Council approves bids for three major works

Iowa Park's city council Monday night approved bids on three major projects, after having appointed a new chief of police and fire marshall.

After several months of studies before finally advertising for bids from contractors, the council accepted a bid of \$99,104 for a "plain vanilla" building to replace the old Recreational Activities Center.

Architect Don Daugherity explained the bid was for a basic metal shell building, with finished walls only for the office and bathrooms, but with all interior electrical work to be done by city workers.

Four bids had been received on the project.

The structure is to be built on the city-owned block between Third and Fourth Streets, fronting on Third.

Prior to the voting, candidate for alderman Ira Hambright told the council he felt a new structure to replace the old RAC was needed, but said several citizens had commented they felt a city-wide straw vote

Several members of the council, however, responded that the topic had been discussed numerous times over the past several months, always listed on the published agenda, and in that time not one citizen had ever attended a meeting to oppose the project.

Mayor Tim Hunter also pointed out that the old RAC would either have to be locked, because it does not meet building codes of the city, or several thousands of dollars would have to be expended to bring it into

The present RAC consists of two old one-story barricks that were sold by Sheppard AFB in the early 1950s, and put together by memers of the Iowa Park Jaycees.

Over the objections of Leader publisher Bob Hamilton, the council approved by a 3-1 vote to accept a bid of \$42,656.50 to install an eightinch sewer line from US 287 along Wigley Road to Lake Iowa Park dam, and 200 feet east from that point.

Voters show little interest

Parsons new police chief

The successor to Alan Sheffield as chief of the Iowa Park Police Dept. is Wayne T. Parsons II, a seasoned peace officer from Temple.

The 43-year-old Parsons was hired by the city council during Monday night's meeting following a twomonth search.

Parsons was in Iowa Park Tuesday, and said he would be here as soon as he could submit his twoweek notice and "get everything in order around our home, so my wife doesn't have to take care of every-

Sheffield's resignation is to become effective as soon as the transition of the new chief is completed. He then plans to move to South Dakota.

During the council's search for a new chief, some 50 applications were received in response to advertisements in various publications.

The list was narrowed down to six finalists, from which Parsons was chosen. The other finalists were from Perryton, Addison, Grapevine, McGregor and Anson.

Parsons and his wife, Mary, have three children: Lisa, 22, Karen, 15, and Brian, eight. They also have a one-year-old grandson.

Born Aug. 17, 1947 in Brownwood, Parsons attended schools there through the sixth grade, when his family moved to Georgetown, just north of Austin, where he was graduated from high school.

After attending McMurry College at Abilene, 1965-68, he completed his BA degree in history and government in 1976 at Mary Hardin-Baylor Univ. in 1976 at Belton. He received additional education in 1981 at the University of Louisville.

Parsons served three years, 1969-72, in the U.S. Army Security Agency, where his assignment was intelligence gathering and analyzing foreign radio transmissions.

He is a graduate of the Southern Police Institute and has over 1,500 classroom hours in training, with certifications including basic, intermediate, advanced, instructor, and teacher, as well as instructor in firearms, driving and radar.

Most prominent responsibilities on the Temple department include identification, patrol and traffic

officer as well as patrol supervisor, traffic supervisor, training director, and currently administrative assistant.

His current assignment includes internal/external complaint investigations, recruiting and hiring, attendance at State Commission meetings, attendance at public hearings,

Weather creates problems

Not including the shower Wednesday morning, Iowa Park received 3.53 inches of precipitation during the past week, bringing the month's total to 4.30, according to Virgil Woodfin.

The rains are causing major problems for homeowners and some schools in low-lying areas, bringing activities on farms and in the oil patch to a complete stop, baseball games are postponed, the city-wide Clean-Up Week had to be extended, and construction to widen West Highway is at a standstill.

The city received numerous complaints of sewer lines backing up into homes, as well as Bradford Elementary, after 3.03 inches of rain fell Wednesday and Thursday of last

The major problem, according to James Barrington, city administrator, is the fact that the soil is completely saturated, and water is seeping into sewer line manholes, causing the lines to be overloaded.

And when a sewer line is over- conditions take over loaded, lines from homes and schools in the affected areas cannot empty into the main lines, causing them to

City crews over the past few years have been working to prevent as much as possible the seepage of ground water into the manholes. They encased and elevated many of the manholes, and then hired a firm to test the sewer lines with smoke in an effort to locate major leak areas, following that with repairs.

City workers have been assisting residents in installing units in their sewer lines which are designed to prevent backup from main lines, Barrington said yesterday.

But, though the units prevent backup, there is no way for drainage of the private lines when the main lines have great pressure closing the backup valves, he explained.

Tall and heavy wheat is starting to lay over on the ground in several fields over the area, and will continue unless the weather clears and hot, dry

The city was forced to extend its free dumping of debris and trimmings by city residents, because wet conditions hampered the annual Clean-Up Week activities.

Several organizations have been unable to clean up areas designated for their efforts by the Chamber of Commerce, co-sponsor of the yearly

Susan Dillard, Chamber secretary, said several organizations still are planning to fullfill their commitments, as soon as the weather clears.

Mrs. Dillard also reported the Reynolds Aluminum Recycling crew that was here Friday and Saturday had received and paid for 1,600 pounds of

The road construction crew will not be able to resume its work to widen West Highway until the ditches are dry enough to continue work to widen the culverts.

That work was believed to have been about half completed when the extended wet spell developed.

MRS. C.E. BIRK Faithful church member 70 years

Ninety-eight years ago a Confederate soldier and his wife from Mississippi placed membership with Iowa Park First Presbyterian Church and their name has been synonomous with the church to the present day. The couple was Mr. and Mrs. N.L. Lowrance. A granddaughter, Mary Anna

Lowrance Birk, has the distinction of being the oldest member of that church its centennial year, not by age, but by number of years of membership.

Mrs. Birk's parents were the late W. Locke and Ethel Reaves Lowrance. Born Aug. 23, 1911, she was baptized as an infant and joined the church July 16, 1922. She has been a faithful and very active member through the years and serves as an elder. She has held all offices in Women of the Church, formerly the Ladies' Auxiliary.

Mary Anna was the oldest of a family of three girls. After graduating Iowa Park High School in 1928, she attended Wichita Falls Junior College

and a short time at Draughon's Business College. She worked for Iowa Park City Hall and for the County Tax Office in Wichita Falls.

Her father was a farmer and dairyman and the family lived about two miles east of Iowa Park. After Mary Anna's marriage to C.E. Birk Dec. 17, 1936, she said she just moved from one hill to another. She had known her future husband all of her life. Birk was a native of Iowa Park and son of pioneer Plainview residents, Charles and Lucy Kilbourn Birk, who came here in 1891 and were also active in First Presbyterian Church. In 1925 the Birks built the two buff brick homes on a hill just east of Iowa Park on the old Iowa Park Road, now 370. Mary Anna still lives in one of the homes.

She says she used to tell her family and friends she wished she could find a husband like Ernest Birk. He had graduated Iowa Park High School 13 years before she did. Birk had the misfortune of losing his first wife by death when his two children,

Bettye and Bob, were young children. A few years after her death he and Mary Anna were married. Ten years later they had a daughter, Beverly.

Birk was an active member of the Presbyterian Church and was a civic and community leader. He served as an elder in the church and two times was commissioner to the General Assembly Church which is the highest court of the Presbyterian Church. Mrs. Birk's father also was honored with that position in earlier years. Birk died in 1966.

Mrs. Birk's priority has always been her church and family. "My mother and father took me to church. There wasn't a choice and they didn't send me or take me and leave to go somewhere else. Today so many people make Sunday a holiday instead of a Holy Day," she said and added "Unless I am sick I will be at church every time the doors open."

Mrs. Birk is a member of 23 Study Club and through the years has held most offices in the club.

She has lived her 78 years just

outside the city limits of Iowa Park. "I could never have kept my age a secret if I had wanted to," Mary Anna commented. She smiles as she remembers that her mother always told people "I moved from Tennessee in 1907, married Locke in 1909 and Mary Anna was born in 1911." Mrs. Birk said, "I don't know why, but the three were always mentioned together."

Mrs. Birk said, "We are so pleased with our present minister, Betty Stribling. She is so sensitive and compassionate. Also the membership has increased since she came in 1984." Rev. Stribling is the first woman minister the church has had.

Mrs Birk has three children. Bettye (Mrs. Calvin Hansen) of Wichita Falls, Bob of Iowa Park and Beverly (Mrs. Joe L. Orr) of Fort Worth, and nine grandchildren.

Other grandchildren of Mr. and Mrs. N.L. Lowrance still active in the Iowa Park First Presbyterian Church are Frances Park and Linton Gale Lowrance.







These are full-time homes and businesses, all producing taxes for the city.

Presbyterian Church celebrating centennial

FIrst Presbyterian Church will observe its 100th anniversary at 5 p.m. Sunday with a worship service conducted by Rev. Lewis Wilkins of Lubbock and Rev. Betty Stribling. pastor, liturgist. Rev. Wilkins is General Presbyter of Palo Duro Presbytery.

Special recognition will be given to former pastors and members. A brisket supper will be served on the grounds following the service. Those planning to attend should contact the church office, 592-

A new stained glass window has been installed in the choir loft of the sanctuary to memorialize and honor friends and family members and to commemorate the centennial.

Old pictures, record books and other items of interest will be on display and history booklets will be available to take home.

The impending organization of First Presbyterian Church almost parallels the beginning of Iowa Park. A plat was filed for the town in October 1888 and the Presbyterians had their first services Feb. 7, 1889 in the dining room of the old Cameron Hotel which was the only available place. Rev. W.N. Dickey, then evangelist of Dallas Presbytery, conducted the service.

In January 1890 Rev. Dickey returned by invitation and organized the Presbyterian Church with 11 members. Iowa Park was declared incorporated in July 1891. There has been a small but active congregation

The church register shows the 11 charter members were W.O. Moberly, Mrs. W.J. Moberly, Miss Kate Moberly, James Ralston, Mrs. Kate Ralston, A.A. Skinner, John White, Mrs. M. White, Mrs. Mattie Layne, Mrs. G.L. Hester and Mrs.

In March of that year D.C. Kolp, one of the town's developers offered the Presbyterians a building site. It was accepted by the session, composed of White and Skinner, elders, and Moberly, deacon. The site was in the same block, but north of the present building at 211 S.

In 1891 Rev. J.R. Jacobs served the church as pastor for a salary of \$150 a year. Twenty-one members were added to the church roll that year. In 1892 four members were added, including Mr. and Mrs. N.L. Lowrance. Three of their descendants are present members, Mrs. C.E. Birk, Frances Park and Linton Gale

Rev. John V. McCall frequently preached for the church in 1883, using a one room building offered to them by the First Methodist Church. After holding 11 a.m. services here Rev. McCall rode horseback to Archer City to conduct 3 p.m.

During Rev. McCall's ministry in 1894 a small 30x40 foot white frame structure was built on the site given by Kolp. N.L. Lowrance gave a horse to be sold to start the building campaign. The building's foundation was of native stone quarried south of the Wichita River and hauled to the site in wagons.

By 1914 a manse was constructed just north of the church building. This house is still standing at 201 S. Yosemite. During the

ministry of Dr. E.S. Lowrance (1907-1940) when the church was having financial difficulties, Dr. Lowrance insisted the church sell the manse and use the money for "other things." Dr. Lowrance, a cousin of N.L. Lowrance, bought his own home and lived in it until he retired in 1940. The fact that he was totally deaf was not a drawback for him, he was expert at reading lips.

The first part of the physical plant, a sanctuary with classrooms on each side, was built in 1931. The "Akron Plan" was used in the architectual design.

In January 1922 "The New Church Building Committee" was listed as R.F. Abernathy, chairman, G.B. Gauntt, Noel Troutman, A.H. Estes, Locke Lowrance, Mrs. C. Birk and Mrs. G.B. Gauntt. Church officials were E.S. Lowrance, minister, N.L. Lowrance, Abernathy and D. McBride, elders; Locke Lowrance, Troutman, Ralph McBride, Gilbert Weeth and Gale Lowrance, deacons; Troutman, Sunday School superintendent; Mrs. C. Birk, Home Class Department superintendent; Mrs. R.F. Abernathy, cradle Roll superintendent and Mrs. N.L. Lowrance, president of Ladies' Auxiliary.

That year the Ladies' Auxiliary projects were to pay on the preacher's salary, help to clothe a girl from the orphans home in Itasca, give banquets for high school graduates, make quilts to send to orphanages in Oklahoma and Texas, send flowers, trays and magazines to the sick, and each fall to "pound" the preacher with canned goods and other food items.

A fellowship hall, now known as the Wesminster Room, was added to the existing structure in 1930 and included a kitchen and rest rooms.

High school graduates honored in 1937 by the Ladies Auxiliary in the home of Mrs. C. Birk were Robert Bruce Lowrance, Johnny Johnson and Graham Purcell Jr. A highlight of that summer was a preaching mission by Dr. Manfred E. Gutzke, a well-known Bible scholar.

The year 1940 was a memorable one for church members. The 50th year of organization was marked Jan. 21 with a morning and evening service featuring Dr. C.T. Caldwell as guest speaker. An afternoon service with "Greetings From Our Sister Churches" was held.

Dr. Lowrance was still pastor with R.F. Abernathy, C.E. Birk, R.W. Cornforth, Locke Lowrance, G.B. Purcell and John W. Yarbo serving as elders. K.P. Abernathy and Gayle Park were deacons. Birk was serving as Sunday School superintendent, Marguerite Ralston was president of Young People and Mrs. Gayle Park was serving as president of Ladies' Auxiliary.

That was the last year Dr. Lowrance served as pastor. He had tried to resign in 1932, but the local congregation would not accept his

resignation. Another milestone in 1940 for the church was the purchase of a lot at 300 S. Yosemite across the street west and south of the church building. A house known as the Trice house was bought and moved to the location from the 700 block of South Wall Street. The house was remodeled and became the manse. Rev. Will Fred Galbraith Jr., and family were the first to occupy the

This manse was sold in 1955 and was moved from the site and a three-bedroom brick home was built on the property. Thirty years later in 1975 the manse property was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Roy Lakey and a four bedroom brick house was purchased for the manse at 1601 Douglas.

To add traditional character, a spire was placed on the roof of the church building in 1949 and a large semi-Gothic cathedral glass window was installed in the choir loft area. Also at this time building entrances were redesigned, the sanctuary interior was redecorated, new carpeting was laid and a Baldwin organ was purchased and installed. These improvements were made during the ministry of Rev. Maurice C. Yeargan who served as minister of the church from 1947 to 1954.

In 1953 an educational building was added to the north side of the existing facility. The building was dedicated as "The Evelyn Jo Miller Educational Building." Most of the

funds were provided by Luther Miller, father of Evelyn Jo, a member of the church who died in 1950 at the age of 21.

A building fund was established in 1961 with C.E. Birk, Mrs. Carl Troutman, Luther Miller and Floyd Miller giving the money for the purchase of lots on North Pacific. These were later sold to Pacific Ave. Baptist Church.

Seventy-five years of organization was observed January 1965 with Rev. John Cunningham, General Presbyter of Central Texas Presbytery as speaker for the morning worship service. Rev. William Gould from the General Presbyter's office assisted with administering Holy Communion. A service was held in the afternoon to dedicate the new Allen organ which had been given to the church by some of the members. Rev. Harold Dykstra was pastor at this time, serving from 1963 to

Though it has always been small in numbers the church continued through the years to make improvements to the buildings and grounds. The most recent improvements was begun during the time Rev. E.B. Compton Jr. was minister. Multi-colored art glass windows were installed in 1979 and 1980, the chancel was enlarged, walls were recovered with light colored fabric and the metal ceiling was repainted in several colors. New carpeting was laid in the sanctuary and Westminster Room. A baptismal font and lectern were given to the church as memorials and illumination was improved. A new climate control system was installed and new steps were built at two outside entrances to the sanctuary. On the 90th anniversiary of the church the sanctuary was rededicated.

In 1984 and 1987 the educational building was redecorated, new carpeting was laid in the rooms and hallways, ceilings were lowered and tile flooring was laid in the Fellowship Hall.

First Presbyterian Church has

belonged to three Presbyteries, Dallas Presbytery, with offices in Dallas, Central Presbytery, headquartered in Fort Worth and Palo Duro Presbytery with offices in Lubbock. The Iowa Park congregation is a member of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

Fifteen pastors have served the church during its 100 years. Other than those already mentioned were Rev. R.D. Campbell, in the early years between 1890 and 1907, Rev. William L. Walker, from 1955-1956. He was killed in a plane crash in May 1956. Rev. Boyd Sclenther, 1960-1962, Rev. Albert M. Dorsett, 1969-1973, serving Iowa Park and Electra, Rev. Norman Nettleton, 1980-1983, and the present minister, Rev. Stribling who has been here since 1984.


Elders serve on a rotating basis. Elders currently serving include Floyd Zion, Frances Park, Gary House, Catherine Whittingstall,



Until now, all of FmHA's loans for water and sewer systems, fire stations, health clinics and other community facilities have been direct loans from the agency to the

"With the addition of guaranteed loans, we can now assist communities that are able to qualify for commercial loans with the support of an FmHA guarantee," Johnson said.

Under the program, FmHA guarantees a loan made by a bank, savings and loan, insurance company, Federal Land Bank or other qualified lender against a certain percentage of loss. Since the mid-1980s, guarantees have become the major component of FmHA's farm loan program, accounting for more than 50 percent of all farm loans.







Iowa Parkan is leader for annual iris show

Beautifully blooming iris, that in concert with the crocus, tulip and forsythia helps to announce spring, will be the center of attraction for the garden tour planned for Sunday. William K. (Bill) Parker Jr. is serving as show chairman.

The tour in Iowa Park will close out the 1990 American Benson Iris Society Region 17 Iris Show and Convention that begins Friday.

The Iris specimen show "Iris in the Land of the Wichitas" and judging will be held Saturday at the Hilton.

Iris at the Parker home east of Iowa Park are blooming in colorful array along the winding drive. The Parker home is located on what he likes to refer to as "Bluebonnet Hill." It is one of the landmarks along the old Iowa Park Road, now 370, that was built in 1925 and owned by the C. Birk family until Parker bought it five years ago.

Texas bluebonnets carpet the sloping front yard and keep Mrs. Parker busy with a hoe "murdering" weeds and goat heads as she has time because they do not want to mow with the bluebonnets in their present stage of growth.

Parker has many varieties of iris blooming around the grounds in plots and in an especially attractive triangle bed with Japanese iris that bloomed for the first time last year.

Tall bearded iris are his favorites, however he has Siberian, Louisiana, Dutch, English and Spanish, miniature dwarf and standard dwarf bearded, in addition to the Japanese.

A flower lover since childhood because his grandmother always grew a lot of flowers, Parker became interested in iris when they bought some from Mrs. Lester Brooks. At that time she told the Parkers about the Benson Iris Society and they became members.

He transplanted about 150 plants when they moved to the Birk place. He says he has dug up bulbs and kept them out of the soil for as long as 10 months and when planted they have done well. It takes about five years to grow iris from seeds. Parker said.

He has received the American Iris Society silver medal in the local iris show that had more than 150 entries, and was awarded 13 blue ribbons out of 15 allowed.

Parker is teaching his son William Kenneth III to hyberdize iris. He received the "People's

Although the Parkers like all flowers and plants, he is an orchid aficionado. That is easy to tell when one visits his greenhouse. In addition to many varieties of orchids growing in profusion he has other exotic hanging, container and foliage plants.

Growing space in the 40x45 foot greenhouse is almost at a premium. Some of the plants belong to Tim Kasper, high school biology teacher, who Parker says does most of the

work because on his job he doesn't have time.

Sometimes there are as many as 3,000 blooming orchids of varying sizes at one time and it would be difficult to make a choice for the most beautiful. He has one Paphiopedilum orchid that originated in Southeast Asia (Gwenda Overett) which he has given the varietal name "Emily" for his mother. He received a "Highly Recommended" certificate from the Southwest Region Orchid Growers Association in Austin where there were 1200 to 1500 specimens in the show and only five awards were given.

A few of the orchid varieties, some with a delightfully sweet fragrance, include Pansy, Lady Slipper, Cattelya, Phalaeanopsis, Butterfly, Dancing Lady, Vanda, and Rattlesnake. The orchids range in color from purple to yellow, deep wine, red, white, orange, peach and pink. He has one large plant that is about 23 years old that was given to him by the late Mrs. Frank Timberlake of Wichita Falls when it had only two leaves. Sometimes it has from three to four hundred blooms at one time, Parker said.

Some of the different orchid species that Parker has came straight from the jungles of Southeast Asia. He explained that the Cattelya orchid pod probably has as many as 8,000 seeds, but it takes from five to seven years for the plants to bloom from seeds.

The Phalaenopsis orchids have many different patterns on the petals and are in a variety of colors. Many small orchids blooming on pieces of cork add an attractive and unusual note in the greenhouse. One of his

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interesting container plants is a green frond-like species that pre-dates the dinasaur.

In his eclectic collection are many succulents such as different sizes of cactus in pots. He has snow roses, a collection of citrus trees including orange, lemon, Mandarin oranges and dwarf Ruby Red grapefruit. He has a coconut palm tree. Some plants have grown to nine feet tall, too tall for his greenhouse so he and his wife and Kasper took several of their plants to the Botanic Gardens in Fort Worth.

Mrs. Parker has found the perfect answer for the fruit from his lemon tree. They take them to his mother and she makes delicious pies for them.

Parker raises honey bees to help pollinate his plants. Every so often he opens the greenhouse door so they can go in.

To add a tropical touch Parker found a dead mesquite tree in the middle of an area on his parents' farm where they had made a dump ground. He dug up the tree and moved it to his greenhouse before it was finished. He draped the limbs with Spanish moss and has Bromeliads growing on them. Many of these are in bloom now.

Bill was born in Wichita Falls, the son of William and Emily Parker who live on a 160-acre farm in Archer County. The farm originally belonged to Mrs. Parker's family. He graduated Archer City High School in 1964 and from Midwestern University in 1969 with a degree in secondary education. He worked for First State Bank in Archer City and later for Arnold Furniture Co. in Wichita Falls where he refinished and reupholstered furniture. He has worked for UPS in the Jacksboro area 10 years and likes it more all of the

Jackie was born near Ballinger. She graduated Oklahoma State University School of Veterinary Medicine. She is the first woman to serve in the Southwest Region Veterinary Corp of USDA. She has been working for more than 25 years inspecting animals and has a small processing plant in Windthorst.

Jackie has a special interest in African Violets and is a member of the African Violet Society. They both hold memberships in House Plants Unlimited and are life members of the Benson Iris Society.

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
