## School launches search for new football coach

Iowa Park schools could possibly name a new head football coach and athletic director as early as the second week in March.

The board of trustees met Tuesday night to officially launch a search for the replacement of Robert Clensay, who was "reassigned" during last week's meeting.

Tuesday's meeting, which did not

begin until about 8:35 p.m., began with a round table discussion on criteria for selecting the replacement.

The board then went behind closed doors for an executive session on personnel, which lasted from 9 to 11:05. No official action was taken following the closed session.

Supt. Glen Mitchell proposed a tentative timetable for making the selection, suggesting applications be cut off Friday, Feb. 25, and deciding on a selection by Mar. 8.

Mitchell said his office began receiving inquiries from candidates almost immediately after last week's decision by the board.

By Tuesday, the administration office had received 36 inquiries, and in response the candidates had been mailed applications.

When the school held its last opening for the position, more than 100 applications were received. Lucky Gamble was hired, and left after one year, and was succeeded by Clensay just before the start of the 1992-93 school year.

The board, during its regular monthly meeting when considering contacts for all administrative personnel, voted unanimously to reassign Clensay for the duration of his contract, which extends through the 1995-96 school year.

As to who is serving as interim athletic director, Mitchell explained the campus principals -- Richard Davis at high school and Randy Lovelady at junior high -- in effect assumed those responsibilities after last week's meeting.

Mitchell told the board his office has already had "good response from all levels, AAAAA on down."

The board is tentatively slating its next called meeting for 7 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 24, Mitchell said.

Included in the list of criteria the board will look for when considering a new head football coach and athletic director were:

- \* strong interpersonal skills: successful in working with the administration, staff, players and community;
- \* role model (high values and morals);
- \* mature/experienced;
- \* organized;
- \* strong management skills;
- \* leadership qualities;
- \* clear record with University Interscholastic League;
- \* successful winning program;
- \* good with kids;
- \* committed to all sports;
- \* treat all (athletes) equally.

All three administrators at the meeting -- Mitchell, Davis and Lovelady -- said they will give a very critical look at any candidate about whom, during their investigation into backgrounds, observe what they termed as "red flags."

Board chairman Keith Fisher offered a suggestion that the group should meet as often as necessary during the replacement search, so the eventual selection could be made as early as possible.

The superintendent said Wednesday he has already begun making contacts concerning some applications and even potential candidates.

## City approves bids for water tower

### Aldermen discuss lease agreement for proposed golf course

The city council accepted bids for the construction of a new elevated water tower, approved an ordinance annexing a housing addition area, and discussed leasing land at Lake Iowa Park for a golf course.

Phoenix Construction submitted the lowest of four bids to build the city's new water tower on the north side of US 287.

The Phoenix bid was \$232,235, and the highest bid on the same tower was \$314,180.

Of the seven bids to construct a pump station and lay a 12-inch water line from the Johnson Road tower to the new tower, Bowles Construction of Wichita Falls was the low bidder.

Bowles' bid of \$187,202 was more than \$20,000 less than the next lowest bid. Highest bid was \$258,543.

Mayor Wayne House commented that the only bad thing about the new tower project was the fact that it likely would not be completed before August.

The council had received numerous complaints from residents in the northern area during the past year, about low water pressure. Those complaints, and plans for additional housing in that area, prompted the council's action.

Following the third and final public hearing concerning the proposed annexation of a 9.758-acre tract of land, the initial phase of the Park Place Addition, an ordinance completing the process was approved.

Developers of the addition are Tommy Key and Tommy Hammonds.

The council has agreed to lay the water and sewer lines, as well as have the street constructed, and the devel-

opers will reimburse the city for its costs, plus interest, as each lot is sold, it was explained.

After discussing the first draft of a lease agreement for land around Lake Iowa Park, which is to be finalized in the near future, aldermen approved a resolution authorizing the mayor to enter into a lease agreement with Acropolis Golf Club and Development Company.

The council agreed to lease the property for approximately the same rate it has been leased in the past for grazing rights.

Estimating 100 acres, the lease is for \$5 per acre per year, with the agreement to be reviewed in 10 years.

Mayor House told the council the representatives of Acropolis have not asked the city to expend any money on the project.

The representatives, House said, have only asked for use of the lake's raw water, and they understand that should a dry spell necessitate a curtailment of use, they would agree.

As was the case of a previously-proposed golf course in that area, when Rip Smith wanted to build one, affluent from the wastewater treatment plant also is desired. Acropolis expects to lay the line for that source, House said.

During a general discussion on the course, it was brought out that the developers seek in the future to build an additional 27 greens, in addition to the initial 18. Not all city land would be used for the courses, and adjoining property would be acquired.

Different housing areas would be constructed in the area of the courses, and all would become part of the city,

aldermen were told.

A second ordinance was passed during the meeting. It would regulate any sexually-oriented business that might decide to locate inside the city limits.

Acting on bids received for the purchase of a brush chipper, the council approved a bid of \$18,200 to buy a unit manufactured by Vermeer Equipment of Texas.

Included in the motion to purchase was the addition of an automated feeding attachment, for an additional \$600.

Another resolution approved authorized the mayor to execute a deed of trust for the sale of two housing lots to

Bill Steger for \$10,050.

The two lots are on land where the water tower once stood at Gordon Lake.

The council officially called its annual city election for May 7. The terms of Mayor House and Aldermen Bud Mercer and Johnny Crawford expire this spring.

Filing dates for candidates open Monday and end Mar. 23.

Administrator Mike Price was authorized to move budgeted funds into the Employee Benefit Trust Fund.

Also taking place during the meeting, the council approved the re-appointment of Herschel Nipper to the

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## Police report one arrest

Iowa Park police arrested only one individual during the past week, and that was on warrants issued by another agency.

Police took Larry Daniel Thompson, 24, into custody Sunday evening at Woodbriar Apartments.

Two warrants, *capias pro fine* DWI and probation violation, had been issued for his arrest by the Wichita County Sheriff's Department.

Thompson was later turned over to a county deputy to be transported to jail, according to the police blotter.

An alleged domestic disturbance Thursday night resulted in a warrant being issued against a suspect.

Police were notified Friday morning that a woman was in the emergency treatment room of Wichita

General Hospital, being treated for minor injuries sustained the previous evening.

Following an interview of the victim, a warrant was issued for the arrest of 27-year-old Troy Ray, for Class A assault family violence. No arrest had been made as of Wednesday, however.

After a complaint was registered by a couple who live in the 700 block of West Louisa, that they were receiving harassing telephone calls, a tracer was placed on that number by Southwestern Bell Telephone.

The company Thursday confirmed that the calls were real. In fact, 28 such calls had been recorded.

Police said a suspect has been interviewed, but no arrest has yet been made.

## Early voting begins for party primaries

Early voting in the Mar. 8 Democrat and Republican party primaries began Wednesday, and will continue through Mar. 4, according to Vernon Cannon, county clerk.

Early voting boxes are available at the Wichita County Tax Office sub station here in Iowa Park, 400 North Wall, as well as at the county courthouse, the sub station in Burkburnett and at the Precinct Four building on Highway 25 north of Electra.

The local sub station is open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday through Feb. 25; 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 26; 12-noon to 5 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 27, and 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday Feb. 28 through Mar. 4, Cannon announced.

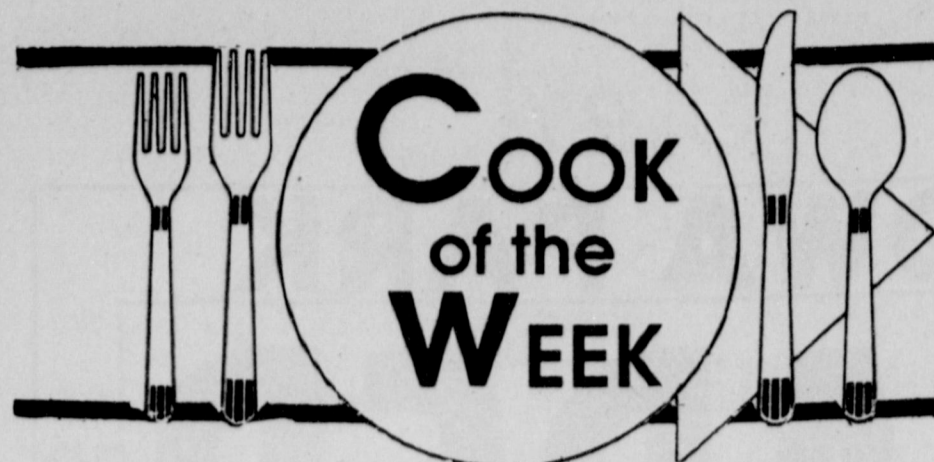

In other church activities, Cathy helps lead the "Experiencing Class," a series of studies, on Sunday nights, and enjoys working with elderly people.

Cathy credits Mark's mother with teaching her to cook, and said that she was exposed to the food and recipes of many different ethnic groups while living in the San Francisco area. She is sharing several of those recipes, plus one her grandmother gave her for "Mexican Cornbread." The recipe for "Bacon Spaghetti" is one she got while attending a church social.

Stuffed Cabbage

- 1 beaten egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1/4 cup finely chopped onion, 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce



Cook of the Week

- 3/4 tsp. salt, Dash pepper, 1/2 lb. ground pork and 1/2 lb. ground beef (or 1 lb. ground beef), 3/4 cup cooked rice, 6 large or 12 medium cabbage leaves, 1 - 10 oz. can condensed tomato soup, 1 Tbsp. brown sugar, 1 Tbsp. lemon juice

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a bowl combine egg, milk, onion, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper and mix well. Add meat and cooked rice; mix well.

Remove center vein of cabbage leaves, keeping each leaf in one piece. Immerse leaves in boiling water for about 3 minutes or until limp; drain.

Place 1/2 cup of meat on each leaf; fold in sides. Starting at unfolded edge, roll up each leaf, making sure folded sides are included in roll. Arrange all in 12x7 1/2x2 baking dish.

Stir together condensed tomato soup, brown sugar and lemon juice. Pour sauce mixture over cabbage rolls and bake, uncovered, in a 350 degree oven 1 1/4 hours, basting once or twice with sauce. Makes 6 servings.

Mexican Cornbread

- 1 pkg. cornbread mix, 1 lb. ground beef, 1 large onion, 1 can green chilies, chopped, 1 can cream style corn, 1 1/2 cups grated cheese

Mix cornbread mix as directed. Brown meat, onion and green chilies in skillet.

In another greased skillet add 1/2 cornbread mixture, then add meat mixture. Add corn, grated cheese and remaining cornbread mix. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven until golden brown, or about 45-50 minutes.

Bacon Spaghetti

- 1 lb. bacon, chopped, 2 onions, chopped, 2 bell peppers, chopped, 1 lb. mushrooms, sliced, 1 can black olives, pitted, 1 pkg. spaghetti, 1/2 large jar Cheez Whiz

Cook bacon in frying pan; remove bacon and 1/2 the grease. In remaining grease, cook onions, bell peppers, mushrooms and olives. Drain off fat from vegetables.

Prepare spaghetti and drain off water. Add Cheez Whiz and mix. Then add vegetables and bacon and mix again. Serves 6.

Chicken Curry

- 2 cups cooked, diced chicken, both light and dark meat, 3 tart apples, cored and diced in 1/2-inch pieces, 1/2 cup sweet onion, diced in 1/2-inch pieces, 1/4 cup soft butter, 1 tsp. curry, 3 Tbsp. flour, 1 cup milk, 1 - #2 can chicken broth, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 4 cups cooked fluffy rice

Put apples, onion and butter in a saucepan and saute over low heat until the onion is transparent and soft. Stir in the curry and flour. Add the milk and chicken broth and continue to cook over low heat until slightly thickened. Stir frequently to prevent lumps and sticking. Add the salt, pepper and chicken and continue to cook 5 minutes longer, or until the chicken is heated.

Divide the hot rice in four equal portions and top with the curry mixture. Serving piping hot. Serves 4.

VARIATIONS: Use 1 - 10 oz. can cream of chicken soup in place of the chicken broth. Add one additional cup of milk. Decrease the curry to 1/2 teaspoon for a milder flavored dish. Serve over boiled noodles instead of rice.

Pumpkin Ice Cream Pie

- 1 can ready made pumpkin pie filling, 1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream, 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice, 2 graham cracker pie crusts

Mix ice cream, pie filling and spice, then spread in pie crusts evenly. Cover and freeze.

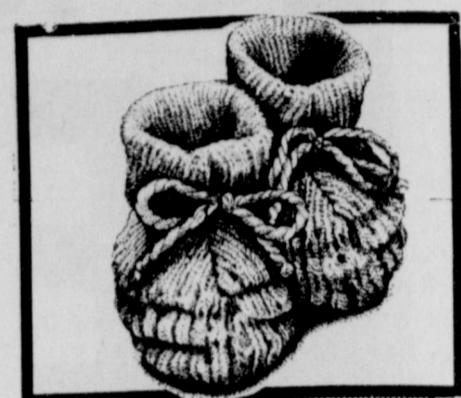
Stir Fry

- 3 pork chops, sliced thin, 1/2 cup teriyaki sauce, 1/4 cup soy sauce, 1/2 tsp. ginger, 1 Tbsp. brown sugar

Mixed vegetables of choice (cabbage, carrots, celery, char, bean sprouts, water chestnuts, onion, broccoli, bell peppers, etc.)

Marinate pork in sauce with seasoning. Heat wok using 2 tablespoons

oil. Drain sauce from meat, saving it for later. Place meat in wok, stirring vigorously. When meat is brown, add vegetables. When almost done, add sauce and stir until covered. Serve over rice. Makes 8 servings.

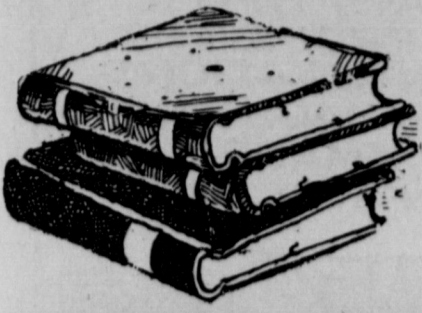

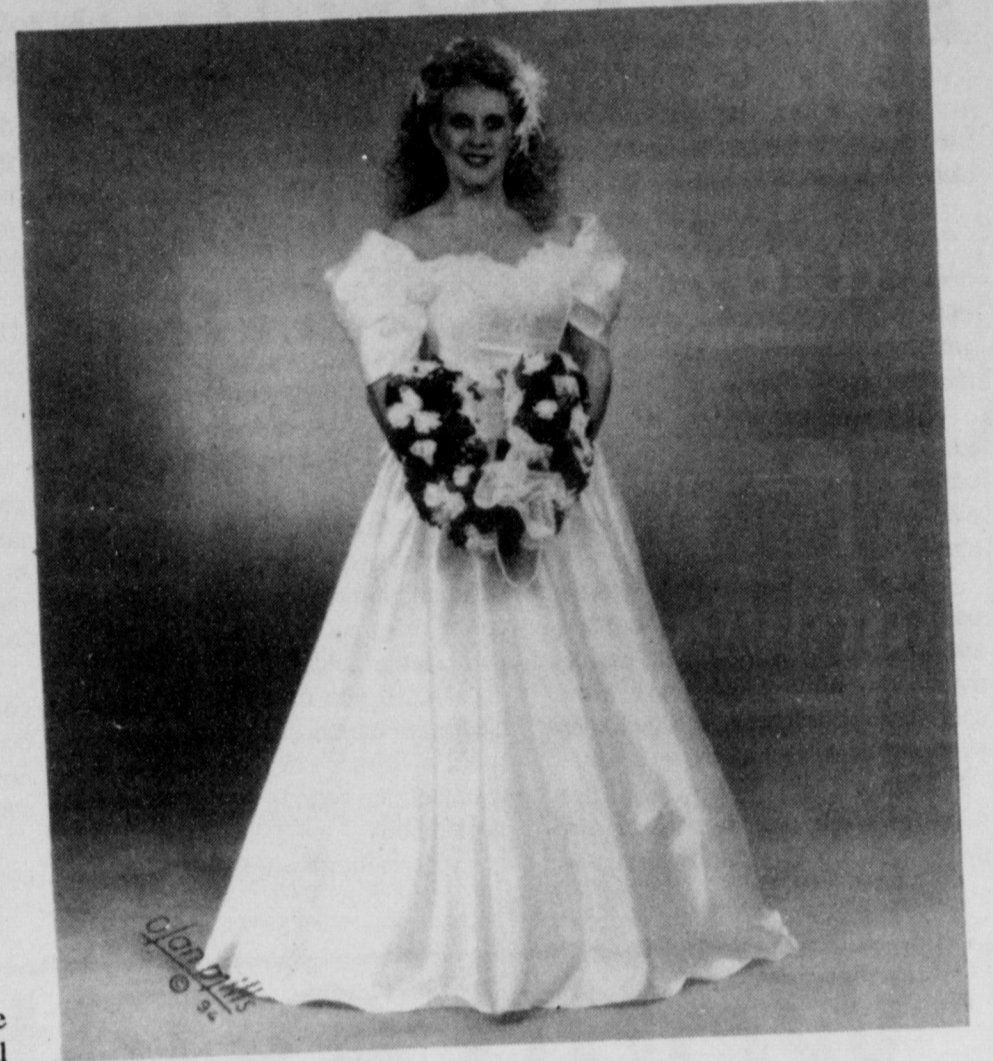

AUSTIN - U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's attorney said she will testify on her own behalf in a felony trial for ethics violations that allegedly occurred while she was state treasurer.

Defense attorney Dick DeGuerin made the announcement as jury selection continued last week for the trial in Fort Worth.

Judge John F. Onion Jr., to make sure a panel of 12 jurors and two alternates are found, has called in 20 more jury candidates for questioning, as lawyers struck about 30 of the original 40 candidates on the list.

According to the *Houston Chronicle*, the central legal question that remains to be settled is whether prosecutors can use evidence obtained in a raid on the state Treasury a few days after Hutchison was elected to the Senate.

Her lawyers have said the seized records should not be admitted as evidence.

Hutchison is charged with using state employees and equipment to do political and personal work, and tampering with records that might have proved wrongdoing.

The Republican senator pleaded innocent in last week's proceedings. She has maintained that charges against her were brought by Democrats seeking to destroy her political future.

Telephone Records Released

Gov. Ann Richards last week released nine months of resurected long-distance records pieced together through computer data tapes.

Also released were all cellular calls made since Richards took office in 1991, all incoming toll-free calls and copies of calls made by employees on state-issued credit cards.

The governor's office has been criticized for its decision last August to destroy more than two years of the telephone records, which under the law are public records.

Hannah's Prison Warning

Secretary of State John Hannah Jr. warned last week that despite reports of 6,000 empty prison beds, state penitentiaries are near their legal capacity.

Hannah, who has been nominated to become a federal judge, said his investigation showed that any attempt to increase the prison population "would immediately get the state back into federal court."

Gov. Richards asked Hannah to look into the case of empty beds and report whether any could be used to ease the overflow of state inmates in county jails.

The question of the empty beds surfaced last month in preliminary findings of a prison system audit by Comptroller John Sharp's office.

Teachers Group Endorses

Texas' largest teacher organization has endorsed incumbent Democrats for the top six statewide offices and Democrat Jim Mattox for the U.S. Senate.

The 95,000-member Texas State Teachers Association said the endorsements were based on the candidates' positions on public schools, education funding and opposition to private school vouchers.

"What happens to education in the 1995 Legislature will be determined by what happens in the March 8 primary," TSTA president Richard Kouri said. "We will press that hard reality on our members during the campaign cycle."

Receiving endorsements were Gov. Richards, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Attorney General Dan Morales, Comptroller John Sharp, Treasurer Martha Whitehead and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, all Democrats.

Job Growth in Valley

Cities in the Rio Grande Valley remained among the national leaders in job growth in a recent 12-month period, according to a report from the Economic Outlook Center at Arizona State University.

An employment growth rate of 5.4 percent, or 5,900 jobs, made the McAllen-Edinburg area fifth best among all U.S. metropolitan markets from November 1992 to November 1993.

Victoria in South Texas climbed from 72nd place to sixth place nationwide with 5.3 percent job growth. Close behind were Laredo, ranking 10th at 4.5 percent, and Brownsville-Harlingen, ranking 11th at 4.3 percent.

Evangelist Wins Court Round

A Texas Supreme Court justice's opinion says evangelist Robert Tilton's rights have been violated by a trial judge's court order to turn over records of church members who claimed healing miracles.

Justice Rose Spector wrote the unanimous opinion that Tilton's right of freedom of association under the First Amendment had been violated.

The records were among documents sought in a \$50 million lawsuit filed by Norma Smith of Dallas, the widow of a Tilton follower. Mrs. Smith said she suffered emotional distress after Tilton's Word of Faith Outreach Center in Farmers Branch continued to send her husband requests for money after he died.

The Supreme Court said a "compelling state interest" must be shown before a court may order the disclosure of membership in an organization that advocates particular beliefs.

Other Highlights

Texas officials moved closer to implementing major health-care reform last week, selecting Blue Cross and Blue Shield to administer the first state-authorized insurance pool for small businesses. The Texas Insurance Purchasing Alliance, created last year by the Legislature, aims to make health insurance more affordable and accessible for businesses with three to 50 employees.

Laredo was the second fastest growing metropolitan area (11.4 percent) in the United States in the early 1990s, the Census Bureau reported last week. Las Vegas topped the list with a growth of 13.9 percent. The McAllen-Edinburg-Mission area ranked fourth with a growth of 9.8 percent.

U.S. Rep. Mike Andrews, who is seeking the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate, received the endorsement of former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby. Hobby said the six-term Houston congressman has the best chance of unseating Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison.

Former Attorney General Jim Mattox, another U.S. Senate hopeful, won the endorsement of the Texas Coalition of Black Democrats. Prior to the coalition's convention, Mattox had accused one of his rivals, Dallas investor Richard Fisher, of trying to buy the group's endorsement. Fisher denied the charge.

Grace reports increased net

W.R. Grace & Co. reported an increase of 11 percent in per-share net operating earnings in the 1993 fourth quarter before special non-cash credits and a 13-percent rise for the full year.

Grace is the parent company of the Iowa Park Cryovac plant.

Current quarter earnings include a \$200-million after-tax credit, reflecting partial reversal of the \$300-million charge taken in the third quarter related to asbestos insurance coverage.

The year ago period included a \$1.8-million credit related to discontinued operations. Grace's fourth quarter 1993 net operating earnings rose 15 percent to \$85.2 million, compared to \$74.1 million a year ago.

Per-share results were 91 cents, an increase of 11 percent compared to 82 cents in the prior year period.

Including the special credits, Grace reported net income of \$285.2 million or \$3.05 per share for the fourth quarter of 1993, compared with \$75.9 million or 84 cents per share a year ago.

Memorials may be made to First Christian Church of Iowa Park.

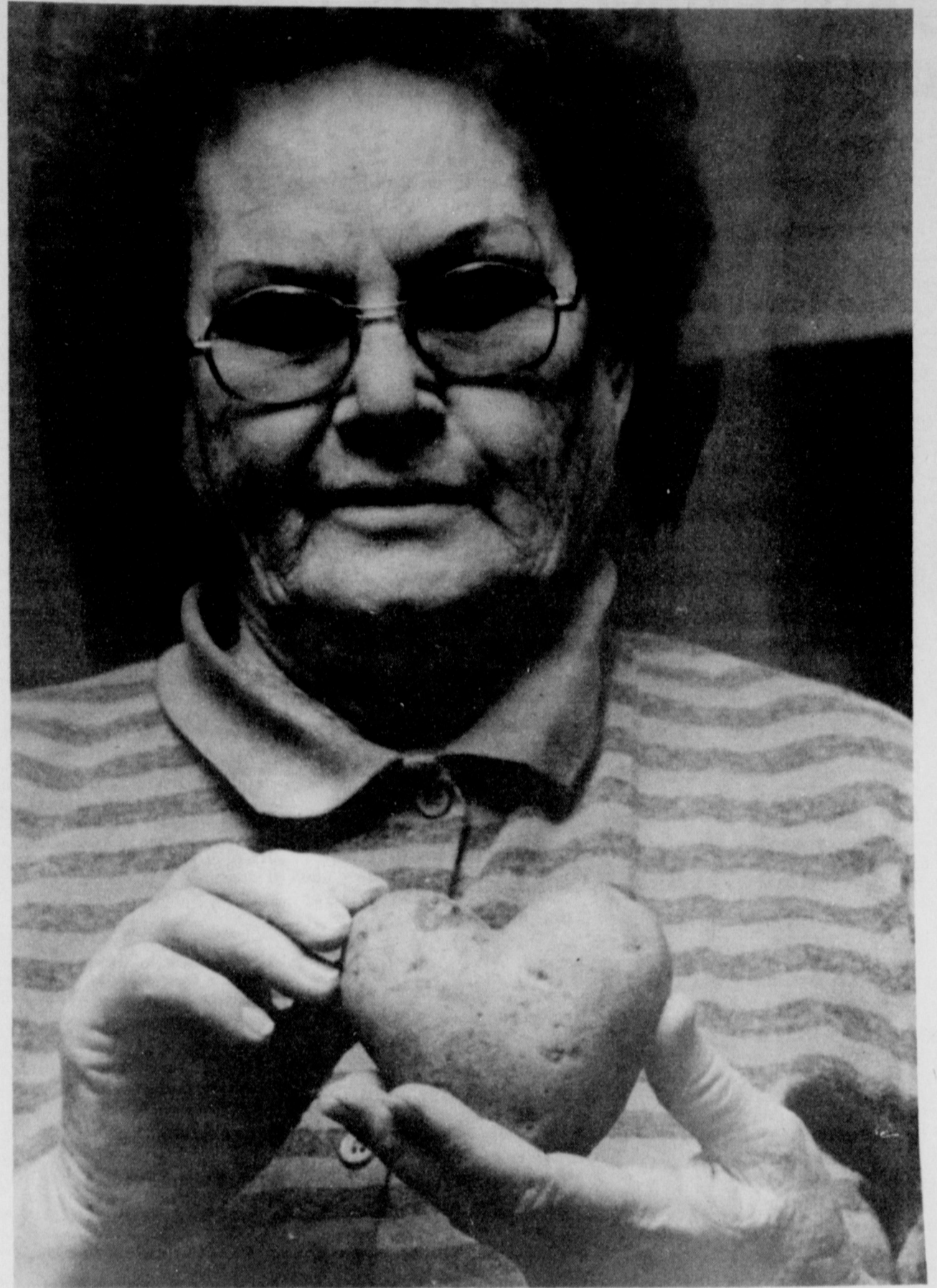
**Masons to recognize Wichita West firemen**

## SSI joins '20-something' crowd

This month, the Supplemental Security Income program, better known as SSI, joins the '20-something' crowd," said Greg White, Social Security manager in Wichita Falls.

The first SSI benefits were paid in January 1974 to about 3.2 million people. This month, an estimated 6.2 million individuals will receive payments under the program that pays benefits to people with low incomes and few assets if they are 65 or older, or if they are blind or have a disability.

"Many original SSI recipients had been on state assistance rolls before the federal program was established," White said. "SSI was set up to provide a nationally uniform standard for people with little or no income."

In January 1974, the highest fed-

eral SSI payment to an individual was \$140 per month. Beginning this month, the national payment standard for an individual will be \$446.

Although the SSI program was designed for needy people of all ages, more than half the original SSI population was 65 or older. According to White, things have changed considerably in the last two decades.

"Individuals with disabilities are now the largest segment of SSI beneficiaries," White said, "representing nearly three-quarters of all recipients. And children are the fastest growing recipient group, accounting for nearly 12 percent of all SSI beneficiaries with disabilities."

In December 1975, the first month such statistics are available, children

represented only three percent of disabled SSI recipients.

Reaching out to potential beneficiaries in the North Texas area is one of White's goals.

"From the outset," he said, "we have given high priority to identifying individuals who might be eligible for SSI. Our goal is to make sure that anyone potentially eligible for SSI is aware of the program and given every opportunity to file for benefits."

Individuals who think they might be eligible for SSI can call the Wichita Falls Social Security office to discuss the program or set up an appointment to file for benefits.

The Hawks had a hard act to follow in their season-ending game here Tuesday night, and they responded with a 76-60 victory over Henrietta's Bearcats.

After Iowa Park jumped out to a 17-8 lead in the first quarter, the visitors rallied in the second to narrow the Hawks' lead to 31-29 by halftime.

But Iowa Park dominated the 'Cats throughout the second half, as three Hawks finished in double digits: Randy Schmidt, 23; Michael Stanford, 16, and Rudy Hawkins, 10.

The win gave Iowa Park a 2-3

record for the second half of Dist. 4-AAA play, and 11-20 for the season.

When the JV contest finally ended (shortly after 8:30 p.m.), Iowa Park had outscored the visitors, 94-90.

And the Freshman Hawks, playing in the evening's opener, made a sweep of the day, defeating Henrietta 54-47.

Friday's trip to Graham was a disappointment for the Varsity. The hot-shooting Steers remained undefeated in conference play by thumping Iowa Park 91-64.

Graham out-scored the Hawks in all four periods: 24-18; 21-15; 28-14, and 18-17.

Leading scorers for Iowa Park were Stanford, 12, Michael Fallon, 11, and 10 apiece by Schmidt and Nick Black.

## Grace is EPA Green Light partner

W.R. Grace & Co. signed an agreement June 29 to formally become a full EPA Green Light partner.

Grace, the world's largest specialty chemicals company with a leadership position in health care and other niche businesses, operates the Cryovac Division plant here in Iowa Park.

EPA Green Lights is a voluntary program that encourages U.S. businesses to install energy-efficient lighting in their facilities over a five-year period.

According to EPA Green Lights program director Robert Kwartin, "Energy-efficient lighting upgrades effectively reduce nitrogen oxide (NOx), sulfur dioxide (SO2) and carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions by limiting or postponing the need for new construction of electrical power-generating utilities burning fossil fuels."

Kwartin added, "Early in the Green Lights program we developed specialized computer software to help prospective Green Lights partners survey their facilities on a room-by-room basis, and identify upgrades that would be both energy saving and financially attractive."

"During Grace's lighting evaluation of its Washington Research Center (WRC), Grace personnel went the extra mile by contributing refinements

and additions to our Green Lights computer analysis software and testing the refinements in the field."

Grace's WRC lighting retrofit program is scheduled for completion this month.

The WRC program included upgrading 4,598 fixtures, 12,327 T-12 fluorescent lamps and 6,090 magnetic ballasts with the latest technology, energy-efficient, T-8 fluorescent fixtures, lamps and new electronic ballasts.

According to Dr. Peter Boer, Grade executive vice president and chief technical officer, "We are pleased to be a full partner with the EPA in the Green Lights Program. Our participation reflects a continuing Grace commitment to environmental responsibility, and to supporting others' initiatives that achieve environmental goals in an economically sound manner."

Green Lights lighting upgrade programs are well underway at more than seven Grace plant sites throughout the U.S.

"To date, we have studied and made changes to more than 700,000 square feet of our total 10 million square feet of facilities in the U.S.," Boer noted.

"The annualized kilowatt hours (kwh) saved through this completed

work, approximately 3 million kwh, represents a significant positive environmental impact through the reduction of annual emissions equivalent to 17,000 pounds of NOx, 39,000 pounds of SO2 and more than 4.5 million pounds of CO2."

## FmHA eases process

Texas farmers applying for assistance from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will experience a breath of fresh air this year," said George Ellis, state FmHA director in Temple.

"I have today (Jan. 13) taken action to delegate the full loan approval authority allowed under the federal regulations to FmHA county offices in Texas," he said.

The action means that supervisors on the county level will be able to exercise loan approval authority up to the full county limit without prior reviews being required at other locations or even by FmHA officials at the same location.

"As this new year begins, I feel this will be a real help to our farm customers, and I intend to pursue this type of change in the future, whenever I can," Ellis said.

County supervisors were previously subject to a complicated system of reviews and re-reviews of loan ap-

plications in order to approve a loan. The system was instituted several years ago in order to insure fewer mistakes and more uniformity from county to county.

"I still intend to hold FmHA supervisors to the same high standards as in the past, but I am also dedicated to streamlining the process so that our farm customers will have funds available to them at the time they are needed," said Ellis.

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
