1992 was year of growth, change

1992 was a year of growth in Iowa Park, as reflected in the pages of the Iowa Park Leader.

School enrollment increased, new businesses opened their doors, plans for even greater growth also were announced, as residents look forward into 1993.

It also was a period of change, as long-time business and social leaders died, leaderships changed, and the area felt the extremes caused by weather, from extremely wet to an extended dry period.

A review of the year is hereby presented, reflecting the top news

stories of 1992:

JANUARY

The year started off on an optimistic economic note, when James Cates announced the opening of Park Tire and Battery at 600 East Pasadena. Two topics that would eventually be acted upon were on the city council's agenda for the first meeting of the year: building a lagoon so the sewage treatment plant could be reconditioned for the first time since constructed more than 20 years earlier, and assuming the right of way through Park West Shopping Center so Park West could be extended through the 400 block. Final building permits for 1991 were announced by city hall, amounting to \$795,375. Annual awards given by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department were presented to Donald Jones and Bob Kenedy. Recipients of the Chamber of Commerce annual awards, presented at the organization's banquet, went to: Glen Mitchell, representing the Iowa Park CISD, Outstanding Business; Ruth Welch, Outstanding Citizen; Wayne House, Outstanding Senior Citizen; Carolyn Richter, Outstanding Educator, and David Robnett, Outstanding Agriculturist. Southwestern Bell Telephone changed the local phone system to digital switching. First snow of the winter fell Jan. 15, and the following day temperatures fell into the 20's. The following weekend, the city was blanketed with a six-inch snow cover. Pizza Hut opened its doors for business, after construction of the business was completed. Funeral services for J.M. "Jim" Voyles, long-time county sheriff, were held. Directors of the Chamber of Commerce went on record as supporting the state's construction of a maximum security prison on FM 369, north of US 287. Residents of Washington Street were given an opportunity to hear the state's plans for a major paving project on their street, all the way from West Highway to Bell Road, a distance of 1.4 miles.

FEBRUARY

Funeral services were held the first week of the month for two long-time community leaders and workers: Edyth Marie Books and Carl A. Sullivan. Fifty seven athletes competed in the first annual Iowa Park Powerlifting Tournament. Back-to-back three-point losses ended the Lady Hawk basketball team's hopes of defending their Dist. 4-AAA crown. The city council adopted an ordinance prohibiting the dumping of any petroleum products and oil filters at the landfill. Spike Dykes, head coach at Texas Tech Univ., was the keynote speaker at the football banquet, when Charles Jolly was named recipient of the Outstanding Hawk Award and T.J. Bean Defensive Player of the Year. Mike Sellers opened his new business, Iowa Park Athletic Center. Steve Smith was elected Little League president. Local and area emergency crews searched ranchland between here and Electra several hours before finding a 79-year-old man from Overton, alive and well. Melody Gray and Misty Cook were named to the all-district basketball team, and Marcy McCarthy honorable mention. Golf returned as a competitive sport at Iowa Park High after being dropped several years, and this time it included a girls' team. MARCH

Senior Jeremy Carroll was named to the all-district basketball team. IPHS tennis coach Dick Wineinger was sidelined with a torn Achilles tendon injury. Some 230 entries vied for prizes at the annual Iowa Park 4-H and FFA Project Show. Super Tuesday's party primary voters failed to name clear-cut winners among candidates for Precinct three commissioner (Gordon Griffith and J.C. Thompson) and constable (Sam Fairchild and Aubrey C. Bohannon), and Precinct four constable (Don Brewer and Jerry Jones), and a runoff was set in April. Winning teams in the annual Hawk Relays included: Electra, Division One; Tascosa, Division Two; Electra, Division Three; Vernon, Division Four, and Rider, Division Five. Dates for the annual Clean-Up Week, co-sponsored by the city and Chamber of Commerce, were set for March 30 through April 4. An off duty police officer, Michael Dozier, arrested a woman for shoplifting after following her across the street from Wal-Mart, and finding two items, an electric drill and telephone, still in their boxes. Jason Miller became the first Hawk to ever qualify for the state powerlifting tournament.

The month started off with lots of people roaming the city, visiting sites of those participating in the annual Chamber of Commerce City-Wide Garage Sale promotion. Assistant coach Rick Barker was credited with saving a man's life, using life-saving technique when the man suffered a heart attack. Incumbent county commissioner Gordon Griffith was returned to office in a runoff election, and Sam Fairchild was the winner in his first-ever bid for the constable seat. School trustees considered, and approved, initiating all-day kindergarten classes in the 1992-93 school year. Iowa Parkan Annetta Reusch was named Teacher of the Year for the Wichita Falls school district, where she is the journalism teacher at Wichita Falls High. Iowa Park High's Hawk Band earned the coveted Sweepstakes Award for the ninth consecutive year.


The city council voted to not support the firing of police officer Wayne Shewey. State National Bank threw a big party in observance of its 60th anniversary, and fed all comers. City and school elections were held, with the results being: Max Henderson and Robert Cook winning in their bids for school trustee; Bud Mercer and Johnny Crawford elected city aldermen, and Wayne House as mayor. The FFA's land, range and pastor judging team, composed of Shawn Kaufhold, Mark Phillips, Lance Shortt and Joey Shephard, placed fourth in the state contest. Marcy McCarthy was named valedictorian and Lychelle Monday salutatorian of IPHS graduating class. Some said it was a straight wind and others said it was a twister, but a considerable amount of damage was inflicted in the southeast part of the city by a nighttime storm. Four local businesses and three in the area signed up to participate in the state-sponsored lottery program. The Ford dealership building on West Highway, empty since the business' closing, was sold by owners Mr. and Mrs. Luther Shaw to Mr. and Mrs. Chris Powell, owners of C&L Service. Eighth Grade valedictorian and salutatorian were Ashli Thomas and Brandon herder, respectively. The Baseball Hawks finished the regular season runners-up in Dist. 4-AAA, and then lost in their first playoff game 3-2 to Denver City. A two-vehicle collision near Burkburnett resulted in the death of Johnny Montgomery of Iowa Park and injuries to his four friends in the same vehicle. JUNE

Ray Youngblood was named manager of the local Cryovac plant, after Sam Laird was transferred to South Carolina. Portions of southern Iowa Park were flooded and electric service temporarily knocked out by an electrical storm that poured almost three inches over the already-soaked city. Burglars took almost \$20,000 worth of tools and equipment from the high school's auto mechanics building. Earl Bennett and Vern Mikkelson were the winners of the annual All-Iowa Park Golf Tournament, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, in which 65 golfers participated. Three of the four local teenagers were injured when their vehicle was involved in a multi-car collision in Wichita Falls.

A domestic disturbance at a rural residence north of the city climaxed with the shooting death of William Ellis (Bill) Patterson, 50, after he allegedly pointed a gun at two county sheriff deputies. Dorothy (Mrs. Robert) Palmer, first grade teacher at Kidwell Elementary, was elected by her peers Teacher of the Year in the Iowa Park school district. The city council approved purchase of a used street sweeper from the highway department, but at year's end it still had not been delivered. Head coach and athletic director Lucky Gamble resigned, and his replacement, Robert Clensay, was named by the school board. Also resigning was police chief Wayne Parsons. Cryovac voided a contract with Fluor Daniel which had existed since 1975. Though the issue was not supported by the majority of voters in the Iowa Park area, a \$9-million county bond issue to finance a multi-purpose event center in Wichita Falls was passed.

Iowa Park schools opened their doors for classes early, Aug. 19, allowing students to complete their fall semester of studies before taking their Christmas holidays. Enrollment in Iowa Park schools exceeded 2,000 for the first time since 1976. Ray Smock was named acting chief of the police department. The Recreational Activities Center sponsored its second annual Community Day activity. Jo Lynn Cockrum was named to succeed Sheri Kennedy as director of



AUSTIN - Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro rocked the State Capitol last week by announcing that he had filed for personal bankruptcy, listing debts of more than \$4 million.

A second Republican Congressman, Jack Fields of Houston, filed as a candidate in the yet-to-beannounced special election to replace U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

Texas Democrats continued urging Gov. Ann Richards to appoint herself as Bentsen's interim successor and run as their party's choice in the election sometime this

Meanwhile, Richards visited with six more men about the senate seat: Congressmen John Bryant, Jim Chapman and Mike Andrews; Railroad Commissioner Robert Krueger, former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle.

However, the governor told reporters she is not close to a decision on Bentsen's successor.

Many Capitol insiders are prone to consider Richards as the inevitable choice, particularly since speculation about Richards as the new senator has been making the Capitol rounds since August, well before the election.

Mauro's Real Estate Busts Mauro told reporters he blamed the 1986 real estate bust for the devaluation of his trust fortune once worth almost \$10 million.

He said he now has no checking account, his \$77,000 state salary and a homestead worth more than \$300,000, after spending all other assets to pay creditors.

By filing Chapter 7, Mauro is walking away from payment of the remaining debts.

Mauro to Washington?

Ironically, Mauro manages the state's public lands trusts and the Permanent School Fund; now that his own trust is bankrupt, he is certain to relive his bankruptcy past if he seeks re-election in 1994.

Mauro, now beginning his 11th year as land commissioner, served as Texas campaign manager for President-elect Bill Clinton, and a protege of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

He declined to press for a Washington appointment to keep his financial troubles out of the headlines, particularly any linking him to Clinton.

But Mauro's political fortunes in Texas are viewed as in a nosedive; many think he may soon resign for a post in Washington, D.C., or use his connections to build a new beginning as a lobbyist there.

State Children in Poverty

One in every four Texas children is born into poverty, the state Health Commissioner David Smith said last week, calling for investment in youngsters' well-being.

Smith cited statistics that were part of an annual report by the Children's Defense Fund. The report said that nationally, one in every five children lives in poverty.



Smith said that for black and Hispanic children, the number born into poverty is one out of two. One in every four Texas children has no medical insurance.

Citing figures from other recent studies, Smith said 30 percent of Texas' 2-year-olds are fully immunized against childhood diseases, compared to a national average of 60 percent.

He challenged the state to invest in children's health. Childhood immunizations should be free and available to all Texas children, Smith said.

That would cost about \$50 million a year in state and federal funds - \$15 million more in state money than the Texas Department of Health's current budget for vaccine and immunizations.

Other Highlights

Resumes have already begun pouring into Henry Cisneros' San Antonio offices from Democrats eager for a position with the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Effective Dec. 21, Cisneros took a leave of absence from his assets management company, which manages \$525 million in pension funds and other assets.

A South Texas University regent has called for an audit of the marching band after some members stole \$22,000 worth of electronic equipment during a recent visit to Japan, and revelations that 28 of the 120-member band on the trip were not TSU students.

Judge Norman Lee, presiding judge of the 257th State Judicial District Court of Harris County, has been elected to the Fourteenth Court of Appeals, Place 1. The place is currently held by Justice Paul Pressler, who has announced that he will retire.

Judge Lee, formerly of Iowa Park, has served as presiding judge of the 257th District Court since his appointment by Governor Mark White in 1983. He was elected to the bench without opposition in1984, and was re-elected without opposition in 1986 and 1990.

In judicial evaluation polls by the Houston Bar Association, Judge Lee has consistently received the highest rating of all judges in his division in Harris County.

Judge Lee's background in private practice was in both criminal and civil litigation with Richard "Racehorse" Haynes, followed by practice in association with Mike Ramsey and George Tyson of Houston.

Born and raised in Iowa Park, Judge Lee graduated Iowa Park High School in 1956. He was on the Hawk football team four years. He attended the University of Texas and graduated Midwestern State University.

He received his law degree from South Texas College of Law in 1965, where he received the E.E. Townes Award for Academic Achievement and graduated number three in his law school class.

His parents were Lonnie and Argie Lee, long time residents of Iowa Park. He has a brother, Larry, and a sister, Ava Nell.

Judge Lee is active in both the Houston and State Bar Association's Continuing Legal Education Program and is a frequent author and lecturer in local, state and national continuing legal education programs. He is a Life Fellow of the Texas Bar Founda-



Health Tips



Colds and Flu — Tis the Season

- The cold season lasts from early fall through the spring. The flu typically strikes in epidemics in January or February.
- The common cold and the flu are both caused by viruses.
- The symptoms of colds and flu are similar nasal congestion, a sore throat, runny eyes and a cough, but flu symptoms are more intense and last longer.
- · A high fever may accompany flu symptoms. Fevers are not common with colds, but if they are present they are usually low-grade.
- · The viruses that cause cold or flu are transmitted through direct contact or through the air.
- To lessen your chances of catching a cold or the flu, get enough exercise, eat properly and get plenty of rest.
- · A flu vaccine is available to prevent or minimize the severity of influenza.
- The vaccine should be administered early in the flu season to people in the high risk group — those over the age of 65, or with lung or heart disease, or with any disease that interferes with the body's ability to fight infection.
- · Most people must wait out the symptoms of a cold or flu. But if you are in a high risk group, see a doctor if you have flu symptoms and a high fever.
- · The incidence of serious complications, including death, is much higher with the flu than it is with the common cold.

A 110-lot housing development is on the drawing board. It will be in the northeast part of the city, an area that has long been potential but not getting much attention through the years.

To go along with all that is a major quality of life project that also is in the planning stage: an 18-hole golf course at Lake Iowa Park. When completed, it will not only serve local residents with something that hasn't been available here the past 50 years, but also will be a major attraction for folks to travel or move here.

And business hasn't been lacking in Iowa Park through the year, according to the sales taxes collected. 



the RAC. Todd Pulley signed a letter of intent to play baseball for Hardin-Simmons Univ. Faced with lower-than-usual sales of water, caused by the abnormally wet year, the city council increased water prices by 10 percent, but held the line on property taxes (80 cents). School tax rate, including local and CED, was set at \$1.12 per \$100 valuation. Heavy rains continued to plague the city and area, often causing the temporary closing of streets and roads.

SEPTEMBER

A home's burglary was solved when the suspect was caught in a Rio Grande city with a car taken during the theft. Rachel Thompson was crowned IPHS Homecoming Queen and 272 attended the annual Ex-Student Association banquet during homecoming weekend. A storm that passed west to east, north of the city, damaged several homes and structures. Ray Smock was selected from a field of 17 applicants as police chief. Tess Goodwin was named a Commended Student in the 1993 National Merit Scholarship Program. A contract worker survived a fall of some 26 feet onto a concrete floor, during construction of a building at the city's water treatment plant.

OCTOBER

A combination of 60 years experience was lost in the local post office, when Robert Wilcox and Steve Lowe took advantage of an early retirement program. Strict mandates by the Texas Water Commission concerning septic tank regulations were announced by the county health department. Clay Williamson was named a bronze award winner in the national FFA cereal grain proficiency program. Police recovered within a week two vehicles that were stolen, including a four-wheel ATV and an automobile. School trustees entered into an agreement with a firm that guarantees savings of thousands of dollars in energy bills. An ordinance was approved by the city council which provides for mutual aid with the county, Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and Electra, in case of a disaster. The Hawk Band earned a Division One in the marching contest for the 11th consecutive year.

NOVEMBER

Voters at four area boxes, precincts 32, 33, 34 and 35, turned out in record numbers (2,417) for the general election. The city's sewer treatment plant underwent its first complete renovation since it was built some 20 years earlier. Thirty seven Chamber of Commerce members participated in giving away free Thanksgiving turkeys. Iowa Park native Eddie Watson was promoted to vice chairman of TU Electric. Michael Dozier was elected president of Iowa Park Little League. Mr. and Mrs. Carmen Lozipone became the new owners of Video Library. The Fina service station at Johnson Road and US 287 was renamed Brown's Fina & Automotive Center. The city council voted to sell land in the northeast corner at Lake Gordon to Paul Arrington, where he said he plans to build a restaurant. The Hawks closed out their football season with a 38-23 win over Henrietta, giving them a 2-8 record. A program to serve "latchkey" children was launched by the Recreational Activities Center, as leaders began exploring what services were needed and how they can be implemented and financed. Larry Dutton was elected 1993 president of the Chamber of Commerce at the organization's annual membership business luncheon. J&J Craft Mall was opened for business. Two high school playoff games were held here, one between Graham and Childress and the other between Goldwaithe and Canadian. Faith Baptist Church held a note-burning service to commemorate the payoff of a \$545,000 financing of its main structure in 1987. After an extended dry spell which had frustrated wheat farmers wanting to plant their 1993 crop, the area received more than four inches of rainfall in a week's time.

DECEMBER

Thousands of dollars worth of possessions were stolen when burglars forced open stalls at Mini-Con Storage, and police later solved the case with arrests in Wichita Falls. Three football Hawks, Scott McNeely; Brent Brown and Patric Kennedy, were named to the All-District team. Christy Kenyon placed first in the FFA District Talent Show. After hearing a proposal from Iowa Parkan Mike Negri that a development firm in Oklahoma City was interested in developing a golf course at Lake Iowa Park, the city council approved leasing the property for that purpose. Considering the Thanksgiving turkey give-away program was a major success to businesses, Chamber members then gave hams to lucky winners for Christmas. Long-time restaurateur, civic leader and baseball supporter Charles Lawson Metz was buried. The city council voted to open West Park through the 400 block, which passes through Park West Shopping Center. School trustees received a report that the third and seventh graders exceeded the state level on almost all aspects of TAAS testing. Quick action by police led to the arrest of a Wichita Falls couple while they were stealing tools from pickups and items from a storage building. Parker Square Bank announced plans to open a branch in the TU Electric building, which is to be closed some time in the near

LOW BACK PAIN
