Celebrate Sixtieth Anniversary



Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Bedford commemorated their 60th wedding anniversary at an openhouse Sunday afternoon at the home of their son and daughter-in-law Mr. and Mrs. Wilburn Bedford. As guests called they were greeted by the hostess, Another daughter-in-law Mrs. Walter Bedford presided at the register.

Cerise and white were observed in the floral decorations and appointments. Violets were used to beautify the home. In the living room a pot plant of Godesia violets was used on the coffee table. The dining table was draped with a lace cloth. On either side of the table were burning tapers. A runner of cerise nylon lace bearing diamond-like numerals "1890-1950" terminated at the base of the candleholders in bows caught up with clusters of violets. The crystal punch bowl and dainty napkins were pleasing table additions.

Miss Jan Bedford presided at the punch bowl. Miss Louise Bedford of Crosbyton and Mrs. Louis Morris of Seymour alternated at the cake service.

The children of Mr. and Mrs. Bedford presented their mother a wristwatch and their father boots.

Six of the seven children were present for the celebration. One son, Wallace of Megargel was unable to be here. The six are Walter and Wilburn of Iowa Park, John of Crosbyton, Mrs. R. A. Barrick of Fort Worth, Mrs. Guy Morris of Seymour and Mrs. James Parr of Olney.

Mrs. W. J. Robinson of Frederick, Okla., and Mrs. W. E. Bowen of Antelope, sisters of Mrs. Bedford, came for the celebration. Mr. Bedford's brother W. M. of Burkburnett was also here.

Approximately 100 guests called during the afternoon.

A. M. Bedford was born at Weatherford, Nov. 2, 1869. His parents and grandparents were among the first to settle there, his grandfather having built the second house in Weatherford. Later the family moved to Jack county and as he grew up he became a cattleman, the profession he followed until retirement several years ago.

He worked from the line of Mexico to Parker county. He also drove cattle up the Chisholm trail.

Mr. Bedford recalls the names of some of his bosses. He worked for W. T. Waggoner 12 years, Sid Webb, Uncle Jim Loving and Col. Millette. He remembers the last one so vividly because he gave Mr. Bedford the first cow brute he ever owned.

Mr. Bedford worked some on the early railroads. He helped to build the Fort Worth and Denver from Harrold to the border of New Mexico.

Mrs. Bedford, the former Miss Cornelia Wallace, was born and reared near Gainesville and moved to Jack county in 1886. She has a record of her grandfather being in Jack county in 1851. He is credited with establishing the first general store and post office at Jackboro. Mrs. Bedford saw the first train that ran into Gainesville and Graham.

The Bedfords were married near Antelope in Jack county February 2, 1890. For several years they lived in Old Tucker, Okla., in the Cherokee Strip. This town was later moved to Comanche when the Rock Island was laid through there.

Both remember many Indian depredations that occurred in Texas and Oklahoma. They also had experiences with Mexican lions, loafer wolves, rattlesnakes and panthers.

On one trip to Comanche which necessitated camping out at night, a panther almost seized their first baby. Mr. Bedford's father was sleeping outside the tent and noticed the panther just as he was slipping his paw underneath the tent. The marauder was chased away and about a month later the animal was killed by area residents. It was reputed to be the largest panther ever killed in that locality.

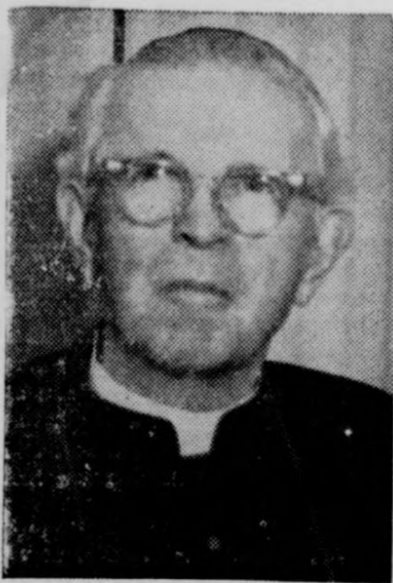

Water Board Asks for Bids on Construction Of Dam and Plant

Iowa Park is clearing another hurdle in its race toward the goal of lots and lots of soft water. This week requests for bids on the construction of a water dam and its attendant waterworks system were made, and awarding of the contracts is expected soon after March 7. Plans and specifications are obtainable from the officials of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District 3, and bids will be accepted by A. L. Reed, secretary of the administrative group.

About half the land needed for the new system has been bought by the district and negotiations are underway to buy the remainder.

Repair and extension of Iowa Park sewers will begin at an early date also. This is strictly a City of Iowa Park project, the bonds for which have been voted and sold.

Polio Drive Goes Over Quota; Ends Feb. 15

Spurred to new heights by the dynamic enthusiasm of Francis E. Barnes and Mrs. E. L. Scott, chairmen of the March of Dimes campaign, Iowa Park and surrounding areas have topped their quota of \$750 this week.

The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce will continue to accept donations until Feb. 15. The announced total collected to date is \$7751.


