Hawks to open season Friday at Burkburnett

Frosh, JV play here tonight

The 1992 football season gets underway Friday night, and Iowa Park's Hawks have chosen their long-time competitor, the Burkburnett Bulldogs, as their opening opponent.

But first, the Hawk Freshmen and Junior Varsity will host Burkburnett in Hawk Stadium this evening, with the first game getting underway at 5.

With new Head Hawk Robert Clensay at the helm, Iowa Park will be attempting to end a two-year losing streak against the Bulldogs.

The Hawk offense was stymied by Burk's defense last year, when they lost 21-7. They gained a mere 44 yards rushing and 98 more passing for 142 yards.

Iowa Park's leading rusher in that game was this year's starting fullback, Chris Williams, who gained 43 yards in 14 attempts.

The Bulldogs racked up a total of 315 yards against the Mean Green defense, and did it without their eventual leader of the season, Skip Hicks, who showed his stuff the night before when he played for the Burk JV.

Despite missing the season opener, Hicks wound up with 1,196 yards on 178 carries. And he figures to be the main target tomorrow of Hawk defenders.

Iowa Park and Burkburnett have been competing against each other longer than any other team on this year's Hawk schedule.

Since the 1960 season, Iowa Park has won 10 times and Burkburnett 13. Always close, competitive games, the widest scoring margin during those 23 years was 44-7, and the closest was 17-14. Both were Hawk wins, in 1969 and 1973, respectively.

The last time the Hawks beat the 'Dogs was 1989, when they outscored Burk by a 37-23 margin. The Bulldogs got their revenge in '90, however, with a 15-3 win over the Hawks.

Iowa Park has a number of returners back from the '91 team who want nothing more than to beat a Burkburnett varsity before they graduate.

Besides Williams, they include linebacker T.J. Bean, a unanimous All-District selection last year; tackle Scott McNeely, first team All-District; Patric Kennedy, second team offensive lineman; Mark Tatom, linebacker who earned honorable mention All-District last year and has been switched from tight end to runningback this year; and Mark de la Rosa, second team All-District runningback last year who will see most of his time on the field this year on defense. Williams also was honorable mention All-District as a runningback last year.

Until they changed their offensive attack at the half of their game last year, the Bulldogs were held in check, primarily by Bean's tenacious play as middle linebacker. Burk kept trying to run inside the tackles, and was almost held to minus yardage during that time.

While very likely expressing the enthusiasm and confidence of his players, Clensay said this week, "There's not a team on our schedule we don't think we can beat."

Despite Burkburnett being a Class AAAA school, Clensay believes his players have greater over-all speed than the Bulldogs. But he admits there's not a Hawk who can match Hicks' speed.

Physically, the Hawks will be almost at full strength. The only player who definitely will not be suited out Friday is the starting runningback Scott Byrd, who suffered a broken foot bone. It was Byrd's place that Tatom was summoned to fill.

Jeff Kaspar missed a lot of early-season work because of a hand injury, but he's back and ready to play center.

"Burk is a quality team. Similar to last year, with a good defense," said Clensay. "They come off the ball well. A big-play team. They don't make many mistakes. They make you make them (mistakes), and then make you pay for it."

No classes Monday for local students

Iowa Park students will have their first holiday from classes after only eight days of school.

No classes will be held Monday, Labor Day, but students will be required to return Tuesday.

Enrollment continues to increase at all the campuses. A report indicated that, as of that date, 569 students were attending high school, 478 junior high, 491 Bradford Elementary, and 500 at Kidwell Elementary, for a total of 2,037.

In other business, the board approved a proposal to add Weldon Strain to the list of teacher appraisers, and approved bids for the purchase of folding tables for computer instruction and chairs for the Bradford music room.

Police clear two theft cases

Two theft cases that had been reported to police during the past week have been resolved, according to Det. Ray Smock, acting police chief.

After receiving a complaint from a local woman last week, concerning the alleged theft of five rings and a wrist watch, police issued a warrant which was served Tuesday.

Taken into custody on a charge of theft over \$200 and under \$20,000 was Yvonda Lee Reynolds, 22.

The suspect was taken before the justice of the peace, where bond was set at \$2,500, and then transported to the county jail.

The jewelry, missing some decorative ruby stones, was returned to the owner.

An officer on patrol Friday night found the bill-cashing machine at Catlin Car Wash on West Highway had been burglarized, and reported it to the radio dispatcher at 2:22 a.m., according to the blotter.

The next day, parents of a juvenile told police their son had been involved. An investigation determined two other males - two were 15 and the other 16 - had used a tire tool to break open the machine.

A reported \$250 in cash was reportedly taken.

The boys' parents have agreed to make restitution, including repairs to the machine.

Thursday afternoon, a Department of Public Safety trooper ran a license check on a pickup found abandoned in weeds in the 500 block of West Manes.

The first report indicated the vehicle had not been reported as stolen. But shortly afterward, it was learned the pickup had indeed been reported as stolen in Wichita Falls.

The vehicle's owner obtained his keys from the local police station and

drove it home, according to the police blotter.

Thursday afternoon, the police dispatcher received a call from a citizen concerning a possible drunk driver nearing the city limits, and officers began searching for the described vehicle.

It was located at 5:09 p.m. in the 1000 block of Mary, and William Keith Wilson, 34, was arrested on a charge of

public intoxication.

Wilson was released seven hours later after signing a personal recognition bond, according to the blotter.

When officers responded to a domestic disturbance at 12:27 a.m. Wednesday in the 200 block of South Wall, they arrested Carl Kissner, 31, on

Trustees adopt budget, set tax rate at 27 cents

Iowa Park school trustees Monday night approved the 1992-93 budget that calls for expenditures of \$7,369,824.

The board then approved a tax rate of 27 cents per \$100 valuation, but by a split vote of 4-3. Three trustees had wanted a 28-cent rate.

Voting for the 27-cent rate were Wendall House, Max Henderson and Randy Catlin, while Martha Dudley, Sheri Kennedy and Robert Cook voted against it. The tie was broken by board president Keith Fisher, in favor of the lower rate.

The new rate is broken down to provide 17 cents for local maintenance and 10 cents to pay bonded indebtedness.

One of the major reasons the three wanted the 28-cent rate was that the additional penny would have generated \$24,897 more local tax money, as well as \$17,587 more from the state, which has a reward schedule for districts generating more local tax funds.

The greatest portion of the budget, 71.6 percent, is payroll costs. The budget calls for expenditures of \$5,282,702 for that category.

Other categories include: \$590,480, contracted services; \$668,165, supplies and materials; \$205,463, other operating expenses; \$256,002, debt service; \$254,837, capital outlay (most of which is for classroom computers and related equipment), and \$112,175 for "other uses."

Supt. Glen Mitchell told trustees he had "padded" the budget to cover an anticipated state funding shortfall, called "proration," of \$400,000.

Prior to adoption of the new budget and setting of the tax rate, the board held its required public hearing on the proposed budget.

Also voted on was the required amending of the 1991-92 budget.

OTHER BUSINESS

Among the other topics on the

meeting agenda, most of the time was spent on discussions concerning the perceived need for additional permanent classrooms, and individual comments by trustees concerning their vision of future needs of the district.

Because the majority of trustees appear to be ready to construct more classrooms, primarily to displace the portable buildings now being used, a schedule of discussions and possible actions was considered.

The schedule calls for the board to review enrollment trends throughout the four campuses and consider revising a schedule which could lead to a decision on when, and if, to build.

It was decided to hold the first study in January, 1993, and again the following August.

A tentative schedule considered on the subject would have called for a final decision during the 1994-95 school year and moving kindergarten classes into the permanent rooms by August of 1995.

At that point, Kidwell Elementary Principal Ron Woods told the board that he and his teachers would not have made such a strong recommendation to change kindergarten class format from half year to full year, had they known it might be so far in the future before the additional classrooms were built.

Continued increases in technology, such as more computers being made available for students, was the unanimous "vision" for the district discussed by the board members.

They also voiced anticipation of benefits to be gained through the newly-adopted district plan for site-based decision making.

The new plan allows for more input from faculty and staff, but takes away none of the powers assigned to the board by law, it was pointed out.

Trustees formally approved adoption of the site-based decision making plan, following a final hearing.

Landfill accepting old tires

Iowa Park residents can once again dispose of their old tires at the city's landfill site, according to Mike Price, public works director.

Residents possessing a valid city landfill dumping sticker can take their old tires to the site.

Tires, and not trash, are to be stacked on the north side of the landfill pit, Price emphasized.

No truck tires larger than 11.00 or tractor tires larger than 12.00 will be accepted, however.

No landfill in the state is permitted to allow whole tires, that have not been cut up in at least quarters, to be placed in the pits.

The city has located a contractor who will haul the tires away, at no charge, to be recycled to make asphalt products.

Hauling tires away assists the city in making a solid goal of a 40 percent reduction of solid waste going into the landfills, Price said.

Wichita County Criminal District Attorney

A recent front-page article in the *Wichita Falls Times and Record News* asserted that the Wichita County criminal district attorney's office employs more people and has a larger budget than three of four other Texas counties similar in size to Wichita County. However, the article failed to include other Texas counties similar in size to Wichita County that employ more people and have larger budgets than Wichita County.

When the budgets and staff of the district/county attorney offices of the ten Texas counties similar in size to Wichita County are compared to Wichita County, the results are quite different from the article published by the *Wichita Falls Times and Record News*. The district/county attorney offices in 7 out of the other 10 counties have larger annual budgets than Wichita County, and the average annual budget of the district/county attorney offices in the 10 counties is almost \$300,000 larger than Wichita County. Potter County (Amarillo), for example, while having a

population smaller than Wichita County, has a budget twice as large as Wichita County.

Despite having less attorneys and investigators than 7 out of the other 10 counties, in the last 4 years Wichita County has on average filed and disposed of over 5,000 more criminal cases and 1,500 more mental health cases than the other 10 counties. Except for Smith County (Tyler), none of the other counties have filed or disposed of more criminal cases than Wichita County. Because a state hospital is located in Wichita Falls, none of the other 10 counties have filed or processed as many mental health cases as Wichita County.

She said that the entire family likes to hunt and make yearly visits to a deer lease they own jointly with her husband's side of the family.

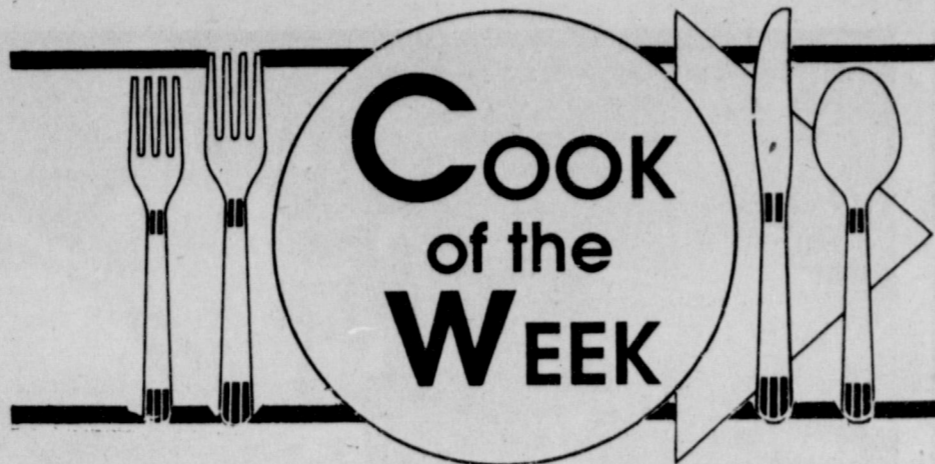
Every year they use a portion of the venison to make "Deer Jerky." Sherry said that they have made the recipe using beef, but most of the time they use deer meat.

- 2 tsps. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tsp. black pepper
- 1/8 cup salt
- 1/8 cup brown sugar
- Juice of 1 lemon
- 1/8 tsp. garlic powder
- 2 cups water

Slice meat as thin as possible with the grain in long strips.

Marinate 2 days or longer in glass jar or wide mouth crock.

Set oven at 150 degrees.

Drain meat well, place on racks with drip pan under racks. Cook 8 to 12 hours until dry and tough.

Cornbread Salad

- 1 pkg. cornbread mix (follow directions on package).
- 2 green onions, tops and all
- 2 medium tomatoes
- 1 cup celery
- 1/4 cup bell pepper
- 10 slices well-cooked bacon

Chop everything real small. Add mayonnaise to coat cornbread. Better after refrigerated overnight.

Hot Chocolate Mix

- 1 lb. box instant milk
- 1 lb. box instant chocolate mix
- 1 - 7 oz. jar coffee creamer
- 1 cup powdered sugar

Mix about 4 tablespoons to a cup of hot water.

Cinnamon Graham Cracker Cookies

Line a flat cookie pan with cinnamon graham crackers.

- Combine in saucepan:
- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 1/2 cup pecans

Cook until almost candied; thick and bubbly all over.

Pour over crackers and bake 10 minutes at 350 degrees.

Cinnamon Rolls

- 1 loaf bread
- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
- 1 to 1 1/2 stick margarine, melted

Mix together:

- 1 cup sugar
 - 2 tsps. cinnamon
- Trim crust from bread and cut each slice in half. Spread thin coat of cream cheese on each slice and roll up. Dip in melted margarine and roll in sugar mixture. Bake about 10 minutes at 350 degrees.

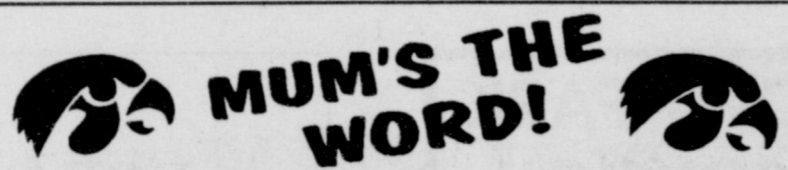
