Most of those were added to the decorations at the library, and include poles on the facility's circle drive.

The city's decorative lighting fixtures will remain lit through the Christmas holidays.

Needy family food baskets still lacking

A lot of needy families will not be helped this Christmas, unless there is a major reaction from the public during the next week.

The annual food drive sponsored by the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance has fallen far short of its goal, and more than 100 families have signed up this year for assistance.

The Alliance is to deliver what food baskets they have been able to fill next Thursday.

Response from the public to donate canned foods at boxes put out at the local grocery stores has fallen far short of previous years, and the same was true when Boy Scouts sought door-to-door donations at homes.

Additionally, announcements were not made at some of the schools, where donations in the past by students have been a major source of what is donated in the food baskets, according to Paula Booth, Alliance spokesperson.

The boxes will remain through next Wednesday at the stores.



He said hospital officials began to realize the importance of getting the patients ready to take their places in society again if at all possible. At the present time there are 500 patients and 1500 employees at the hospital.


The hospital focuses on the body, mind and spirit, Bennett said, adding that he and an assistant are responsible for providing a spiritual environment and training.

I have a strong feeling, that one of the main results to come out of all this public school financing legislation will be the forced consolidation of small schools.

It's not a new topic. But it comes up in about every report coming out of the special legislative session underway in

No, it's not new. I can remember it being a hot topic when the legislature was in session during the mid 1960s.

Bigger is better. Bigger is more efficient. More manageable. It would, supposedly, trim costs per pupil. And it would effect the minority of voters.

But is it?

I can't claim to be expert on the

I was here when the Valley View district consolidated with Iowa Park. And I was operating the paper at Kress when the issue first arose. From those two experiences, I've not only studied the issue, but know the feelings of those related to the small school situation.

subject, but I do have some first-hand

knowledge.

It may be true that there are some counties with 10 or more school districts. On those situations, I can't comment on their efficiencies.

But of the almost 1.500 school districts, there are certainly a lot of them around which communities survive. Take away their schools, and those communities will eventually disappear.

What does that have to do with the efficiencies of public schools? Maybe nothing, but how about the people who have their lives wrapped up in their homes and businesses in those communities? Are they to be sacrificed so the legislators can solve their problem?

And how much efficiency would really be realized? With all the mandates handed down on faculties and administrations by state and federal governments, wouldn't those receiving (or surviving) schools need more people to do exactly what is now being done in the smaller schools?

Because of our population shift to the major cities of the state, that's where the legislators come from. They have no idea of life, and needs, in smaller com-

My gosh, they refer to cities as large as 25,000 as "small towns." Kress, the town I mentioned earlier, had only 500 population. How small is that, in some big city feller's thinking? But I was told, in the '60s, that if

those students at Kress were forced to be bussed to Tulia, the larger school of Swisher County, the community's bank, lone grocery store, and other businesses not directly involved in supplying farmers, would close within two years.

Valley View, though its consolidation was not forced by legislation, certainly has not grown since 1970. Both its businesses closed, but one has reopened. But growth is out of the question, as long as classes are not held

A community without a school is like a house without an occupant: it deteriorates and eventually crumbles.

How much of that public education money saved through consolidation would it cost the state in the long run, with those business closures in all those communities? What happens to the tax base of those communities? What happens to the people who lived there?

Some of the discussions of the legislators has been to consolidate all schools into the 188 districts now operating as "county education districts." But what happens to some of those West Texas schools, where it takes as many as four counties to make a "good-

sized district?" I don't have the answer the state needs to solve public education financing. But I can tell you one thing: sacrificing entire communities for the purpose of saving money through forced consolidation is not the answer.

Worth Quoting

The "Fair Share Plan" school finance package announced by Governor Ann Richards, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and Speaker of the House Gib Lewis looks like a tax inhaling dragon. It has all the earmarks of another of those "no new state taxes" but plenty of additional burden at the local level.

At a time when it appears we're totally loaded on property taxes, this plan calls for additional ad valorem revenue.

It will be particularly hard on property-poor school districts such as those in agriculture-based, rural West Texas which are not blessed with oil and natural gas reserves below their surfaces.

Roughly 40 percent of the billions of dollars' worth of property that the State Property Tax board considers taxable in Texas in concentrated in Dallas, Harris, Tarrant and Travis Counties. This "Fair Share Plan" might be tailor-made for those metropolitan areas.

Joe Hughes, editorial writer/columnist for the Lubbock Avalanche does a bit of comparing between the Lubbock and Richardson schools, both of which have approximately 31,000 stu-

"For one penny on its ad valorem tax rate, Richardson ISD can raise \$1,200,000. For a penny on its ad valorem tax rate, Lubbock ISD can raise \$400,000," Hughes figures. "Think about it. For every cent on its tax rate, Richardson raises three times as much revenue as Lubbock does."



Plans call for raising \$98 more per student next year. To accomplish this, Lubbock Independent School District would have to raise school property taxes another 21 cents per \$100 valua-

Stop and think what another 21 cents would do to our tax rate.

From this viewpoint, it would appear that citizens had better scream loud and soon to avoid this disaster. JIM REYNOLDS



NEITHER CATHOLIC, PROTESTANT, NOR JEW #4

There is a tendency among men to preach only a partial gospel, tailoring the Lord's message to suit their own personal inclinations. This has sometimes led men to stop far short of the gospel of Christ. It has also sometimes led them to go far beyond the teachings of the Lord. Either error is disastrous. (2 John 9-11). It is a very serious offense to lead sincere men and women to believe they are saved when they have only partially obeyed their Lord.

The church of Christ is neither Catholic, Protestant, nor Jewish. We are unique and different for we are endeavoring to go all the way back to the original New Testament church. Using the New Testament as our blueprint, we have re-established in the twentieth century Christ's church. It fits no modern label. It is not just another denomination. We believe in the restoration of New Testament Christianity. We believe in calling Bible things by Bible names and insist on having a "thus saith the Lord" for all we do. Being neither Catholic, Protestant, nor Jew we aspire to be Christians only.

The attempt to consider the followers of Jesus Christ under labels obscures the Christ and the beauty of New Testament Christianity. Is it possible to be just a Christian today? Can a person be a Christian and not be a Catholic? Even the Catholics will admit that he can. Is it possible to be a Christian and not be a Protestant. Even most Protestants spend much time in proclaiming this is true. Is it possible for one to be a follower of God and not be a Jew? The Jews today will answer in the affirmative. Why not be just a Christian, not bound by human tradition, not enslaved by human ecclesiasticism, and not tied to any sect or party? Be loyal to Christ. Study the Bible and see Christ as He is. Obey His commandments. It is only when we stop pouring the new wines of Christian truth and love into the old bottles of tradition that we will be Christians in the New Testament sense. Why not be just a Christian and neither Catholic, Protestant, nor Jew?

HEADACHES

Headaches are the most frequent reason people seek medical care. Pain from headaches ranges from mild to severe to the daily activities of many patients. AUSTIN - Lawmakers went home early for Thanksgiving last week - leaving behind a disappointed governor and disgruntled lieutenant governor — after House Republicans rejected a proposed compromise school finance bill.

Gov. Ann Richards and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, their own "Fair Share Plan" roadblocked by the GOP caucus, had asked Republicans to

offer their own plan. Although cynicism abounds in this special session, hopes rose briefly when freshman Rep. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, steered his bill through committee.

But after the House Republican Caucus abandoned the Ogden bill as too expensive, lawmakers went home, leaving Ogden to fine-tune it over the holidays.

Nothing Accomplished

"For all practical purposes, there's no way we can accomplish what we wanted. This session is just as good as over," said Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi.

Democrats, who hoped to resolve the issue before more GOP troops arrive in January for the regular session, blamed the failure on the Republicans.

Bullock blasted House Republicans, saying they are playing hardball politics with the state's schoolchildren and the state's \$14 billion education system.

"They get an 'F' in leadership and an 'F' on their plan," said Bullock, who presides over the Senate.

Bullock said it was clear to him that some Republicans came to the special session intent on "trying to embarrass Gov. Richards." If the session fails, Bullock said, "we ought to send the Republicans a bill for \$500,000 for wasting taxpayer

Governor's Mistake?

Rep. Tom Craddick of Midland, leader of the 58-member GOP caucus, said Republicans are not trying to be spoilers. He said GOP members choked on the Ogden bill when they saw its \$15 billion price tag. He said the bill would require about \$1 billion in new

state money - significantly more than the Democrat-backed plan.

Craddick said Richards was told last spring that Republicans would not support any bill until told precisely how funds would reach

each school district. "Without an agreement in hand before the session, I'd say it was a waste for the governor to call the

session," Craddick said. Compromise Possible

But Richards said the Senate Education Committee is expected to take up a bill to deal with public education spending this week.

She did not have specifics about the new proposal, but House Speaker Gib Lewis said Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, is expected to file a new bill on school finance.
