School launches search for new football coach

Iowa Park schools could possibly name a new head football coach and athletic director as early as the second week in March.

The board of trustees met Tuesday night to officially launch a search for the replacement of Robert Clensay, who was "reassigned" during last week's meeting.

Tuesday's meeting, which did not

begin until about 8:35 p.m., began with a round table discussion on criteria for selecting the replacement.

The board then went behind closed doors for an executive session on personnel, which lasted from 9 to 11:05. No official action was taken following the closed session.

Supt. Glen Mitchell proposed a tentative timetable for making the selection, suggesting applications be cut off Friday, Feb. 25, and deciding on a selection by Mar. 8.

Mitchell said his office began receiving inquiries from candidates almost immediately after last week's decision by the board.

By Tuesday, the administration office had received 36 inquiries, and in response the candidates had been mailed applications.

When the school held its last opening for the position, more than 100 applications were received. Lucky Gamble was hired, and left after one year, and was succeeded by Clensay just before the start of the 1992-93 school year.

The board, during its regular monthly meeting when considering contacts for all administrative personnel, voted unanimously to reassign Clensay for the duration of his contract, which extends through the 1995-96 school year.

As to who is serving as interim athletic director, Mitchell explained the campus principals -- Richard Davis at high school and Randy Lovelady at junior high -- in effect assumed those responsibilities after last week's meet-

Mitchell told the board his office has already had "good response from all levels, AAAAA on down."

The board is tentatively slating its next called meeting for 7 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 24, Mitchell said.

Included in the list of criteria the board will look for when considering a new head football coach and athletic director were:

* strong interpersonal skills: successful in working with the adminis-

tration, staff, players and community; * role model (high values and

- * mature/experienced;
- * organized;
- * strong management skills;
- * leadership qualities; * clear record with University Interscholastic League:
 - * successful winning program;
 - * good with kids;
 - * committed to all sports;
 - * treat all (athletes) equally.

All three administrators at the meeting -- Mitchell, Davis and Lovelady -- said they will give a very critical look at any candidate about whom, during their investigation into backgrounds, observe what they termed as "red flags."

Board chairman Keith Fisher offered a suggestion that the group should meet as often as necessary during the replacement search, so the eventual selection could be made as early as possible.

The superintendent said Wednesday he has already begun making contacts concerning some applications and even potential candidates.



NEARING REALITY - Some 10 years after an area at Lake Iowa Park was dedicated to the late George Hammonds, in memory of his years service on the city council, the George Hammonds Park is expected to be ready for use this spring. Aldermen discuss lease agreement for proposed golf course

The city council accepted bids for the construction of a new elevated water tower, approved an ordinance annexing a housing addition area, and discussed leasing land at Lake Iowa Park for a golf course.

Phoenix Construction submitted the lowest of four bids to build the city's new water tower on the north side of US 287.

The Phoenix bid was \$232,235, and the highest bid on the same tower was \$314,180.

Of the seven bids to construct a pump station and lay a 12-inch water line from the Johnson Road tower to the new tower, Bowles Construction of Wichita Falls was the low bidder.

Bowles' bid of \$187,202 was more than \$20,000 less than the next lowest bid. Highest bid was \$258,543.

Mayor Wayne House commented that the only bad thing about the new tower project was the fact that it likely would not be completed before August.

The council had received numerous complaints from residents in the northern area during the past year, about low water pressure. Those complaints, and plans for additional housing in that area, prompted the council's action.

Following the third and final public hearing concerning the proposed annexation of a 9.758-acre tract of land, the initial phase of the Park Place Addition, an ordinance completing the process was approved.

Developers of the addition are Tommy Key and Tommy Hammonds.

The council has agreed to lay the water and sewer lines, as well as have the street constructed, and the developers will reimburse the city for its costs, plus interest, as each lot is sold, it was explained.

After discussing the first draft of a lease agreement for land around Lake Iowa Park, which is to be finalized in the near future, aldermen approved a resolution authorizing the mayor to enter into a lease agreement with Acropolis Golf Club and Development Company.

The council agreed to lease the property for approximately the same rate it has been leased in the past for grazing rights.

Estimating 100 acres, the lease is for \$5 per acre per year, with the agreement to be reviewed in 10 years.

Mayor House told the council the representatives of Acropolis have not asked the city to expend any money on

The representatives, House said, have only asked for use of the lake's raw water, and they understand that should a dry spell necessitate a curtailment of use, they would agree.

As was the case of a previouslyproposed golf course in that area, when Rip Smith wanted to build one, affluent from the wastewater treatment plant also is desired. Acropolis expects to lay the line for that source, House said.

During a general discussion on the course, it was brought out that the developers seek in the future to build an additional 27 greens, in addition to the initial 18. Not all city land would be used for the courses, and adjoining property would be acquired.

Different housing areas would be constructed in the area of the courses, and all would become part of the city,

A second ordinance was passed during the meeting. It would regulate any sexually-oriented business that might decide to locate inside the city limits.

Acting on bids received for the purchase of a brush chipper, the council approved a bid of \$18,200 to buy a unit manufactured by Vermeer Equipment of Texas.

Included in the motion to purchase was the addition of an automated feeding attachment, for an additional

Another resolution approved authorized the mayor to execute a deed of trust for the sale of two housing lots to Bill Steger for \$10,050

The two lots are on land where the water tower once stood at Gordon Lake.

The council officially called its annual city election for May 7. The terms of Mayor House and Aldermen Bud Mercer and Johnny Crawford expire this spring.

Filing dates for candidates open Monday and end Mar. 23.

Administrator Mike Price was authorized to move budgeted funds into the Employee Benefit Trust Fund.

Also taking place during the meeting, the council approved the reappointment of Herschel Nipper to the

Stuffed Cabbage

1 beaten egg 1/2 cup milk

1/4 cup finely chopped onion 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

3/4 tsp. salt Dash pepper

1/2 lb. ground pork and 1/2 lb. ground beef (or 1 lb. ground beef)

3/4 cup cooked rice 6 large or 12 medium cabbage leaves

1 - 10 oz. can condensed tomato soup

1 Tbsp. brown sugar 1 Tbsp. lemon juice

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In a bowl combine egg, milk, onion, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper and mix well. Add meat and cooked rice; mix well.

Remove center vein of cabbage leaves, keeping each leaf in one piece. Immerse leaves in boiling water for about 3 minutes or until limp; drain.

Place 1/2 cup of meat on each leaf; fold in sides. Starting at unfolded edge, roll up each leaf, making sure folded sides are included in roll. Arrange all in 12x7 1/2x2 baking dish.

Stir together condensed tomato soup, brown sugar and lemon juice. Pour sauce mixture over cabbage rolls and bake, uncovered, in a 350 degree oven 1 1/4 hours, basting once or twice with sauce. Makes 6 servings.

Mexican Cornbread

1 pkg. cornbread mix

1 lb. ground beef

1 large onion

1 can green chilies, chopped 1 can cream style corn

1 1/2 cups grated cheese

Mix cornbread mix as directed. Brown meat, onion and green chilies in skillet.

In another greased skillet add 1/2 cornbread mixture, then add meat mixture. Add corn, grated cheese and remaining cornbread mix. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven until golden brown, or about 45-50 minutes.

Bacon Spaghetti

1 lb. bacon, chopped 2 onions, chopped

2 bell peppers, chopped

1 lb. mushrooms, sliced

1 can black olives, pitted 1 pkg. spaghetti

1/2 large jar Cheez Whiz

Cook bacon in frying pan; remove bacon and 1/2 the grease. In remaining grease, cook onions, bell peppers, mushrooms and olives. Drain off fat from vegetables.

Chicken Curry

2 cups cooked, diced chicken, both light and dark meat

3 tart apples, cored and diced in 1/2inch pieces

1/2 cup sweet onion, diced in 1/2- inch pieces

1/4 cup soft butter

1 tsp. curry

3 Tbsps. flour 1 cup milk

1 - #2 can chicken broth

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper 4 cups cooked fluffy rice

Put apples, onion and butter in a saucepan and saute over low heat until the onion is transparent and soft. Stir in the curry and flour. Add the milk and chicken broth and continue to cook over low heat until slightly thickened. Stir frequently to prevent lumps and sticking. Add the salt, pepper and chicken and continue to cook 5 minutes longer, or until the chicken is

heated. Divide the hot rice in four equal portions and top with the curry mixture. Serving piping hot. Serves 4.

VARIATIONS: Use 1 - 10 oz. can cream of chicken soup in place of the chicken broth. Add one additional cup of milk. Decrease the curry to 1/2 teaspoon for a milder flavored dish. Serve over boiled noodles instead of rice.

Pumpkin Ice Cream Pie

1 can ready made pumpkin pie filling 1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream

1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice 2 graham cracker pie crusts

Mix ice cream, pie filling and spice, then spread in pie crusts evenly.

Cover and freeze.

Stir Fry

3 pork chops, sliced thin 1/2 cup teriyaki sauce

1/4 cup soy sauce 1/2 tsp. ginger

1 Tbsp. brown sugar

Mixed vegetables of choice (cabbage, carrots, celery, char, bean sprouts, water chestnuts, onion, broccoli, bell peppers, etc.)

Marinate pork in sauce with seasoning. Heat wok using 2 tablespoons oil. Drain sauce from meat, saving it for later. Place meat in wok, stirring vigorously. When meat is brown, add vegetables. When almost done, add sauce and stir until covered. Serve over rice. Makes 8 servings.

I wonder how many "experts" will file for places on the city and school election ballots this spring.

I figure they will be waiting for the doors of city hall and school administration to open Monday morning, to get their names on the ballots. That's the first day for filing.

If you're like me, you hear these experts make their observations at the coffee shops, on the street corners, over the back yard fence, or at various meetings.

They can tell you exactly what the problems of the city and school are, and what needs to be done to correct them. And some can be even more specific about who shouldn't have been elected to make decisions.

The problem is, however, I've never, ever, seen the faces of some of these experts at any of the meetings of

the elected bodies. They apparently already know everything they need to

But over the years, they've never seemed to find the time to offer their services to the voters.

Being a member of an elected body is not always as simple as it may appear to one who has never served. Sometimes, these perceived solutions simply can't be achieved for one reason or another.

And, as is the case many times, the perceived needed solution would not solve anything in the first place, could cause even more problems, or the perceived problem fails to even exist.

I'll tell you this. Only in one or maybe two rare occasions, have I ever heard a former elected official ever criticize the actions of an existing elected body.

I figure they know better, because


they've already been there and realize those in office are doing what they believe to be best for those they represent, based on the information they have.

And that brings up another point. Usually these expert critics never ask an elected person about the facts of a situation.

But, whether you believe there are problems in the city or school system, and would simply like to serve as a member of the elected bodies, now is the time to put your name on the ballots.

The satisfaction of serving your community is all you'll get out of it, because the meeting times and dates always seem to conflict with your personal schedule.

And the pay does absolutely nothing for your bank account.



Worth Quoting

The deadline passed and an amazing thing happened in Ochiltree county politics. The only contested local races in this year's primary election will be on the Republican ballot.

Yes, in less than 10 years, this county has changed from having most of the local races decided in the Democratic primary, to one that is mostly Republican. In addition, many of the current office holders that filed for re-election have chosen to change to the Republican party.

I commend those that have seen the light and decided to make the party switch. They are joining a growing number of individuals that have decided that they have not changed, but the Democratic party has left them.

Others have made the same decision. Our senior U.S. Senator Phil Gramm initially ran for office as a Democrat and won election to the seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. During his service in the House he decided that the Democratic party did not represent his philosophy of govemment, so he decided to change and be a Republican.

Instead of merely announcing that intention, he resigned his seat and then ran as a Republican for the same office. He won overwhelmingly and then moved on to his present job as Senator.

There was no other decision other than to be a Democrat on my part. I actively campaigned for Democratic Governor Preston Smith and a number of other office holders.

When I got out of college and moved to Houston, I began to re-examine the Democratic party. As the old guard began to retire and die off, it shifted steadily toward the left.

Whereas before most party activists were business people, the leadership of the Democratic party moved to civil rights activists, liberal lawyers, government employees and others.

The party began to advocate various new "rights" for individuals, such as the right to an abortion, gay rights, rights for criminals, animal rights, environmental rights and many others. New groups of "victims" were found and their causes championed.

At the same time the Democrats insisted on taking "rights" away from other individuals. Tax increases took the right to spend your money as you please from vast numbers of middle income workers. New rules and regulations infringed on individual property rights.

Slowly I began to realize that the Democratic party was not interested in individual freedom, just creating more government jobs and growing the welfare state. That is when I became a



AUSTIN - U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's attorney said she will testify on her own behalf in a felony trial for ethics violations that allegedly occurred while she was state treasurer.

Defense attorney Dick DeGuerin made the announcement as jury selection continued last week for the trial in Fort Worth.

Judge John F. Onion Jr., to make sure a panel of 12 jurors and two alternates are found, has called in 20 more jury candidates for questioning, as lawyers struck about 30 of the original 40 candidates on the list.

According to the Houston Chronicle, the central legal question that remains to be settled is whether prosecutors can use evidence obtained in a raid on the state Treasury a few days after Hutchison was elected to the Senate.

Her lawyers have said the seized records should not be admitted as

Hutchison is charged with using state employees and equipment to do political and personal work, and tampering with records that might have proved wrongdoing.

The Republican senator pleaded innocent in last week's proceedings. She has maintained that charges against her were brought by Democrats seeking to destroy her political future.

Telephone Records Released

Gov. Ann Richards last week released nine months of resurrected long-distance records pieced together through computer data

Also released were all cellular office in 1991, all incoming tollfree calls and copies of calls made by employees on state-issued credit

The governor's office has been criticized for its decision last August to destroy more than two years of the telephone records, which under the law are public

Hannah's Prison Warning

Secretary of State John Hannah Jr. warned last week that despite reports of 6,000 empty prison beds, state penitentiaries are near their legal capacity.

Hannah, who has been nominated to become a federal judge, said his investigation showed that any attempt to increase the prison population "would immediately get the state back into federal court."

Gov. Richards asked Hannah to look into the case of empty beds and report whether any could be used to ease the overflow of state inmates in county jails.

The question of the empty beds surfaced last month in preliminary findings of a prison system audit by Comptroller John Sharp's office.

Teachers Group Endorses

Texas' largest teacher organization has endorsed incumbent Democrats for the top six statewide offices and Democrat Jim Mattox for the U.S. Senate.

The 95,000-member Texas State Teachers Association said the endorsements were based on the candidates' positions on public schools, education funding and opposition to private school vouchers.

"What happens to education in the 1995 Legislature will be determined by what happens in the March 8 primary," TSTA president Richard Kouri said. "We will press that hard reality on our members during the campaign cycle."

Receiving endorsements were Gov. Richards, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Attorney General Dan Morales, Comptroller John Sharp, Treasurer Martha Whitehead and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, all Democrats.

Job Growth in Valley

Cities in the Rio Grande Valley remained among the national leaders in job growth in a recent 12month period, according to a report from the Economic Outlook Center at Arizona State University.

An employment growth rate of 5.4 percent, or 5,900 jobs, made the McAllen-Edinburg area fifth best among all U.S. metropolitan markets from November 1992 to November 1993.

Victoria in South Texas climbed from 72nd place to sixth place nationwide with 5.3 percent job growth. Close behind were Laredo, ranking 10th at 4.5 percent, and Brownsville-Harlingen, ranking 11th at 4.3 percent.

Evangelist Wins Court Round

A Texas Supreme Court justice's opinion says evangelist Robert Tilton's rights have been violated by a trial judge's court order to turn over records of church members who claimed healing miracles.

Justice Rose Spector wrote the unanimous opinion that Tilton's right of freedom of association under the First Amendment had

The records were among documents sought in a \$50 million lawsuit filed by Norma Smith of Dallas, the widow of a Tilton follower. Mrs. Smith said she suffered emotional distress after Tilton's Word of Faith Outreach Center in Farmers Branch continued to send her husband requests for money after he

The Supreme Court said a "compelling state interest" must be shown before a court may order the disclosure of membership in an organization that advocates particular beliefs.

 Texas officials moved closer to implementing major health-care reform last week, selecting Blue Cross and Blue Shield to administer the first state-authorized insurance pool for small businesses. The Texas Insurance Purchasing Alliance, created last year by the Legislature, aims to make health insurance more affordable and accessible for businesses with three to 50 employees.

■ Laredo was the second fastest growing metropolitan area (11.4 percent) in the United States in the early 1990s, the Census Bureau reported last week. Las Vegas topped the list with a growth of 13.9 percent. The McAllen-Edinburg-Mission area ranked fourth with a growth of 9.8 percent.

Prior to the coalition's convention, Mattox had accused one of his rivals, Dallas investor Richard Fisher, of trying to buy the group's endorsement. Fisher denied the charge.

Grace reports increased net
