Council studies options to close city's landfill

The city council was presented a list of seven alternatives to consider in plans to close the sanitary landfill, during Monday night's regular meeting.

Administrator Mike Price listed a breakdown of the options, along with cost estimates, which will be considered on how residential and commercial trash will be handled in the future.

Though no final decision was reached during the meeting, aldermen indicated they are about ready to finalize an action which has been discussed almost two years.

Government mandates regarding landfills have made disposal of trash so expensive that few cities under 100,000 population plan to operate their landfills by themselves.

"Subtitle D," the regulation covering landfills, was developed by the Environmental Protection Agency, and turned over responsibility of enforcement in this state to the Texas Water Commission.

The date for the regulations to be implemented originally was set at Oct. 9, and the council had planned to cease accepting trash at the local landfill on Aug. 1, to allow adequate time for its closure.

However, Price said the effective date reportedly had been extended, to allow municipalities to complete fill-

ing their existing pits, and cease operations in April.

Aldermen asked that a written statement be obtained from Austin, concerning the extension date.

Council members went into a closed session to discuss the possibility of selling the landfill site. But, after some 40 minutes, Mayor Wayne House said no decision was reached during the executive session.

The seven options Price presented, as well as the estimated monthly residential costs, included:

1. Iowa Park collects the solid waste and hauls it to the Wichita Falls landfill using their (local) collection vehicles. Tipping fees are figured at \$38.00 per ton and the distance to the landfill is 23 miles round trip. \$10.75.

2. Iowa Park collects the solid waste and hauls it to the Tri-Cities landfill (Burkburnett) using their (Iowa Park) collection vehicles. Tipping fees are figured at \$54.22 per ton and the distance to the landfill is 40 miles round trip. \$14.50.

3. Iowa Park collects the solid waste and hauls it to a transfer station owned by them (Iowa Park) and located at the closed landfill. From there the waste is transferred in a large trailer to the Tri-Cities landfill for disposal. Tipping fees and distance is the same as in Option B. \$15.50.

4. Iowa Park collects the solid waste and hauls it to a transfer station owned and operated by the Tri-Cities group. From there the waste is transferred to the Tri-Cities landfill for disposal. Tipping fees are figured at \$63.11 per ton and the distance is the same as in Option B. \$14.00.

5. Iowa Park contracts with Bell Group for the collection and disposal of their solid waste which will be taken to the Wichita Falls landfill. Bell has estimated the tipping fees at the Wichita Falls landfill to be \$30.00 per ton. \$18.85.

6. Iowa Park contracts with Texas Waste Management for the collection and disposal of their solid waste which will be taken to the Wichita Falls landfill. TWM's cost reflects a tipping fee of \$36.00 per ton. \$13.25.

7. Iowa Park collects the solid waste and hauls it to a transfer station owned by them. From there the waste is transferred by tractor trailer to the Hillside Landfill Facility owned by Texas Waste Management at Sherman, Tex. Tipping fees are estimated at \$22.00 per ton and the distance to the landfill is 250 miles round trip. \$10.85.

In all cases where options included Iowa Park using its own collection system, Price said cost to replace equipment when it wears out is not included in fees presented.

He also pointed out that commercial accounts, or businesses, monthly fees were estimated at \$45 and \$100, depending on frequency of pickups.

In addition, Mayor House pointed out that the Iowa Park Optimist Club has requested it be allowed to build a gymnasium near the Recreational Activities Center, and that the city fund approximately \$6,500 for dirt work and installation of utilities.

"Please consider the request for the funds to help complete the gym construction. It is estimated that 300-400 Iowa Park youth have to use Wichita Falls or Burkburnett facilities because of the lack of a gym in our city," wrote Bob Dean, club president in his letter of request.

Iowa Parkan injured in Colorado accident

An Iowa Park man was severely injured in a one-vehicle accident Monday night in Colorado.

Joel McIlroy, younger son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam McIlroy, reportedly was in the intensive care unit of a hospital in Grand Junction following surgery to

remove a blood clot on his brain.

Details were not available at presstime, concerning the accident and his condition.

McIlroy is a 1992 graduate of Iowa Park High School and is attending Midwestern State Univ. and employed by X-Pert Weed Control.

Members of the McIlroy family left Iowa Park late last week to vacation at the family's cabin near Gunnison.

The only information available concerning the accident is that he was the only occupant of the vehicle when it was wrecked sometime between 10 and 11 p.m. Monday.

He was flown to the Gunnison hospital. He sustained other injuries besides to his head, and was described upon arrival at the hospital as being in critical condition.

However, family members reported the surgery "went well."

BIG WEEK FOR POLICE

Eight arrests made here

Iowa Park police experienced one of their busiest weeks in several months, during which time they made eight arrests.

The first arrest listed on the police blotter was at 9:33 p.m. Wednesday. When an officer made a traffic stop on Tracy Lewayne Jeffrey, 21, in the 200 block of West Ruby, it was determined on a computer check that an outstanding warrant existed from Tarrant County for his arrest.

Jeffrey reportedly was wanted for theft over \$20 and under \$200 by Tarrant County, and he also had a warrant for a traffic violation filed by the Department of Public Safety in Wise County.

Unable to make the recommended bond of \$1,000, he was taken into custody and transported to Wichita County jail.

A warrant for the arrest of Harold Edward Allen, 54, was executed Thursday evening on South Yosemite. The charge against Allen was telephone harassment. He was transported to county jail.

Police made two arrests with one traffic stop at 3:11 p.m. Thursday in the 700 block of West Magnolia.

The driver, Nennette Lea Simmons, 27, was charged with speeding, and Yvonda Lee Reynolds, 22, was wanted for failure to display a drivers license.

They were taken to city jail on lieu of \$91.50 fine for Reynolds and \$131 fine for Simmons, according to the blotter entry.

Isaias Alvarey Gomez, 29, was taken into custody at 6:25 a.m. Saturday in the 400 block of South Jackson, after it was determined an outstanding warrant had been issued by the county sheriff's office for his arrest on a charge of theft over \$750 and under \$20,000. He was turned over to a deputy sheriff.

At 4:42 a.m. Sunday, an officer arrested Jamie Lynn Pulliam, 28, in the 100 block of East Highway, on a charge of public intoxication. Pulliam was released at 12:30 p.m. after paying a \$270 fine, according to the blotter entry.

Early Tuesday morning, police stopped a vehicle that was being driven at Texowa and Lafayette, arresting the driver as well as a driver in another vehicle at the same location.

The first driver, Julie Ann McCray, 29, was charged with public intoxication. The second driver, Larry Henry Tompkins, 43, was charged with operating a vehicle with an expired license plate.

Tompkins and McCray have been in the news in Wichita Falls recently, when she obtained a judge's order to have him take down signs that the two of them were married.

The owner of a van called police to the Wal-Mart parking lot at 1:00 p.m. Wednesday, to report the vehicle had been broken into and a bank bag containing \$200 had been stolen.

That case remains under investigation.

Earlier that day, police received a "theft of service" complaint from a local garage owner.

Billy James said Andrew Gilbraith had taken his pickup, which had been impounded, without paying the required fee. A relative reportedly paid the \$70 charge later that day, police said.

Thomas Graham Baxter, 32, was issued a citation Monday evening for violating a city ordinance which prohibits operating a motorboat on Lake Gordon. He must appear in municipal court.

School budget picture takes brighter look

Budgeting problems for 1993-94 appear to be improving for Iowa Park schools, according to information sent school trustees since last week's board meeting by Supt. Glen Mitchell.

Trustees got their first look at the proposed budget at that meeting, and studied requests from two campuses and three support departments.

Their next meeting will be Thursday evening of next week.

The superintendent's latest projection, should all requests be granted, initially indicated an eight-cent increase in the tax rate would be necessary.

However, his latest revision calls for a four-cent increase which, should it be approved, would make this fall's

tax rate \$1.10 per \$100 valuation.

Mitchell's figures show that this year's carryover is now estimated to be \$901,796, up from \$700,000 as first estimated.

"Please remember if there is additional proration that the estimated carry over will be reduced," Mitchell cautioned trustees in his cover letter.

One of the major problems the school faces in developing next year's budget is the fact that the legislature's actions during its regular session cut appropriations to the local district by \$351,000.

Principals of both elementary campuses will present their proposed budgets at next week's meeting.

understand the balance and interdependence of living organisms.

Maybe you would like to raise some fish too. Fish and plants don't mix, do they?

They do if you are growing water-loving plants. Water lilies and other aquatic plants are right at home in a garden pond.

The nice thing about water-loving plants is they resist the most common cause of plant-kill inflicted by humans -- over-watering.



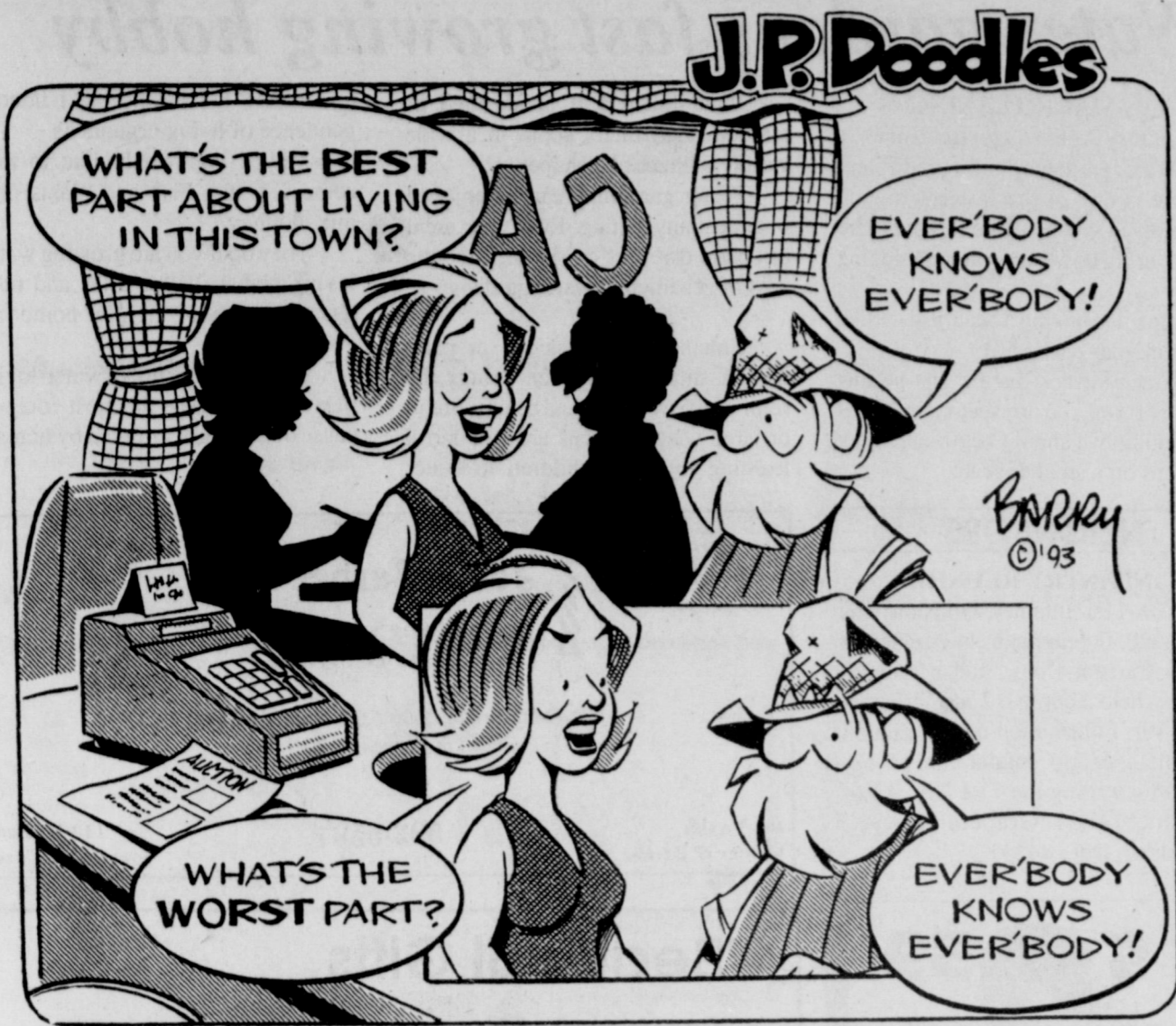

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



At a time when we're supposed to be optimistic around here, with all the new residents moving into the area, I almost hate to point out that we are all facing some trying times financially in the near future.

We can just look at the mandates being handed down, unchecked by congress, by the Environmental Protection agency, the president's pledge for change -- which means cutting the federal deficit and increase our social programs -- and then closer to home what our own state legislators have created. . . just to name a few.

My most current current whipping subject is the cost of doing away with our trash. I've said it before, that stuff we're throwing away is just about as expensive as it was when we bought it brand new.

The EPA regulations will drive our individual home trash bills up four to five times what they are now. And that's just in the near future.

How much do you know about the EPA's newest diamond, air conditioning and what makes it run?

In a nut shell, the EPA says the refrigerant we now use has knocked a big hole in the world's ozone layer, and that is going to cause a lot of problems.

So, before we eliminate the layer, which we're supposed to have damaged, we're going to quit using the refrigerant all car and home coolers now use, and change to another type.

The new regulation is supposed to go into effect in 1995, and cars made that year are supposed to have been converted to use the new refrigerant.

So, that means, if you have a car that hasn't been converted -- at a current cost of about \$700 -- it will be worth that much less when you try to trade it in or sell it.

It also means, you won't be able to buy the refrigerant if your unit needs to be recharged. Not until you have it converted to use the new stuff, anyway.

And, in the meantime, the current refrigerant's cost is doubling and about to triple in price.

Yeah. The same is true of your home air conditioner!

We're all aware of what each of us owe to retire the nation's indebtedness, as well as what it costs to pay the interest on the debt.

But, for the life of me, everyone seems to be coming out of the walls with new social problems that they want added onto the cost of operating our federal government.

Among those most-needed demands are womb-to-tomb health care,

housing for the houseless, protection from the bad guys and guaranteed employment.

We hear the statement, that if everyone were covered by a national health insurance, the cost wouldn't be any higher than most of us now pay.

Yeah. I remember that's what they said about automobile insurance in Texas. We've got the laws that now require you to have liability insurance if you own a car. What happened to our premiums being lowered?

I read of a social program in the Burkburnett newspaper last week I hadn't heard of. It's free meals, during

the summer, served to kids.

According to the article, the program is available to any school district where half or more of the students qualify for free or reduced lunches.

The kids don't have to carry any identification when they get in line for their summer's day lunch. Nothing is checked to see if the youngster is qualified for free or reduced meals. Just show up and chow down.

It doesn't cost much, you say? Well, that's just one social program among what appears to be many.

And again I ask, how much more can we afford?

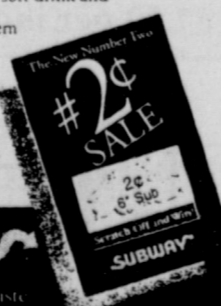

6 hard-cooked eggs
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 tsp. vinegar
1 tsp. mustard
1/8 tsp. salt
Halve hard-cooked eggs lengthwise; remove yolks and mash with a fork. Stir in mayonnaise, vinegar, mustard, and 1/8 tsp. salt. Stuff egg white with yolk mixture. Garnish with paprika or parsley if desired. Makes 12 servings.

Beef n' Bean Casserole

2 lbs. hamburger meat
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 small jar picante sauce
1 can ranch style beans
1 bag tortilla chips
Mozzarella & Cheddar cheese
Brown meat. Add mushroom soup, picante sauce and ranch style beans. Cook 10 minutes on medium heat. Then, in baking dish, layer chips, meat and cheeses. Cover and bake until cheese melts.

Pecan Pie

3 eggs, slightly beaten
1 cup Karo syrup
1 cup sugar
2 Tbsps. Mazola, melted
1 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 cup pecans
1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell
In large bowl stir first 5 ingredients until well blended. Stir in pecans. Pour into pie shell and bake in 350 degree oven 50 to 55 minutes or until knife inserted halfway between center and edge comes out clean. Cool. Serves 8.

Microwave Fudge

16 oz. box powdered sugar
1 stick oleo
1 Tbsp. vanilla
1/2 cup cocoa
1/4 cup milk
1/2 cup pecans
In a 1-quart microwave dish, mix sugar and cocoa. Add oleo and milk (DO NOT STIR). Microwave on high 2 minutes uncovered. Add vanilla and nuts and stir. Pour into pan and cool.



Marshmallow Creme Cake

2 sticks oleo
5 Tbsps. cocoa
4 eggs
2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cup flour
2 Tbsps. vanilla
1 cup pecans
Melt oleo and cocoa together. Beat eggs and sugar together. Combine cocoa mix with sugar mixture; add flour, vanilla and nuts. Bake at 350 degrees.

Icing

1 box powdered sugar
1/2 cup cocoa
1 stick oleo
1/2 cup evaporated milk
Marshmallow creme
Mix powdered sugar with 1/2 cup cocoa. Melt oleo with 1/2 cup evaporated milk. Mix together. Spread

marshmallow creme over hot cake. Top that with the icing.

Beef Tips and Rice

2 Tbsps. shortening
2 lbs. beef tips
1 can consomme
1/3 cup wine or cranberry juice
2 Tbsps. soy sauce
Garlic clove
1/4 tsp onion salt
2 Tbsps. cornstarch
1/4 cup water
4 cups cooked rice

Melt shortening, then brown meat. Stir in consomme, wine (or juice), soy sauce, garlic, and onion salt. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 1 hour or until tender.

Blend cornstarch and water in separate bowl. Pour in with meat and stir constantly until thick. Boil one minute and pour over cooked rice.

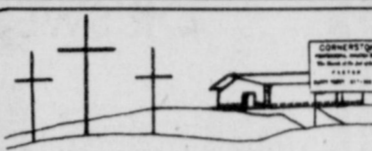

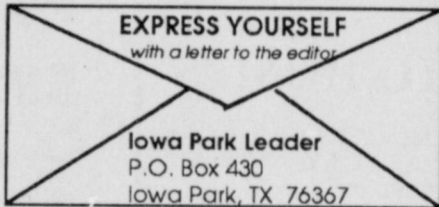


