The season will get underway at 12-noon, and continue to open daily through the summer. Hours will be 12-6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 1-7 Sunday.


Another incentive this year will be that the high school gymnasium also will be open, allowing youths to vary their time between basketball and swimming.

No credit will be given for the courses, but it will be available from remedial to improvement of skills, according to school personnel.







it. But not everyone around Sierra Blanca, down near El Paso, feel the same. In fact, a suit is being threatened by the president of the "Save Sierra Blanca" organization, if the project goes that far.

Numerous farmers in Colorado are already contracting to accept the sludge, according to a company the Perryton people were working with. Those folks up there liked it.

The sludge is shipped by sealed rail by Perryton's industrial foundation, as a car to a receiving location, and from there is distributed on the land with spreaders, similar to the equipment used in putting out barnyard manure.

There are some regulations that must be met, as far as the receiving soil is concerned. Among them is land that has almost zero slope, doesn't drain into a municipal water supply, and poses no threat to underground water because of soil type.

Merco Joint Venture of Oklahoma is the firm that wants to put New York's "stuff" out in Hudspeth County.

The city of Canyon, up in the Panhandle, got permission from the state to apply its sludge onto range land sometime during the past year, instead of burying it in the landfill.

Senator David Boren of Oklahoma has evidently correctly interpreted the mood of the country, and wants to overhaul the nation's welfare system.

He and eight other senators, including Sen. Loyd Bentsen of Texas, have joined together to introduce a bill to bring about a modern day version of two programs used during the great depression of the thirties.

Old timers here in Andrews will remember the Works Progress Administration and the Civilian Conservation Corps, programs designed to put millions of unemployed Americans back to work.

Senator Boren compares the results of our current welfare system with the eight-year record of the WPA and the CCC.

"In spite of billions spent on welfare programs, America's underclass is growing at an unprecedented rate," Boren declares. "In the last two years, the number of people receiving Aid to Families with Dependent children benefits has gone up 24 percent and total spending has increased 17 percent -- and only seven percent of the welfare population has actually switched from welfare to work under job search programs." The Oklahoma senator compares today's welfare with the eight years the WPA was in existence in the late 1930s and early 1940s. The eight million WPA workers built more than 650,000 miles of roads, highways and sidewalks, 125,000 public buildings (including 39,000 schools), 124,000 bridges, 8,000 parks and 18,000 playgrounds. WPA workers wrote hundreds of books and created countless artistic works. They served over one billion meals to hungry school children and sewed over 382 million garments for those in need. All this required an investment of about \$90 billion in today's terms.

benefits or \$5,000 in cash on graduation from high school.

The second program would create camps or dormitory units in urban areas for people aged 17 to 22 to work on projects ranging from reforestation to auxiliary police to town beautification. It would provide up to \$10,000 in educational benefits for one year of work. The program might well use excess military bases and personnel being phased out of the military in supervisory positions.

Like Senator Boren says: "The current welfare system cannot be fixed with patches and Band-Aids. It is time to recycle an approach that worked well in the past and modify it to fit current conditions.

"Maybe someday, welfare recipients whose talents are now being wasted can point to some major community facility and say with pride, like the WPA workers of old, 'I helped build it!"" JAMES ROBERTS Andrews County News

Here in West Texas, the Indian Mountain Lodge in the Davis Mountains was a WPA project and streets in Lamesa, Lubbock, and several other area cities were paved with bricks -- and many are still in place.

In contrast, what has our current welfare system created in the last eight years?

At a cost of over \$900 billion spent on all public assistance, we have managed to produce nothing but subsistence level payments to an increasingly hopeless segment of American society. Boren says these recipients will never have the satisfaction of saying: "Ihelped build that park for the community" or "I served meals to the homeless."

Under Boren's bill, all able-bodied welfare recipients with the exception of mothers with small children and those enrolled in education and training programs, would be required to take an available job with the agency if they cannot find a job elsewhere.

Local and state agencies as well as private non-profit organizations would apply for work grants to help rebuild the infrastructure in cities, counties, and states. And an added incentive, pay for the workers would be at least 10 percent higher than welfare payments.

In addition to the adult programs, two youth programs would be created. A Youth Community Corps would allow students beginning in the 7th grade to work up to 250 hours per year until they reach the senior year of high school. Students participating for six years would earn up to \$10,000 in educational

My old truck is over the hill. It's a little hard to start in the morning, and some of its joints squeak. It certainly could use an overhaul.

Salan, Tate are MSU scholarship recipients


Midwestern State Univ. students Jenny Salan and Krystal Tate have been awarded the Rotary Foundation Scholarships.

New guidelines for AIDS procedures

New Public Health Service guidelines advise dentists and surgeons performing limited types of "exposure-prone" procedures to get tested for AIDS and, if infected, to refrain from these procedures.

The tests are recommended only for health workers involved in exposure-prone procedures such as abdominal and heart surgery, root canals and tooth extractions -- in which an accidental cut could cause the health care worker's blood to contact a body cavity, subcutaneous tissue or mucous membranes. James O. Mason, M.D., who heads the Public Health Service, said, "In most medical situations, there's no more risk from an HIV-infected nurse or doctor than from an infected lawyer, cab driver, waiter or teacher, which is to say, no risk at all. We much get that across to the



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

AUSTIN - State officials plan to throw 14 parties to boost and celebrate the new Texas Lottery.

Gov. Ann Richards plans to sell the first ticket of the 300 million printed for sale starting at 6 a.m. Friday.

Lawmakers hope the new game, which officials say makes one in every 7.9 tickets a winner, will raise enough state revenue to fund a desperate public education kitty.

Critics called the lottery a shell game sham on the poverty class, and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock once said it was "a sleazy way to raise state revenues."

Budget Miscalculations

As state lawmakers, sitting in committees last week, heard grim predictions of state budget shortfalls, Bullock commented: "The truth is the Legislature has promised school districts more than it could ever fund."

Bullock also warned school officials that they should not assume they can continue collecting \$5.2 billion in illegal county education district taxes next year.

Bullock said he fears major corporate taxpayers will refuse to pay the CED tax while it is entangled in litigation. The tax is being appealed to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals.

The budget examiners predicted school districts would start their next budget periods with \$350 million less in state revenues because of miscalculations.

Senate Education Committee chairman Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, blamed school districts for

raising taxes "more than necessary to generate more state aid." **Census** Report on Texas

The U.S. Census report for Texas released last week put the past decade of recession into numbers:

The population rose from 14.2 million in 1979 to 16.9 million in 1989, including thousands of Hispanics and Asians.

 Households in 1989 with low incomes, below \$25,000, numbered almost three million, but shrank by a fourth compared to-1979.

Beneath the poverty line, or \$12,647 for a family of four, a million households were added in the 80s. One of every three was headed by a woman, with no spouse present.

 More than a million households had \$50,000 incomes, five times more than in 1979. More than 85,000 households had incomes of \$150,000 or higher, many boosted by marriages of two professionals.

 Overall, the poverty class increased 3.4 percent to end the decade with 18.1 percent of the total Texas population of 16,986,510.

Perot Reports Income

Independent presidential probable Ross Perot disclosed financial documents last week showing more than 176 investments each worth more than \$1 million.

He is expected to join the race as a candidate next month.

Meanwhile, Texas GOP national committeeman Earnest Angelo of Midland predicted if Perot throws the election into the U.S. House of Representatives, Bush would lose.

There, each state has one vote, cast by the majority of its congressional delegation; 26 votes wins it all

Currently, Democrats control 31 delegations, Republicans have 10, eight are evenly divided, and Vermont has a lone, independent congressman.

Killing Phone Records

Records of local calls from state telephones now will be destroyed weekly instead of monthly, state officials announced. They said the

change will save money and free up computer data space.

The change comes after such records implicated Land Commissioner Garry Mauro in using state phones to help Gov. Bill Clinton's presidential campaign and also implicated U.S. District Judge James Nowlin in getting secret help from a legislator to redraw Texas Senate districts.

Sen. Dickson Has Cancer

State Sen. Temple Dickson, D-Sweetwater, has been diagnosed with lung cancer.

He entered the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. last week and will be there several days, a spokesman said. The cancer was discovered during a checkup in April, early enough that doctors believe it can be removed.

Dickson, 57, was elected to the Senate in 1988, after serving six years in the House. After redistricting, he was defeated in March by Sen. Bill Sims, D-San Angelo.



beneficiary who has changed your address and have not notified the Social Security Administration (SSA), you need to do it now.

It is important that SSA have a correct address in case the agency needs to contact you for information about current entitlement to benefits.

Currently, SSA is contacting national trade associations that represent banking institutions throughout the country. These associations are being asked to inform their member banks of the need for their cooperation in helping Social Security obtain correct addresses for beneficiaries who use direct deposit.

The associations also are being asked to alert their members that in May, SSA field office staff will request that banks furnish the correct

whom a Form 1099 (Social Security Benefit Statement) was returned to Social Security as undeliverable. This request for disclosure is permissible under the "Right To Financial Privacy Act."

Before contacting the banks, SSA will recheck its records to see if a new address has been reported since the forms were returned.

All undeliverable forms will be mailed a second time, using a new address if it has been submitted. For those using direct deposit, if the form is returned after the second mailing, the financial institution will be identified and contacted for a current address.

If the financial institution cannot or will not provide the address, or if benefits are paid directly to the benpost office and telephone directory assistance to seek a current address.

If all these efforts fail, a "due process" letter will be sent to the last known address of the beneficiary and benefits will be suspended until he or she contacts SSA.
