POLICE CHIEF

Council picks Ray Smock

Ray Smock, a 15-year veteran of law enforcement, was named Monday night by the city council as the new chief of police.

Smock, who joined the department in 1987, has been serving as temporary chief since Wayne Parson's resignation in July.

He was selected from a field of 17 applicants.

Prior to employment in Iowa Park, he was a corporal in the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept., and a supervisor in the county jail.

Two years before moving to the county, he reached the position as chief deputy of the Jefferson County Sheriff's Dept. at Waurika, Okla., and was a police officer in Waurika from 1979 to 1983.

For the past few years, Smock has been the local department's investigator. Though an official document was never signed, the city council agreed to the encouragement of former Chief Allen Sheffield to elevate his rank to lieutenant. No formal document of that action was ever found in city records, according to City Administrator Gary Jones.

The council voted 4-1 to promote Smock to chief of the department.

In response to a question from the audience, Mayor Wayne House said the finalists among the applicants for the position were Rick Patterson, Emmitt M. "Skip" Cargile, Harry Leroy Kelly

and Dan Williams. Members of the department held an informal reception for Smock and his family at the police station, immediately after Monday's meeting.

Smock's annual salary was set at \$28,500, with an additional \$400 clothing allowance.

Alderman Johnny Crawford later explained his desecrating vote was not against Smock, because he also favored the selection.

Crawford said he was voting against the annual salary, explaining he felt it was too high and he had understood at the previous council meeting that it would be \$28,000 plus clothing allowance.

Alderman Bob Hamilton, who had offered the motion to name Smock and included the salary figure, responded, "I never agreed to that amount."

OTHER BUSINESS

Mayor House issued the first veto of his administration, nullifying an action of the council.

At issue was a proposal to grant a temporary waiver to an ordinance requiring that the city administrator reside in the city.

Administrator Jones had sought the waiver, explaining his weekend house at Lake Kickapoo had burned and has been rebuilt with the plan that it would become his retirement residence in about two years.

He has been renting a home here since moving from Burkburnett, and

said he plans to maintain an apartment in which to stay during bad weather conditions.

Three council members voted in favor of the waiver. They were Mark Raby, Virgil Woodfin and Hamilton. Crawford voted against it, and Bud Mercer abstained.

The mayor immediately announced he would involk his privilege of vetoing the action, and went on to explain his reason, that Jones knew the requirement to live in the city when he accepted the position.

He added, however, that he would not oppose council action to do away with the ordinance requiring an administrator's residency in the city.

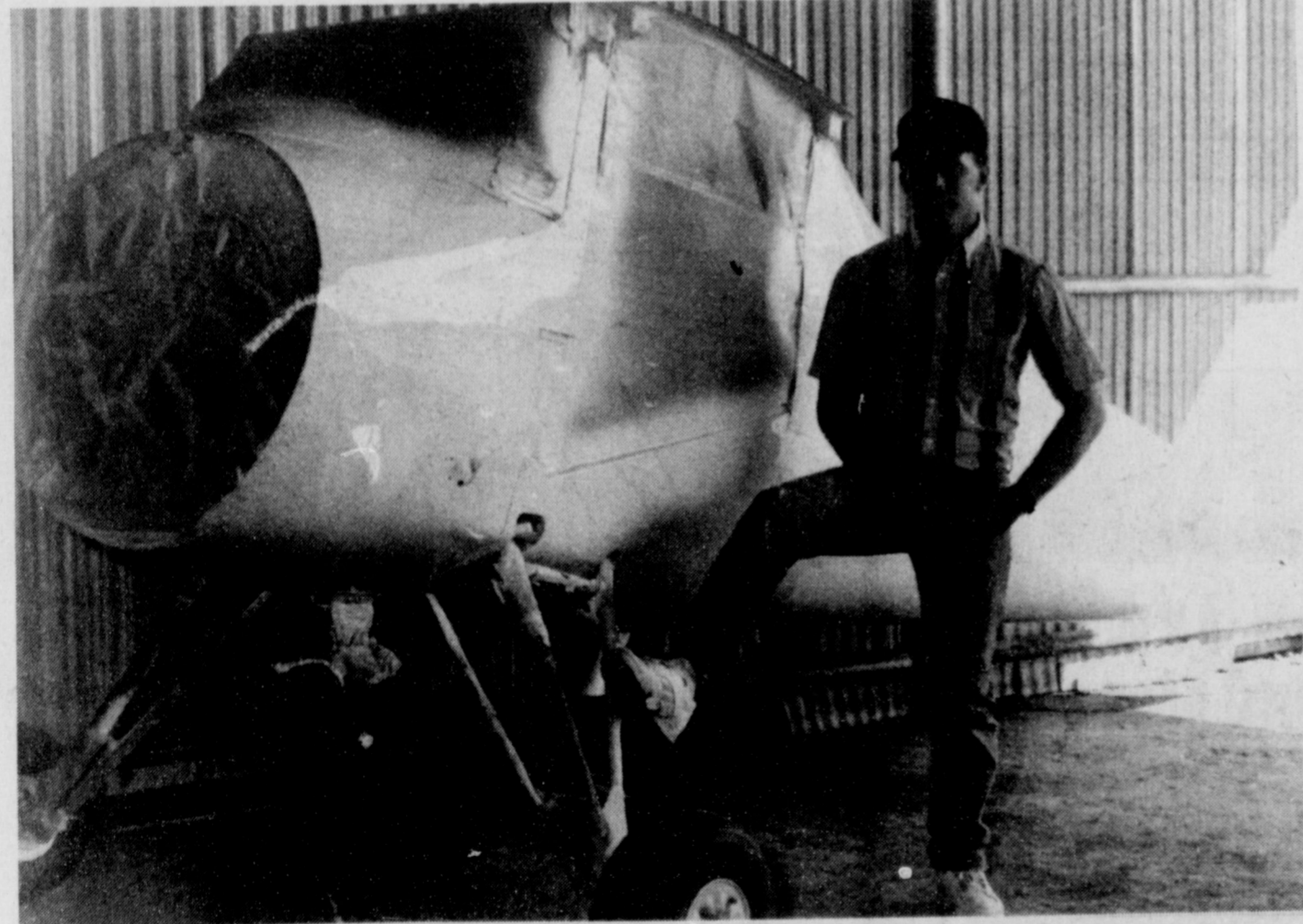
The ordinance was passed by the council shortly after former administrator James Barrington resigned, and the council had launched its search for a replacement.

The council voted confirmation of the mayor's appointments to the board of adjustments for the next two years. They include Linda Merrick, Jerry Robertson, Allen Gilstrap, Ronald Robinson, Gerald Walsh, David Padgett, Laverne Owens and Jan Clapp. Mike Hicks is an alternate.

Other council actions were formalities, such as approving the writing off of bad utility debts, a warranty title signing on property at 305 East Lafayette, and authorizing a budget change to permit the purchase of used equipment.

Fireman loves to fly

Jim Stevens wears several different hats, and he hardly takes one off before he puts another on.

His regular paying job is a professional fireman with the Wichita Falls Fire Department. Some of the other hats he wears is that of a chaplain, a pilot, a builder, assembler, and sculptor's helper.

Jim achieved his childhood dream of flying an airplane when he earned his private pilot's license in 1989.

He has helped his father, Jack Stevens, well-known sculptor and artist of Valley View, since he was in high school; he serves as chaplain for the Wichita Falls Fire Department, a volunteer job; he has built houses, designing his own house and doing much of the construction, and currently he is busily restoring and assembling a 1940 two-seat airplane he purchased a year ago.

Jim holds the rank of lieutenant with the fire department where he has been employed since July 1978. He

works at the Central Fire Station.

"I do not think of myself as a 'preacher', but to me once a believer, you are automatically a minister. Acting as a chaplain is just part of fulfilling my duty," Jim said. The Stevens are members of Grace Church in Wichita Falls.

He related several instances where firemen have been involved in tragedy on the job, or in their private lives and he tries to minister to them.

Hawks still seeking win #1

Still seeking their first win of the season, the 0-4 Hawks will travel Friday to Wellington where they will take on the 4-0 Skyrockets in the final non-conference game of the season.

Iowa Park is not only smarting from last week's 37-27 loss at Memphis, but is suffering from a major player loss. T.J. Bean, starting offensive tackle and two-year starter at middle linebacker, is out for the season with a broken arm.

The 215-pound senior thinks he may have broken the large bone in his left arm in the third quarter Friday, but continued to play until pulled late in the fourth period.

Wellington advanced to the quarter-finals last season, before losing 28-24 to Albany.

The Skyrockets, apparently having a difficult time scheduling non-conference games because of their success and lack of schools their size in their part of the panhandle, opened the season with three games against Oklahoma teams and the other from Dallas.

In succession, they knocked off Hollis 39-7, Mangum 21-6 and Hobart 13-12, before defeating Bishop Dunne 36-10 in Wichita Falls last week.

Like the Memphis Cyclones, the Hawks haven't played against Wellington since 1969. That game, played here, ended with a 68-6 victory for the eventual state champion Hawks.

The Skyrockets aren't a big team, with only one player over 200 pounds. But they're mature, carrying 17 seniors and only six juniors and five sophomores.

They count heavily on their speed, though Hawk coaches who have scouted them admit they are not nearly as fast as were the Cyclones.

The key to their offense is junior Clifton Burns. "You must stop number 10! He is not their whole offense, but makes up about 80% of it," says the scouting report.

In the Mangum game, Burns moved

from quarterback to tailback, sending #21 Henry Outley, a senior, from that position to tight end. Outley reportedly is an outstanding receiver and blocker.

Burns (143), end Lukas Wilbur (167), guard Tyrone McKnight (176), and tackle Bradley Southerland (236) are rated as the best of the Skyrocket defenders.

Hawk mentor Robert Clensay said Monday he would have to watch the workouts of tight end Mark Tatum, before deciding whether the big senior would be able to play at Wellington.

Tatum, who has recovered from a foot injury in the season opener at Burkburnett, was hobbled by a hit on a knee at Memphis.

The Mean Green offense was bolstered with the return of senior running-back Mark de la Rosa. He has been held out of play, recovering from knee surgery in the summer, and saw his first action on offense against Memphis.

He was handed the ball 23 times and produced a net 102 yards, including one run for a touchdown.

Game facts

No advance tickets will be sold here for Friday's game. Admission at the gate will be \$3 for adults and \$1 for students.

Wellington is 130 miles away. To get there, take US 287 west to Childress, and turn north on Hwy. 83.

When entering Wellington from the south, continue to an intersection with a blinking light. The Community Bank will be on the corner of 15th Street.

Turn west, to the left, on 15th about half a mile to the high school, and the stadium is two blocks back to the south of the campus.

Fulfer, Sipe nuptial vows exchanged recently at First Baptist Church

Scene of the wedding was the sanctuary of First Baptist Church. The groom's father, chaplain at Providence Medical Center in Waco, directed the double ring vows of matrimony.

Mr. and Mrs. Jon Fulfer of Kamay are parents of the bride, and the groom's parents are Rev. and Mrs. Buddy Sipe of McGregor.

The first glimpse of the bride's chosen colors for her wedding, teal white and black was noted in the church foyer by wedding guests.

The table, where Miss Melissa Maggenbourg sat to direct the registration of wedding guests, was covered with cutwork white linen draped with illusion and trimmed with large satin teal bows at the corners.

The registry table held the bride's book, a white plume pen and a framed needlepoint picture of a miniature bride and groom receiving a congratulatory message stitched in black, "This is the day that the Lord hath made, Mom".

Church pews were marked at intervals with sheer white rose bouquets. Family pews were designated with the flowers centered with teal ornamentation and delicate black foliage.

Altar decorations were spotlighted with a central brass arch centered with a spreading bouquet of white silk gladiola, spider mums, and peonies, teal gypsophilia and berries, eucalyptus, and a large teal bow.

Smaller arrangements at either side enhanced the floral design. The arch was threaded and based with silk grape ivy. Beef Stroganoff

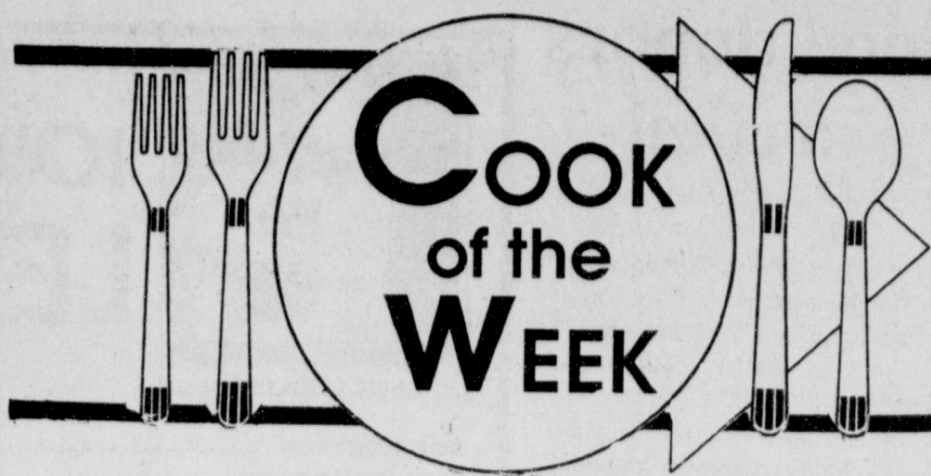
- 1 1/2 lbs. round steak, in small, thin strips
- 1/4 cup butter (or oleo)
- 1 Tbsp. flour
- 1 Tbsp. paprika
- 1 can sliced mushrooms
- 1 can beef broth
- 2 cups sour cream
- 1 small onion, chopped

Place half of butter and beef in pan and saute lightly. In another large pan, melt rest of butter and saute onions and mushrooms. Then add flour, paprika, broth and sour cream. Stir until slightly thickened. Add this mixture to beef and simmer until meat is tender (about 1 hour). Serve over rice or noodles.

Egg Casserole

- 1/2 lb. Monterey Jack cheese, grated
- 1/2 lb. Cheddar cheese, grated
- 1 small onion
- 1 small can green chilies
- 1 red bell pepper

Toss together above ingredients and put in an ungreased 9x13 Pyrex dish. Beat 10 eggs and 1/2 cup milk. Pour over cheese mixture. Bake at 350 degrees 40-45 minutes or until slightly brown. Let cool 5 minutes before cutting. (Freezes well.)



Cook of the Week

Chicago Crunch Cookies

- 3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 3 tps. baking soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 cup butter (or oleo)
- 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 Tbsp. milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 cup cornflakes
- 1 cup quick oats
- 1 - 12 oz. pkg. chocolate chips

Mix butter, sugars, egg, milk and vanilla until well blended. Set aside. Mix flour, baking soda and salt. Stir in

flour mixture with butter mixture, alternating with oil, until thoroughly mixed. Stir in cornflakes, oats and chocolate chips. Drop by heaping teaspoons onto ungreased cookie sheet about 2 inches apart. Bake at 350 degrees 10-12 minutes.

Oyster Crackers

- 1 pkg. oyster crackers
- 3/4 cup oil
- 1 pkg. Ranch dressing mix
- 1 tsp. garlic salt
- 1 tsp. lemon pepper
- 1 Tbsp. dill weed

Mix oil and dry ingredients. Put crackers in Ziploc bag. Pour oil mixture over crackers and shake. Let stand.

Shrimp Chowder

- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/8 tsp. cheyenne pepper
- 1 Tbsp. butter (or oleo)
- 1 clove garlic
- 2 cans cream of potato soup
- 1 1/2 can milk (measure in soup can)
- 1 - 3 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 2 cups frozen shrimp
- 1 - 8 oz. can of corn, undrained

Cook onion, garlic, pepper and butter. Blend in soup, cheese and milk. Add shrimp and corn. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes.

This is the day Ross Perot is to make his announcement that he once again is a candidate for president, according to his supporters.

For a man to say the people, or volunteers as he calls it, are the ones who are calling the shots, as to whether he will be a candidate or not, he apparently didn't listen to them when he quit the race earlier.

This guy knows how to get more free publicity than anyone I've ever

Everyone knows about the Red Cross.

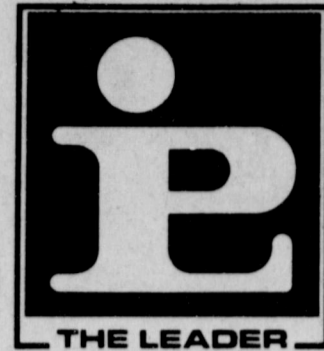
They are the people who help people - after floods, hurricanes, fires, tornadoes, earthquakes - they are always there with food, shelter, clothing and medical help.

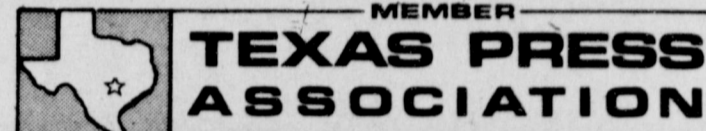

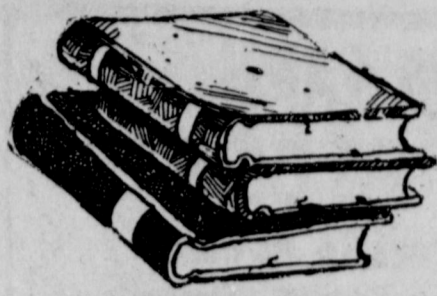

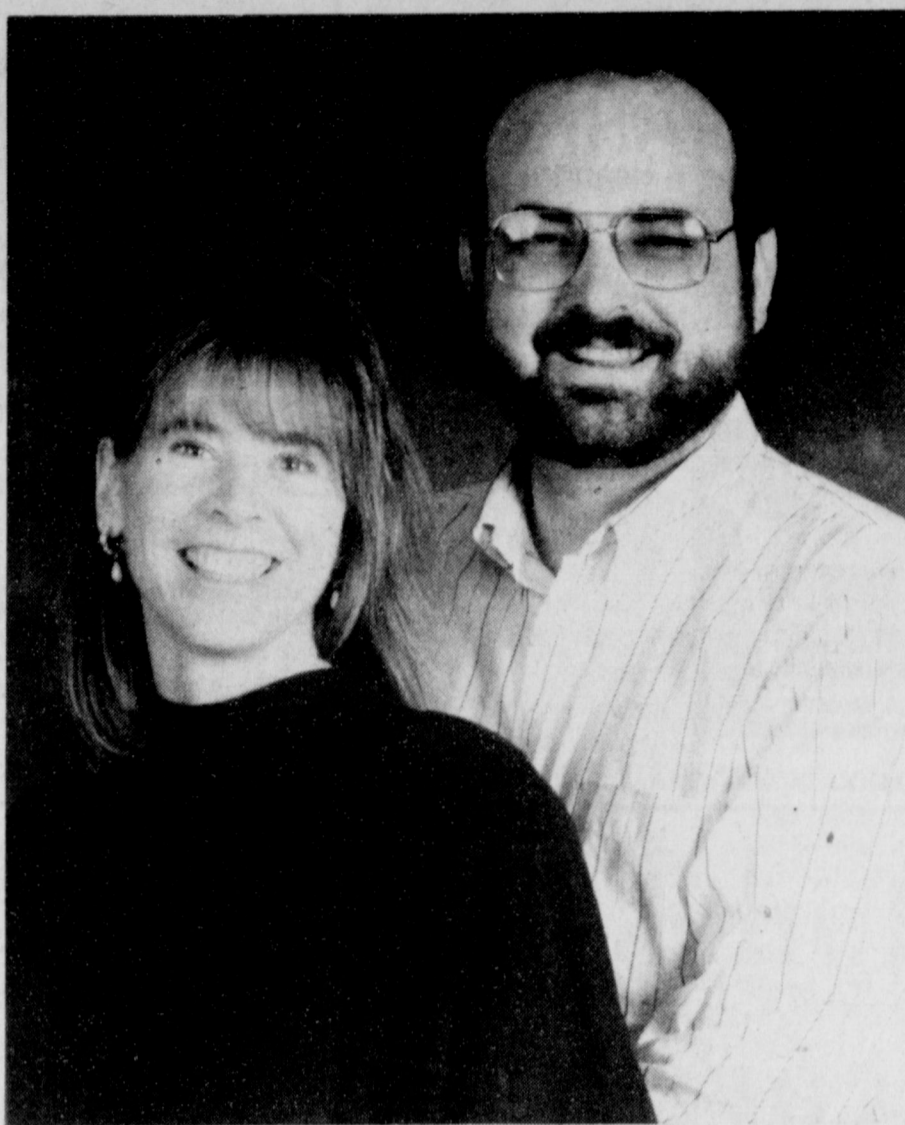
Membership drive is now underway

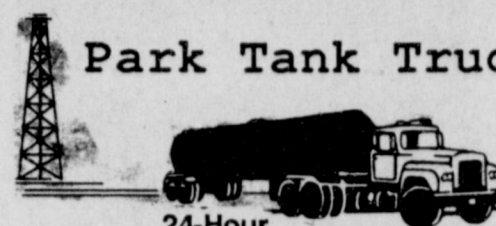

Cyclones outscore Hawks

You had a pretty good idea early-on what kind of a game it was going to be Friday night, when three touchdowns had been scored in the first minute and 46 seconds.

And you were correct, because the 48-minute contest, that required more than two and a half hours to play, resulted in 64 total points.

The Hawks dropped their fourth decision of the year, 37-27, to the defending Class A champions, the Memphis Cyclones.

"We won't see that kind of speed in any of the rest of our games this season," commented Head Hawk Robert Clensay. He was referring to Cyclone speed-burners Jay Lynn Runnels, Brian Brown and Kerry Brown. Brian Brown was rated by Clensay as possibly "... the best high school offensive back I've ever seen."

The game was marred by 23 penalties, most of which were called against Iowa Park.

And, midway through the scoreless third period, there was almost a game-ending riot, when a Memphis player hit Mark de la Rosa out of bounds directly in front of the Hawk bench.

The senior de la Rosa saw his first action on offense since the 1991 season. He underwent surgery on a knee during the summer. But he made up for lost time, carrying 23 times for 102 yards, and scoring a touchdown. He had only 248 yards all of last season.

Brent Brown set the tone of the evening, by returning the opening kickoff from his own four yard line to the Memphis 38. Five plays later, and after a 15-yard penalty, quarterback Jason Miller threw a 16-yard TD strike to Ken Cooper. The try for extra point was muffed.

Memphis immediately responded by returning the following kickoff to the Hawks' 13. A five-yard penalty and two rushing plays advanced the ball to the one, and the Cyclones scored on the next play.

Iowa Park was assessed a 15-yard penalty on the following kickoff, and began the series on the 20 yard line. Miller went on an 18-yard ramble, but lost the ball when

tackled.

On the next play, Brian Brown found himself cut off at the line of scrimmage on one sideline, completely reversed the play, and scored. The two-point conversion was good, and Memphis led 14-6 with 7:24 yet to play in the opening period.

Before the quarter ended, Memphis tacked on three more points via a 44-yard field goal that was aided by a stout wind out of the south.

As the quarter was ending, Memphis had begun a 61-yard drive that ended on a 40-yard draw, which was set up by a 15-yard penalty against Iowa Park.

Memphis scored again, less than three minutes later. Lineman Clint Scobee caught the kickoff that was knocked down by the stout southern wind. But he lost hold of the ball when tackled, and the Cyclones had possession on the Hawk 30.

That drive was keyed by a 28-yard screen pass to the three yard line. The Hawk defense appeared to have set a runner back five yards on the next play, but a major penalty put the ball back on the three. And Memphis scored on the next play, to lead by a whopping 29-6 margin.

Iowa Park fought its way back into the game before halftime, however, scoring a pair of TDs.

Miller capped a 57-yard drive, that was highlighted by Chris Williams' 18-yard sprint, with a five-yard run.

Then, Carl Pace laid claim to a Cyclone fumble on the second play following the kickoff, at the Cyclone 29. Three Miller passes, a 10-yarder to Michael Frazier, and a 10-yarder to Mark Tatum,

keyed a drive that was climaxed by a one-yard plunge by de la Rosa, with 21 seconds remaining on the clock. The score had been narrowed to 29-18.

Memphis ran the second half's opening kickoff back for a touchdown, but it was called back on a forward lateral penalty. The Cyclones, with two major penalties called against the Hawk defense, drove to the Iowa Park 10 yard line. But four plays later, Iowa Park took possession at the 10.

In the fading moments of the period, the Hawks began a drive from the 50 yard line. Ten plays later, at the three and facing a fourth down, Ellis kicked a 20-yard field goal to narrow the hosts' lead to 29-21.

Memphis again made quick work of scoring. Returning the kickoff to the Cyclone 45, Iowa Park was called for "spearing" and assessed a penalty to the Hawk 40. Three plays later, Memphis scored on a 28-yard run, and tacked on a two-pointer, with 9:08 showing on the clock.

After exchanging possessions a couple of times, Iowa Park began its last desperate drive, from the Hawks' 45. A 50-yard reception by Jason Houston kept the drive alive, advancing the ball to the Memphis five. Four plays later, Miller hit Tatum on a six-yard pass,

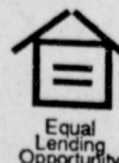

County Orders in each of these three counties require the inspection of: 1) individual septic system installations, 2) septic system renovations, and 3) all existing septic systems for malfunction before any sales and/or transfers of ownership of property (private, conventional, FHA, and VA loans included).

All installer/repair technicians must be licensed and certified by the TWC. Permitted installers may not begin construction, alteration, repair, or extension on a septic system that is owned by another person unless the owner or owner's representative shows proof of a current paid permit. Each owner and/or buyer of property with an existing septic system is required to request an inspection and permit from the Wichita Falls Water Pollution Division prior to closing and/or transfer of deed. Failure to comply with County Order may result in a fine of up to \$200.00 per day.

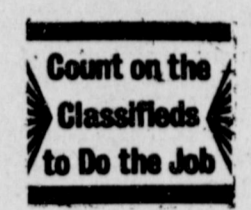
