Decision is postponed on gas street lighting

The city council spent more of Monday night's meeting discussing the type of lighting they want on West Park Boulevard, but reached no decision and voted to table the subject until next meeting.

The discussion centered on whether to switch to natural gas lighting fixtures, a proposal suggested and strongly supported by Mayor Wayne House, who asked the council, "Do we want to dress it (the street's appearance) up a little?"

Alderman Bob Hamilton said he saw no reason to spend more money to make something pretty, and have less light along the street than is now there.

During the early portion of the discussion, David Collins, of the public works department, explained how changing the light fixtures from mercury vapor to high pressure sodium could be accomplished.

He explained the change, which would cost \$92 per fixture, would produce more light, and then told the council how newer light fixtures per block would produce the same light as the old units now produce, but at less money.

Hamilton reminded the council that even if the gas lights were chosen, the standards would still require electrical service in order to utilize the Christmas decorations. That would add to the installation and operation costs, he said.

Lone Star Gas company, whose representatives told the council during the December meeting that they would encourage the changeover, promised to publicize Iowa Park throughout their territory.

The utility, since December, has figured a lower rate for street lighting. It does not now have a municipality using that type lighting.

Figures given the council last month was the annual cost for the three-block area would be \$4,405 annually. New rate estimate proposed at Monday's meeting was \$3,294.

Sales tax collections show gain

Strong business activity during November has given Iowa Park a financial boost for the new calendar year, according to this month's report from the state comptroller's office concerning sales taxes.

Local businesses collected 8.99 percent more in sales taxes that month than November of 1991.

The city has received a check in the amount of \$13,294.32, reflecting the gain over the \$12,197.53 received this time last year, according to the report.

Electra was the only other Wichita County city with a higher gain, 10.05 percent, than Iowa Park. Wichita Falls had a 1.82-percent gain, but Burkburnett was down a whopping 17.98 percent from November 1991 business.

Holliday also had a poor November for business, as that community suffered a 32.15-percent decrease from the previous year, according to the report.

The sales taxes reported were collected during November by the businesses, and reported in December to the comptroller's office.

Mitchell's contract extended

The Iowa Park School Board voted to extend Superintent Glenn Mitchell's contract during a regular meeting held Monday night.

Trustees announced that Mitchell's contract would be extended through June 30, 1996, with an annual salary of \$60,500 plus \$3,600 in travel allowance, following an executive session that lasted about one and a half





Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, gave a report on the exit level TAAS testing by Iowa Park High School 11th grade students, saying Iowa Park scored highest in the state in mathematics among schools this size.

The percentage of those meeting minimum expectations this year are 70 percent in math and 80 percent in reading, both up from the last school year. In writing, 81 percent met minimum expectations, down 7.9 percent from last year.

Twenty-six percent mastered all objectives in writing, up 3.8 percent from last year; 34 percent mastered all objectives in reading, up 12.2 percent; and 18 percent mastered math, down .5 percent.

Palmer said 11 students still have not passed exit level testing, which is necessary for graduation.

High School Principal Richard avis recommended to the board that three math and three English teachers already teaching in our system be hired to teach one additional period after school each week to help teach students who have failed the exit level TAAS tests.

The board approved the actual per period rate for all six teachers of \$1,301.94 total to teach remediation in those areas.







IS THE BIBLE OUR ONLY RULE?

Dear Sirs: You always talk about the Bible, but never about the role the Catholic Church had in giving it to us. If the Bible is to be our only rule, why did Christ allow people to go without the Bible for 1400 years? Why was it 400 years after the church was established before a complete copy of the Bible was ever put together?

With regard to Christ allowing people to go without the Bible for 1400 years, let me suggest some things to consider. There has never been a time since the revealing of the New Testament in the first century by the Holy Spirit that God's Word has been taken from the world. "When he the Spirit of truth is come, he shall guide you into all the truth...Sanctify them with the truth, thy word is truth...His divine power hath granted unto us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of him that called us" (John 16:13; 17:17; 2 Peter 1:3). It is true that prior to Tyndale's English New Testament and the invention of the printing press in the early 1500's, the circulation of the written word was far from widespread. This was due mainly to the slow, tedious job of writing by hand each copy of the bible. In 1382, when Wycliffe turned out his translation of the New Testament, historians tell us that it took ten months to write just one copy which sold for

To make the statement it was 400 years after the church before a complete copy of the Bible was put together is historically inaccurate. Jerome's Latin Vulgate has been pronounced authentic by the Roman church, and it was translated in 385 A.D. Jerome said that he used a Greek Bible that belonged to Origen, a man who lived in the early 200's. Origen, who lived from 185 to 254 A.D., listed all the New Testament books in his works. The Syriac and Coptic versions were translated from the Greek language in the second century, within less than 100 years of the times of the apostles. You will find most of this information in any good Bible encyclopedia, as all church historians know these truths.

Mosheim, the dean of religious historians, said, "before the middle of the second century, the greatest part of the books of the New Testament were read in every Christian society throughout the world and read as a divine rule of faith and manners" (Book 1, page 31). This means that before the year 150 A.D. the books of the New Testament were recognized, read, and followed. In other words, the "canon" of the Bible was established and followed within 50 years of the death of the apostles.

Watkins coached Iowa Park 12 years, winning the state championship in 1969 and sharing the title in 1970. He also coached six years at Andrews and six more at Uvalde.
