### Need of Post Office Boxes Related at C of C Board Meeting

At a recent meeting of the directors of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, Postmaster E. E. Wallis was invited to give a report on the present post office facilities and the efforts that had been made to get standard boxes to take care of Iowa Park patrons.  
Mr. Wallis made this report, which included the information that when the post office moved to its present location the equipment belonging to the lesor was not available and government equipment had to be used.  
At that time, materials were scarce, and 328 obsolete boxes were fitted into the standard screens with a considerable loss of space. A year later one section of 54 boxes was added, making a total of 382 boxes.  
Since then frequent requests for standard lock boxes have been made but the 504 boxes recommended by the post office inspector have not been received.  
The Chamber of Commerce has wired Congressman Ed Gossett the present status of the local office and asked his cooperation. The wire was followed by an air mail letter setting forth detailed information.  
The Postal Department this week advised Postmaster Wallis and C of C President Alan Berry that advertising has been issued to cover purchase of the equipment. An additional 122 boxes would take care of the present needs of local post office patrons, Mr. Wallis says.

### Bradford Attending National Conclave at Atlantic City, N.J.

Supt. W. R. Bradford left today for Atlantic City, N.J., where he will attend the meeting of the American Association of School Administrators. Some 15,000 are expected to attend this program, the biggest educational gathering in the United States, which is planned for the school executives of public schools.  
The president of the association is Supt. W. H. White of the Dallas schools, who is a brother-in-law to Dr. Gordon G. Clark of Iowa Park.  
Among featured speakers will be such notables as Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, J. Edgar Hoover, head of the FBI, and J. Howard McGrath.  
Mr. Bradford will take a chartered coach from Wichita Falls and join a larger group on the Texas Special at Dennison. He will spend all day Saturday, his birthday, by the way, in New York City. After the meetings are over on March 2, Mr. Bradford will spend one day in Washington and arrive home the following Sunday.  
Other superintendents from this county who will attend the Atlantic City meeting are Ralph Davis of Burk Burnett, W. G. Barber of Electra. Area men going are J. B. Golden of Vernon, W. S. Thomas of Holliday, Jeff Gerron of Archer City, J. W. Hamilton of Seymour and Frank Richardson of Henrietta.

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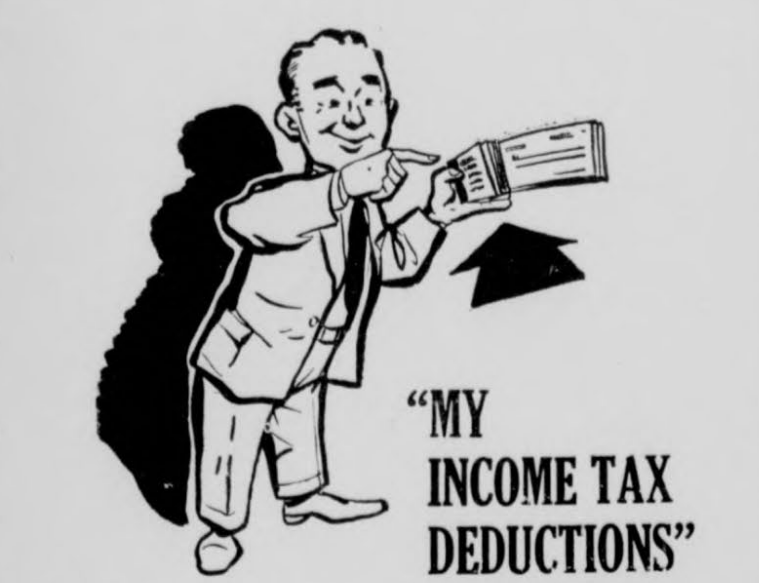
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**From where I sit... by Joe Marsh**

### Mrs Eugene Lowrance Dies at Dallas

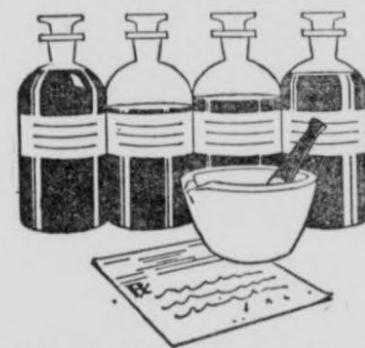

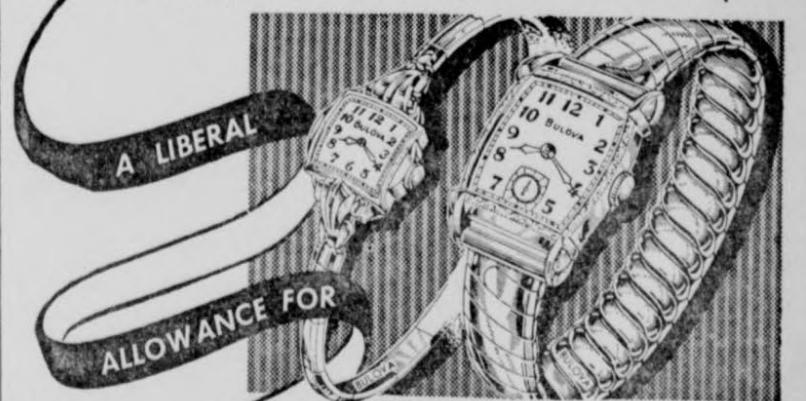
