Area escapes serious ice storm

The Iowa Park area narrowly escaped a damaging and hazardous ice storm Tuesday, when the temperature rose above freezing for the first time between 8 and 9 that evening.

Ice began collecting on anything above ground level during the day, as more than three-quarters of an inch precipitated fell.

Virgil Woodfin said he measured .78 of an inch precipitation, which fell mostly in the form of rain.

Higher soil temperatures apparently prevented any icing on streets, even though the air temperature ranged from 30 to 32 until after 8 p.m.

City Administrator Gary Jones said the street crew had trucks loaded with sand, and was standing by throughout the day, in the event ice did begin forming on the streets.

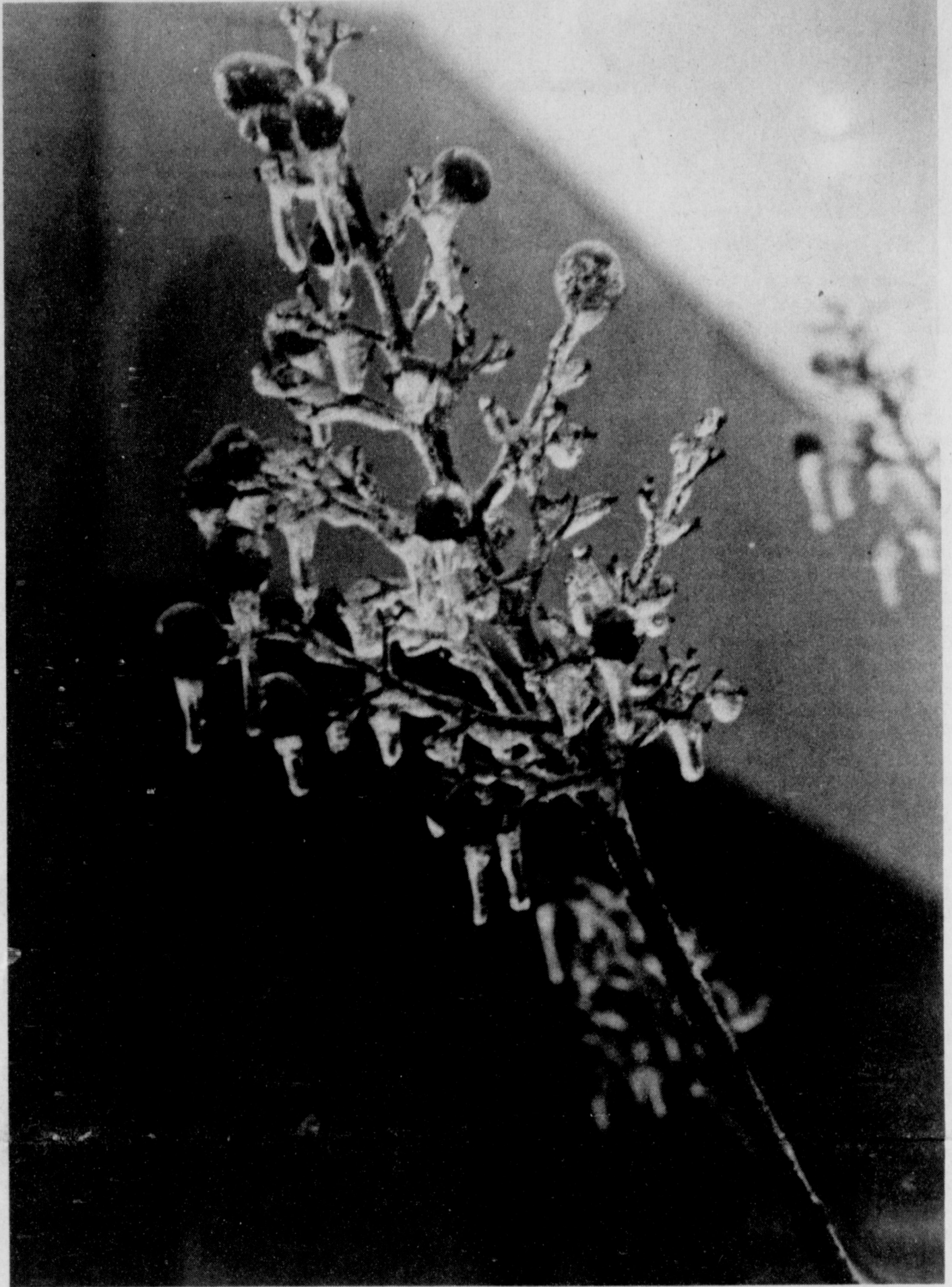
Though there was a mid-day two-vehicle accident at the intersection of Colorado and Lafayette, it was not believed to have been caused by slick road

surface. No ice was detected on the pavement by emergency and police personnel.

Most of the frozen pavement was reported to the west of Electra.

Some sleet and snow pellets were detected on vehicles during the day, but most of the moisture fell in the form of rain.

Trees, shrubbery and fences were coated with ice Wednesday morning, but melting began early in the day.

Preacher sees childhood friend become president

An Iowa Park minister, his wife and son, have had a busy week in the nation's capital, taking part in the 42nd presidential inauguration activities.

Rev. Phil McLarty, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, was invited to the activities both because he attended a kindergarten school in Hope, Ark. with Pres. Bill Clinton, and his first cousin, Mack McLarty, has been named the new president's White House chief of staff.

Rev. McLarty's departure to Washington D.C. was slightly delayed Sunday, when he accepted an invitation to officiate at the funeral service of A.K. "Bumps" Settle that afternoon at Dutton Funeral Home.

The minister has been mentioned in stories appearing Monday and Tuesday in the *Dallas Morning News*.

Reporter Nancy Kruh, in her report Tuesday on Monday's activities concerning bus trips to various activities, wrote:

"By mid-afternoon, the rain had stopped, and the passengers had settled into their journey. But the bus' picture windows were still fogged. Phil McLarty passed the time by doing a crossword puzzle, while his wife, Donna, played checkers with their 17-year-old son, Chris.

"He (McLarty) recalled being raised in Hope to think anyone could grow up to be president. It's unbelievable to me that the fantasy that guides this country

is really true."

In Wednesday's edition, Kruh wrote, "Day Two of the group's bus trip began in Knoxville, Tenn. The Rev. Phil McLarty, a Hope native who's now a Presbyterian minister in Wichita Falls, Texas, offered an early morning prayer over the bus loudspeaker.

"Help us be mindful of the significance of this moment. . . . We pray the Clinton administration will be able to work of one mind to lead our country forward in the days ahead."

"Mr. McLarty ended with an appeal to 'give us a sense of joy and peace, even on this bus.' But the emotions on Tuesday's ride had more to do with the growing sense of anticipation."

Council may decide on street's lighting

The city council is expected to make a final decision on the type of lighting that will illuminate Park West, when the council meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

This will be the third meeting at which the subject has either been pre-

sented or considered.

At issue is whether to change from electric lighting to natural gas lighting, change the type of electric light fixtures to another kind that produces more light with fewer fixtures, or leave the lights as they are.

No decision was reached during the Jan. 11 meeting, when aldermen voted to table the subject.

A lease agreement to permit Cellular One to place radio antennas atop the Johnson Road water tower, as well as install a small equipment building at its base, will be considered for approval.

Authorization will be considered for the city administrator to purchase

seven portable radios for the police department. The units cost \$550 each, for a total of \$3,850.

Also, authorization will be considered to permit the administrator to advertise and accept bids for the sale of certain city-owned properties, as well as grazing rights at Lake Buffalo.

The council will be asked to approve an interlocal agreement with the City of Electra, to lease that city's brush chipper at a rate of \$80 per day.

Aldermen had included the purchase of a chipper when preparing this year's budget, and since learned they might save money by leasing Electra's unit, rather than purchasing one.

Western Hash

- 1 lb. ground beef (or venison)
- 1 lb. can tomatoes
- 1 cup chopped green bell pepper
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup uncooked rice
- 1/2 tsp. salt

Cook meat; drain. Add the remaining ingredients. Simmer 25 minutes. Put in a baking dish and top with Velveeta cheese or sliced cheese and melt in oven.

Summer Sausage

- 5 lbs. ground lean venison (or beef)
- 5 Tbsp. Morton's Tender Quik
- 2 tsp. garlic salt
- 2 1/2 tsp. coarse black pepper
- 2 1/2 tsp. mustard seed
- 1 tsp. liquid smoke

Mix all ingredients; cover and refrigerate 4 days; mix every day. On the 4th day, form into rolls; wrap in foil, and bake in pan for 8 hours at 150 degrees.

Oklahoma Beef Supper

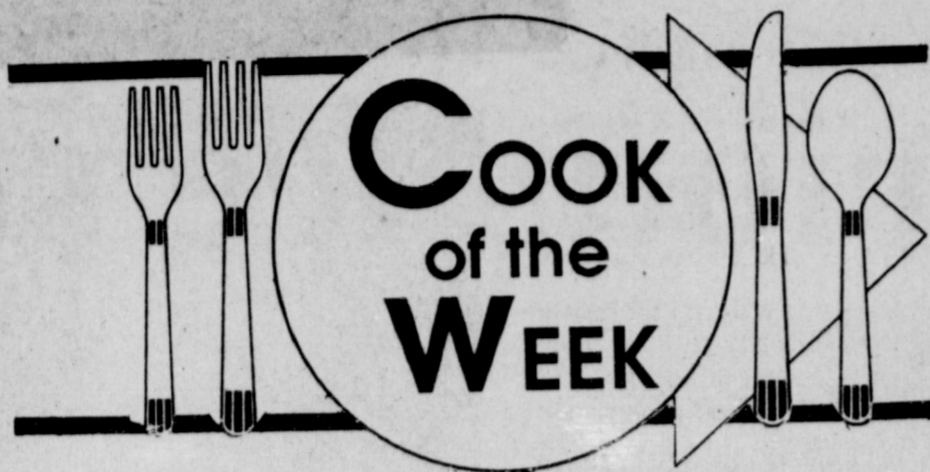
- 2 Tbsp. oil
- 2 lbs. beef stew meat
- 1 large onion, sliced
- 1 cup water
- 2 large potatoes, pared and thinly sliced
- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1 1/4 cup milk
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1 1/2 cups Wheaties cereal, crushed

Salt and pepper to taste
Cook and stir meat and onions in oil until meat is brown and onion is tender. Add water, heat to boiling. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 20 minutes. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Pour meat mixture into baking dish; arrange potato slices on meat. Stir together soup, milk, salt and pepper and pour over potatoes. Sprinkle cheese and cereal over the top. Bake, uncovered, 1 1/2 hours or until potatoes are tender. Serves 6.

Skillet Stew

- 1 lb. venison, cut up
- 1/2 cup carrots, chopped
- 2 to 4 potatoes, chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1/2 can water

Quick brown venison. Add all other ingredients and bring to a boil. Then cover and simmer 45 minutes or until meat is tender. Serves 4 to 6.



Fruit Cobbler

- 1 stick butter
- Melt in pan and set aside.
- Mix together:
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- Dash of salt
- 3/4 cup milk

Pour over melted butter, DONOT MIX. Add 1 can of fruit. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

Tomato Beef Casserole

- 1/2 lb. ground beef (or venison)
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced

- 1 - 5.5 oz. pkg. Betty Crocker Au Gratin potatoes
- 2 1/2 cups boiling water
- 1 cup frozen peas, thawed
- 2 medium tomatoes, chopped
- 4 oz. shredded Cheddar cheese

Place beef, salt, onion, and garlic in large skillet. Cook until beef is brown and onion is tender. Drain.

Place potatoes and sauce mix in ungreased 1 1/2-quart casserole dish. Stir in boiling water, stir in beef mixture, peas, tomatoes, and half of the cheese. Bake uncovered at 400 degrees 40 to 45 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Sprinkle with remaining cheese during the last 5 minutes of baking. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Serves 6.

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As I See It

For more than 20 years, I've had an industry-development idea on the back burner.

After reading a news release this past week from the Texas Department of Agriculture, I want to bring it up to the front, once more.

Soon after moving to Iowa Park, the idea hit me. I approached B.T. Haws with it, but never heard anything back. I guess that was because it was in the winding-down period of his job as Wichita County Agriculture Agent.

My suggestion is for someone to take the leadership to develop either a cooperative or company, for the production of catfish.

There are hundreds and hundreds of acres adjoining the irrigation ditch that do little more than producing coastal bermuda... a low-yielding crop for cattle grazing.

Water from Lake Kemp, which passes through Lake Diversion, is contaminated with salt, making it useless for anything except flood irrigation.

Flood irrigation is expensive, if one wants to use it on row crops, because it requires more manpower than sprinkler irrigation. This salty water kills any plant on which water is sprinkled on its leaves.

Also, rural property owners in the water district are charged for the service, whether they use the water or not.

So, with all that in mind, it would seem to me that putting all this land and water to use in a productive, or more productive, practice can be accomplished.

I suggest that someone could coordinate with the property owners the locations for catfish farming ponds along the irrigation channel's network.

Then, trained professionals in catfish farming could manage the ponds, from stocking to feeding to harvesting.

And, in case you may have forgotten, we have an immediate source of stocker fish. Remember, one of the state's largest fish hatcheries is located at Lake Diversion, which could be the supplier.

The property owner would be paid on the basis of pond size, or whatever method would be determined and appropriate.

With all this in place, it would seem that a processing and freezing industry could be either formed or attracted to handle the meat that was not sold fresh. Shipment would be simple, in that this area is well situated along railroad and highway routes to about any major market you could want.

There is a need for this industry, according to the news release I mentioned earlier.

At the present time, the Department says there are only 169 catfish farms in all of Texas. And these are not producing enough for Texan consumption. Because of that, the deficit is made up by producers in Mississippi.

"We aim to change that by increasing production of Texas-raised catfish," Commissioner Rick Perry said.

The Department can provide financial assistance through the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority's loan guaranties and Linked Deposit Program.

Also, the Department is working with the industry, its representative organizations like the Texas Aquaculture Association, scientists at institutions such as the Texas A&M Sea Grant College, and other government agencies to develop and promote high quality, Texas-produced aquaculture products.

Is anybody listening? Is anybody interested? We're talking about using what we have available, for new dollars and payrolls.

Now, let's see if someone has the initiative to put all this together.

AUSTIN — Texas legislators opened the regular session by vowing to resolve the controversial public school finance crisis within the first 30 days.

House members elected Rep. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, as house speaker, and senators named Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, president pro tem.

Laney told members his top priority was to restore public trust, a sentiment echoed in Texas Secretary of State John Hannah's speech to members.

Hannah told them: "The public's frustration with politics is real. Their mistrust of the political system runs deep."

One observer commented: "He ought to know; he caught enough flak this summer when he tried to void the primary elections to help Democrats."

Lawmakers hope to agree on a public school finance amendment by February, which is the deadline for making the special election ballot, expected to be called May 1 to elect a successor to vacating U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

Senate Race Widens

Gov. Richards' hand-picked candidate in that contest, Bob Krueger, won endorsements last week from the AFL-CIO and the Texas Democratic Party's executive committee, an initial victory over potential opponent, former Attorney General Jim Mattox.

Mattox, who asked both groups to remain neutral, has made all the motions of being a candidate, except an official announcement, which he may do soon.

He also issued a blanket apology to Richards. In their 1990 gubernatorial battle, he asked her to deny she had ever used drugs. Richards won the election, but some voters still remember Mattox's image of Richards' life before she became a recovering alcoholic.

"Jim, don't do this. This isn't your race," Krueger advised.

Meanwhile, if Democratic party faithful are solidifying behind a single candidate, Republicans are spreading their political strength: Texas Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison and Houston Congressman Jack Fields officially entered the race last week. U.S. Rep. Joe Barton of Ennis catered the race earlier.

Both Hutchison and Fields promised to serve no more than two terms and to support term limitations, which Krueger opposes.

New Appointments

Gov. Richards appointed Mary Scott Nabers to the Texas Railroad Commission seat being vacated by Krueger, and state Rep. Eddie Cavazos, D-Corpus Christi, will fill Nabers' seat representing employers on the Texas Employment Commission.

Worth Quoting

IOWA PARK - Once they were young. Now they are old.

Actually, it is really "younger" and "older." So are we all.

Nothing changes much. Just time and circumstances and situations.

Personalities are pretty much the same. Mean and green. Charming and debonair. Coy and shy. Coquettish and maneuvering. Manipulative and domineering. Ambitious and aggressive. Lackadaisical and dreamy. Shaking and moving.

Ex-students had returned to their old hometown.

I don't actually know many of them, though I am sure I had seen many of them on the school grounds and in town some years back, say 30 or 40. Just a mere blink in time. That's what it seems like.

The setting was the Iowa Park High School Reunion, where the hometown alumni had decided especially to recognize all the graduating classes from 1902 to '92.

The reunion, which was in the new high-school cafeteria, looked like a roomful of senior citizens. And, overall, I suppose they were.

Of course, there were none at the Saturday night banquet from turn of the century, though there were some graduates from classes in the '20s. None from the '90s showed up. Maybe there were a couple from the decades of '70s and '80s. There were more from the classes of the '60s, but not many. My kid brother, Gene, class of '64, was pretty well socked in Louisiana and didn't drive in.

I was the lone soul from the class of '56, which graduated 30-odd seniors.

There was a bunch from the '50s, particularly from the class of '52 -- a solid 40 years ago. My older brother, Delbert, was in that lot and still is in

town. He left the community for several years to get his military service and college education, returned, taught school, retired, and is busy dabbling in railroading -- his childhood fascination.

There were a slew of folks from the class of '42. That class from 50 years ago was put on the line-up, and each one offered an endearing comment about the other.

About the most memorable comment came from Norman Beaver, class of '42 graduate, who went into preaching and then, in what some term "retirement years," took up accounting.

Mr. Beaver honored those who had passed on, those who had died in World War II in their tender years, which were quickly hardened by war, and those who had just grown older.

"We remember them not because they died but because they lived," Beaver said.

In the main, there was laughter, no talk about who was more worldly "successful" than others.

There was a bit of wisdom and truth: "Wherever you go, there you are." In their mind's-eye, they were teenagers who, suddenly, it seemed, had grown older.

One fellow, a tall, gentle man, got around with the aid of a mechanical walker but was just as alive as those rushing around before and after supper, which was prepared by the Iowa Park Mule Skinners.

Another fellow, Charles Agee from the class of '39, who was blessed with a melodious voice, led the Iowa Park-eyes in singing "God Bless America" and proudly and humbly announced: "I do love America and my wife."

Of course, there was fond talk about the teachers and Mr. Bradford, the superintendent "back when," and the marching band and the football team --

the "mean green" Iowa Park Hawks.

"This is the dude that made them mean," one ex-student said of another.

And there was the sentimental lady who talked about all of her classmate-friends, whom she called her brotherly and sisterly "lovers."

Going to the reunion was enlightening.

Quickly, you learn how brief is this earthly existence, how fleeting time is, and that we are just one among many.

And you don't have to be a veteran of life to know that.

Those high-schoolers know that. Just ask any ex-student who braved those adventuresome teenage years where there is more wisdom gained than is readily apparent.

A bit of artwork, graced with one of life's poignant observations and high on the cafeteria wall, said as much:

"All we are is dust in the wind. Same old song. Just a drop."

DID ALEXANDER CAMPBELL BUILD THE CHURCH OF CHRIST?

Since all denominations have a human founder and a date of establishment centuries after Christ established His church, many have tried to find a man who established the church of Christ. Most have thought that Alexander Campbell established it in 1813. Read from the documents held by Dr. Robinson, principal of Overdale College, Birmingham, England:

"In the Furness District of Lancashire in North West England - there existed in 1669 during the reign of Charles II, a group of eight churches of Christ. Most of them are not now in existence. An old minute-book has been found on the year 1669 and it shows they called themselves by the name of church of Christ, practiced baptism by immersion, celebrated the Lord's Supper on each Lord's Day, and had elders and deacons. There was also a church of Christ in Dungannon, Ireland in 1804; one in Allington Denbighshire. In 1735 John Davis, a young preacher, in the Fife District of Scotland was preaching New Testament Christianity twenty-five years before Thomas Campbell (Alexander Campbell's father) was born."

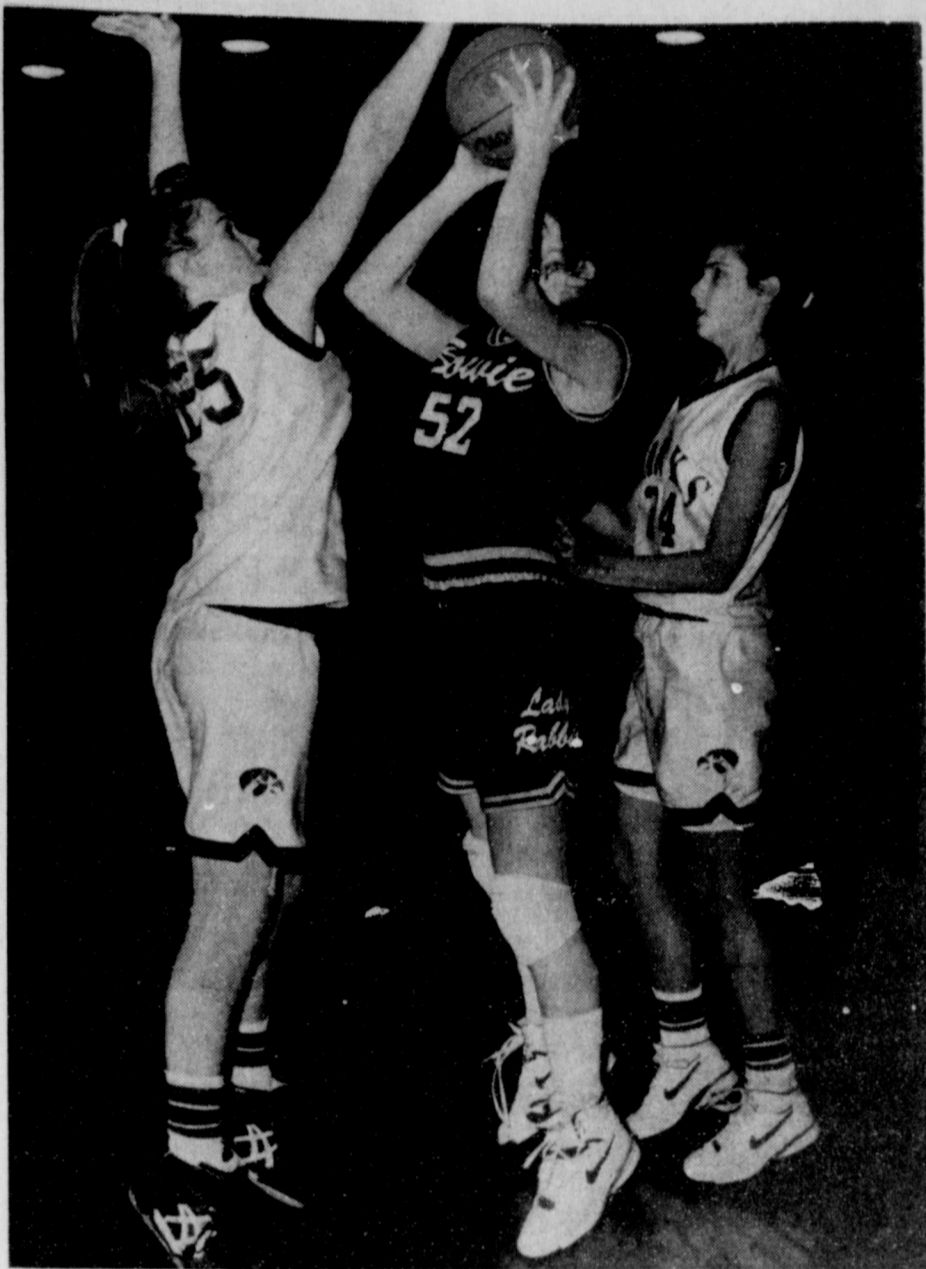

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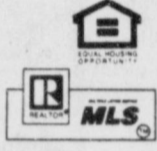
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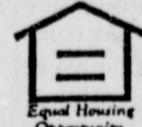
