Mike Hoover named principal at Kidwell

The school board, in a called meeting Thursday night, approved the hiring of an elementary principal and five teachers, three of whom are coaches, and approved a contract to be offered to City View ISD for transfer students.

Mike Hoover was hired to replace Ron Woods as principal of Kidwell Elementary.

Hoover has been an elementary principal at Hawley, just north of Abilene, and Woods recently submitted his resignation so he could retire.

The five teachers hired included: Stephen Stradley, to teach sophomore English at the high school; Susan Scott, a nine-year veteran in education to teach at Bradford Elementary; Larry Zachary, with eight years experience, as junior and senior high coach and teacher; Brett White, high school history teacher and coach, and Greg Biehl, high school math teacher and coach. White and Biehl both have three years experience.

Three staff resignations were accepted, including Trey and Shelli Morgan and Debbie Cain.

Jayna Case, who has been teaching in the fifth grade, was reassigned as elementary librarian.

Trustees, with a split vote, approved a proposed contract with the City View school to accept its transfer students, but at an increased annual fee of \$1,700.

The proposed fee agreement must be approved by that district's board. The fee has been \$1,500. There was no mention in the contract concerning any liability concerning litigation expenses involving any City View students, as had been included in a previously proposed agreement and rejected.

City View does not offer classes for its high school students, and those students have a choice of attending any school that is contiguous with that

Trustees voting for the revised contract were Sheri Kennedy, Martha Dudley, Max Henderson and Keith Fisher. Wendall House and Randy Catlin voted against it.

Supt. Glen Mitchell said 71 City View students attended school here during the 1992-93 year, and with 11 new transfers approved during Tuesday's meeting, it appeared 61 would be in classes starting in the fall.

Bids were opened for construction of a special education facility at the high school, were discussed by architect Don Daugherity, and all bids except three items on which no bids were received, were accepted.

Daugherity said the 1,584-square

Bids also were accepted for two computers and related equipment for the high school, at a cost of \$4,887.

Other bids, including the district's bank depository, which went to State National Bank, and various food service supplies, were approved.

Council to decide future of landfill

Landfill operations and related subjects are the only two items listed on a tentative agenda for Monday night's regularly-scheduled meeting of the city

Aldermen are to begin the meeting at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Bids for a private contractor to either dispose of the city's garbage, or both collect and dispose of it, will be considered.

Then, armed with those possible costs, aldermen are to consider their options concerning the future of the city's trash collection operation.

Administrator Mike Price said he should have final response on a proposed tri-city landfill operation, which would include Iowa Park, Burkburnett

and Vernon. Price has been told that Vernon

had already turned to a private contractor, but the possibility of that city joining the other two had never officially been ruled out.

Because of a federally-mandated program called Subtitle D, the cost of operating landfills is expected to increase to a point that few, if any, small cities will be able to continue operating their own trash disposal programs.

Regardless of who collects the trash and where it is taken, the city plans to offer a facility where motor oil and used oil filters can be deposited.

Those items cannot be put in landfills, regardless of who operates

The city has received a grant from the state for a facility to be constructed that will receive both the used oil and oil filters.

The early settlers who came to Iowa Park had a dream of a town with beautiful parks, flowers and trees.

There has always been those who have come after who have shared the dream of a beautiful town through the years. As happens with most towns, there are times they are more beautiful than at other times.

Now, there is a move on in Iowa Park to improve its appearance in a number of ways.

The town will be entered in the Governor's Community Achievement Award competition, which has already been won by Electra, Burkburnett and Wichita Falls in their population categories. Now, Iowa Park would like to follow suit.

Six sections are emphasized in the contest, including cleanup, education, public awareness, solid waste management, beautification, and illegal dumping/law enforcement.

Under the specifications of beautification is the planting of trees, landscaping, planting wildflowers, and improving parks and gardens.

In addition to the many beautiful yards at homes throughout the city, the churches are dotting the town with their own "beauty spots" and doing their part in the beautification of Iowa Park.

First Christian Church grounds have taken on a new look because what started as an idea became a dream and the dream became reality.

Through the cooperation of many of the members who have given of their money, time and talents, the grounds have been completely replanted with flowers and shrubs.

Donations given in memory, or to honor loved ones are responsible for the church being able to do all that has been done to the grounds. So much can be done through shared

And church families have adopted flower beds and are maintaining them as a part of their commitment.

There has been complete new landscaping around the building. Members worked many hours pulling up all of the old shrubs with a winch truck and rebedding the beds completely surrounding the building with shrubs and flowers.

The beds are now exhibiting a riot of color in yellow, red, purple, and pink low growing flowers backed by



• Immobilize the affected extremity and apply ice packs.

If the broken bone protrudes through the skin, cover it with a sterile dressing, but DO NOT try to push it back in.

tion, please feel free to notify us in the office. We want your RAC to be as clean and comfortable as possible and with everyone's cooperation, this should be easily maintained. Thanks!







You may by now be getting sick of me using this space, and space on the front page, talking about landfills.

But folks, reading it won't make you nearly as sick as paying for all the new regulations and changes that are almost upon us.

If I were a betting man, I'd give you odds that our city is going to get out of not only the disposal of trash, but also its collection, and hire a private firm to do it.

Whatever the cost will be if that happens won't be nearly as high as if the city continued as it has for these many years.

The city council has already decided it will close its landfill operation. Whether it stays with the deadline to take trash there will not be decided for another week or so.

As it stands now, the council's decision is to close the landfill, located southwest of the city off Smith Road, as of August 1. It was felt it would take from then until October 8 to close out the landfill site, to meet mandated specifications.

That August 1 date possibly could be moved a couple of weeks, but don't count on it.

I suggest that if you have a collection of trash or unwanted items you've been intending to throw away, like I have, you might want to get started with their disposal.

That's because of three points: you'll get done what you've wanted to;

it will help fill up space at the landfill pit that will just require more dirt fill to close it out; and if you wait until after the landfill is closed, the cost could be greater than you would want.

Wherever our trash is taken once our landfill is closed, the cost is going to be based on the amount we as citizens and businesses throw away. For that reason, if you feel as I do about how my money is spent, I'm expecting to begin a concerted effort to recycle everything I can.

I've already converted my lawnmower to chop up the blades of grass and leave it on the yard, rather than catching it and throwing it in the trash bin, and I began a few weeks ago bagging my aluminum cans which I plan to take to George Roy's and sell as scrap metal.

Additional recycling will have to come, as I adjust and consider how I want to do it. But at least, I've started.

On those regulations concerning landfills I've referred to so many times, let me explain how these all came about and why things are so tentative, as far as the city is concerned, this late in the

First of all, the Environmental Protection Agency -- not congress -came up with the regulations, called Subtitle D.

Commission. The state groups were instructed they could make the regulations tougher, but not easier.

The Water Commission had the regulations a year, and only in the past few weeks, told cities and counties what the state's regulations would be. That's right, only weeks before those dreaded regulations come into effect.

The regulations are so strict that, according to the city's engineer, the cost of disposing of a ton of garbage that currently cost about \$8 would rise to an estimated \$118. And that doesn't include the \$18 for its collection, which would take it up to \$136!

The Water Commission encouraged each of the regional planning commissions to coordinate regional landfill organizing.

I don't know what happened in other areas, but Nortex didn't announce anything to the general public until just recently. You may remember I ran an article last week that said seminars would be held for anyone wanting to learn about the Subtitle D regulations.

Oh, there were a lot of meetings between city government leaders in the Nortex area, concerning a regional landfill. One such regional landfill was even discussed, to be located in Archer

Nothing ever came out of it because the municipal people couldn't get their act together. And I can't blame them. Their folks back home didn't know what was facing them, and therefore they put no pressure on their representatives to accomplish some-

I have my reservations about turning the city's trash collection and disposal to a private firm. I ask myself, what would happen if the city sells all its equipment, goes privatization, and the outfit is shut down by the government for non-compliance, or it should declare bankruptcy and quit, or if it should make price demands that the people couldn't afford to pay?

These are questions I can't answer. But they're the makers of night-

With the knowledge that a vast majority of cities, and even counties, have contracted private firms for trash disposal, I feel there is legislation needed in Austin, And I'm disappointed nothing was done during the past regular session.

Privately-operated sanitary landfills must be declared a utility, just like all other services people can't live without. There's got to be a regulatory power to hold costs within reason.

We had enough Robin Hood affecting school financing. We don't need it in connection with throwing away



Utility costs during the five months included: \$48,817, 58%, electricity; \$30,026, 36%, natural gas, and \$4,995, 6%, sewer and water.



Toast on both sides until lightly browned and cheese is melted. Cut into pie-shaped wedges and serve with sour cream, guacamole, olives, and pico de gallo.

Monterrey Zucchini

5 or 6 medium zucchini 2 medium onions

1 lb. Monterrey Jack cheese, shredded Slice zucchini into thin slices. Chop onions. Saute zucchini and onions until tender. Drain off all of the oil. Add cheese and stir continuously until melted. Serve in casserole dish topped with extra cheese.

Favorite Banana Pudding

1 can Eagle Brand milk

8 oz. sour cream

1 large pkg. vanilla instant pudding 1 medium Cool Whip

Bananas - as many as you prefer

JESUS IS LORD!

"Were the highest heavens my pulpit, multitudes of angels my audience, and eternity my time, Jesus Christ would always be my text," wrote an older preacher to a young evangelist. In Philippians 2:9-11, we learn why: wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name: that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things on earth, and things under the earth; and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." The word "Lord" actually means "Master." Peter preached on Pentecost, "God hath made that same Jesus, who ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ: (Acts 2:36).

Christ has all authority, "both in heaven and on earth" (Matthew 28:18). In Colossians 1:18, Paul writes concerning Jesus, "He is the head of the body, the church, who is the beginning, firstborn from the dead, that in all things he might have the preeminence." On the mount of transfiguration, the voice of God spoke these words: "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased. He ye him! (Matthew 17:5). Powerfully, Colossians 2:9, 10 informs us that "Christ is the fullness of the Godhead bodily" and that we are "complete in him." Jehovah now speaks "through his Son, who is the brightness of his glory" (Hebrews 1:1-3). Saul of Tarsus learned of the power and authority of the Son of God on the Damascus road many years ago. The natural loving response of his heart is recorded in Acts 9:6, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" In Acts 22:16 the answer is recorded from the words of the preacher Ananias, "arise, and be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord."



Cattlemen still helping Rehab Center

Twenty-five years ago, a small group of area cattlemen decided to have a livestock auction to benefit North Texas Rehabilitation Center.

A new art auction will be produced by the Texas Wild Bunch, a group of independent, well-known, successful artists who join forces for benefits such as the Rehab Auction.

The art auction will also take place at the Activities Center that Saturday.

In addition to the opportunities to give and to purchase, good food, good music and good art will be there for all to enjoy.
