

Early voting to end Tuesday

Early voting in the county's \$9-million bond issue has already attracted an unusually large turnout, and the voting will continue through Tuesday.

At issue is whether Wichita County taxpayers approve or disapprove the commissioners court issuing of \$9 million in certificates of obligation to fund part of the proposed multi-purpose event center in Wichita Falls.

As of 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, 235 voters had cast their early ballots in

Iowa Park. At the same time the previous Wednesday, 59 votes had been cast.

The largest one-day turnout here was Friday, when 58 ballots were marked.

The official election day is Saturday, July 25.

The commissioners court had originally pledged the \$9 million to help fund the multi-event center, which is advertised to cost \$25 million.

The city of Wichita Falls also

pledged \$9 million, of which that municipality's council plans to raise \$4 million also by certificates of obligation. The remaining \$7 million is to be raised from "local sources."

Location of the proposed center is on either side of the Wichita River, directly north of downtown Wichita Falls.

Early voting is being held in Iowa Park at the county's tax sub station, 220 West Park.

Council approves proposal to purchase street sweeper

The city council Monday evening approved a proposal to purchase a used street sweeper, and adopted an ordinance which is expected to yield more taxes from the telephone company.

Additionally, action was taken to authorize a change in employee payments for dependent health care, approved the 9-1-1 emergency district's budget, heard a report on delinquent taxes, and decided to hold its second work session on next year's budget next Monday.

Administrator Gary Jones told the council it was possible the city might be able to purchase a used street sweeper from the highway department, if no other state agency requested it.

Jones was authorized to negotiate a six-month, \$6,000 loan to make the

purchase. The purpose of the loan is to include the purchase in the 1992-93 budget.

Aldermen approved repeal of an ordinance adopted in 1961 which covered a franchise tax for Southwestern Bell Telephone, and adopted a new ordinance which would be based on gross receipts.

The change will increase taxes from the utility company from the \$9,000 annual range to approximately \$25,000. Additionally, instead of a one-time annual payment, future payments would be made quarterly to the city.

In adopting a resolution concerning employee payments for dependent health plan, a legal step was taken to authorize an exemption under IRS regulations, saving employees money

and costing the city nothing, it was explained.

Because Iowa Park pays a proportionate share of the Nortex 9-1-1 district's budget, approval of proposed budgets by all contributing entities is required.

The new budget calls for expenditures of \$551,634 and receipts of \$451,637, leaving an anticipated surplus at the end of the fiscal year of \$124,002.

No action was taken following tax collector Allen Shewmake's report on delinquent taxes.

His presentation was an explanation of how taxes become delinquent and efforts taken to collect them.

Aldermen approved a proposal to hold a budget work session at 3 p.m. Monday in the council work room at city hall.

Discussions were also held on a current project to renovate the sewer treatment plant and authorization for Recreational Activities Center volunteers to work around the building.

Jones told the council of progress on the treatment plant project, which includes the digging of a lagoon and coordinating the efforts of a contractor to renovate the two-decade-old plant.

Alderman Bob Hamilton proposed an addendum in the city's lease on the RAC building to the RAC board, which would permit the board to have ground improvement work done.

Hamilton said the lease agreement authorizes the RAC board control of the interior of the structure only, and improvement of grounds immediately around the building were needed.

No action was taken, but the consensus appeared to be in approval of the proposal.

Trustees call meeting

Personnel and consideration of bids dominate the agenda for a called meeting of the school board tonight.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

No names or positions are included on the agenda, which calls for accepting resignations, employing new personnel, and also an executive session.

Bids are to be considered for bread, milk, ice cream, other food, non-food items and frozen food storage.

Also under the cafeteria department report will be a recommended

cafeteria price list for the 1992-93 school year.

Cafeteria equipment bids also are to be considered, as are repairs on parking lots and contract welding on the still uncompleted new bus maintenance barn.

Trustees will hold a study session on the preliminary 1992-93 budget.

Also on the agenda are reports on the Norm-Referenced Assessment Program for Texas, and Chapter One achievement, as well as action on student transfer requests.

RUMOR:

Coach Gamble resigning?

Rumors began flying around Iowa Park Tuesday afternoon, that Head Coach Lucky Gamble is resigning.

Efforts by the Iowa Park Leader yesterday failed to find anyone in the school administration who would deny or confirm the rumors.

Additionally, attempts to contact Coach Gamble also were fruitless.

Supt. Glen Mitchell has been attending a conference of school superintendents in Austin, and was to leave that city Wednesday afternoon.

The school board's called meeting agenda, which includes "resignations" under the topic of personnel, does not specify who is resigning. That agenda was posted at 4 p.m. Monday.

Gamble was hired by the school board in the spring of 1991, following the resignation of Len Williams.

When asked about the rumors of Gamble's resignation Wednesday afternoon, an administrator responded, "He hasn't resigned yet. That's all I can tell you."

Cryovac voids contract with Fluor Daniel firm

A contracting firm that has been working at the Cryovac plant since 1975 is no longer there.

Fluor Daniel personnel, upon arrival at the plant Monday morning, were informed by Cryovac authorities that their firm was no longer under contract.

Workers were instructed to pick up their individual tools, kept in the plant, and leave the premises, which they did.

Ray Youngblood, plant manager, termed the action as being "purely an economic decision."

He explained Fluor Daniel had approached Cryovac management recently, seeking to renegotiate its contract at a higher price.

"That opened an opportunity for us

Trash is expensive!

It has often been said, that trash may eventually cost as much as when the item was purchased, or more. And there are very few who are knowledgeable on the subject who would disagree.

The culprit is a regulation, entitled Sub Title D, issued by the federal Environmental Protection Agency, which concerns sanitary landfills.

That's where all trash is supposed to eventually be disposed.

Those regulations are already too strict that many municipal governments have already contracted private firms to dispose of their garbage.

But, there is even a darker shadow on the horizon which concerns city governments. That is the additional rules which may, or may not, be added on by the Texas Water Quality Board.

Sub Title D is to become effective Oct. 9, 1993.

A few of the major requirements for sanitary landfills that are closed after the effective date are:

- * ground water monitoring with wells; samples of the water from those wells to be tested twice a year with an initial cost of \$1,800 per well.

- * a 30-year post closure care which requires \$1 million clean up minimum fund, or more if a more expensive clean up procedure is estimated.

- * new landfill pits dug can be no larger than a six-month capacity; each requiring the same soil compaction as now required, but with an additional plastic liner and a means of collecting any water which might seep into the pit after closure to be pumped out and treated at the sewer treatment plant.

- * pits, when closed, must have a two-foot compacted soil covering, with a six-inch top soil that is seeded with a grass covering.

- * one load of trash delivered to the pit each day must be scattered out and sorted by a licensed inspector, to determine if any unpermitted contents are in the load.

The state's regulations cannot be more relaxed than the federal's, but they can be more strict.

Only four sanitary landfills are being operated by cities in this part of the state, according to Iowa Park City Administrator Gary Jones. They are Iowa Park, Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and Vernon.

Those, very likely, will be reduced to one in the near future, and replaced with a regional landfill, which would be shared by all participating cities or counties.

In fact, every Regional Council of Governments, such as Nortex which is headquartered in Wichita Falls, is in the process of coordinating its own regional landfill, Jones said.

Included on proposed expenditures Iowa Park city council members will be considering in the 1992-93 budget is equipment that would be necessary for the city to begin sending its trash to a regional landfill, or contracting with the city of Wichita Falls.

Iowa Park's landfill currently receives an average of 17 tons of trash per day. Mike Price, public works director, says the cost is about \$22 per ton to operate the garbage pickup department and landfill operation.

"I think the EPA, in writing Sub Title D, came out with regulations trying to protect the environment," said Jones. "And they did a pretty good job."

He added, however, "But they didn't take into consideration 'site specific.' Basically, they forgot a key ingredient:

considering sites and types of soils at those sites."

His point was, the type of heavy clay soil where Iowa Park's landfill is located is more compact than the compacted clay liners which have been required of pits, therefore, the lining has done nothing more than make pits more expensive than necessary.

The tightness of the soil does not permit water to seep into underground water supplies.

"Good clay meets permeability criteria. It doesn't have ground water to contend with. But the regulations should reward those with this type of soil, and make it tough on those who don't have it.

"That's the fallacy of the whole thing," Jones said.

Jones and others connected with city governments who have not contracted with private companies to dispose of their garbage fear the potential of being held captive of a profit-making business by turning their operations over to them.

Virtually every city which has contracted with private corporations for trash collection and disposal have undergone continuous increases in rates.

Even the Texas Water Commission is aware of problems municipal governments are having, with so much

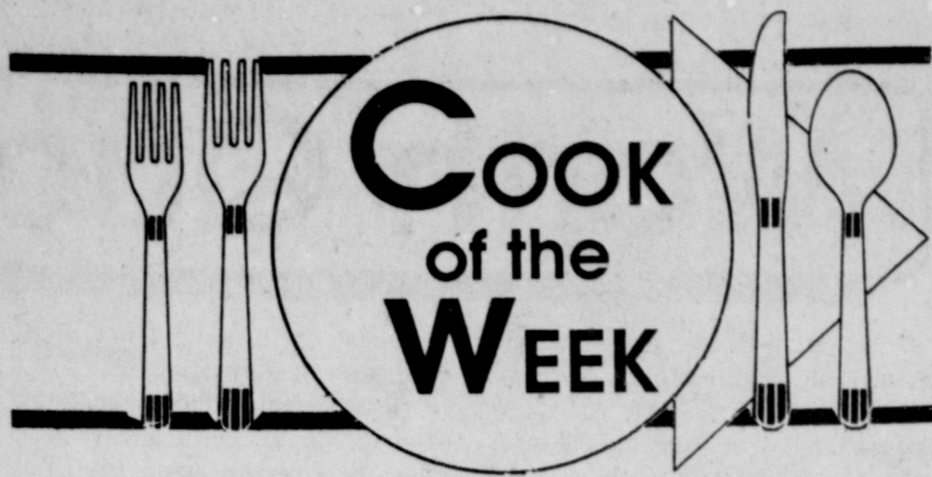
Debra said that she has been cooking since she was nine years old. She was active in 4-H and participated in their food shows.

Cinnamon Dumplings

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Slice 2 cans of biscuits into 1/4's. Spray 9x13 pan with non-stick cooking spray. Lay biscuit quarters in pan and sprinkle 1/4 cup flour over biscuits. Heat 1 stick butter, 3/4 cup sugar and mix. Add 3/4 to 1 cup milk and stir thoroughly; then pour over biscuits. Sprinkle cinnamon over biscuits and bake 15 minutes.



Turkey and Cheddar Pasta Salad

1 pkg. (12 oz.) garden swirl macaroni
1 envelope Good Seasons honey mustard salad dressing mix
1 cup thinly sliced red pepper strips
1 pkg. deli-cut turkey, cut into thin strips
1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Prepare pasta as directed on package; drain. Rinse with cold water; drain. Prepare salad dressing mix as directed on envelope. Combine pasta with remaining ingredients. Add about 1/2 cup dressing; toss to mix well. Chill at least 2 hours. Mix in additional dressing before serving, if desired.

Oatmeal Pie

2 eggs
2/3 cup white Karo
2/3 cup dry oatmeal
2/3 cup sugar
2/3 cup oleo
9-inch unbaked pie shell

Cream oleo and sugar; add beaten eggs. Add Karo until smooth. Stir in oatmeal, pinch of salt and 1 tsp. vanilla. Pour into pie shell. Bake 45 to 50 minutes at 350 degrees.

Double Chocolate Chewies

1 pkg. Duncan Hines Butter Fudge cake mix
1 - 6 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate chips
2 eggs
1/4 cup oil
1 cup pecans

Mix ingredients in order given. Pat into a 9x13 greased pan. Bake at 350 20 to 25 minutes. Cover with frosting while hot.

Frosting

Bring to boil:
1 stick oleo
1/3 cup milk
3 1/2 Tbsps. cocoa
Mix in:
2 1/2 cups powdered sugar
1 cup chopped pecans

Pour over hot brownies or cake.

Graham Cracker Cookies

Graham crackers
1 stick oleo
1 stick butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
Chopped nuts

Lay crackers on cookie sheet to cover. Put oleo, butter, sugar and vanilla in a saucepan. Cook for 3 minutes, stirring to dissolve sugar. Pour over graham crackers, covering well. Take chopped nuts and sprinkle over top. Bake 8 to 10 minutes at 375. Let cool and break apart.

Pre-Soak for Stains

1/4 cup household chlorine bleach
1 cup dishwasher detergent
1 gallon HOT water

Do not use metal container. I found this to work great on stubborn baby stains!

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As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



If you've read my article on the front page about the cost of operating the city's sanitary landfill, and how grass clippings are contributing to that cost, I've got a confession to make.

I've been aware for a couple of years that the grass clippings I've been dumping in the trash bin shouldn't have been there.

There's no regulation against it, but a couple of years ago, I read about a program being promoted by Texas A&M called "Don't bag it."

The idea was, those grass clippings were eating up space in landfills, and it was costing governments unnecessary money to bury it.

The specialist being quoted in the article suggested either composting the

clippings, or just mowing with a special mower blade called a mulcher.

Well, I'm not a gardener, so I saw no real benefit in building a composting bin. Had I been a gardener, using that composted material would have been a great idea.

My recently-purchased mower had a bag to catch the clippings, but didn't have a mulching blade. And, after just shelling out the money for that piece of equipment, I wasn't in any shape or mood to make the change.

But, I did have a new mulching blade put on before this season's mowing got underway. And I'm glad I did.

Admittedly, I'm kind of lazy. If I weren't, I'd probably have a garden.

I flatly don't miss having to dump those clippings two or three times when I mow our yard.

In fact, mowing with a mulching blade has cut my mowing time by about 15 minutes. . . I'm not as tired anymore because I don't have to carry and lift that heavy bag at the dumpster. . . and I know that I'm doing the right thing.

That mulcher blade cuts the grass clippings up so finely that you can't see them. And they also help the yard, in a sort of composting way.

You might want to try it, too.

Cryovac appealing method of taxing

A four-person delegation representing the Iowa Park Cryovac plant met Monday afternoon with the appraisal review board of Wichita County, seeking a reduction in the plant's personal property taxes.

The major thrust of the appeal was a request to reduce the Appraisal District's use of a 15-year depreciation schedule on equipment.

Primary spokesman for the plant was Derek McCleery, a tax agent, who was assisted by Stephen Johnson, the company's engineer from Duncan, S.C.

Presenting the District's side of the appeal case was Larry Bacus, who is the industrial tax appraiser. Bacus is a 1980 graduate of Iowa Park High School.

No decision was reached by the review board during the hearing. Chairman Bobby Schaaf explained the

board's recommendation, when reached, would be presented to the full, nine-member tax appraisal board.

McCleery's appeal was mainly on the basis that the plant's equipment should be allowed to depreciate more rapidly than the District's schedule, primarily because it is operated on a four shift, 24-hour basis.

Johnson pointed out that the equipment was constantly being changed and updated to meet the demands of both the market and federal regulations.

Bacus explained that the method with which Cryovac plant is appraised is based on methods used throughout the county, numerous other counties and the state comptroller.

The hearing lasted approximately one hour.

grass from yards going into landfills.

The Commission has recently launched an educational project to encourage recycling of garbage and yard waste.

"Don't Bag It," is a slogan being promoted on yard waste.

"If every Texan would compost their yard waste, we could extend the life of the landfills we have in the state right now by another 10 years," said TWC Commissioner Peggy Garner. "And the landfill space we're using now to bury grass clippings, leaves and brush is going to cost four times as much to replace in the future."

To prove her point, a homeowner whose yard produced 25 pounds of clippings on each of 16 mowings costs the city \$5.20 annually to bury in the Iowa Park landfill.

Iowa Park's city council is studying a plan to close its landfill before the effective date of Sub Title D.

Whether it will join other cities in a cooperative regional landfill, or contract with Wichita Falls, has yet to be determined.

But, whatever course is taken, the cost of trash in the future will continue to increase higher and higher.

Sales taxes continue climb

With continuing regularity, Iowa Park's business climate is rosy, based on monthly sales tax receipts reported by the state comptroller's office.

The city this month received a tax rebate check for \$14,202.54, an 8.38 percent increase over the same month in 1991.

Iowa Park, for the year, shows a gain over the previous year of 19.82 percent. Thus far, the city's rebates have amounted to \$115,887.47, according to the comptroller's report. At this same

time last year, it was \$96,718.42.

The other three municipalities in the county also are reporting gains for the year, but not as significantly as the Iowa Park gain.

Electra now has a 7.92 percent gain over 1991; Wichita Falls 6.78, and Burkburnett 3.73.

Holliday is a minus 21.96 percent below last year.

This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on May sales and reported in June by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Non-profit calendar being compiled

The North Texas Center for Non-profit Management needs help.

The directory, which was first released in 1989 by the United Way of Greater Wichita Falls, lists all area nonprofit agencies and the services they offer to the public.

Volunteer opportunities will also be included in the listing. The directory is a good way to let the public know what an agency offers to refer clients to sources of assistance.

A list of available speakers is also being compiled from the information to create a "speaker's bureau" listing which can be used by area groups.

Worth Quoting

You know those signs that are so strategically placed at highway roadside parks that say, "DUI, You Can't Afford One!" Well, you might change them to read: "Traffic Citation, You Can't Afford One of These Either!"

It was shared in this space about a month or so ago that I picked up a ticket while returning from Marble Falls.

The time was after midnight, the Bulldogs had been soundly defeated and my son had sprained a knee (he missed all of last season with knee surgery, but this was the other one) and I was kind of in the dumps.

A patrolling DPS trooper was the furthestest thought from my mind. I mean, no one works after midnight on an isolated country highway in the middle of nowhere.

As I was meeting a car, I noticed it pulled off the highway, and my thought was, "Isn't that a coincidence that someone would have car trouble just as we were meeting him?"

Then as we passed the car, the overhead lights came on. What a sinking feeling! I didn't even look down at the speedometer. . . I knew I'd been had.

And no, it's not the first traffic citation I've received, but it is the first in several years, thank goodness.

After rolling to a stop, I automatically got out my drivers' license and attempted to calm my nerves.

The patrolman was extremely nice, and after the lecture and my signing the ticket, he thanked me for my courtesy. If only he'd known how I actually felt!

Anyway, that was just the tip of the iceberg. . . getting the ticket, that is. Then began the process of dealing with the county JP. I've never seen the amount of red tape that's involved in paying a fine.

Of course, I volunteered to take Defensive Driving Course No. 8, something that 30 of us finished last Tuesday at the National Guard Armory. (No, I'm not going to list the names of them in case you were getting worried.) To say that was a waste of time would not be true. It was kind of interesting and not a bad refresher course especially on avoiding a head-on collision. Pick the oak tree if there's a choice between a car and the tree. That ought to tell you something about the relative speed of two autos crashing head-on.

There is a ton of paperwork to be done in letting DDC take the place of paying the fine, and there's a fallacy that it actually replaces the ticket. I was stopped for going 66, 11 miles an hour over the speed limit. Some say that if I'd been going three mph slower, I'd have never been stopped, but don't quote me on that one because I don't know.

Going the DDC route cost me \$63. Not to mention the eight hours of classroom work at the Armory. If I'd have paid the ticket and gone on, it would have been \$72.

In the meantime, I've become much more speed conscious and have been using the autopilot much more frequently. I also know now that for each 10 mph over 50 you drive you double the chances of serious injury.

Perryton's Mike Hargrove is becoming a media star. The March 20 issue of Sports Illustrated carries a description of manager Hargrove's role in the Cleveland Indians 1991 highlight video.

For those of you that Mike has hoped have forgotten, the Indians lost 105 games last season. Using that performance as a starting point, the video begins with the opening scene from Frank Capra's classic film, "It's a Wonderful Life."

Jimmy Stewart is standing on the rail of a bridge, staring down into the rushing water. He is depressed about his life and is ready to jump.

When the camera pans back, Hargrove has taken the place of Stewart and an angel in the form of Hall of Fame pitcher Bob Feller. Feller, who spent 18 years with the Indians, speaks.

He intones, "Don't jump, Mike. If you jump off the bridge now, you'll regret it."

That bit of cinematic history joins another role Hargrove recently played. He and his author wife Sharon were two of the primary spokespersons for the Perryton Economic Development Corporation video.

With that kind of experience, can Hollywood be far away?

Mike has every reason to look forward to the next few years at Cleveland. Long known as a revolving door club, Cleveland has had a hard time retaining players.

As soon as their original contract expires, most ball players that are good are lured by the big dollars of the larger market clubs. That is one of the reasons that Cleveland has such a young team.

Hargrove and the Indian management decided to try something new for the majors. They selected about a dozen good young players and signed them to three and four year contracts.

That will head off the bidding wars and arbitration disputes that have a tendency to tear up a major league club. Basically the same set of players will have a chance to play together for at least three years.

What has happened to the Indians has also happened to many other clubs in secondary television markets. One time I was visiting with the President's son and part of owner of the Texas Rangers, George W. Bush. He told me that just the cable rights to the New York Yankees was more money than the Rangers received for television for the entire season.

The ball clubs in those secondary markets have become farm teams for the clubs flush with cash. They develop talent and then those good ball players are purchased by the major city clubs using their greater media dollars.

Maybe signing key players to longer contracts will be the way to temporarily break that cycle. Best of luck to the Cleveland Indians and Mike during the 1992 season.

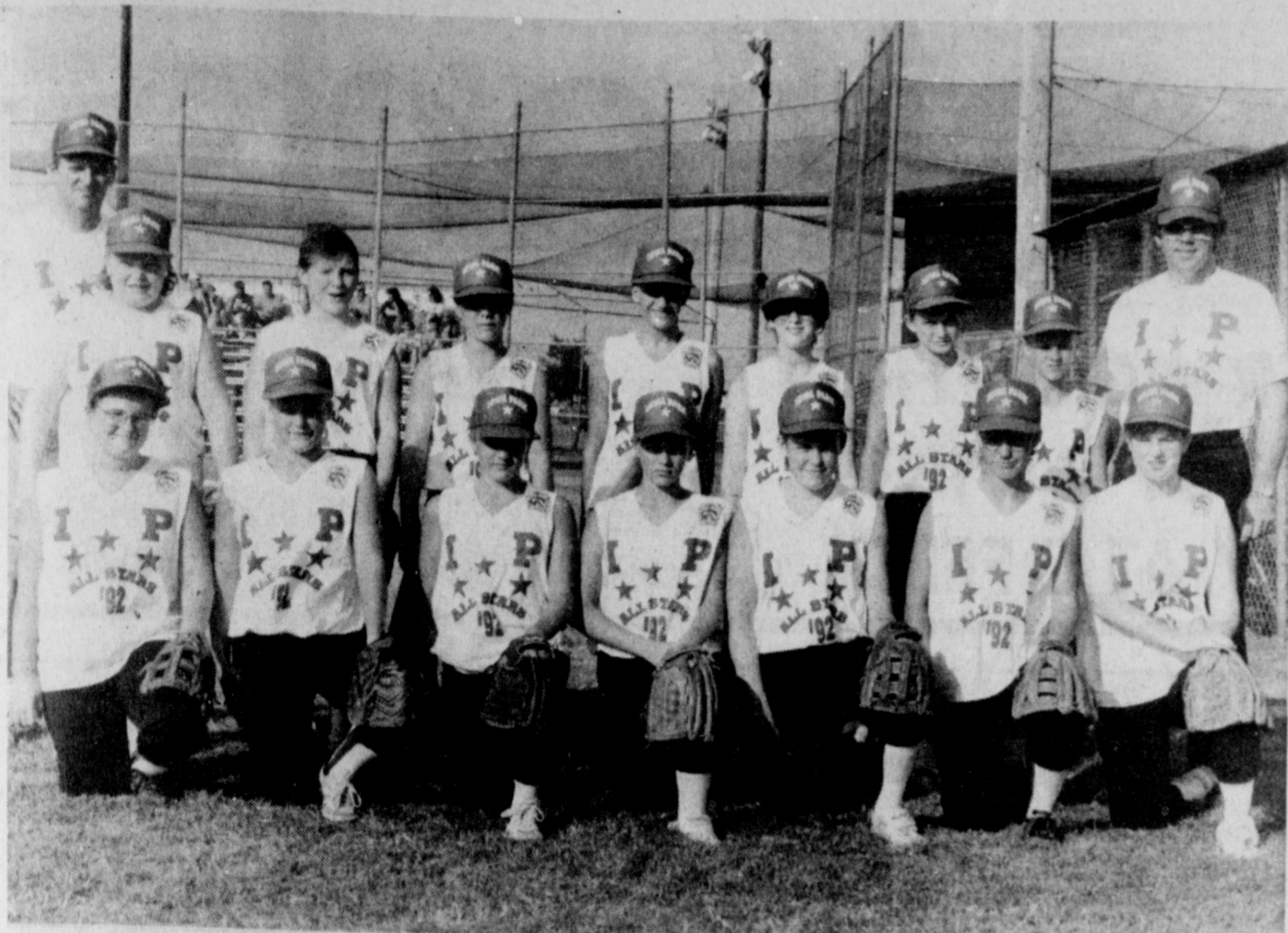

This year's coed slowpitch tournament, sponsored by the Iowa Park Optimist Club, is being expanded into two divisions.

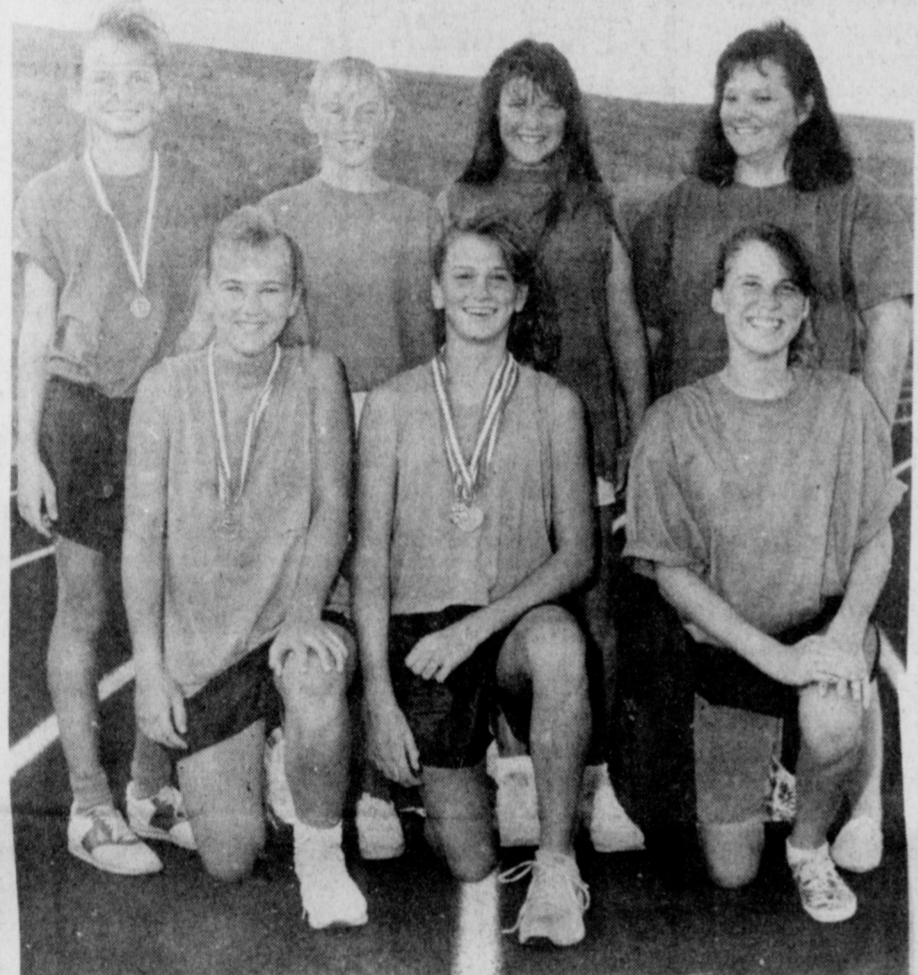
To be played July 27-31 at Burnett Field, one division will be for high school age teams and the other for junior high.

AUSTIN — Financially-strapped Texas legislators, disillusioned with judges whose rulings force expensive laws, watched the issue become more politically partisan last week.

On the GOP side, U.S. Attorney General William P. Barr representing President Bush filed a legal brief in Houston calling for an end to the 20-year-old prison reform lawsuit.

Barr accused inmates' attorneys of extorting state government. "The time is well overdue for the Ruiz case to be brought to an end," he said.

Later that day, State District Judge Scott McCown, an Austin liberal Democrat, said he will shut down Texas public schools if lawmakers don't pass a school funding plan by next June as ordered by the Texas Supreme Court.

While justice is theoretically non-partisan, Capitol observers see it as intensely partisan; the gray area of the Constitution which allows judges to influence or even mandate new laws flows from a strict vs. liberal interpretation argument to Republican-Democrat political warfare.

Showdown Promised

The prison reform lawsuit prompted U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice, an LBJ appointee, to order billions spent to achieve his vision for new prisons, effectively sapping money from public schools, despite a decade of new taxes and fee increases.

In a parallel lawsuit for equal public school funding, state judges in four years have struck down three successive plans offered by the Texas Legislature.

Last week, lawyers for 'poor' schools asked Judge McCown to appoint a special master to write a court-imposed plan.

McCown refused, but said he will force a showdown between the Legislature and the Texas Supreme Court.

McCown: 'Who Cares?'

McCown told lawyers he will enjoin state funds and maybe local tax dollars if the deadline comes and goes with no reform.

Then the question to overrule him will go to the Texas Supreme

Court, where Democrats hold a 5-4 majority.

"At that point, you either have a plan or you don't, and if you don't, fine. Nobody (no school) has any money, the schools are shut down; stick with that position and then let the bad guys scream," McCown declared.

"If there's not education in the State of Texas for six months, who cares?" he said.

Democrats Praise Gore

In the presidential election arena, Democrats praised the selection of U.S. Sen. Al Gore, D-Tenn. as Gov. Bill Clinton's running mate.

Party chairman Bob Slagle, who endorsed Gore's candidacy for president four years ago, jubilantly predicted Gore will bring Reagan Democrats back with the party faithful.

Gov. Ann Richards, who earlier said she would cull any veep nominee who wasn't pro abortion, predicted Reagan Democrats are "not at all happy with George Bush."

Meanwhile, Hispanic spokesman Henry Cisneros, who had urged Clinton to pick someone from the northeast, said he doubts he will ever seek public office again, but will continue public service in other ways.

"In a very short order, there will be five or six Hispanics who will be presidential or vice presidential material," Cisneros predicted.

Records Opened to Public

Consumers gained a new source of information last week when the Texas Department of Insurance opened its files of recent insurance company examination reports to the public.

A new rule enacted by the State Board of Insurance treats as open records final reports of examinations of a company's condition as of Dec. 31, 1990, or later.

The rule, which took effect July 2, applies to both financial and market conduct examinations. Conduct examinations look into treatment of policyholders, claimants and sales prospects.

Helpful Facts

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"Consumers want and need to make informed choices when shopping for insurance. A company's financial strength and its treatment of consumers are important considerations," said Claire Koriath, board chair.

"These reports should have been made public years ago. The current board is happy to reverse a bad policy and let the daylight of public scrutiny shine on these reports."

Other Highlights

■ Before entering a Dallas hospital for knee and back surgery, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said the Legislature will pump \$630 million more into public education next session, mostly from economic growth totaling \$1 billion, not new taxes.

■ Harris County recently declared its buildings smoke-free, but the county's judges voted to exempt themselves from the prohibition.

■ Gov. Richards appointed Travis County Sheriff Doyme Bailey to head her criminal justice division.

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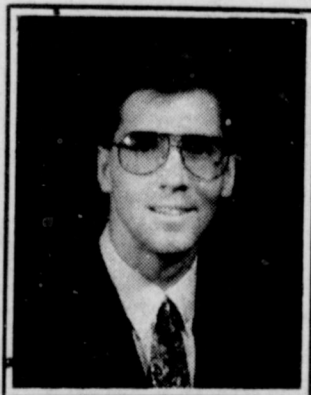



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WHATEVER HAPPENED TO BLUSHING AND BEING ASHAMED?
One of the Devil's greatest weapons against the Christian is desensitization. Little by little, inch by inch, we can lose the power to blush. Things that were once considered to be terribly offensive eventually do not even raise an eyebrow. The culprits are many, but here are some basic ones.
1. The change is the basic philosophical approach to right and wrong have been replaced by a gradual graying of the clear lines of black and white behavior. Situations rather than a "thus saith the Lord," now determine moral and ethical decisions.
2. The brazen intrusion of the media into the home. For example, the May 27th broadcast of "Doogie Howser" promoted pre-marital sex and downgraded virginity. 3. Increasing isolation for the morally conservative. This should really be nothing new for the church. Peter talked about those in the first century who thought it strange that Christians would not "plunge with them into the same flood of dissipation" (1 Peter 4:4). We need the exhortation of Paul, "...stand firm." (1 Corinthians 15:58).
There is something that will keep our sensitivity razor sharp. Read your Bible, pray, and expose yourself to nothing voluntarily in the pursuit of entertainment that will desensitize your spirituality! We need to say with Jesus, "Get behind me, Satan." (Matthew 4:10).
