the business parking lot area by a curb and gutter.
Additionally, where there are now eight light standards along the route, only four will be used in the future, and they will be relocated during reconstruction.

Perhaps the authors hoped no one would notice that it wasreally local money, not state money, that they were being so generous wiuh.

The "Fair Share" plan, now justly resting on the scrap heap, was nothing force local school boards to raise property taxes, and amend the constitution to make that legal. They even threw in a "good schools" fund to make us think they were interesting in improving education, when all they were really doing was re-naming an existing fund.
Were not requiring anybody to raise taxes," they said. "That's your local board's decision."

Right. You don't require them to raise taxes. You just require them topay teachers, buy cog education, remediate scores, do drug ede for the gifted, the dropouts, provide
disabled, the emotionally disturbed and the handicapped, build classrooms to
meet your quotas, and report every detail by computer directly to Austin every day.
