Chamber banquet is Saturday

They will be the recipients of the awards presented annually by the organization during the Chamber's banquet Saturday evening.

To begin at 7:00, the event will be held in the cafeteria of Iowa Park High School. Tickets, available at the Chamber office, Hughes Pharmacy, Dutton Funeral Home, State National Bank, Parkway TrueValue and Iowa Park Leader, are \$10 per person. But there will be considerably more

than presentations of awards during the evening.

The banquet meal will again be catered by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners, entertainment by the IPHS Show Choir, evening's speech by Ron Hill, and installation of new officers, all are on the evening's agenda.

The dinner will include steak, baked potato, salad, hot rolls, dessert and choice of tea and coffee.

Larry Dutton will be installed as the Chamber's president for 1993. He succeeds Gene Jordan. Kathy Riggins will become the first vice president and Glen McGee the second vice president.

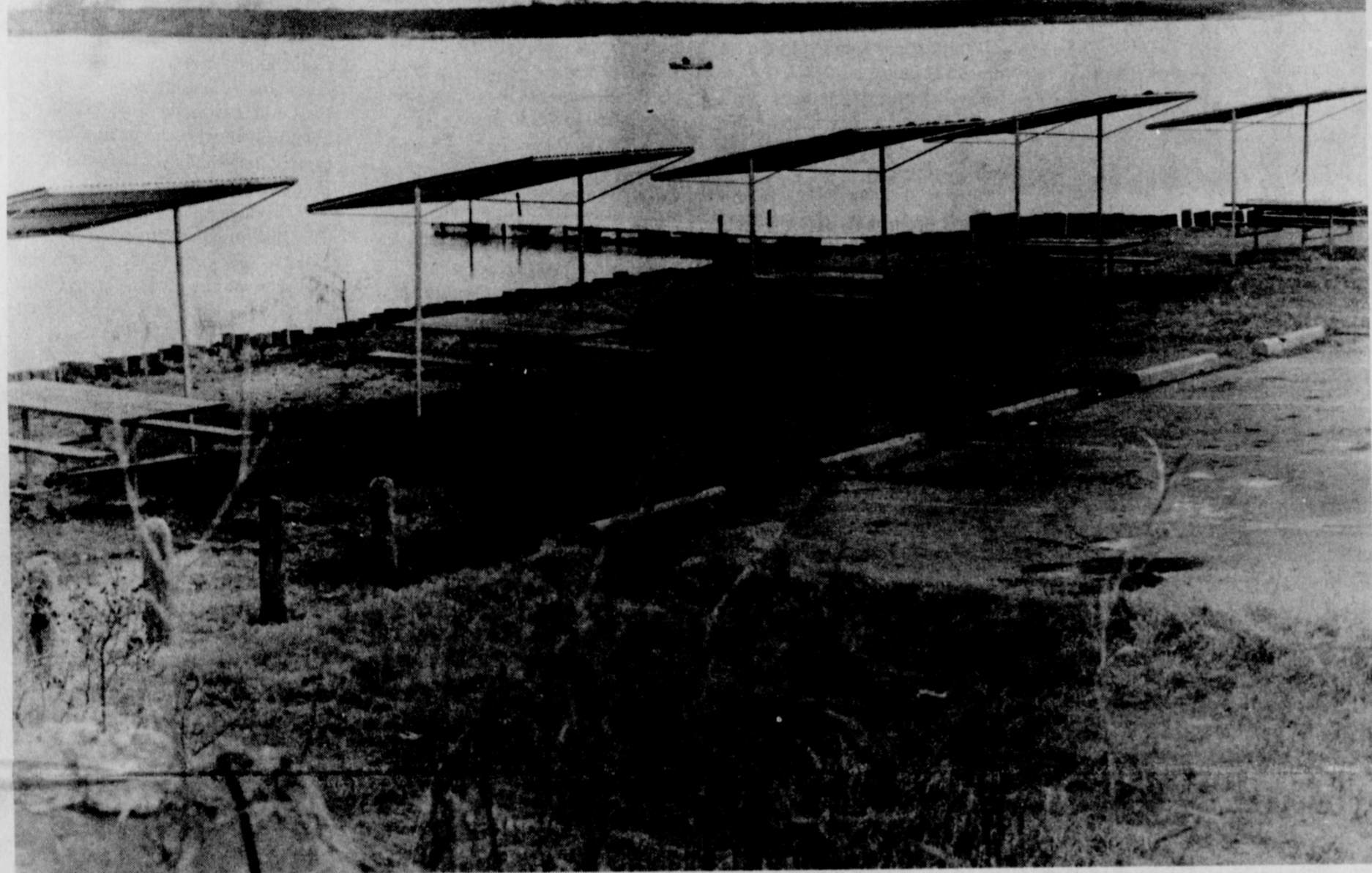
Welch.

City, school slate meetings Monday

Both the city council and school board will be holding regular meetings Monday.

The city meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers, while trust-

ees are to start their session at 7:30 p.m. in the junior high library.

Lighting of West Park is again on the council agenda. Aldermen were approached by representatives of Lone Star Gas Company last month, to consider changing the lighting along the boulevard.

December slow month for building

Residents apparently turned their attention to buying Christmas presents during December, because it wound up being one of the lowest months of 1992 in terms of building permits issued by city hall.

Only \$19,430 in permits were issued. They included: Bob Hamilton, 904 Comelia, siding, \$3,980; Christ the King Catholic Church, 1008 North First, cover drive, \$4,500; Roger Mathews, 907 E. Washington, mobile home, \$1,200; Jim's Conoco, 612 W. Highway, roofing, \$2,000; Lyle Buzzard, 207 E. Jefferson, alteration, \$750; R.B. Wilkerson, 300 E. Alameda, siding, \$7,000.

A different type of electrical lighting will be considered by the council, which hopes to save money. Mayor Wayne House has said the cost of the lights in the three blocks amounts to about one-tenth of the entire street lighting expense, or \$3,500 annually.

Bids for the construction of a carport and storage facility for police cars will be considered, as well as a resolution authorizing the city administrator to submit grant applications for the parks.

A Wichita Falls firm, CellularOne, will approach the council to allow installation of an antenna placed atop the Johnson Road water tower.

Administrator Gary Jones' reports listed on the meeting agenda include: future of the landfill; plans for opening the 400 block of West Park; property owned by the city; change ordinance for street, and presentation for grant at Nortex this month.

Lady Hawks' district opener Friday

Team enters conference schedule with 5-game winning streak

The Lady Hawks will carry a five-game winning streak onto the court Friday night, when they open their Dist. 4-AAA schedule against Graham.

But the Hawks still have another non-conference game on their schedule before they travel Jan. 15 to Vernon for their district opener.

Three of those five wins posted by Coach John Hoelter's crew were earned during the New Year's weekend play in the Archer City tournament, where they were crowned champions.

The Lady Hawks advanced into the winners' bracket with a 58-51 win over Electra. Gina Inman canned 16 points and was followed by Dusti Welch's 12.

They knocked off district opponent Bowie 68-59 Friday in an out-

standing exhibition of team play. Inman and Christal Goad each had 16 points, while Misty Cook chipped in 11 and grabbed six rebounds.

Cheri Halady was credited with nine points, four assists and five rebounds; Michelle Robertson had eight points and four assists, and Jennifer Ricks also had eight points and six rebounds.

The Lady Hawks earned their trophy in a 65-57 rough-and-tumble title bout against Windthorst.

Cook led scoring with 20 points while grabbing 10 rebounds and blocking five shots. Inman had 19 points and five assists, while Dusti Welch added 11 points and six rebounds.

Cook was named Most Valuable

Player of the tournament, and Inman was named All-Tournament.

Tuesday night, Iowa Park ran away from their Wellington hosts, 64-43, to extend their season record to 16-7.

Three players scored in double figures: Inman 16, Cook 14 and Halady 11.

The Junior Varsity had an even easier time with Wellington, winning 62-38 and advancing the team's record to 12-3.

Cristal Fisch had 16 points and Briana Stalker followed closely with 14.

The Lady Hawks will host Graham in a triple header tomorrow, with the Freshman game starting at 5 p.m.

The clubs will then hit the road for a pair of games, traveling Tuesday to Henrietta and again the following Friday to Vernon.

The Hawks won their tournament opener Thursday at Archer City, defeating Crowell 75-70. Three players scored in double figures: Thompson and Young 19 each, and Staford 18.

But it was all downhill in the winners' bracket. They lost Friday to host Archer City, the eventual tourney champion, 69-38.

Then, in the third-place playoff Saturday, Iowa Park fell victim to the Holliday Eagles, 84-53. Ken Cooper and Yusef Garland led the locals with nine points each.

Things didn't get any better in the team's trip Tuesday to Seymour, where the Hawks fell by a 69-54 margin. Hawkins led with 11 points, and Childs and Cooper each had 10.

The Junior Varsity and Freshmen

both win their games, however, 46-44 and 50-42, respectively.

The Hawks will wind up their non-conference schedule Tuesday, when they host Wichita Falls Hirschi in a triple header that is slated to begin at 4:30 p.m.

Large light peach satin bows marked the pews leading to the nuptial area.

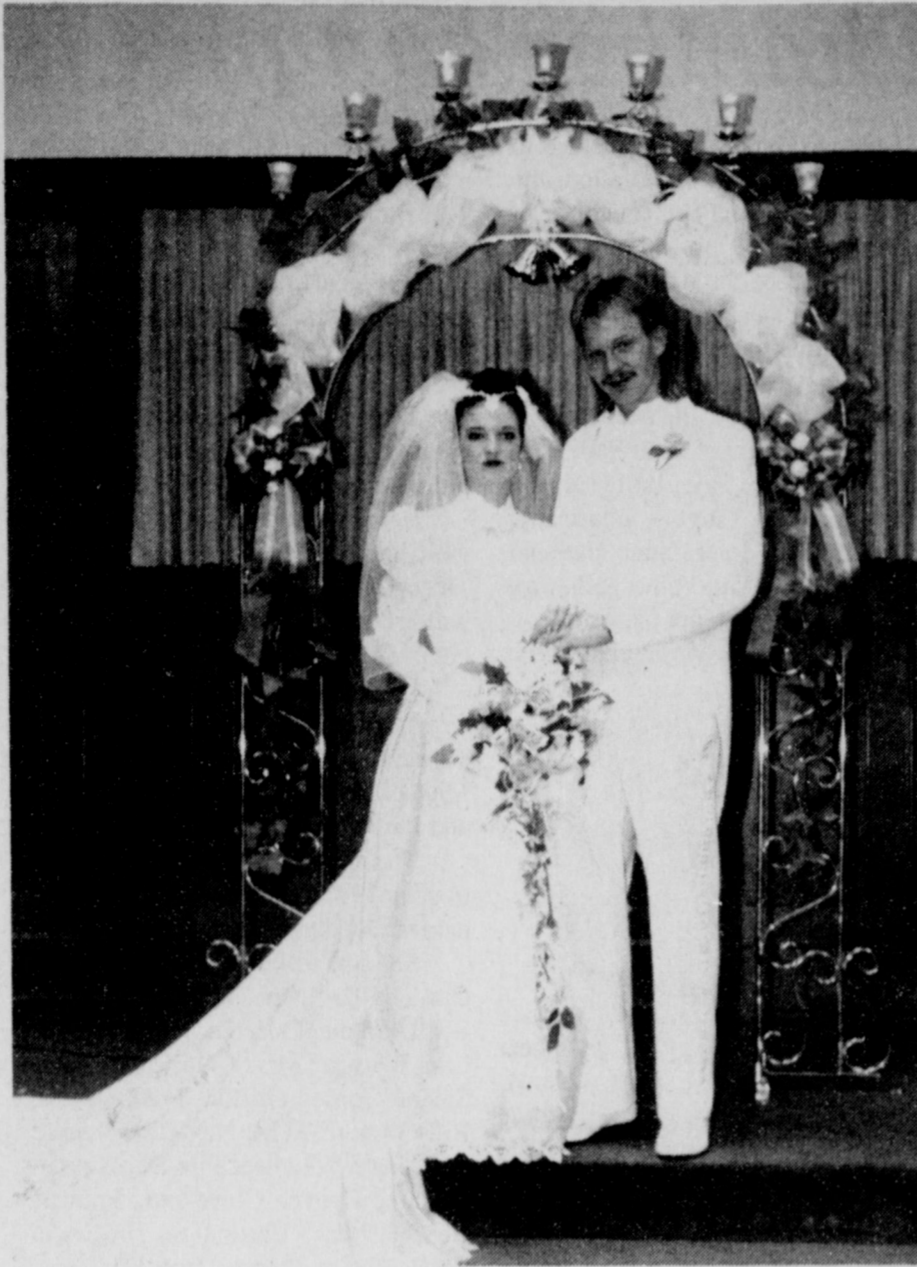

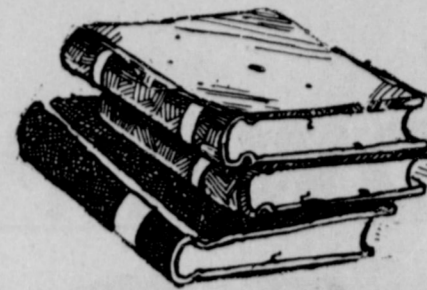

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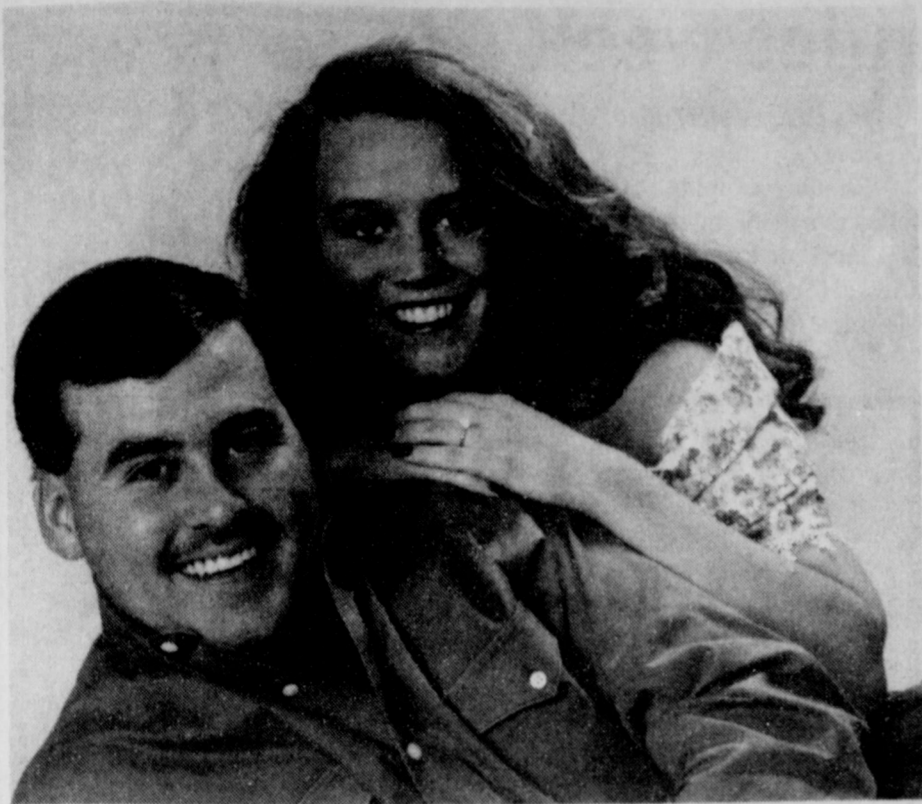
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Murphy, Ward nuptial vows exchanged recently

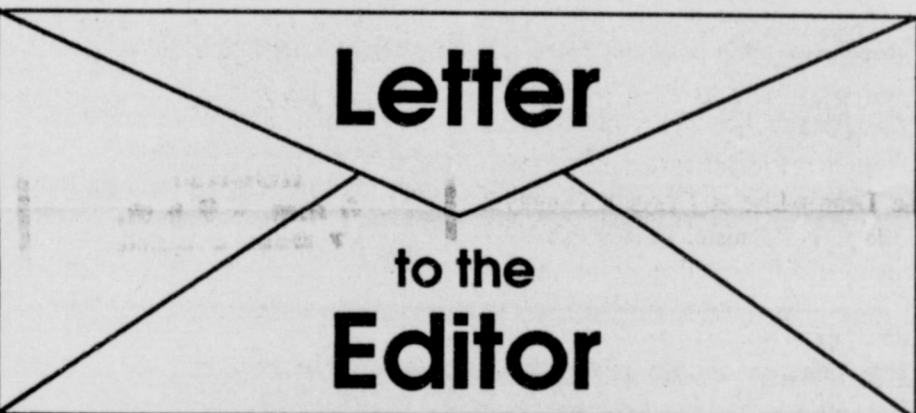

This letter is written due to my concern for our elderly patients who are residents of Heritage Manor Rest Home. My husband is one of the residents and it seems that I had just been able to get him settled in and stable enough that he doesn't walk off so often. I called there today to check on him and learned that the administrator has been terminated on the spur of the moment. I called the Regional Vice President to make an inquiry about this matter and she advised me that he has had some problems in the past but it seems the conversation centered around the main reason being due to the fact that the number of residents are a factor for his termination.

We discussed the fact that Heritage Manor is an older home and doesn't look as nice as some of the newer ones but that the residents get good care. I advised her that I had much rather have my husband get good care than sitting in a pretty facility as I have personally been in one of those pretty facilities for 4 days and got very poor care. Maybe that is one thing the owner should consider, uplifting it.

I also discussed with her the interest in knowing how other people who had relatives there might feel about this matter but she advised me I could not get names of patients relatives due to the privacy act.

So if you have relatives in Heritage Manor would you please call me to discuss your feelings about how you felt the administrator was handling his job with your loved ones. I feel sure that anyone with this type of job could not

make everyone happy and there would certainly be problems to be discussed and worked out but personally Mr. Taras had bent over backward for us and was helpful and willing to be helpful in any way he could.

I would like to discuss this matter with you if you have relatives in Heritage Manor because I feel that my husband having alzheimers has to get adjusted all over again. I also feel that it is very unfair to anyone to be terminated because they have a 77 bed facility with only about 40 patients and he certainly didn't have the staff to accommodate 77 patients and give them the individual care they need. I found Mr. Taras to be a very helpful and caring person. Should not our doctors take an interest in helping him to keep the facility occupied instead of referring them to Wichita Falls facilities. He would certainly need the staff to handle that number of elderly people.

Since I pay \$1581.00 monthly out of my pocket for my husband's care I feel that I should have a voice in who administers his care. We worked all our years to try to prepare for a matter of this nature, but we make too much money for subsistence. If he had never worked or paid Social Security, Medicare would pay his bill and give him \$30.00 month. So it really appears that we worked and made preparations for people who were not capable or didn't make preparations for themselves and it doesn't matter whether I have the money to live on every month and keep my house going or not. Please call me at 592-4987.

She has a 10-year-old daughter Kimberly, who is in the fifth grade at Bradford.

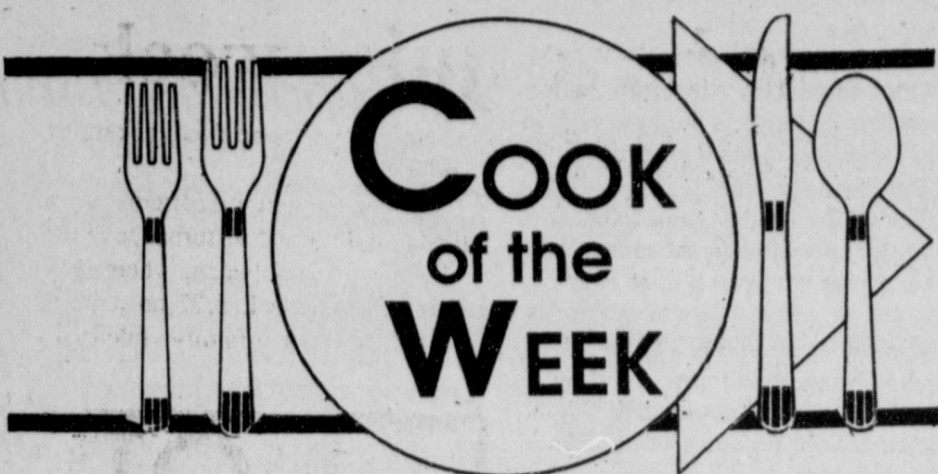

Chris' Favorite Meal

- 2 Tbsps. olive oil
 - 1/2 onion, chopped
 - 1 bell pepper, chopped
 - 1 jalapeno pepper (remove seeds) chopped
 - 1/2 tsp. ea. Rosemary, Oregano, Basil, Marjoram, Thyme
 - 1 bay leaf
 - 2 tsps. minced garlic
 - 1 large jar sliced mushrooms
 - 1 1/2 lbs. ground turkey
 - 1 can Hunt's chunky spaghetti sauce
- Saute onion, peppers, garlic and spices until onions are clear. Add meat and brown. Add sauce, mushrooms and bay leaf. Simmer at least 20 minutes to 1 hour. Remove bay leaf before serving. Serve over mound of spaghetti with garlic bread. Even better reheated.



Quick Banana Bran Muffins

- 1 1/2 cups oat bran or pulverized uncooked rolled oats
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
- 2 tsps. baking powder
- 2 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup (1 med.) mashed ripe banana
- 1 whole egg or 2 egg whites
- 1 cup chopped dates

In a large bowl, combine the oat bran or pulverized rolled oats, flour, brown sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, soda and nutmeg until smooth.

In another bowl, combine the buttermilk, oil, mashed banana and egg.

Stir the liquid ingredients into the dry ingredients all at once, stirring just until dry ingredients are moistened. Fold in the dates.

Grease 12 large muffin cups generously. Spoon muffin batter into the cups.

Bake at 375 degrees about 18 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Tip: To pulverize rolled oats, measure into container of blender or food processor with steel blade in place. Process until oats are pulverized to coarse crumbs. To substitute for buttermilk, if necessary, use 1 1/2 tsp. vinegar or lemon juice plus 1/2 cup milk.

Herbed Beef Patties

- 1 1/4 lbs. lean ground beef
- 3 Tbsp. cold water
- 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
- 1 tsp. dried oregano leaves
- Dash black pepper
- Dash paprika
- All-purpose flour
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1/4 cup fine seasoned bread crumbs
- 2 Tbsp. butter or margarine

Topping:
1 cup spaghetti sauce
3/4 cup grated Cheddar cheese
2 Tbsp. Parmesan cheese

1 Tbsp. chopped fresh herbs such as basil leaves, sage, oregano or thyme

In a bowl, combine ground beef, cold water, garlic salt, oregano, pepper and paprika. Mix to blend well. Divide meat into 4 even pieces. Shape each piece into a patty about 3/4 inch thick. Coat patties with flour. Let sit for a few minutes. Then dip patties into beaten egg and into bread crumbs. Brown patties on both sides in butter in a skillet.

Arrange patties in a shallow baking dish. Pour a little spaghetti sauce over patties. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Pour rest of the spaghetti sauce over patties. Bake at 400 degrees about 25 minutes or until patties are hot and cheese has melted. Sprinkle with herbs and serve.

Sherry's Dinner Rolls

- 1 pkg. active dry yeast
- 1/2 cup warm water (105-115 degrees)
- 1/3 cup shortening, melted and cooled
- 1/4 cup sugar
- Dash salt
- Dash ground nutmeg, optional
- 3/4 cup milk, scalded, (105 - 115 degrees)
- 2 eggs
- 3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

Combine yeast and warm water in large bowl. Let stand 5 minutes. Add melted shortening (cooled), sugar, salt and nutmeg, if used. Add milk and eggs and stir until well blended.

Gradually add flour, first 1 cup and then the remaining flour, beating until batter is smooth and satiny. Don't use too much flour, the dough should still be soft.

Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface. Knead a few times until dough is easy to handle. Let dough rise about 30 minutes. Punch down. Divide dough into 3 parts. Divide each into 6 smaller portions. Shape each portion into a small round ball. Place into muffin tins or paper cups. Let rise, covered, for another 50 to 60 minutes or until doubled. Bake at 400 degrees 10 to 12 minutes until golden brown and light.

Tip: You may use whole wheat flour in place of all-purpose flour. Do use at least 1 cup all-purpose flour and 2 1/4 to 2 1/2 cups whole wheat flour. You may also brush rolls with beaten egg and sprinkle with sesame seeds or fennel or poppy seeds.

Honeyed Chicken Teriyaki

- 2 lbs. chicken breasts, skinned and boned
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 2 eggs, beaten
- Oil for frying
- Glaze:
1/3 cup soy sauce
1/3 cup honey
1 Tbsp. dry sherry
1 clove garlic, minced or pressed
1 tsp. grated fresh ginger
2 Tbsp. sesame seeds, optional
Celery, for garnish

Combine flour, salt and pepper. Dip chicken in eggs, then coat with seasoned flour.

Pour 1/2 inch oil in a wide frying pan and place over medium-high heat.

To test temperature of oil, drop a pinch of flour into pan; flour should sizzle and float on hot fat. When fat is hot, add chicken, half at a time. Cook, turning as needed, until chicken is golden brown. Allow total of 6 to 8 minutes for larger pieces. 4 to 5 minutes for smaller pieces.

Meanwhile, heat soy sauce, honey, sherry, garlic and ginger in a small pan.

Lift chicken from oil and drain briefly. Dip in honey mixture, then place on a rack set in a baking pan. When all chicken is cooked and dipped, sprinkle with sesame seeds, if used. Bake at 250 degrees 20 minutes. Brush with glaze after 10 minutes. Serve hot or at room temperature.

Kimberly's Brownies

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 2 tsps. vanilla
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 cup toasted almonds, pecans or walnuts, optional
- 1 cup Nestles chocolate chips

Melt butter. Add sugar, eggs, cocoa and vanilla. Combine the flour and baking powder and stir into chocolate mixture.

Toast the nuts by spreading in a single layer in a shallow pan. Bake at 325 degrees 10 to 15 minutes.

Stir the nuts and chocolate chips into the batter. Spread batter in a 9x13 pan that is lightly greased. Bake at 350 degrees 35 to 40 minutes or until a toothpick comes out barely moist.

Cool in pan on a rack and cut into squares.

Lake Buffalo waters loaded with crappie

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. is reporting an excellent crappie population at Lake Buffalo.

Scott Robinson said a crappie sampling with nets at Buffalo and other lakes indicated the population and size of the fish.

Thirty six crappie per net were captured at Buffalo, and 61 percent of

the fish sampled were over 10 inches, Robinson said.

"Although this catch rate is not as high as the catch rate at Lake Wichita (67 per net), it is still excellent for this area," Robinson said.

"The crappie at Buffalo were also very thick and fat with a high weight to length ratio," Robinson continued.

He said the good places to fish on Buffalo are brushy or rocky points, creek channels in the upper end of the lake, and the dam.

Cooling water temperatures move crappie into relatively shallow water where they are easier to find and catch, and fishing pressure is typically light at this time of year.

Gordon Lake was stocked during November with 576 channel catfish, ranging in length from five to seven inches.

Fishermen interested in Lake Arrowhead will be interested to know that lake had the highest crappie catch rate of any of the area lakes. Nearly 165 crappie were captured per net there, but the majority were small, in the three-to-five inch range.

Legal size crappie are 10 inches or longer.

State Capital

AUSTIN — Activity in Capitol halls slowed over the Christmas and New Year holidays, but speculation remained at high speed over who Gov. Ann Richards will name as U.S. Senator.

Still lingering in discussions is the possibility that Richards will eventually name herself, by appointing a "caretaker" to serve until she wins the upcoming special election.

According to well-orchestrated leaks from the governor's office, candidates still on her "short list" are Congressmen Mike Andrews of Houston and Jim Chapman of Sulphur Springs, Railroad Commissioner Bob Krueger, Secretary of State John Hannah, and Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle.

Both Andrews and Chapman have the federal experience, obviously; Krueger, who lost '78 and '84 Senate races, has a statewide

organization and name ID.

Caretaker Strategy

The presence of Hannah and Earle on her list lend credence to those predicting Richards will name a caretaker to hold the seat while she runs as the Democratic Party's anointed candidate.

Neither has much statewide recognition, and only a little organization and campaign money; to choose either when better prepared candidates abound would be a clear signal that Richards will be a candidate this spring.

Both Hannah and Earle are long-time Richards' cronies who have done much to elevate her in Texas politics.

Sen. Ronnie Earle?

Earle, who as DA heads the Public Integrity Unit which investigates state government wrongdoing, and then-county commissioner Richards were allies in Austin's courthouse crowd in the 1970s.

When Richards challenged incumbent state Treasurer Warren G.

Harding in 1982, Earle prosecuted him, he copped a plea and quit the race; Richards won.

In 1983, Earle prosecuted Attorney General Jim Mattox, known to be on a collision course with Richards. Mattox was acquitted, then collided with her in the '90 gubernatorial primary. Richards won.

Some believe the governor was relieved when Earle prosecuted House Speaker Gib Lewis, sometimes a obstacle to her legislative program. Lewis pled guilty and will retire this month.

The Tennessee Signal

One sign of the times came last week when Tenn. Gov. Ned McWherter appointed his deputy as a "caretaker" for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Vice

President-elect Al Gore.

One certainty: Any poll will show that Richards is the most popular Democrat in state government.

But thus far, the governor has failed in her stated game plan to give the appointment advantage to a Democrat who can win in May.

Meanwhile, Republicans are officially lining up to run, diluting the edge Richards could give to a Democrat; the pressure for her to act is building.

As one observer said: "We're all on hold until we see who gets the appointment. Anyone who campaigns for anyone other than the governor's candidate is making a bad career move."

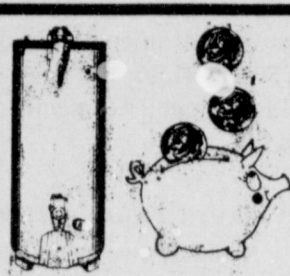

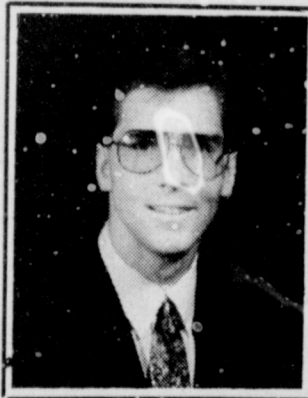

ARTHRITIS

Degenerative arthritis of the spine is one of the most common disorders that occurs, limiting function in persons over 50 years of age.
