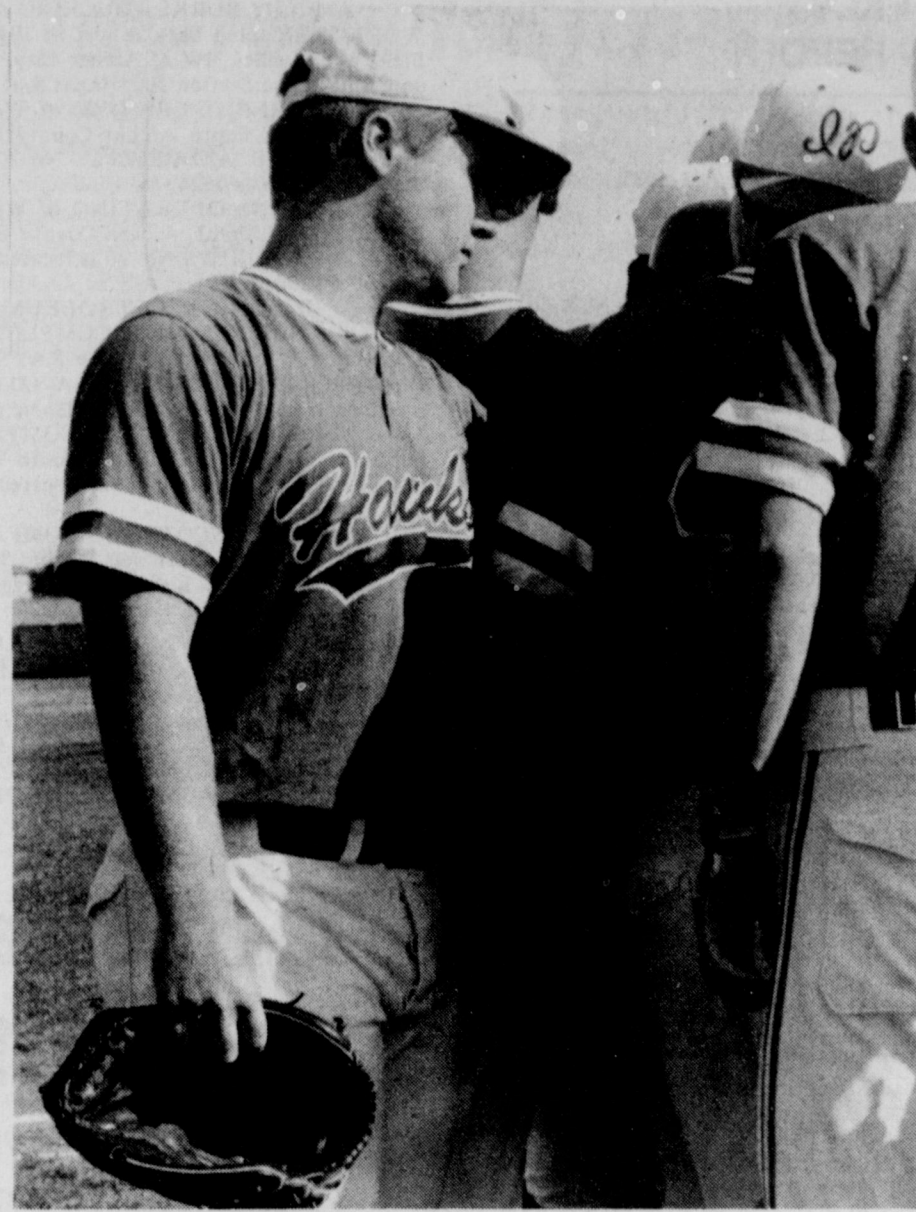
Second baseman Patric Kennedy was credited with two hits on three trips to the plate.

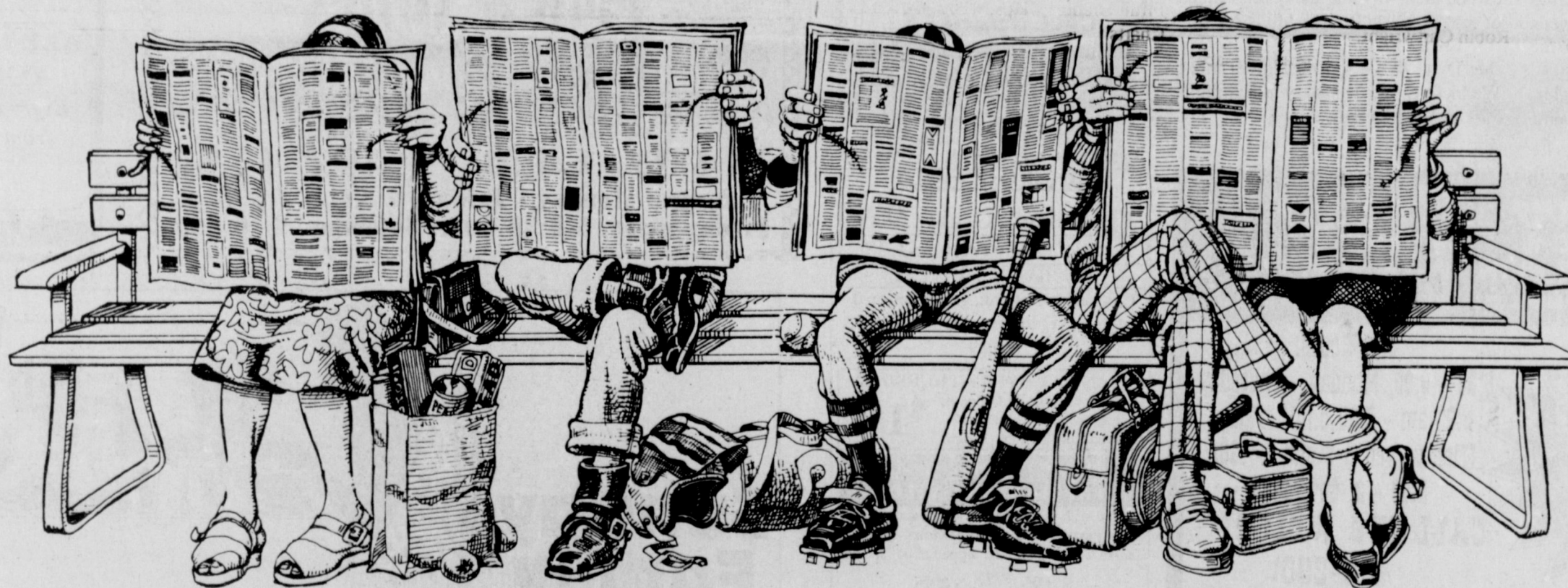

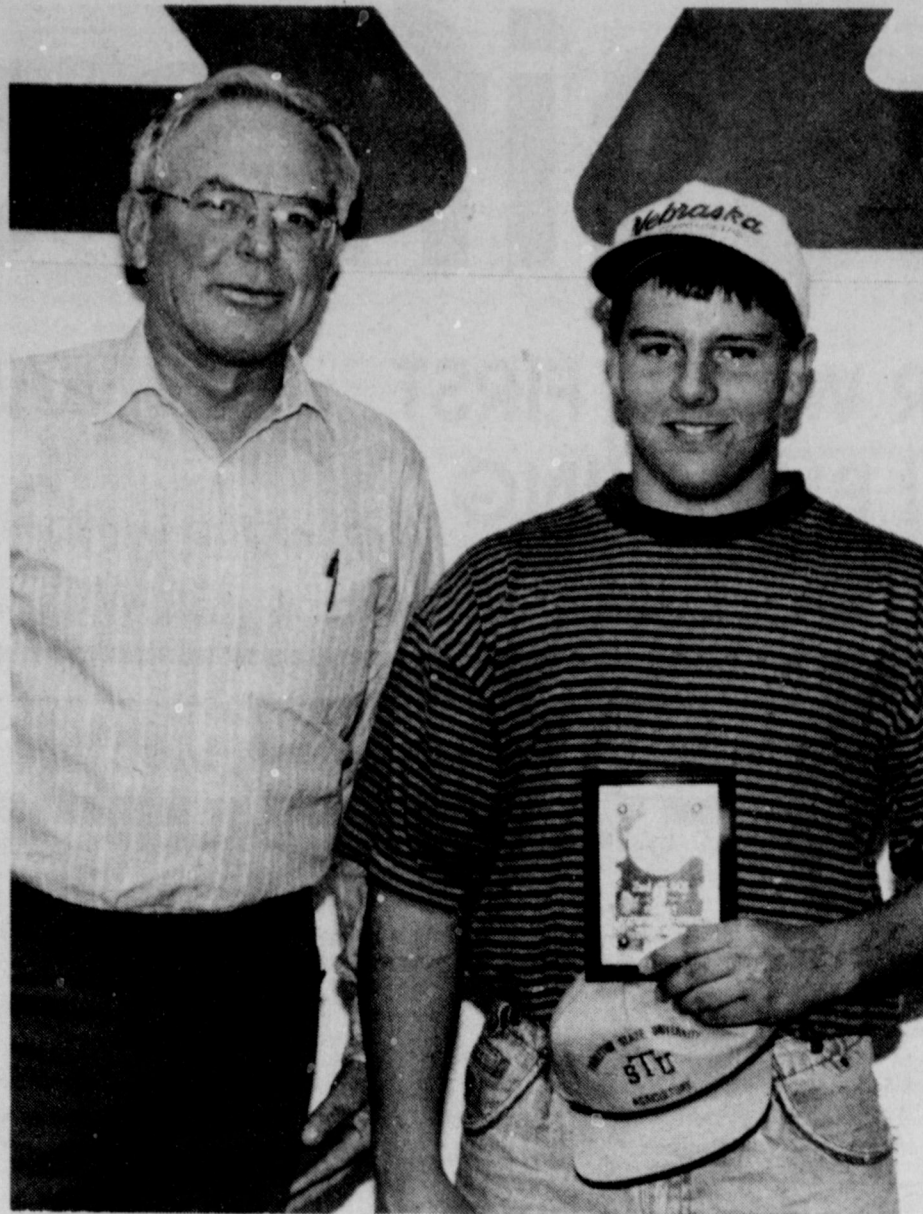

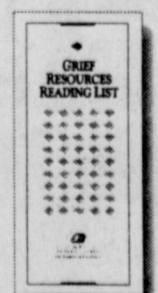

Gun laws, safety topic of Optimist program

Among other important tips Phillips listed were that unattended guns should be unloaded, guns and ammunition should be stored safely beyond reach of children and careless adults, and to not mix gunpowder and alcohol.

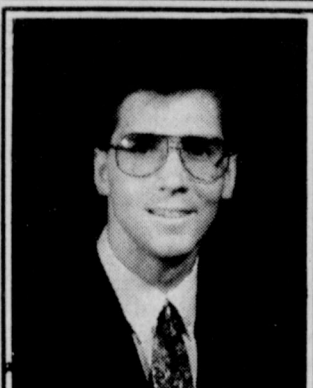
