In 1934 Barbour was asked by the Texas Company to bid on moving 90,000 pound bubble tower and set it a bid which he thought would be high. It was accepted and then th work really started.

The tower arrived on two flat cars Rollins "Doc" Woodall, who was foreman and supervisor of handling heavy equipment at that time, and other employees borrowed tires, trail ers and other equipment and finally got the bubble moved the 22 miles in two days.

The third day, when they started raising the tower, water began to pour out. It was discovered that the towe had been half full of water all during the move. At that time it was the
heaviest piece of equipment eve moved by truck in this area.

Some of the early-day employees, who helped to build the company were Gayle Park, George Butcher Loyd Bell, Bud May, Arch Hughes J.C. Horn, Burk Scout, Williom Black Boyt Smith, Wade Park, Paul Craft, J.S. Bridges, and John Mixon

Mrs. E. E. Wallis was office manager in the early years and Mrs. Eldon Thompson worked in book keeping.

The Barbour's son, the late J.B Barbour Jr., grew up with the business,
