Ice began collecting on anything above ground level during the day, more than three-quarters of an inch precipitaton fell.

Virgil Woodfin said he measured .78 of an inch precipitation, which fell mostly in the form of rain.

Higher soil temperatures apparently evented any icing on streets eventhough the air temperature ranged from 30 to 32 until after 8 p.m. City Administrator Gary Jones said he street crew had trucks loaded with and, and was standing by throughou forming on the streets.

Though there was a mid-day two ehicle accident at the intersection of Colorado and Lafayette, it was not believed to have been caused by slick road
sura. No ice was detected on the pavement by emergency and police personnel.
Most of the frozen pavement wa reported to the west of Electra.

Some sleet and snow pellets wer detected on vehicles during the day, bu most of the moisture fell in the form of rain.
Trees, shrubbery and fences wer coated with ice Wednesday morning but melting began early in the day.

Water from Lake Kemp, which passes through Lake Diversion, is contaminated with salt, making it useless for anylhing except lood inigation. want touse it mon crons because wants to use it on row crops, because irrigation. This salty water kills any plant on which water is sprinkled on its

Also, rural property owners in the water district are charged for the ser, whether they use the water or not. m to me that putting all this land and water to use in a productive, or more productive, practice can be accomplished.

I suggest that someone could coordinate with the property owners the locations for catfish farming pondsalong irrigation channel's network.
frming could manse the ponds fish farming could manage the ponds, And, in case you may have forgotten, we have an immediate source of stocker fish. Remember, one of the state's largest fish hatcheries is located at Lake Diversion, which could be the supplier. The property owner would be paid on the basis of pond size, or whatever method would be determined and appropriate.

With all this in place, it would seem that a processing and freezing industry could be either formed or attracted to handie the meat that was not sold fresh.
Shipment would be simple, in that this area is well situated along railroad and highway routes to about any major market you could want.

There is a need for this industry, according to the news release I men ioned earlier.

## DID ALEXANDER CAMPBELL

 BUILD THE CHURCH OF CHRIST? Since all denominations have a human founder and a date of estabishment centuries after Christ established His church, many have rried to find a man who established the church of Christ lished the church of Christ. Most have thought that
Alexander Camphell established Alexander Campbell established it in 1813 . Read from the documents held by Dr. Robinson, principal of Overdale College, Birmingham, England:
"In the Furness District of Lancashire in North West England - there existed in 1669 during the reign of Charles II, a group of eight churches of Christ. Most of them are no now in existence. An old minute-book has been found on the year 1669 and it shows they called themselves by the name of church of Christ, practiced baptism by immer sion, celebrated the Lord's Supper on each Lord's Day and had elders and deacons. There was also a church o Christ in Dungannon, Ireland in 1804; one in Allington Denbighshire. In 1735 John Davis, a young preacher, in the Fife District of Scotland was preaching New Testament Christianity twenty-five years before Thomas Campbell (Alexander Campbell's father) was born.

As you can see 150 years before Campbell was sup posed to have established the church of Christ, it existed as it does today! And if you go back 1900 years in history you will find that it exists today as it did then! It has the same name, organization, doctrine, and practices today as it did then.

## ARTHRITIS

Degenerative arthritis of the spine is one of the most common disorders that occurs, limiting function in persons over 50 years of age.
