Council considers offer of Park West property

The majority of Monday night's city council meeting was devoted to exploring the possibility of accepting property in Park West Shopping Center as an extension of West Park, and also on possible changes of street lighting fixtures.

Actually, the council took only one vote during the meeting which lasted more than an hour. That was to confirm

the appointment of Marc Newman as the city/school representative on the Wichita County Appraisal District board.

Mayor Wayne House said the major property owner in the shopping center, Ray Townsend, has offered the 60-foot-wide strip through his property to be taken over by the city for the purpose of maintaining it as a street.

The remaining property, on the west end, is owned by the Fugate Corpora-

tion, parent of Pizza Hut, and has been offered to the city for \$3,200. The price includes the two recently-installed lighting fixtures.

Administrator Gary Jones told the council he could rebuild the street for \$17,000, which was included in the 1992-93 budget for streets.

However, if the council insists on installing curb and guttering -- which

Canadian, Goldwaithe to meet here tomorrow

For the second consecutive week, Iowa Park's Hawk Stadium has been chosen for a high school football playoff contest.

Kicking off at 7:30 p.m. Friday will be Canadian and Goldwaithe, in a Class AA regional semifinal. Tickets are \$4.

The winner will face the victor of Saturday's game between Hamlin and Springlake-Earth, for the Region One crown.

This will be "old hat" for the fans from Goldwaithe, who captured the Class A state championship in 1985,

and have been in the playoffs all but two years since then.

But, for Canadian, this is something new. No football team from the Panhandle school has ever advanced beyond the bi-district level.

Goldwaithe, which is located 34 miles southeast of Brownwood, was elevated to Class AA in 1986, but still reached the quarterfinals.

The Eagles knocked off Rotan 49-14 in bi-district, and last week earned

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News Briefs

More than 4 inches rainfall

Weather may have provided some problems to a few area residents, but farmers and ranchers are definitely smiling.

Prior to Tuesday morning's rain, Iowa Park had received 4:21 inches of precipitation since last Wednesday evening.

Virgil Woodfin said he measured

2.44 from the Wednesday night rain, and an additional 1.77 Saturday. None of the rains were dashing and hard, but fell slowly and soaked fields and yards well, observers said.

No measurement was available at presstime on the precipitation that began falling during the early morning hours Tuesday.

Christmas lights go on Dec. 3

The annual ceremony of turning on the city's Christmas lights will be held Thursday, Dec. 3, according to Mrs. Philip Welch, chairman of the lighting project.

As has been the case in previous years, the ceremony will be held at the

Tom Burnett Memorial Library, and will feature the appearance of Santa Claus.

Crews will be busy until Thursday, putting the lighting fixtures in place for the ceremony.

Leader printed early this week

This issue of the *Iowa Park Leader* has been printed a day earlier than usual, because of the Thanksgiving holiday.

The paper's policy has long been to print early, whenever a holiday falls on a Thursday, the publication's regular date of distribution.

The newspaper office will close at noon Wednesday and reopen at 8 a.m. Friday.

Next week's issue will be printed on Wednesday evening, as usual, and all regular deadlines for news and advertising will be observed.

Police report arresting six persons

Among the six arrests Iowa Park police made during the past week, one of them cleared up a side-swiping incident.

Police received a report Tuesday evening of last week, that two different vehicles parked in the 800 block of Vogel had been struck by a car that had left the scene.

Monday morning, Paul James Heckman, 28, was taken into custody on a Class B miscellaneous charge of failure to comply with law on striking an unattended vehicle.

Heckman was transported to the county jail.

Additional charges could possibly be filed against Heckman, but by other agencies, but none had been recorded as of Tuesday morning.

He reportedly abandoned the car near Punkin Center, and then reported to Wichita Falls officers that it had been stolen.

A 29-year-old Kansas woman was arrested here Friday morning, on outstanding warrants from that state.

Edith G. Jacobberger was found to have warrants against her from that state for failure to appear on charges of driving while under the influence, and violation of probation.

Additional charges reportedly will be facing her, once she is transferred from the Wichita County jail, for violation of probation for delivery of cocaine.

Two men were arrested on charges of disorderly conduct in the 700 block of East Bank early Saturday morning,

according to the police blotter.

Officers received a cogplait that a group of males were in a yard at 1:01 a.m., drinking and breaking bottles.

James Chad Bever, 19, and Christopher Lance Drookins, 22, were arrested on public intoxication charges, and later released after signing personal recognizance bonds.

Robert C. Ramatowski, 22, of Wichita Falls was taken into custody at 3:54 a.m. Tuesday in the 200 block of West Highway, on outstanding warrants issued both locally and by the county sheriff's office.

The county warrant was *capias pro fine* for driving while license was suspended, and the local warrants were for speeding and having no insurance. The

local fine amounts to \$417.

Ramatowski was transported to the county jail, according to the police blotter.

Steven L. Duncan, 33, was taken into custody at 3:44 p.m. Sunday in the 1000 block of Park Plaza, on a charge of criminal trespass of a habitation.

He was transported to the county jail, where he posted a \$200 bond and was released.

Soft drink machines at Woodbriar Apartments were struck by vandals, who were able to take canned drinks and an estimated \$45 in cash, according to a report that was filed Monday afternoon.

Faith Baptist sets noteburning

Faith Baptist Church will host a noteburning and rededication service for its new facilities Sunday at 2 p.m.

The service will commemorate the pay-off of a \$545,000 note on the church's facilities. In 1987, Faith Baptist Church constructed a 750-seat sanctuary, a nursery suite and an office complex.

The church began in 1954 as a mission of the First Baptist Church in Iowa Park. It began with 45 members meeting in donated buildings on a \$1400 parcel of land, and became a church in 1955.

Since that time, the church has grown to a membership of 1350, with an average worship attendance of 400.

In 1957 a 300-seat sanctuary was built. Then in 1962 the church purchased the McCullough property and in 1966 built the Fellowship Hall incurring indebtedness of \$149,000, with 645 resident members. In 1986 the church began having two morn-

ing worship services.

Construction on the latest addition to the church facilities began Easter Sunday in 1987, with an indebtedness of \$545,021.26. The project was completed in December of the same year. In March 1988 the sanctuary was dedicated at an actual cost of \$498,085.

It was financed by the State National Bank of Iowa Park through a Southern Baptist program entitled, "Challenge to Build". The program is based on the concept of equal sacrifice from each of the members, not equal giving.

"The liquidation of the debt is attributed to God's grace in leading the church membership to be faithful in their commitment to give sacrificially," Dr. Greg Ammons, pastor, said.

Since construction of the new facilities, the church has continued its substantial growth. Faith Baptist has baptized 222 persons in the new sanc-

tuary while experiencing a 20 percent increase in resident membership.

Festivities for the noteburning and rededication service will include special music, as well as favorite numbers from the Faith Baptist Choir.

In addition, several special guests will share a brief word with the congregation. These speakers include Fred McDowell, Director of Missions for Wichita-Archer-Clay Baptist Association, and Mayor Wayne House of Iowa Park.

Guest speaker will be Jerry Miller, a former pastor of Faith Baptist Church. He is current pastor of First Baptist Church in Decatur.

In conclusion, Dr. Ammons will share a word of thanksgiving and challenge to the church membership. After the service everyone is invited to stay for a reception hosted by the church in its fellowship hall.

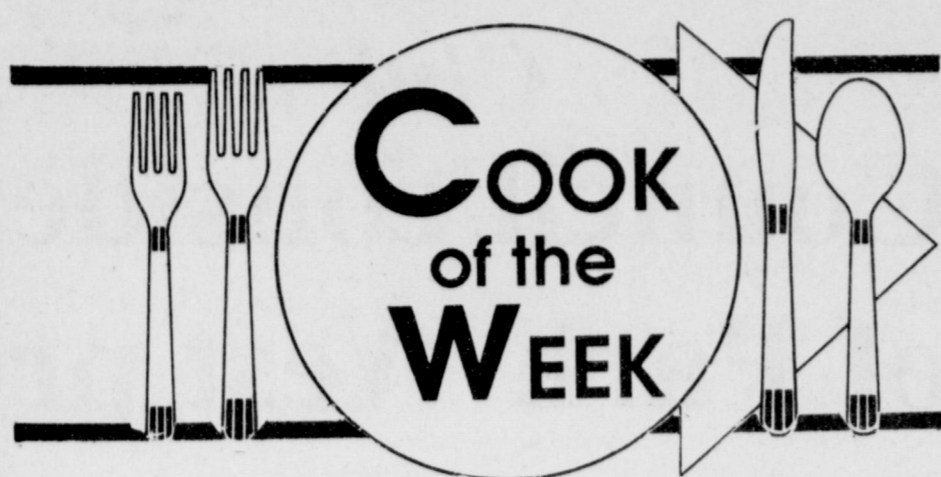

The recipe for "Secret Pie" is extremely rich, and the filling can be prepared weeks ahead of time. "Mexican Cornbread Casserole" is especially good served with a pot of pinto beans.

Festive Fudge

Mix in heavy 2-quart saucepan:
2 cups sugar
2/3 cup evaporated skimmed milk
12 regular-size marshmallows
1/2 cup butter or margarine
Few grains of salt
Cook, stirring constantly, over medium heat until mixture reaches a boil - mixture will be bubbling all over top. Boil and stir 5 minutes more. Take off heat.
Stir in until completely melted:
6 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate pieces
Stir in:
1 cup nuts, chopped
1 tsp. vanilla
Spread in a buttered 8-inch square pan. Cool and cut into 30 pieces.



Secret Pie

1 to 2 cans Eagle Brand milk, cooked in can (amount depends on size of crust used)
1 graham cracker crust
Chip pecans on top of milk and top with Cool Whip. I usually sprinkle pecans on top of Cool Whip to decorate.

I usually cook 6 cans of Eagle Brand milk at a time.

1 pint fresh strawberries, halved
2-3 bananas, sliced
1 lb. can sliced cling peaches, drained
1 - 8 oz. can pineapple chunks, drained
1. Cut cookie dough into 1/8-inch thick slices; arrange cookie slices on lightly greased pizza pan. Press lightly together to seal.

2. Place in oven and bake 10-12 minutes. Crust is done when edges just begin to brown - top of crust will not be brown.

3. Blend cream cheese with Cool Whip and spread evenly over cooled crust.

4. Arrange strawberry halves around edge of cookie crust. Place banana slices in a circle next to strawberries overlapping slightly. Next, place peaches in a circle. Mound pineapple chunks in center.

5. Spoon orange sauce over fruit.

Orange Sauce

1/2 cup sugar
Dash salt
1 Tbsp. cornstarch
1/2 cup orange juice
2 Tbsps. lemon juice
1/4 cup water
Stir together sugar, salt and cornstarch in a small pan. Gradually stir in orange juice, lemon juice and water. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and boils. Remove from heat and cool.

Mexican Cornbread Casserole

1 lb. ground beef
1/4 cup chopped onion
2 Tbsps. chopped jalapenos
1 envelope corn bread mix
4 slices American cheese
1 can cream style corn
2/3 cup milk
2 eggs, beaten

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Brown ground beef until crumbly, draining off any excess fat. Add onions and jalapenos. Combine eggs, 1 cup of corn and milk; add to cornbread mix and stir just until dry ingredients are moistened. Pour half of cornbread batter into greased 9-inch cake pan. Top with beef mixture, cheese slices and remaining corn. Pour other half of cornbread batter on top. Bake 25-30 minutes.

Willie's Goodies

Melt in double boiler:
12 oz. milk chocolate chips
Remove from heat and add:
1 can Eagle Brand milk
4 cups miniature marshmallows
2 cups pecans
Drop on wax paper-covered cookie sheet. Chill. Then store.

Taco Dip

Kay Cole was winner of the "People's Choice Award" at the recent Iowa Park Garden Club Flower Show.

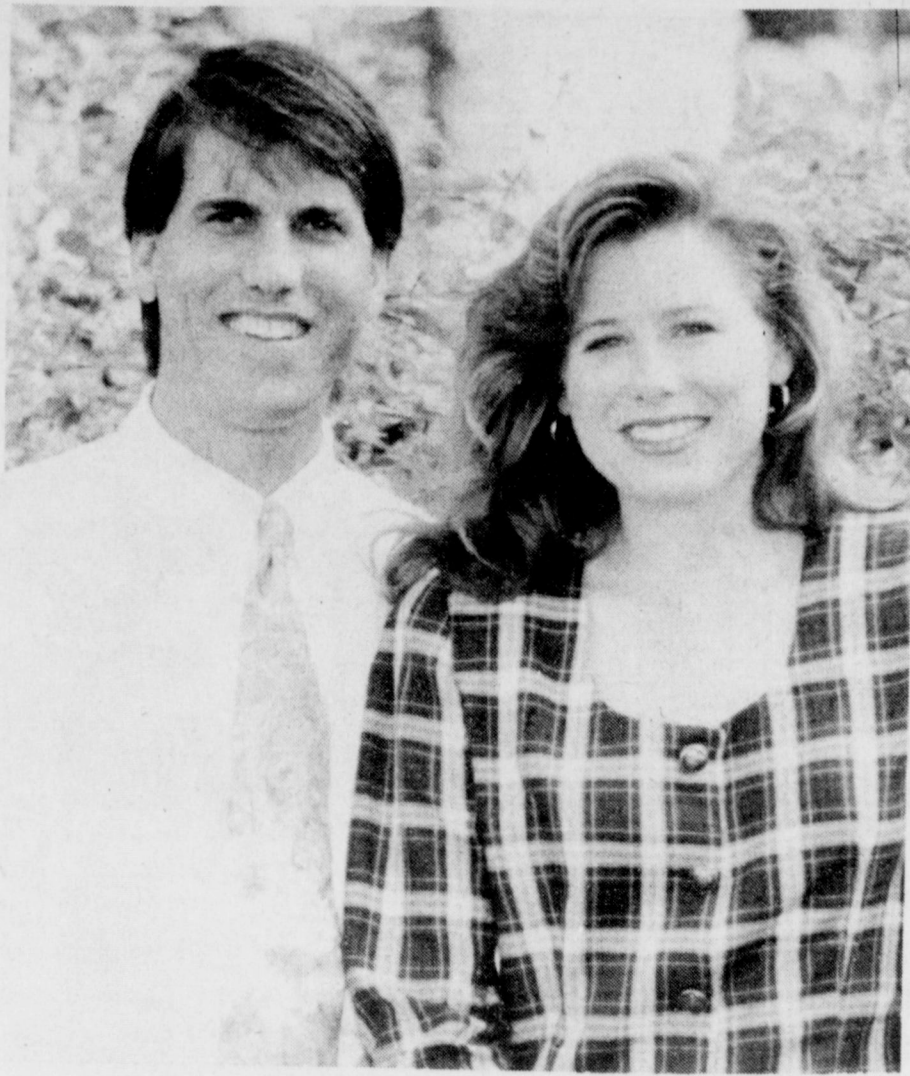
The annual show, which was held at the Iowa Park RAC, attracted more than 30 entries from club members. Show theme was "Beautify".

has been supported by Alderman Johnny Crawford and Bob Hamilton -- the cost would raise to almost \$24,000.

There also was a lengthy discussion on how many of the existing lights would be retained, as well as what type of lighting fixtures would be used.

During the discussion, Hamilton said the lights used along the 400 block should be the same as whatever is finally decided to put on the 100-300 blocks, should those be changed.

Jones was asked to make a detailed cost presentation on variations of what the expense to the city would be, should the shopping center land be accepted as a street.

Mayor House had arranged to have representatives of Lone Star Gas to meet with the council, to discuss the possibility of changing out the lighting along West Park from electricity to natural gas.

However, earlier in the day, company officials said they could not be present that evening, asking that their presentation be rescheduled in the future.

The reason the council is considering alternatives -- including changing type of electrical fixtures -- in the 100-300 blocks of West Park is that those three blocks cost almost 10 percent of the city's street lighting expense each month.

That would amount to some \$3,500 annually, aldermen were told.

"I really didn't want you to vote on any change tonight" concerning the street through the 400 block, the mayor told the council. He explained he wanted the discussion held, and a vote to be taken at a later meeting.

Council members decided to hold only one meeting next month, on Dec. 14. Should a pressing issue arise, however, a called meeting could be set, it was pointed out.

this week's entry with a 27-9 drubbing of Wall.

Goldwaite, with only 1,700 population, is one of the smaller schools in enrollment among AA members, with 155 pupils.

An extremely young team, only seven seniors are listed on the roster.

But the Eagles will have at least three charter buses loaded with fans Friday night. "We don't have much else to do besides follow our football team," commented Goldwaite Eagle publisher Frank Bridges.

Canadian, located 37 miles south-east of Perryton and 41 miles north of Wheeler, defeated Highland Park of Amarillo in bi-district, and last week knocked off Ralls 26-19.

Only five times has a Canadian football team advanced beyond district since 1951, and each of those times for only one game.

Ben Ezzell, publisher of the Canadian Record, described his team as one without any stars, or size, but one with "tremendous team unison."

At least one chartered bus has been contracted by that school's booster club.

Worth Quoting

It's not often that a member of the Kiwanis Club just up and volunteers to present a program to the club at one of its weekly luncheon meetings. We're each assigned a specific date to be in charge of one program during the year, and we often complain when it's our turn.

Last week was Bill Burnside's turn to provide a program, but he was absent from the meeting so we were facing an obvious void in the agenda. Ron Preston seized the opportunity and volunteered to be the day's program. We figured he must be running a fever, which he was in a way. Once he got started, you could almost see little puffs of smoke coming out of his ears.

It would be an understatement to say that Ron Preston is upset with Gov. Ann Richards and other proponents of "The Fair Share Plan" of funding the state's public schools. Her plan sailed through the Texas Senate last week, and the debate in Austin continued this week in the Texas House of Representatives.

Preston said Texans are in serious jeopardy of facing skyrocketing local property taxes if the governor's plan becomes reality. Among the provisions, the plan calls for local property tax money to be redistributed statewide from wealthier school districts to poorer school districts.

The anticipated effect on Henrietta Independent School District would be an increase in local property taxes from \$1.13 to \$1.29 per \$100 valuation while the school district would receive about \$100,000 less in state funding, Preston said.

As state officials prance around promising no new taxes, they are laying a trap to force local school districts to up their taxes to finance the state's responsibilities, Preston said. And he's pretty upset. He wants us to get upset, and he wants the state's leaders to know we're upset.

As of this writing "The Fair Share Plan" is only a proposal which must be accepted by the House of Representatives as well as the Senate. If it passes

both legislative bodies, it will go to the voters in early 1993 in a proposed constitutional amendment election.

Political observers forecast the voters will reject such a proposal, and then the state's leaders will make it look like we are to blame for failing to properly finance public schools. Then the folks down in Austin will twist things around to make it appear as though our rejection of their plan is an endorsement of a state income tax or state property tax.

Better watch out.

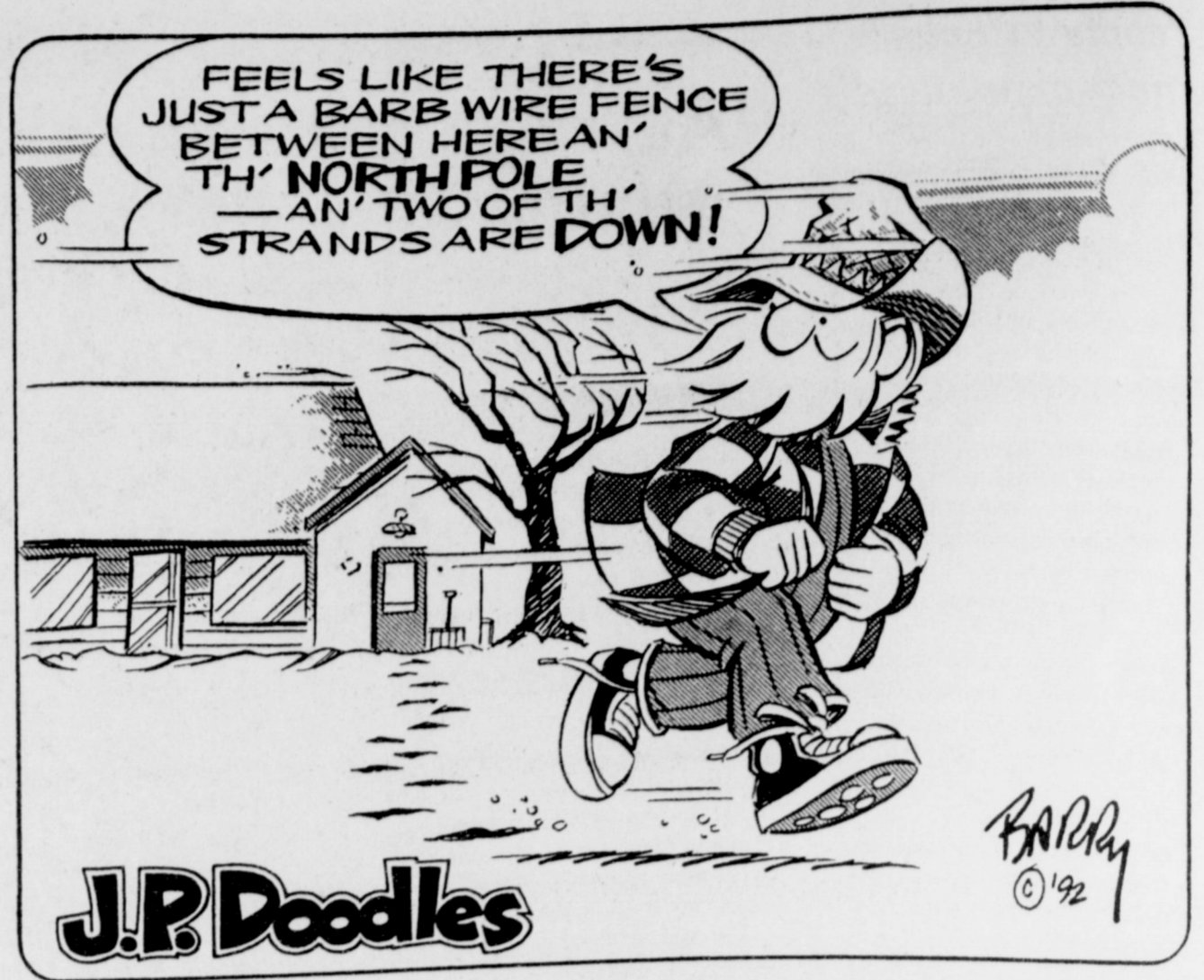

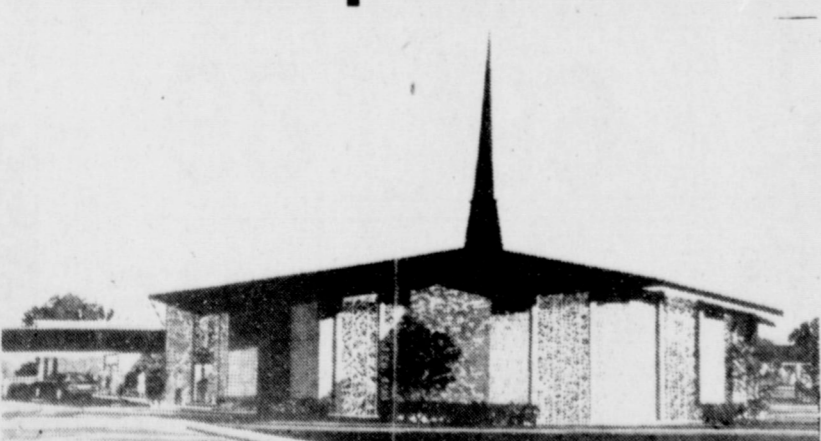

NEITHER CATHOLIC, PROTESTANT, NOR JEW #3

In order to be a Christian, a man must hear the message of Christ and believe that Jesus is the divine Son of God. (Heb. 11:6; Mark 16:16). Having believed in Jesus, one must make the decision to change the course of his life (called repentance). (Acts 17:30). Having done that, one must heed Jesus' instructions to confess Him before men. (Mt. 10:32, 33). Finally as the apostles believed and taught, in order to be a Christian, one must be baptized for remission of sins. (Acts 2:38). When we have done these things, we have merely done what was done in the first century. Any modification in this method of becoming a Christian is not approved by God. (Gal. 1: 8, 9).

When a Christian worships God, one must do it in the way prescribed in the inspired Word of God. (1 John 3:18; John 4:24). When man adds other elements, he is adding things which God did not wish to be included in His worship; else God would have included them from the beginning. We as members of the church of Christ believe that in regard to church government and church organization, we are to follow the divinely given pattern or blueprint as found in the New Testament. We believe in living clean upright lives; in accepting and following the message of the New Testament as given by the Holy Spirit. In short, we are saying we do not believe men or councils have the authority to modify the doctrines, teachings, or principles which God gave us in His divinely inspired book.

We are attempting to be in truth and fact just what the people were in New Testament times, Christians, members of His church. If Paul were here today and one would ask him if he were a Protestant, he would not understand the question. Paul never claimed to be a Protestant. He refers to himself in 1 Cor. 4:1 as a "minister of Christ" and that is a follower of Christ, a Christian. He sought to persuade Agrippa to be a Christian, nothing more. (Acts 26: 28, 29). Protestant churches did not exist in New Testament times. Neither then nor now is the church a party within a party, built around a powerful personality or upon one passage of Scripture to the neglect of others. Paul states the reason why this could not be the case when he condemns the people of Corinth for their party divisions. (1 Cor. 3:21-23).

The church as the pillar and ground of the truth (1 Tim. 3:15), protests just as much against Protestantism as against Catholicism. Christ's prayer was for unity. (John 17:20, 21). Religious division is a prevalent cause of unbelief. Division is a mark of carnality. (1 Cor. 3:1-4). Therefore the church, if it is the church of Christ, cannot succumb to party names, to human ordinances, to a pope, or preach a denominational message. It is impossible for the church to perpetuate a system which necessarily causes and cements division and discord. There are points of similarity between the church which Christ established and modern day Protestantism, but the church is not Protestant. It is the undenominational church of the living God. Next week we will conclude our study of "NEITHER CATHOLIC, PROTESTANT, NOR JEW."

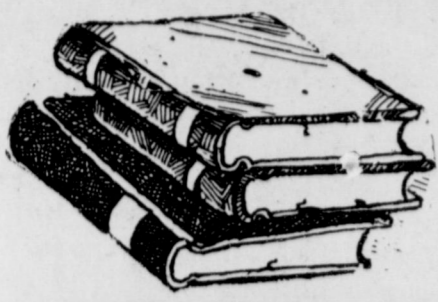

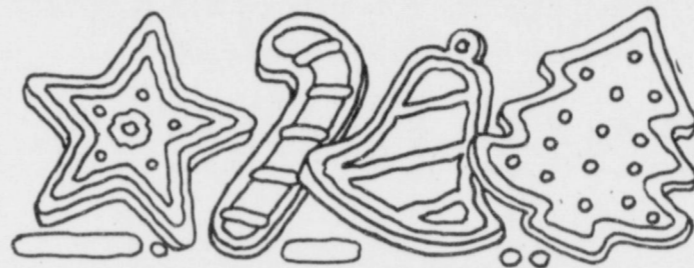

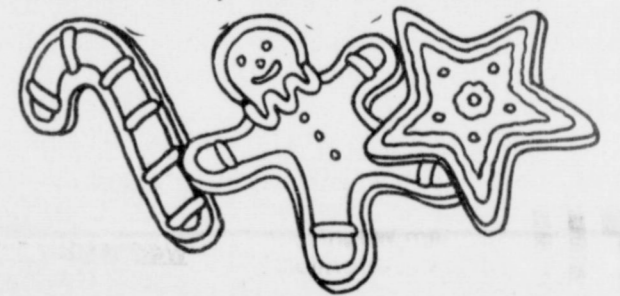

Steers dominate Bobcats

The Graham Steers blew the Bobcats from Childress out of Hawk Stadium during the third quarter of their area playoff game Friday, 29-0, and earned a berth in the regional semifinals of the state playoffs.

Graham, runner-up of Dist. 4-AAA, was held to only nine points the entire first half. But a pair of touchdowns in slightly more than four minutes of play in the third period sealed the Steers' victory.

The two teams were evenly matched through the first period, which ended without a score. It was so close, in fact, that Graham had only 54 yards offense and Childress 60.

But the Steers mounted a 75-yard drive that started late in the first period, and scored on a four-yard plunge by Paul Alvarez. The kick for extra point failed.

Graham tacked on three additional points, with five seconds remaining in the half, on a 33-yard field goal by J.T. Pratt, and went to the dressing room for the halftime break with a less-than-comfortable 9-0 lead.

That comfort came early in the third period, however.

Graham took the opening kickoff and marched 83 yards to score, with quarterback Toby Dollar scoring from the two. Again, the kick for extra point failed.

That was with 6:29 remaining in the quarter. The next score was at the 4:48 mark.

Childress fumbled on the first play following the kickoff, and the Steers were in business again at the Bobcat 22.

Four plays later, Chase Galbraith racked up the first of his two touchdowns, going over from the one. Pratt's extra point attempt split the uprights.

Graham's defense took over from that point. Childress had possession of the ball five times, ran 15 plays, picked up one first down and punted four times.

After that fifth series' punt to the midfield line, Galbraith shook off three tacklers and raced the distance for the final touchdown of the game. Brad Crears' kick for extra point was good.

Childress was held to only 15 yards rushing on three plays during the third quarter.

The Bobcats, in the second period, completed two of the three pass attempts, both one-yarders, but fumbled on one of them. The third pass attempt was intercepted. They also were held to a mere 14 yards rushing.

Steers signal caller Dollar completed 10 of 20 pass attempts, but was picked off twice.

The victory earned Graham, which had not won a playoff game in the past 20 years, a ticket to the regional semifinals against Alpine. That game will be

played Saturday afternoon at Big Spring.

The Hawks and Lady Hawks will play their first games of the annual Fantasy of Lights Tournament in Wichita Falls Friday.

The Lady Hawks are to take on Nocona at 11:30 a.m., in the Hirschi High School gymnasium, while the Hawks are slated to meet Boyd at 1:30 p.m. at Midwestern State Univ.

Meanwhile, however, the Lady Hawks were losing their first contest of the young season, 49-36 to Jacksboro. That evened their record to 1-1.

Iowa Park was playing without the services of starters Jennifer Ricks, who had a fractured finger, and Cheri Halady, sidelined with an ankle injury.

Gina Inman led Iowa Park scorers with 16. Misty Cook, who spent a lot of time on the bench in foul trouble, had seven, while Christal Goad and Mandy Threet each scored five.

Jacksboro, led by all-state center

Angel Singleton, who finished with 22 points, jumped out to a 15-3 lead by the end of the first period.

Coach John Hoelter credited his players with good defensive effort, forcing 40 turnovers. But offensively, the Lady Hawks couldn't find the bottom of the net, and also had 23 turnovers of their own.

"We played with intensity, but didn't execute our offense very well at times," Hoelter said.

Hoelter named Gina Inman, 5-5 junior, his Offensive Player of the Week. She averaged 15.5 points in the first two outings.

Defensive Player of the Week was Mandy Threet, 5-6 junior, who was credited with forcing 72 turnovers in the team's two contests.

Both the Junior Varsity and Freshmen won their games against Jacksboro.

AUSTIN — Speaker Gib Lewis says he might be eating Thanksgiving dinner on the Capitol grounds if the House can't muster 100 votes to pass a constitutional amendment on school finance reform. Lewis adjourned the House last Friday morning stating "We have some more work to do."

Seeking to comply with a court-imposed June 1 deadline, Gov. Ann Richards urged House members to stick with her "Fair Share Plan," which by week's end still needed 14 votes for approval.

Any constitutional amendment must be approved by two-thirds vote in both the House and Senate; the Senate easily approved the issue several days earlier.

But the plan, endorsed by Richards, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and Lewis, has stalled in the House where 58 Republicans control more than one-third of the votes and are joined by scattered conservative Democrats.

Republican House members appear to be stalling until the regular session, when Republicans, for the first time in more than 100 years, will control over one-third of the Senate votes.

Governor's Payroll Grows

Meanwhile, Gov. Richards drew criticism after reports that despite her frequent calls for government to tighten its belt, she has nearly doubled the size of her office staff.

The *Houston Post* looked at the governor's office and found that the number of staff members had grown from 185 when Gov. Bill Clements stepped down to 337, according to figures released by the state comptroller.

Responding to the *Post* article, Richards said she had instructed

her staff to begin making cuts. She said some of the additional employees are justified because "this has been a far more activist office than probably in a long time."

Richards also said the federal government and the Legislature have given the governor's office more responsibilities. "When they give you a job to do, you have got to have the people to do it," she said. However, she said, she does not believe all the personnel growth is justified.

Republican Barbs

Rep. Tom Craddick, R-Midland, chairman of the House Republican Caucus, said the increase in Richard's staff was outrageous. "She's going to have to look at home before she talks about other people trying to cut. She needs to get rid of some of her staff and get down to where the rest of us are."

Clements' appointments secretary James Huffines said: "If her

own bureaucracy has almost doubled in two years, what kind of message does it send to other state agencies?"

Other agency records: Attorney General Dan Morales' staff grew by 32 percent; State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison's by 16 percent; and Comptroller John Sharp's by 14 percent.

Making staff reductions were Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry, 10 percent; and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, four percent.

Phone Inquiry Dropped

Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle said he will not prosecute Mauro for allegedly making political calls with state telephones.

Earle, a Democrat, who heads the Public Integrity Unit which investigates wrongdoing by state officials, said, "It is the opinion of this office that the evidence does not warrant further investigation and criminal prosecution."

Mauro, who was President-elect Bill Clinton's state campaign manager, apologized publicly after an

audit showed 1,440 calls were made to political offices by Mauro and his staff.

Earle said a review of records showed Mauro has consistently reimbursed the state at a minimum of \$25 per month since 1984 to cover any incidental phone use. Records failed to show a conscious pattern of misuse of state property for political or personal purposes."

Aggies, Black Lawmaker

State Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, a veteran black lawmaker who wants to ban an Aggie fraternity for throwing a party with a racist theme, found himself in a war of words with the Texas A&M student newspaper.

Wilson said an editorial cartoon satirizing him was racist; it depicts Wilson as a small black dog barking at an Aggie's senior boot with a caption: "State Rep. Ron Wilson throws his weight around at Texas A&M."

An accompanying editorial stated Wilson should tend to his district and leave university administration to administrators, and save his hot air for those who deserve it.

Wilson called the school president into the fight, and made public an anonymous letter connected to the cartoon: "If you want a war, we'll give you one you won't believe," the letter stated.

Other Highlights

■ A bill filed last week by Rep. Bill Carter, R-Richland Hills, would allow people 21 or older to carry concealed weapons once they passed a mandatory training program and received a state license. Speaker Lewis said, "allowing Texans to carry guns for self-defense would probably decrease crime."

■ Attorney General Morales said his office's child support enforcement program set records in fiscal year 1992. The program collected \$301.7 million for the children of divorced parents, an increase of 28 percent over 1991.

■ Texas school districts, which now spend 23 percent on administration, should cut the figure to 20 percent and put the savings into instruction, said a study adopted by the Educational Economic Policy Center Committee.

Disagrees with comments

Dear Mr. Hamilton,

I was both surprised and saddened that Reverend Dwight Parker, Pastor of the Iowa Park Church of Christ, chose to use your paper as a forum (paid advertisement) to attack the worship and traditions of the Roman Catholic Church. Fear and ignorance on the part of many breed prejudice and intolerance. This has no place within the Body of Christ. I call your attention to Ephesians 4:1-5.

Reverend Parker's insights into Roman Catholicism are, to say the least, limited. He paints a simplistic picture of

the Catholic Church's two thousand year history with a rather broad brush. This attack does both him, and his church, a disservice. Nor does he speak for all Protestant denominations - many of whom consider themselves catholic (the term means Universal and was used by Ignatius of Antioch in 110 A.D. to describe the Church): Orthodox, Methodist, Lutherans, Anglicans/Episcopalians, and Presbyterians.

The Handbook of Denominations in the United States, by Frank Mead and published by Abingdon Press (a Protestant publisher) gives a fair and accurate account of the Roman Catholic Church.

"For the first 1,500 years of Christendom until the time of the Protestant Reformation, the Western world was almost solidly Roman Catholic. The 11th century separation divided the faith between Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox sectors. The Reformation divided continental Europe and the British Isles among Roman Catholics, Lutheran, Anglican and Reformed churches; with the prospect of still further division as denominationalism increased."

While Reverend Parker attacks this One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, he should keep in mind that his particular "brand" of Christianity does not come into existence until the 1800's here in the United States as part of the Campbellite movement.

Yes, we are a Church of scripture and tradition. A careful study, by any serious student of the scriptures, would reveal that it was the early Church, inspired by God, that wrote the New Testament Scriptures as a way of handing on the oral traditions to the many Catholic (Universal) communities. We believe that The Bible is the Book of the Church -- contrary to those who view themselves as the Church of the Book. For too long pastors and churches have used passages from scripture (out of context) as a weapon against their people -- instead of sharing with them the Good News of our salvation in Jesus Christ.

In denying the early Fathers of the Church he is denying the very New Testament that he professes to follow. One seeking the truth would arrive at this conclusion after minimal research. For example, Jerome (around 390 A.D.) translated the Hebrew and Greek texts of the Bible into Latin (The Vulgate Bible), which simply means the language of the people of the time. This is the Bible that was handed down to the Church, and was probably used by Luther and others in their Bible study.

Rev. Parker also claims that the Roman Catholic Church is an apostate church -- this is ludicrous. Apostate means "one who denies the truth". Once more I invite him, and your readers, to study the history of the early Church -- they may be surprised to learn that Roman Catholicism preserved that Truth from the beginning and has vigorously sought to protect it from error through the centuries.

Finally, he gives only a half-truth regarding the role of the Pope. Yes the Pope is the "visible" head of the Church on earth. He is Christ's Vicar -- he acts in the name of Christ (as Bishop of Rome) in shepherding (with the other Bishops) his flock around the world in matters of faith and morals.

The Roman Catholic Church today numbers close to 1 billion members worldwide; 58 million in the United States; and over two million in Texas. We are a community of Christian believers attempting to live the Gospel of Jesus Christ in our daily lives, while respecting the rights of all to worship God within their own faith communities. We likewise deserve, and demand, the same respect as other members of the Body of Christ, His Church.

If Rev. Parker and your readers are interested in the "truth" about what we as Catholics profess, I encourage them to read the article we ran in the Leader two weeks ago. It is an objective presentation of the Catholic Church. They may also call me here at the church and I will be happy to send them a copy of, "The Catholic Church, Who Are We?" Sincerely,
