Council's agenda lengthy

When members of the city council begin their meeting at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, they will be facing an unusually lengthy agenda.

Included are calling the annual election, acting on major project bids, annexation of property, ordinances and a lease agreement concerning a golf course location.

The election will be called for May 7, as the terms of the mayor, Wayne House, and two aldermen, Johnny Crawford and Bud Mercer, expire this spring.

Bids will be considered on the construction of a new elevated water tower, to be located north of US 287, and related projects of a transfer pump station and 12-inch transmission line.

Also to be considered are bids to purchase a brush chipper. Previous bids

on that purchase were rejected, and re-advertised.

Three of the agenda topics all relate to Park Place Addition, a housing addition to be located east of Johnson road and north of County Hills Addition.

The third required public hearing to annex the first 9.758 acre tract of the planned addition will be held. Following that, if there are no objections, an ordinance finalizing the annexation will be considered.

Later in the meeting, Administrator Mike Price is to discuss a proposed agreement and deed of trust contracts in connection with the subdivision, according to the agenda.

Another ordinance to be considered pertains to regulating any sexually oriented business that might lo-

cate in the city.

A resolution will be considered which, if approved, would authorize the mayor to enter into a lease agreement with Acropolis Golf Club and Development Company for land around Lake Iowa Park, to be used as an 18-hole golf course.

Also on the agenda are:

- * authorizing the administrator to allocate additional funds to the Employee Benefit Trust Fund;
- * a discussion on plans for improvements at Hammonds Park;
- * consider re-appointment of Herschel Nipper to the Wichita Appraisal District Review Board;
- * and recognition of the Employee of the Month.

Big turnout for petition

With a day and a half remaining before their established deadline, the committee working on extended calling petitions in the Kamay area already had twice as many as were needed.

Shirley Cravens, the driving force to obtain toll free calling for residents in the 438 exchange area to Iowa Park, Holliday and Wichita Falls, said mid-Wednesday they already had 240 signatures.

The petition will be presented to the PUC with the expectation that, under newly-enacted legislation, residents of that area will be allowed to hold a mail-in election on the extended calling proposal.

Should everything be approved, the residents would only have to pay \$3.50 more than their basic rates for toll-free calling to the three cities. Residents of the three cities would not be affected with any rate increases.

There are 413 telephone customers on the 438 exchange, and only 100 signatures were required. But Mrs. Cravens said she expected to have 300 when signing is completed.

The petitions were available for signing at Kamay Electric Service, Coffman Grocery, Valley View Mini-Mart, and the Cravens' home.

They are to be picked up at 5 p.m. today.

Seven arrests reported here

Seven arrests for various offenses were reported during the past week on the Iowa Park Police Dept. blotter.

Two of the arrests were for public intoxication, one for assault, one for a suspect in a rural area drive-by shooting, one on a warrant issued by another department, and two for theft.

The theft arrest was made Wednesday of last week, when two male juveniles were picked up as suspects in a case reported by Wal-Mart.

One youth was charged with theft over \$20, when police recovered a BB pistol reportedly taken from the store. The other youth, when searched, was said to have some tobacco products believed to have been taken from Scobee's Mini-Mart. He was charged with theft under \$20.

One youth was already serving a probation period. Both were turned over to juvenile probation for further action.

After signing a plea and paying a fine of \$81.50, Jenkins was released about seven hours after the arrest.

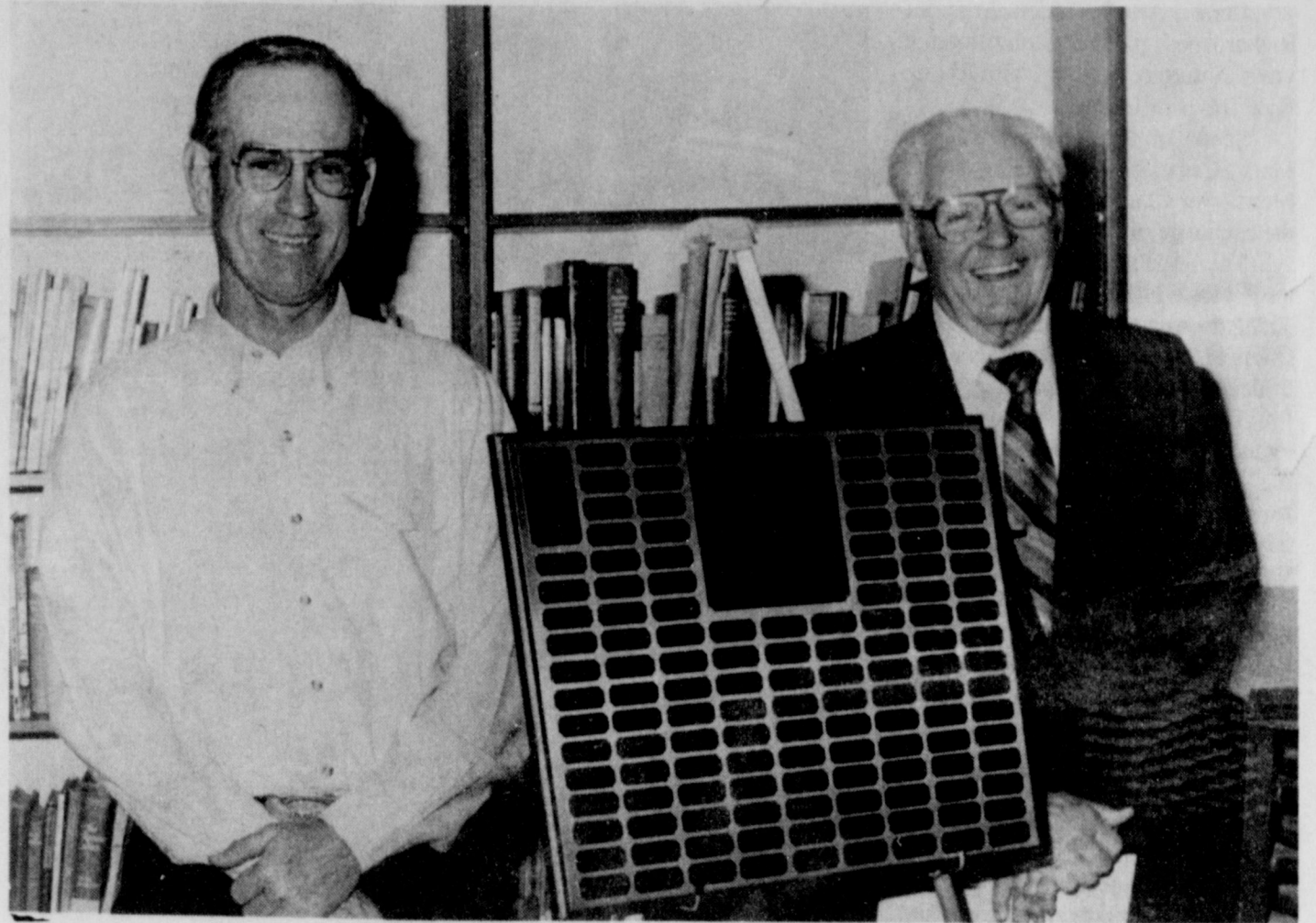
In response to a request from the county sheriff's office, a patrolman assisted in arresting a man believed to have been involved in a drive-by shooting Tuesday night.

Acting on information that the suspect might possibly be at a unit at Woodbriar Apartments, officers received permission to search the apartment after having been told the suspect was not there.

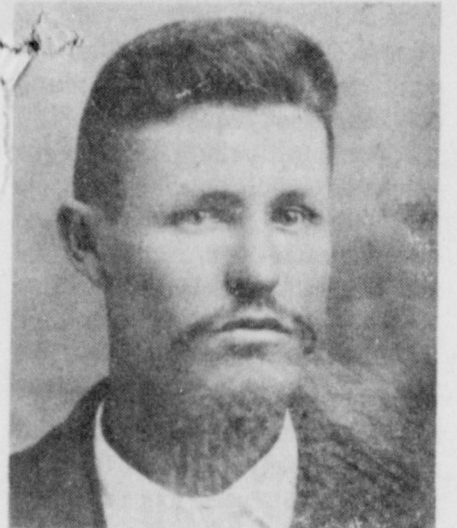
They found Earl Wayne Wilson, 29, in a closet.

Board reassigns Clensay

The board voted to reassign Robert Clensay, athletic director and head football coach, for the remainder of his contract.

There was no explanation of reasons given, and details of the reassignment are to be revealed in the future. The vote of the trustees was unanimous, with all members in attendance.

Clensay's contract extends through the 1995-96 school year.

The trustees' vote was made while considering contracts of all "key" personnel in the district.

The voting was held following an executive session, which was closed to the public, and lasted from 8:44 to 10:51.

However, there was another closed session on Clensay's contract held during a called meeting last Wednesday evening. That session, which lasted from 8:00 to 12:20, was held in order to shorten as much as possible Monday's meeting.

Clensay came to Iowa Park during the summer of 1991, and was elevated to athletic director and head football coach when that position was vacated by Lucky Gamble.

During the two years Clensay was head coach, the varsity football teams won five games and lost 15.

CONTRACTS EXTENDED

One-year contract extensions for each of the district's principals and assistant principals were all approved in one motion. They included principals Richard Davis, Randy Lovelady, Pat Cravens and Michael Hoover. Assistant principals listed were Dennis Brooks and Steve Moody.

Assistant superintendent Robert Palmer's contract also was extended through the 1994-95 school year.

In another motion, all four counselors' one-year contracts were approved. Those include LaRae Collins, Pat Davis, Diane Granbery and Janet Bowling.

Also, another unanimous vote by board members extended tax collector Allen Shewmake's contract through the 1994-95 school year.

Contracts for all classroom teachers will be considered during the board's regular meeting in March.

The first part of the meeting dealt with School Board Recognition Month in Texas. Each member of the board received a small floral arrangement from teachers.

Additionally, a permanent plaque on which all previous school trustees

Called meeting Tuesday to discuss AD position

A called meeting of the school board will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, concerning the athletic director position, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

To be held in the administration building, trustees are expected to iron out the details of filling that post.

The position was effectively vacated during Monday's meeting, when trustees voted unanimously to reassign Robert Clensay for the remainder of his contract, which extends through the 1995-96 school year.

who have served the district since 1910 was unveiled, and 13 of them had responded to be in the audience for the meeting.

May 7 was set for this year's trustee election. Terms will expire for Martha Dudley, Sheri Kennedy and Wendall House. In addition, Dennis Yeager, who has served the balance of one year on a term vacated by Robert Cook, must file if he wishes to serve the remaining year of that term.

Candidates can begin filing for a place on the ballot on Feb. 21, and deadline for filing will be Mar. 23.

Trustees approved a proposal made by Kidwell Elementary principal Hoover to change that school's gifted and talented student identification requirements.

He explained that the present program has not been working to accurately identify those students who qualify for the gifted and talented program, which, he said, had had only a 30 percent success rate.

Instead of the "pull out" program,

out of regular classes for advanced teaching at various times during a week, all students will receive the same teaching, but less frequently.

By the time the students move to Bradford Elementary, identifying the qualified students will be done more easily and accurately, trustees were told.

Other topics covered during the meeting included:

* approved a resolution in support of Kamay area residents seeking approval by the Texas Public Utilities Commission for extended local telephone calling;

* approved transfer of four students from the City View district, including freshmen Michael Fournier, Justin Stubblefield and Amanda Gordon, and sophomore Amanda Carrigan;

* approved a request to the Texas Education Agency for class size waiver for the fourth grade;

* approved a request to allow fifth and sixth grade gifted and talented students to take an overnight field trip to the Omniplex Science Museum in Oklahoma City;

* heard a report that 91.99 percent of the current taxes had been collected by Feb. 1, and an indication that several tax suits would likely be filed in the near future against those who have not paid;

* heard a report that a snack bar would be tried during lunch period at the high school over a two-week period;

* and heard a report that there are 2,012 students enrolled in classes here, down four from the same date last year; however, only Kidwell, with 34 fewer students, is down in enrollment and the other campuses are up.

One of the locals, Norma Diane Bell Hanson, was graduated magna cum laude, which requires a grade point average of 3.70 to 3.89.

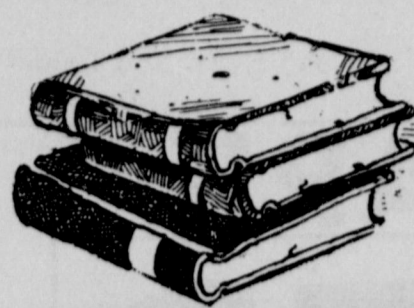

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As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



There's an old saying among community newspaper column writers: "Whenever you're stumped for a subject, just write about the topic most often heard at the coffee shop."

Well, that's simple. It's the weather that is at least mentioned over virtually every cup of coffee consumed around Iowa Park.

You know, she was right? There's little else that Mother Nature can heap onto Californians that they've not had this winter. Except for that big earthquake that could possibly break the western portion of the state off and let it sink into the Pacific Ocean.

Knowing this week's weather was going to be cold here, I was really concerned. My gosh, I had burned all my fireplace wood supply, finishing it

off a couple of weeks earlier!

But everything was made "all better" Tuesday afternoon.

With a simple dialing of a telephone number found in the *Leader's* classifieds, a load of fine oak wood was stacked in our back yard -- and within two hours of the call, my dreaded anticipation of this cold front dissolved!

So, when I go to the coffee shop today, I'll have that supplier's number in my pocket, and offer it to whomever complains about the weather.

Mrs. John Clapp

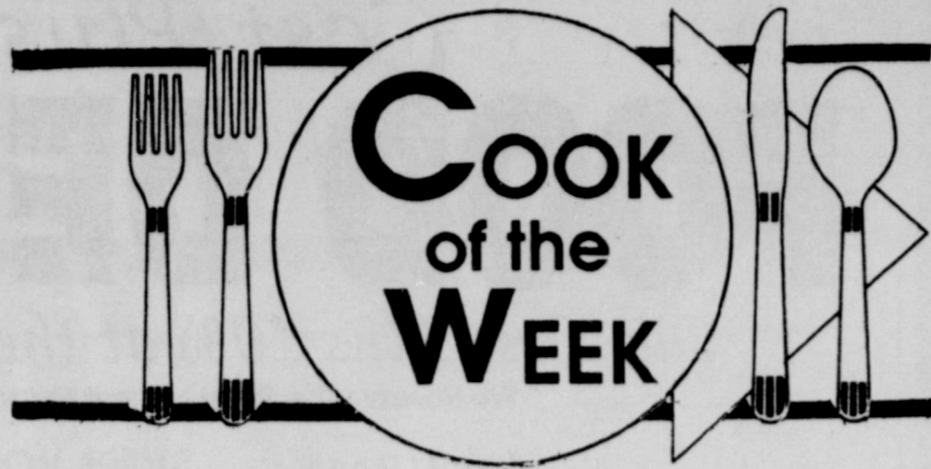
"For someone who doesn't like to cook, I've certainly done a lot of it," said Louise (Mrs. John) Clapp, this week's featured cook.

For someone who doesn't like to cook, the appetizing dishes she has prepared over the years are certainly a hit with her family. The "Broccoli and Corn Casserole" is a favorite of her children and grandchildren, and her children still call home to get the recipe for "Corn Pone Pie." Perhaps the most unusual recipe is for "President's Pudding," one that Louise picked up at Mary Mac's Restaurant in Atlanta, Ga. This dessert is a favorite of President Jimmy Carter and, of course, one of the ingredients is peanut butter.

Louise grew up in north Georgia and was living in Atlanta when she met John. He was a pilot in the Marine Corps, stationed at Jacksonville, Fla. When a hurricane was threatening the area, he helped fly the airplanes to safety in Atlanta. John and Louise met during that September weekend of 1945, married in January of 1946, and moved to Texas.

John was in the sand and gravel business, but sold after his father retired. He went to work for Northrup Aviation at Sheppard AFB and retired in 1985.

Louise worked 19 years in the home office at White's before retiring



in 1984.

The Clapp's have three children and four grandchildren. Their daughter, Mabel Conner, lives in Decatur, and sons, John William "Bill" III lives in Austin, and Jim lives in Iowa Park.

Louise and John have always been active in their church and community. Both are inactive elders of the First Presbyterian Church, and Louise is church treasurer. While their children were in school, Louise was active in the PTA, and John served two terms, one as president, on the school board.

Louise is a member and immediate past president of the Iowa Park Garden Club. She enjoys quilting and likes to read.

She said that John also likes to read, but his favorite pastime is fishing - not one of her favorite things to do. Sometimes she accompanies him to a favorite fishing place, but takes along a book or works on her quilting.

They are both active in the Iowa Park Clean and Green beautification committee, and are regular players in the bridge club at the Recreational Activities Center.

Broccoli & Corn Casserole

1 pkg. frozen broccoli
1 pkg. frozen whole kernel corn
Cook until tender; drain well. Put broccoli in casserole dish with corn on top and cover with:

1 - 8 oz. jar Cheez Whiz
1/2 stick oleo
1 cup croutons
Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Corn Pone Pie

1 lb. ground beef
1/3 cup chopped onion
2 tsps. chili powder
3/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
2 - 8 oz. cans tomato sauce
Brown meat and onions together; add seasonings and tomato sauce. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. Pour into casserole dish and top with corn bread batter. Bake 20 minutes at 425 degrees.

Corn Bread Batter

1 1/2 Tbsp. flour
3/4 cup corn meal
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. soda
1 egg
1 cup buttermilk
Mix well and pour over meat mixture.

Squaw Corn

1 - 17 oz. can cream style corn
1 med. bell pepper, chopped
1 med. onion, chopped
2 eggs, beaten
Salt and pepper to taste
Fry 2 strips of bacon crisp and set aside. Saute onion and pepper until tender. Add to other ingredients (except bacon) and mix well. Pour into casserole dish and crumble bacon over the top. Bake at 350 degrees until bubbly and slightly set.

Chicken Spaghetti

1 med. onion, diced
1/2 cup celery, diced
1 green pepper, diced
1 lb. spaghetti, cooked
1 chicken
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 small jar pimentos, chopped
1 pint chicken broth
Grated cheese

Cook chicken and remove meat from bones. Saute onion, celery and pepper in small amount of oil. Mix all together except for cheese and put in large casserole dish. Sprinkle grated cheese on top and bake 45 minutes at 375 degrees.

Cooked Fruit

1 can apricots
1 can pineapple chunks
1 can peaches
1 can pears
1 jar maraschino cherries
Drain fruit and place in refrigerator overnight. Discard juice.
Melt 3/4 cup brown sugar and 1 stick oleo together. Pour over fruit and cook, uncovered, in 350 degree oven 45 minutes. Serve hot.
NOTE: This is good served with the "Beef Tips."

Highway official speaks to Clean and Green workers

Bill Presson, District Maintenance Manager with the Texas Department of Transportation, spoke to members of Iowa Park Clean and Green Thursday and outlined some of the ways DOT could work with groups and organizations on beautification projects.

He was accompanied to the meeting, held Thursday afternoon at the Recreational Activities Center, by Billy Hibbs of Electra and Fred Hill of Wichita Falls. Both are local maintenance foremen for DOT.

Presson showed slides of projects in Burkburnett and Wichita Falls in which the department has been involved. They often assist groups that want to adopt for improvement areas on state highway right-of-ways, and have worked with civic organizations, businesses and youth groups, as well as municipalities.

In addition to Wichita Falls and Burkburnett, Presson said that, in this area, DOT has worked with Electra, Seymour and Muenster, who are members of Keep Texas Beautiful and winners of the Governor's Achievement Awards.

Presson said that if a group wants to adopt a median or other area situated on state highway right-of-way, they need to send a letter to the DOT outlining their plan and requesting help. Many of the requests they receive already have a plan drawn up,

but he said the department has a landscape architect who can be used if needed.

The club, etc. who adopts an area is allowed to place a sign there with their name on it, and is responsible for maintenance of the project after it is completed.

Presson also discussed the proper way to sow wildflowers, a project the committee is planning for the fall.

During the business session, conducted by Clean and Green chairman

What needs to be done to help children of alcoholics

(This is the fourth and final of a series of articles on alcoholics in the home by Diane Granbury, school counselor)

In the previous articles the information about children of alcoholics has focused on identifying the problem drinker and how the nonalcoholic family members are affected. Today I want to discuss what needs to be done to help the children.

If children have at least one caring adult that they can depend on, they can survive in the alcoholic or drug-addicted home.

This adult does not even have to be a relative. What is important is that the daily needs of the child for food, clothing, shelter, and someone to talk to are met. Some adult needs to be interested in the events of the day for the child and see that the child attends to homework and chores.

Expecting the child to help with additional duties at home because of the alcoholic parent's inability does not harm the child as long as the additional responsibilities are within his or her capabilities and not overwhelming.

Remember that a child needs to have play time every day and sacrificing too much of this play time for extra "adult" responsibilities (like caring for younger siblings) is not desirable.

Homelife should go on as normal as possible in spite of the alcoholic. Meal times and bedtime should be part of a routine. Holiday activities and birthdays should have an important emphasis. Sports, club activities and regular family entertainment should be encouraged.

The more the child becomes involved in outside activities with others, the better the chances that he or she will have of developing a positive outlook about life.

As discussed in an earlier article, the tendency is for members of an alcoholic family to disengage from social contact for fear of embarrassment. What should be done is just the opposite. Being with others will counteract the problems caused by such isolation.

If the alcoholic is physically and/or verbally abusive, then the attempt to keep the homelife as normal as possible is fairly impossible. Children should not be exposed to physical or verbal abuse directed at them or another family member. This exposure will cause longterm problems for the child.

The well parent should not tolerate such abuse in any way, shape, or form! There is a process called "intervention" where the problem drinker or drug abuser can be confronted about his or her behavior and problem.

If intervention is not successful, then either the abusive person should be made to leave, or the well parent and children should take steps to move to a safe environment. I am often asked why someone would tolerate abuse, and the most common reason is that this person was a victim of abuse as a child herself (or himself).

Children of alcoholics deserve help for themselves, even if their parent(s) do not seek help. These children need to hear in counseling that they are not the cause of the drinking; they cannot control the drinking; and they cannot cure the disease of alcoholism. They need to

understand that the parent is not bad, just sick.

There are several places children can get counseling. Alcoholics Anonymous has groups for pre-adolescent children called "Ala-Tots", and adolescent children called "Ala-Teens". The well parent can attend Ala-Non. Involvement in such groups can help family members know what to do for themselves and what works to get the alcoholic to recognize the problem drinking.

Other sources of counseling can be church, school, public or private therapists. If you are interested in more information, please contact me at 592-5841.



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

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

February is a prime time to plant fruit trees, pecan trees, and berries for your home landscape or commercial orchards. You can insure planting success by selecting research-proven performers for the area. Through years of extensive research and development, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has developed a list of recommended cultivars for the Texoma region.

It is always a good idea to include at least two cultivars of each crop in the home orchard planting as one may do better than another in certain years. Remember, fruit trees do not grow true from seed. Instead, the desired fruit-bearing cultivar is budded or grafted onto a particular rootstock which is well adapted to the soils of our area. The correct rootstock is just as important as the recommended fruit-bearing cultivar.

Nurseries and garden centers will be carrying several of the recommended varieties listed below. Check with your local nursery professional for some of these proven performers.

Apples - Red Delicious, Starkspur Golden Delicious, Smoothee, Gala, Holland, Jersey mac, Mollie's Delicious, Fuji, Granny Smith; Rootstocks - Mature tree size of any of the above cultivars can be regulated by grafting onto one of the following: dwarf tree - M9 rootstock; semi-dwarf tree - MM 111 rootstock; full-sized tree - seedling rootstock; Cross-pollination - to ensure adequate cross-pollination and thus good fruit production, plant at least two cultivars

Apricots - Bryan, Hungarian, Moorpark; Rootstock to request - "Lovell" for alkaline clay soils, "Nemagard" for acid sandy soils - expect full crop only one year out of five

Blackberries - Cultivars whose canes are thorny: Brazos, Womack, Shawnee, Rosborough

Cherries, Sour - Montmorency

Citrus, Satsuma - Satsumas are not winter hardy in north central Texas. Thus, they should be grown as patio or terrace container plants, in containers of 20 gallon capacity or greater. Move plants into a sunny location indoors when temperatures drop below 26F. When, in a few days, temperatures

exceed 26F, move plants back outside into full sun

Grapes, American - Black Spanish, Champaign, Golden Muscat - these cultivars resistant to Pierce's Disease

Grapes, Hybrid - Seibel 9110, S.V. 12-375, Aurelia, S.V. 12-309 - these cultivars susceptible to Pierce's Disease; however, they have lived for several years in many areas of the state where occurrence of this disease is quite common

Grapes, Hybrid Seedless Table - Flame, Reliance, Himrod, Glenora, Venus (seed remnants) - these cultivars susceptible to Pierce's Disease

Jujubes - Li, Lang

Peaches - Cultivars categorized by period of the growing season in which they ripen - very early: Bicentennial; early: Sentinel, Ranger, Harvest; mid-season: Redglobe, Milam, Majestic, Denman, Loring, Belle of Georgia (white flesh); late: Dixiland, Redskin, Jefferson; very late: Frank, Ouachita Gold; Rootstock to request - "Lovell" for alkaline clay soils, "Nemagard" for acid sandy soils

Peaches, Dwarf - Bonanza II, Early Golden Glory - These are genetic dwarfs; they produce full-sized fruit on very dwarf plants

Pears - Orient, Moonglow, Kieffer, LeConte, Ayres, Garber, maxine, Warren - Rootstocks to request - Calleryana, Old Home

Pears, Asian - Shineiki, 20th Century, Hosui; Rootstocks to request: Calleryana, Old Home; cross-pollination: to ensure adequate cross-pollination, plant at least two cultivars; or, one Asian plus one regular pear cultivar - Asian pears are susceptible to fire blight

Pecans - Moderate to extensive management situations: Sioux, Pawnee, Desirable, Choctaw, Kiowa, Caddo, Cape Fear - Low management situation: seedling (ungrafted)

Persimmons, Oriental - Cultivars with astringent fruit: Eureka, Hachiya, Tane-nashi, Tamopan; Cultivars with non-astringent fruit: Fuyu (Fuyugaki) - This cultivar is more susceptible to cold; top of tree may sustain freeze injury during some winters in north central Texas

Plums - Morris, Methley, Ozard Premier, Bruce - Rootstock to request: Lovell for alkaline clay soils, Nemagard for acid sandy soils; Bruce requires cross-pollination

Raspberries - Dorman Red
Strawberries - Sunrise, Cardinal, Allstar - plants must be completely covered with mulch (straw, dry leaves, etc.) when temperatures drop below 15F. When, in a few days, temperatures exceed 15F, pull back mulch to again expose foliage.

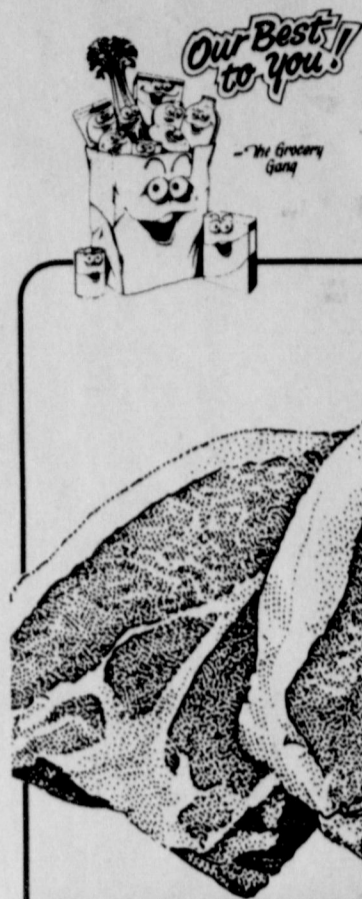
