

Kamay phone customers will soon vote on change

Residents of the Kamay, Valley View area should begin receiving a letter right after June 15 from their telephone company, GTE.

Those envelopes being sent to all telephone customers with a prefix of

438 will carry a ballot concerning extending local calling.

Phone customers in that area earlier this year sent a petition to the Public Utilities Commission in Austin, requesting the election be held.

Coordinating the effort was Shirley Cravens, and Woody Gossom, Precinct One commissioner, has been the committee's contact person with Austin.


In order to pass, 70 percent of those voting must be in favor of the change.

But, most importantly, the ballots must be completed and returned by the date specified in order for them to be counted, according to Lilo D. Pomerlean, hearing coordinator for the PUC.

Under the new service, residential customers will pay a maximum of \$3.50 per line and business customers \$7 per line per month for toll-free calling to Iowa Park, Holliday and Wichita Falls.

If the vote is affirmative, a cost study is submitted by the telephone carrier and reviewed by the PUC. Interim approval could be given by Aug. 29.

Any objection to the new fee schedule must be filed by Sept. 28. The presiding PUC officer could issue permanent approval by Oct. 21.

Barbour Trucking observing 75th

Seven and a half decades have come and gone since John B. Barbour, Sr., returned to Iowa Park after serving in World War I and completing his degree at the University of Oklahoma. He arrived with a Nash Quad truck to blaze the trail in the oilfield hauling industry and to establish John B. Barbour Trucking Co.

Now, a third generation John Barbour of Plano is serving as president of Barbour Trucking Co., Inc. that will celebrate its 75th anniversary Friday with open house at the headquarters office, 402 E. Highway.

Mayor Wayne House has proclaimed Friday Barbour Trucking Day in Iowa Park, and will present the proclamation to Barbour Friday. Several former employees of the company are expected to attend the celebration.

After noting the activity in the oil field business in this section of the country, Barbour Sr., recognized the need for something faster than a wagon and team to move drilling rigs from one location to another and moving supplies and equipment.

Barbour started the business, driving the truck himself, when trucks had just begun to replace wagons and teams in moving oilfield equipment.

From the beginning Barbours was always available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. John B. Barbour Sr., built his business on the precept of providing service that was as good as his word, which has been the ultimate goal through the 75 years.

In 1921 he married Verna Lindsey, a teacher and former classmate in Iowa Park High School. The business was operated out of their home. She answered the phone and would drive out to the field where Barbour was and tell him if he had another job.

By 1924 he had added two trucks and in 1925 he was operating nine trucks, doing all kinds of oilfield work, including stringing hundreds of miles of pipeline in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma, and eventually all over the United States and Canada.

Particularly in the early years of

the business many improvements in equipment and methods of handling oil field equipment were contributed to employees of the Barbour Trucking Company.

One of the first improvements was an A-frame arrangement used in loading. It was designed by Ralph Sisk, an employee, who later established a bullet business here. It was stationary, with a block and tackle hanging on it. It was operated by tying it onto the back of a truck and driving off.

Barbour later procured a "donkey winch". This type winch was used on ships at that time to raise anchor and load and unload. The winch was installed on truck No. 14, and was the first of its kind in this area. A little later the gin pole was designed by Sisk and installed by Barbour.

In 1927, the first dual tired truck was introduced. In 1936 the first rolling tailboard was designed by Barbour Trucking Co. It was not until 1941 that the self-loading float came into being.

In 1934 Barbour was asked by the Texas Company to bid on moving a 90,000 pound bubble tower and set it up. After much consideration he made a bid which he thought would be too high. It was accepted and then the work really started.

The tower arrived on two flat cars. Rollins "Doc" Woodall, who was foreman and supervisor of handling heavy equipment at that time, and other employees borrowed tires, trailers and other equipment and finally got the bubble moved the 22 miles in two days.

The third day, when they started raising the tower, water began to pour out. It was discovered that the tower had been half full of water all during the move. At that time it was the heaviest piece of equipment ever moved by truck in this area.

Some of the early-day employees, who helped to build the company were Gayle Park, George Butcher, Loyd Bell, Bud May, Arch Hughes, J.C. Horn, Burk Scott, Williom Black, Boyt Smith, Wade Park, Paul Craft, J.S. Bridges, and John Mixon.

Mrs. E. E. Wallis was office manager in the early years and Mrs. Eldon Thompson worked in bookkeeping.

The Barbour's son, the late J.B. Barbour Jr., grew up with the business. When he was nine years old he was shop clean-up boy, tire repair helper, etc. By the age of 11 he was working in the shop. After going through all the jobs, he knew the business pretty well by heart.

Both he and his father served their country during World War II and Verna kept things going during that time with dedicated employees.

St. Augustine lawns across the North Central Texas area could be at risk from disease attack.

Several St. Augustine lawns in the Wichita Falls region have been diagnosed with a disease called Take-All Patch.

This disease has also been confirmed in several adjoining counties and in the Metroplex. Both Bermuda

As in other years we will divide the children into three age groups: "Down to Earth" - 3 years through having just completed kindergarten; "Gone Beyond" - Just completed 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grades, and "Adventures Unlimited" - Just completed 4th, 5th, and 6th grades.

The "Down to Earth" readers will meet on Tuesday from 10 to 11 a.m.; "Gone Beyond" will meet on Thursday from 9:15 - 10:15 a.m.; and the

turf and St. Augustine are susceptible to this disease, however, St. Augustine lawns seem to be the hardest hit.

Symptoms include turf which is yellowed and thin in a circular pattern ranging from a foot to several yards in diameter. Affected areas may show irregular patterns as individual spots merge together.

Grass plants in affected areas have poorly developed roots and can be easily pulled out. Leaf blades may show a yellowish or bronze tint before the leaf sheath and blades die.

The roots of the plants in these affected areas are short and rotted, and the above ground stems (stolons) can easily be lifted from the ground.

St. Augustine or Bermuda lawns which are experiencing these types of symptoms should be tested for Take-All Patch. You can obtain a plant disease diagnostic form from your local county Extension office.

This form will give you instructions for submitting a tissue sample to our plant disease diagnostic laboratory at Texas A&M Univ. There is a \$15 fee for testing services. This test will be able to determine if your turf area is affected by this disease.

Lawns which are confirmed with a Take-All Patch disease problem will require special treatment.

A fungicide application made in late summer to early fall will be necessary. Rubigan or Bayleton 25 are recommended controls. Follow all label directions and rates. Lawn care professionals and pest control operators offer disease control services.

Other management strategies which will help reduce disease occurrence are: avoiding over-watering, core-aerating the soil, preventing thatch buildup, maintaining adequate levels of potassium and phosphorus, and lowering the soil pH level.

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





Local tax rates in line with state

Since 1982 the average property tax rate in Texas has more than doubled from 1.037% to 2.258% of market value in 1992-93.

During that period, the tax base grew by 18%; local governments raised tax levies by 144% or eight times as fast.

The figures were provided by the Texas Research League, an Austinbased public policy research group. and do not include tax changes in 1993-94 because statewide data are not yet available.

Property taxes in Texas averaged 2.258% of market value (selling price) in 1992-93, but varied widely throughout the state ranging from a high of 3.28% in Robstown to a low of 1.57% in Fairfield.

Local property taxes were 2.2807% of value. That rate consisted of 80.90% levied by the city, 1.1294% by Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District, and .3423% for Wichita County.

For a single-family house that would sell for \$80,000, the highest tax bill was \$2,678 in Dallas (in Wilmer-Hutchins ISD) and the lowest was \$1,232 tax in Dalhart. If the house were eligible for various homestead exemptions, the lowest tax would have been \$956 in New Braunfels compared to a high of \$2,371 in Robstown.

In Iowa Park the tax bill on an \$80,000 house in 1992-93 averaged \$1,803 if rented or \$1,747 if the homeowner claimed homestead exemptions.

The report points out that homeowners over the age of 65 are eligible for both state-mandated and local-option exemptions and would pay less. Furthermore, school tax bills for

the elderly are frozen at the level in place when the homeowner turned 65.

Equitable appraisals among different types of property are a significant factor in attracting new industry and jobs to a community. The 1992-93 property tax on industrial equipment and inventories valued at \$80,000 ranged from \$1,231 in Fairfield to \$2,639 in Robstown.

For property worth \$80,000 in Iowa Park the report shows a combined average tax of \$1,825 for all types of property, \$1,804 for industrial equipment and inventories and \$1,907 for commercial inventories and fixtures.

The report cites two reasons for the wide range of taxes.

First, local officials adopt budgets and set tax rates and the amount of homestead exemptions. Second, unless all property is appraised uniformly. tax burdens will vary.

The lowest average ratio of tax appraisals to market value (selling price) was 67.7% in Lakeview ISD (Hall County); the highest ratio was in Divide ISD (Kerr County).

Locally, the report shows a ratio of \$101.1% for all types of property in the Iowa Park CISD.


Taxes levied by counties ranged from \$0.157 per \$100 of market value in Titus County to \$1.122 in Jim Hogg County.


Including countywide special districts, county rates ranged from \$0.170 in Somervell County to \$1,160 in Schleicher County.

In Wichita County the true tax rate was \$0.341 per \$100.

Gary Wood, president of the Texas Research League, cautioned that the figures are for last year. Taxpayers already have paid their 1993-94 taxes.


